#### **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Hold a Public Hearing to receive public comments for the Board to adopt amendments to the IEUA's Conflict of Interest Code, establishing disclosure categories specifying the types of economic interests that must be reported by designated positions within the Agency; and
- 2. After closing the Public Hearing, adopt Resolution No. 2017-1-4, adopting amendments to the IEUA Conflict of Interest Code.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Under the Political Reform Act, all public agencies are required to adopt a Conflict of Interest Code.

A Conflict of Interest Code specifically enumerates positions within the Agency, which involve the making or participation in the making of decisions which may foreseeably have a material financial effect on any financial interest of the Agency. Typically, positions that involve voting on matters, negotiating contracts, or making recommendations on purchases without substantive review must be included in the Conflict of Interest Code. Each code designates positions required to file a Statement of Economic Interests, Form 700, and assigns disclosure categories specifying the types of interests to be reported. The Form 700 is a public document intended to alert public officials and the public to the types of financial interests that may create a conflict of interest.

Amendments to Conflict of Interest Code January 18, 2017 Page 2

In December 2014, the Board last amended its Conflict of Interest Code (the "2014 Code"). The Agency's current Conflict of Interest Code is attached as Exhibit "A." Staff recommends that the Board amend the 2014 Code for three reasons. The proposed amended Conflict of Interest Code is attached as Exhibit "B."

First, a few designated positions in the 2014 Code have been eliminated. Staff recommends these designated positions be removed from the Conflict of Interest Code.

Second, the 2014 Code should be amended to reflect the Agency's revision of employees' job titles, particularly with respect to designated positions.

Third, the 2014 Code should be amended to reflect additional positions that participate in the making of decisions which may foreseeably have a material financial effect on any financial interest.

The Political Reform Act provides that the San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors is the "code reviewing body" for local agencies whose jurisdiction is wholly within the County of San Bernardino. Therefore, after the Board adopts the amendments to the Agency's Conflict of Interest Code, the code must be reviewed and approved by the Board of Supervisors before it becomes effective.

#### **PRIOR BOARD ACTION**

In December 17, 2014, the Board last amended the Agency's Conflict of Interest Code.

#### **IMPACT ON BUDGET**

There is no impact on the Agency's FY 2016/17 budget as a result of the adoption of Resolution No. 2017-1-4, for the amendments to the Agency's Conflict of Interest Code.

# CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODE OF THE INLAND EMPIRE UTILITIES AGENCY, A MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT

The Political Reform Act (Government Code Section 81000 et seq.) requires state and local government agencies to adopt and promulgate Conflict of Interest The Fair Political Practices Commission has adopted a regulation (2 California Code of Regulations Section 18730) which contains the terms of a standard Conflict of Interest Code. After public notice and hearing it may be amended by the Fair Political Practices Commission to conform to amendments in the Political Reform Act. Therefore, the terms of 2 California Code of Regulations Section 18730 and any amendments to it duly adopted by the Fair Political Practices Commission are hereby incorporated by reference. This regulation and the attached Appendix designating officials and employees and establishing disclosure categories shall constitute the Conflict of Interest Code of the Inland Empire Utilities Agency, a municipal water district, replacing the Agency's current Conflict of Interest Code last amended in February 2010.

Designated employees shall file their statements of economic interest with the Inland Empire Utilities Agency, who will make the statements available for public inspection and reproduction pursuant to Government Code Section 81008. Statements for all designated employees will be retained by the Inland Empire Utilities Agency.

Persons in this category shall disclose all investments, business positions interests in real property, and sources of income, including gifts, loans, and travel payments, involving entities that (1) do business or own real property within the Agency's jurisdiction, (2) plan to do business or own real property within the Agency's jurisdiction within the next year; or (3) or have done business or owned real property within the Agency's jurisdiction within the past two years.

#### Designated Persons in Category "2" Must Report:

Persons in this category shall disclose all investments, business positions interests in real property, and sources of income, including gifts, loans, and travel payments, from sources that provided leased facilities, goods, equipment, vehicles, machinery, or services, including training or consulting services, of the type utilized by the Agency.

#### Designated Persons in Category "3" Must Report:

Persons in this category shall disclose all interests in real property located within the Agency's jurisdiction, including property located within a two-mile radius of any property owned or used by the Agency.

#### Designated Persons in Category "4" Must Report:

Persons in this category shall disclose all investments and business positions in business entities, interests in real property, and income from sources involving business entities that have filed a claim, or have a claim pending against the Agency.

#### PUBLIC OFFICIALS WHO MANAGE PUBLIC INVESTMENTS

The following positions are not covered by the Conflict of Interest Code because they must file under Government Code Section 87200, and therefore, are listed for informational purposes only:

#### Chief Financial Officer

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the Inland Empire Utilities Agency\* was held at the office of the Agency, 6075 Kimball Avenue, Bldg. A., Chino, California on the above date.

Vice President Camacho called the meeting to order at 10:07 a.m., and Director Hofer led the pledge of allegiance to the flag. A quorum was present.

Vice President Camacho stated that members of the public may address the Board. There was no one desiring to do so.

Vice President Camacho asked if there were any changes/additions/deletions to the agenda.

Director Elie stated that he would like to add an Action Item to today's agenda. He stated that there were circumstances that came to his attention after the posting of the agenda on December 1, related to Resolution No 2016-8-1, adopted at the August 17, 2016 Board meeting. He said that Resolution No. 2016-8-1, requested the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) of San Bernardino County to initiate proceedings for the consolidation of the Chino Basin Water Conservation District (CBWCD) with Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA). He reported that if the Board does not act today, some deadlines might pass, if the Board waits until the December 21 Board meeting. Director Elie noted that General Counsel Cihigoyenetche stated that this is the appropriate venue and would require a 4/5 vote to add this item today's agenda.

#### 1. WORKSHOP

#### **FINANCE WORKSHOP**

Chief Financial Officer Christina Valencia gave a PowerPoint presentation during the Finance Workshop. She stated that this is the first of several Finance Workshops that will be held, as we proceed with the preparation of the biennial budget.

She stated that for the benefit of the new Board members, the workshop will focus on two key areas; an overview of the Agency's funds and the refinancing of 2008A Revenue Bonds. Ms. Valencia provided a general overview of each the Agency's seven funds, purpose, major funding sources, and major expenses.

Ms. Valencia stated that the 2008A Bonds Refinancing Board letter was pulled from the November 16, Board meeting agenda, as requested by the Regional Technical Committee members. She said that the members requested additional time to review the different scenarios considered by the IEUA staff and the Agency's financial team. She also noted that the Regional Technical Committee members requested that IEUA staff meet with the Regional Committees, which occurred on December 1 with the Technical Committee, and December 6 with the Policy Committee. She reported that the majority of Committee members were in favor with staff's recommendation of Scenario 3. She noted that staff received one comment from the City of Ontario, which basically states that Ontario favors the full refinancing scenario (Scenario 4). Ms. Valencia reviewed the four scenarios, which includes 1) Baseline/Do nothing; 2) 5-Year Pay Down; 3) Partial Refinancing/Cash Pay Down; and 4) Full Refinancing. Ms. Valencia stated that this item will be presented as an Action Item at the December 21, Board meeting. Discussion ensued regarding the different scenarios. Director Elie stated that it is important when the Board is thinking about the scenarios, that the Board consider the big picture agency-wide, and determine what is fair and equitable. He stated the fact that Capital Construction Reimbursement funds is available for this very purpose, and the Agency has an obligation to stakeholders to determine the best use of funds for the entire region.

# ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION NO. 2016-12-4, RESCINDING RESOLUTION NO 2016-8-1, WITHDRAWING APPLICATION 3214, AND TERMINATE FURTHER CONSOLIDATION PROCEEDINGS WITH CBWCD

Director Elie stated that Resolution No. 2016-12-4, was drafted this morning to reflect what he will propose. He stated that there were circumstances that have happened and have changed since the time that the Agency passed Resolution 2016-8-1. He stated that late yesterday, the Agency received a copy of a letter prepared by Supervisor Hagman that was mailed to the LAFCO Commission. Director Elie stated that there have been significant developments since August, which has been an ongoing issue. He further stated that for the good of the Agency, we need to focus on many things and while at the time the Agency passed the Resolution in August, he was in favor of it, circumstances and times change and we need to be nimble, and we need to be guick because there could be some actions taken that might be irrevocable in the short term. Director Elie stated that he is recommending to the Board that we adopt Resolution No. 2016-12-4, to rescind the action the IEUA Board took in August, and drop the matter and move on as an Agency. He further directed staff to deliver a copy of the adopted Resolution No. 2016-12-4 to LAFCO immediately, if adopted by the Board. He stated that this is for the good of the Agency. He noted IEUA is a great Agency that does great things and continues to do great things. However, the events surrounding this LAFCO application have been a distraction for staff and the Board, and for the good of the region the Agency needs to focus on other things and move on. He stated that it is the right thing to do.

Director Hofer commented, "Well done, thank you".

# **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Award the consulting engineering services contract for the RP-1 Flare Improvements Project No. EN18006, to LEE & RO, Inc., for the not-to-exceed amount of \$378,030; and
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to execute the contract.

# **BACKGROUND**

The Regional Water Recycling Plant No. 1 (RP-1) has been in service for over 60 years. As part of the treatment process the facility generates digester gas. Digester gas is produced within the digesters and conveyed via pipeline to gas consumers within RP-1; currently hot water boilers and future cogeneration facilities (internal combustion engines, microturbines, etc.).

Currently, the only active gas consumer are the hot water boilers which produce necessary hot water for digesters heating; however, the boilers only consume about 25 percent of the digester gas produced and the rest of the gas must be flared. The flare system is essential to the gas system operation in maintaining regulatory compliance and safety, essentially functioning as a large pressure relief valve. The existing RP-1 flare (original to plant) has limited capacity and cannot support the increased digester gas production projected for RP-1. If digester gas is not able to be flared

adequately, the gas pressure within the digesters will rise and result in venting gas which would be a violation of the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) regulatory requirements.

SCAQMD will consider the adoption of the 2016 Air Quality Management Plan in February 2017. In the Plan, the SCAQMD is seeking emission reductions from non-refinery flares by requiring all non-refinery flares to meet current best available control technology.

In order to meet the new proposed requirements, this project will install three new gas flares to effectively control and accommodate the maximum digester production at RP-1. The upgraded flare system will be fully redundant, automated, and will maintain the highest levels of operability, serviceability, and reliability for current and long-term operations and regulatory requirements.

On November 2, 2016, Inland Empire Utilities Agency's (IEUA) staff advertised on *Planet Bids* the Request for Proposals for consulting engineering services. On November 29, 2016, IEUA received three proposals. The proposals were reviewed by a selection committee consisting of IEUA staff from Engineering and Construction Management, Operations and Maintenance, and Contracts. Based on the project team qualifications and experience, understanding of the project scope, and ability to meet the project schedule, the committee concurred that LEE & RO, Inc. was the most qualified firm to do the work. Staff reviewed LEE & RO, Inc. fee proposal and concluded that the proposed fee is fair, equitable, and appropriate for the scope of the project.

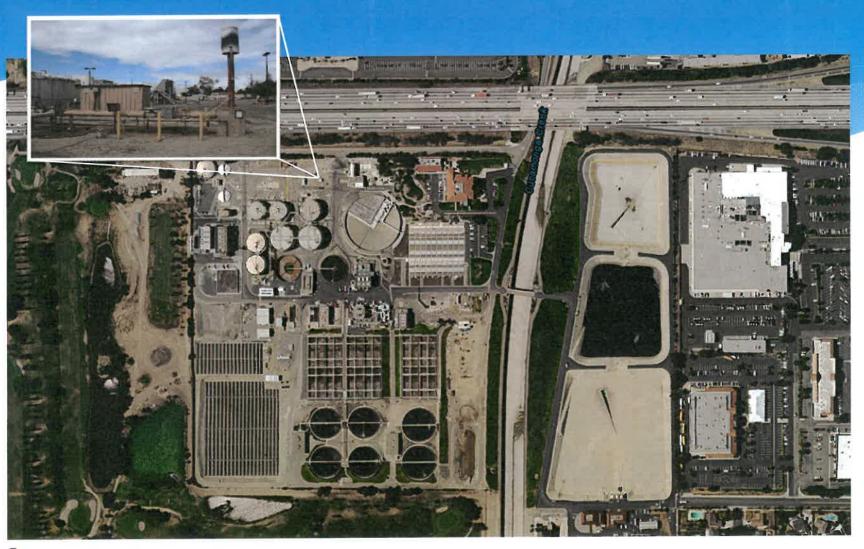

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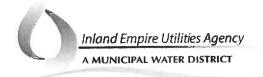

- 3. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE: The documents referenced below represent the Contract Documents. Where any conflicts exist between the General Terms and Conditions, or addenda attached, then the governing order of precedence shall be as follows:

  - B. Contract Number 4600002261, General Terms and Conditions.
  - C. Agency's Request for Proposals ("RFP") RFP-RW-16-030 and germane addenda.
  - E. Consultant's Proposal dated November 29, 2016.
- 4. <u>SCOPE OF WORK AND SERVICES</u>: Consultant services and responsibilities shall include, and be in accordance with tasks identified in IEUA's Request for Proposals ("RFP") RFP-RW-16-030 (interchangeably "the Work"), which are referenced herein, incorporated herein by reference, and made a part hereof by this reference. All referenced services and responsibilities shall be additionally in accordance with the germane Addenda, incorporated herein by reference. The Project may receive a State Revolving Fund (SRF) Loan or a grant from the State; therefore, all design work and Project requirements shall be in accordance with the SRF Loan/Grant requirements attached to the RFP.
- 5. <u>TERM</u>: The term of this Contract shall extend from the date of the Notice to Proceed and terminate upon one year of completed construction, unless agreed to by both parties, reduced to writing, and amended to this Contract.
- 6. COMPENSATION: Consultant's invoice must be submitted according to milestones achieved by Consultant and accepted by the Agency's Project Manager, and shall include a breakdown by items completed, referencing State Prevailing Wages, all associated labor categories provided, labor hours supplied and associated hourly rates, dates worked, the current monthly amount due, and the cumulative amount invoiced to-date against this Contract. 7. CONTROL OF THE WORK: Consultant shall perform the Work in compliance with the Work Schedule. If performance of the Work falls behind schedule, the Consultant shall accelerate the performance of the Work to comply with the Work Schedule as directed by the Project Manager. If the nature of the Work is such that Consultant is unable to accelerate the Work, Consultant shall promptly notify the Project Manager of the delay, the causes of the delay, and submit a proposed revised Work Schedule.

## 8. FITNESS FOR DUTY:

- A. <u>Fitness</u>: Consultant and its Subcontractor personnel on the Jobsite:
  - 1. Shall report for work in a manner fit to do their job;
  - 2. Shall not be under the influence of or in possession of any alcoholic beverages or of any controlled substance (except a controlled substance as prescribed by a physician so long as the performance or safety of the Work is not affected thereby); and
  - 3. Shall not have been convicted of any serious criminal offense which, by its nature, may have a discernible adverse impact on the business or reputation of Agency.
  - 4. Confined Space Work:

Precautions and Programs:

- a. The Contractor shall be responsible for initiating, maintaining, and supervising all safety precautions and programs in connection with the work or the activities of subcontractors, suppliers, and others at the work site.
- b. The Contractors and subcontractors shall comply with the provisions of the Safety and Health Regulations for Construction, promulgated by the Secretary of Labor under Section 107 of the "Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act," as set forth in Title 29 C.F.R. If the Agency is notified of an alleged violation of the Occupational Safety and Health Standards referred to in this Section and it is established that there is a violation, the Contractor shall be subject to liquidated damages as provided in the Contract.
- c. The Contractor and all subcontractors shall comply with the provisions of the Occupational Safety and Health Standards, promulgated by the United States Secretary of Labor under the "Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970," as set forth in Title 29, C.F.R. Where an individual State act on occupational safety and health standards has been approved by federal authority, then the provisions of said state act shall control.

- d. The Contractor shall take all necessary precautions for the safety of, and shall provide the necessary supervision, control, and direction to prevent damage, injury, or loss to:
  - 1) All employees on the work or work site and other persons and organizations who may be affected thereby;
  - 2) All the work and materials and equipment to be incorporated therein, whether in storage or on or off the work site; and
  - 3) All other property at the site.
- e. Contract work requiring confined space entry must follow Cal-OSHA Regulation 8 CCR, Sections 5157 5158. This regulation requires the following to be submitted to IEUA for approval prior to the start of the Project:
  - Proof of training on confined space procedures, as defined in Cal-OSHA Regulation 8 CCR, Section 5157. This regulation also requires the following to be submitted to IEUA for approval prior to the entry of a confined space:
  - 2) A written plan that includes identification of confined spaces within the construction site, alternate procedures where appropriate, contractor provisions, specific procedures for permit-required and non-permit required spaces, and a rescue plan.
- f. The Contractor must also submit a copy of their Safety Program or IIPP prior to the start of the Project for approval by the IEUA Safety Department.
- B. <u>Compliance</u>: Consultant shall advise all Consultant and subcontractor personnel and associated third parties of the requirements of this Contract ("Fitness for Duty Requirements") before they enter on the Jobsite and shall immediately remove from the Jobsite any employee determined to be in violation of these requirements. Consultant shall impose these requirements on its Subcontractors. Agency may cancel the Contract if Consultant violates these Fitness for Duty Requirements.
- C. Effective January 1, 2015: Contract documents must include the following information in accordance with SB854:
  - 1. No contractor or subcontractor may be listed on a bid proposal for a public works project (submitted on or after March 1, 2015) unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5 [with limited exceptions from this requirement for bid purposes only under Labor Code section 1771.1(a)].
  - 2. No contractor or subcontractor may be awarded a contract for public work on a public works project (awarded on or after April 1, 2015) unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5.

- 3. This Project is subject to compliance monitoring and enforcement by the Department of Industrial Relations (DIR). As such, a PWC-100 shall be generated for any Work performed which is determined to be public works having costs in excess of \$1,000.00.
- 9. <u>INSURANCE</u>: During the term of this Contract, the Consultant shall maintain at Consultant's sole expense, the following insurance.
  - A. <u>Minimum Scope of Insurance</u>: Coverage shall be at least as broad as:
    - 1. Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office (ISO) Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this Project/location (ISO CG 25 03 or 25 04) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
    - 2. Automobile Liability: ISO Form Number CA 00 01 covering any auto (Code 1), or if Consultant has no owned autos, covering hired, (Code 8) and non-owned autos (Code 9), with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
    - Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability: Workers' compensation limits as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.
    - 4. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions): Insurance appropriates to the Consultant's profession, with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence or claim, \$2,000,000 aggregate.
  - B. <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retention</u>: Any deductibles or self-insured retention must be declared to and approved by the Agency. At the option of the Agency, either: the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retention as respects the Agency, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers; or the Consultant shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claims administration and defense expenses.
  - C. <u>Other Insurance Provisions</u>: The policies are to <u>contain</u>, or be <u>endorsed to contain</u>, the following provisions:
    - General Liability and Automobile Liability Coverage

- a. Additional Insured Status: The Agency, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Consultant including materials, parts or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the Consultant's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; and CG 20 37 forms if later revisions used).
- b. Primary Coverage: The Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance coverage at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the Agency, its officer, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Agency, its officers, officials, employees, volunteers, property owners or engineers under contract with the Agency shall be excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- c. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Agency, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- d. The Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- e. The Consultant may satisfy the limit requirements in a single policy or multiple policies. Any such additional policies written as excess insurance shall not provide any less coverage than that provided by the first or primary policy.
- 2. Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability Coverage

The insurer hereby grants to Agency a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Consultant may acquire against the Agency by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Consultant agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the Agency has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.

## 3. All Coverages

Each insurance policy required by this contract shall be <u>endorsed</u> to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled by either party, reduced

in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Agency.

- D. <u>Acceptability of Insurers</u>: All insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A-:VII, and who are admitted insurers in the State of California.
- E. Verification of Coverage: Consultant shall furnish the Agency with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Agency before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Consultant's obligation to provide them. The Agency reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time.
- F. <u>Submittal of Certificates</u>: Consultant shall submit all required certificates and endorsements to the following:

## 10. LEGAL RELATIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. <u>Professional Responsibility</u>: The Consultant shall be responsible, to the level of competency presently maintained by other practicing professionals performing the same or similar type of work.
- B. <u>Status of Consultant</u>: The Consultant is retained as an independent Consultant only, for the sole purpose of rendering the services described herein, and is not an employee of the Agency.
- C. Observing Laws and Ordinances: The Consultant shall keep itself fully informed of all existing and future state and federal laws and all county and city ordinances and regulations which in any manner affect the conduct of any services or tasks performed under this Contract, and of all such orders and decrees of bodies or tribunals having any jurisdiction or authority over the same. The Consultant shall at all times observe and comply with all such existing and future laws, ordinances, regulations, orders and decrees, and shall protect and indemnify, as required herein, the Agency, its officers, employees and agents against any claim or liability arising from or based on the violation of any such law, ordinance, regulation, order or decree, whether by the Consultant or its employees.

- D. <u>Subcontract Services</u>: Any subcontracts for the performance of any services under this Contract shall be subject to the written approval of the Project Manager.
- E. Hours of Labor: The Consultant shall comply with all applicable provisions of California Labor Code Sections 1810 to 1817 relating to working hours. The Consultant shall, as a penalty to the Agency, forfeit \$25.00 for each worker employed in the execution of the Contract by the Consultant or by any subcontractor for each calendar day during which such worker is required or permitted to work more than eight (8) hours in any one (1) calendar day and fourty (40) hours in any one (1) calendar week in violation of the provisions of the Labor Code.
- F. <u>Travel and Subsistence Pay</u>: The Consultant shall make payment to each worker for travel and subsistence payments which are needed to execute the work and/or service, as such travel and subsistence payments are defined in the applicable collective bargaining agreements with the worker.
- G. <u>Liens</u>: Consultant shall pay all sums of money that become due from any labor, services, materials or equipment furnished to Consultant on account of said services to be rendered or said materials to be furnished under this Contract and that may be secured by any lien against the Agency. Consultant shall fully discharge each such lien at the time performance of the obligation secured matures and becomes due.
- H. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>: No official of the Agency who is authorized in such capacity and on behalf of the Agency to negotiate, make, accept or approve, or to take part in negotiating, making, accepting or approving this Contract, or any subcontract relating to services or tasks to be performed pursuant to this Contract, shall become directly or indirectly personally interested in this Contract.
- ١. Equal Opportunity and Unlawful Discrimination: During the performance of this Contract, the Consultant shall not unlawfully discriminate against any employee or employment applicant because of race, color, religion, sex, age, marital status, ancestry, physical or mental disability, sexual orientation, veteran status or national origin. The Agency is committed to creating and maintaining an environment free from harassment and discrimination. To accomplish these goals the Agency has established procedures regarding the implementation and enforcement of the Agency's Harassment Prohibition and Equal Employment Opportunity commitments. Please refer to Agency Policies A-29 (Equal Employment Opportunity) and A-30 Harassment Prohibition for detailed information or contact the Agency's Human Resources Administrator. A copy of either of these Policies can be obtained by contacting the Project Manager for your respective Contract. Please advise any of your staff that believes they might have been harassed or discriminated against while on Agency property, to report said possible incident to either the Project Manager, or the Agency's Human Resources Administrator. Please be assured that any possible infraction shall be thoroughly investigated by the Agency.
- J. <u>Non-Conforming Work and Warranty:</u> Consultant represents and warrants that the Work and Documentation shall be adequate to serve the purposes described in the

Contract. For a period of not less than one (1) year after acceptance of the completed Work, Consultant shall, at no additional cost to Agency, correct any and all errors in and shortcomings of the Work or Documentation, regardless of whether any such errors or shortcoming is brought to the attention of Consultant by Agency, or any other person or entity. Consultant shall within three (3) calendar days, correct any error or shortcoming that renders the Work or Documentation dysfunctional or unusable and shall correct other errors within thirty (30) calendar days after Consultant's receipt of notice of the error. Upon request of Agency, Consultant shall correct any such error deemed important by Agency in its sole discretion to Agency's continued use of the Work or Documentation within seven (7) calendar days after Consultant's receipt of notice of the error. If the Project Manager rejects all or any part of the Work or Documentation as unacceptable and agreement to correct such Work or Documentation cannot be reached without modification to the Contract, Consultant shall notify the Project Manager, in writing, detailing the dispute and reason for the Consultant's position. Any dispute that cannot be resolved between the Project Manager and Consultant shall be resolved in accordance with the provisions of this Contract.

#### K. Disputes:

- 1. All disputes arising out of or in relation to this Contract shall be determined in accordance with this section. The Consultant shall pursue the work to completion in accordance with the instruction of the Agency's Project Manager notwithstanding the existence of dispute. By entering into this Contract, both parties are obligated, and hereby agree, to submit all disputes arising under or relating to the Contract, which remain unresolved after the exhaustion of the procedures provided herein, to independent arbitration. Except as otherwise provided herein, arbitration shall be conducted under California Code of Civil Procedure Sections 1280, et. seq, or their successor.
- 2. Any and all disputes during the pendency of the work shall be subject to resolution by the Agency Project Manager and the Consultant shall comply, pursuant to the Agency Project Manager instructions. If the Consultant is not satisfied with any such resolution by the Agency Project Manager, they may file a written protest with the Agency Project Manager within seven (7) calendar days after receiving written notice of the Agency's decision. Failure by Consultant to file a written protest within seven (7) calendar days shall constitute waiver of protest, and acceptance of the Agency Project Manager's resolution. The Agency's Project Manager shall submit the Consultant's written protests to the General Manager, together with a copy of the Agency Project Manager's written decision, for his or her consideration within seven (7) calendar days after receipt of said protest(s). The General Manager shall make his or her determination with respect to each protest filed with the Agency Project Manager within ten (10) calendar days after receipt of said

- protest(s). If Consultant is not satisfied with any such resolution by the General Manager, they may file a written request for arbitration with the Project Manager within seven (7) calendar days after receiving written notice of the General Manager's decision.
- 3. In the event of arbitration, the parties hereto agree that there shall be a single neutral Arbitrator who shall be selected in the following manner:
  - a. The Demand for Arbitration shall include a list of five names of persons acceptable to the Consultant to be appointed as Arbitrator. The Agency shall determine if any of the names submitted by Consultant are acceptable and, if so, such person shall be designated as Arbitrator.
  - b. In the event that none of the names submitted by Consultant are acceptable to Agency, or if for any reason the Arbitrator selected in Step (a) is unable to serve, the Agency shall submit to Consultant a list of five names of persons acceptable to Agency for appointment as Arbitrator. The Consultant shall, in turn, have seven (7) calendar days in which to determine if one such person is acceptable.
  - c. If after Steps (a) and (b), the parties are unable to mutually agree upon a neutral Arbitrator, the matter of selection of an Arbitrator shall be submitted to the San Bernardino County Superior Court pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure Section 1281.6, or its successor. The costs of arbitration, including but not limited to reasonable attorneys' fees, shall be recoverable by the party prevailing in the arbitration. If this arbitration is appealed to a court pursuant to the procedure under California Code of Civil Procedure Section 1294, et seq., or their successor, the costs of arbitration shall also include court costs associated with such appeals, including but not limited to reasonable attorneys' fees which shall be recoverable by the prevailing party.
- 4. Joinder in Mediation/Arbitration: The Agency may join the Consultant in mediation or arbitration commenced by a contractor on the Project pursuant to Public Contracts Code Sections 20104 et seq. Such joinder shall be initiated by written notice from the Agency's representative to the Consultant.
- L. <u>Grant-Funded</u>: This may become a grant-funded and State Revolving Funds (SRF) funded Project. The Consultant shall be responsible to comply with all grant and SRF requirements related to the Project as outlined in IEUA's Request for Proposals ("RFP") RFP-RW-16-030, referenced herein, incorporated herein by reference, and made a part hereof by this reference. These requirements may include, but shall not be limited to: Davis-Bacon Act, Endangered Species Act, Executive Order 11246 (Affirmative Action Requirements), Equal Opportunity, Competitive Solicitation, Record Retention and Public Access to Records, and Compliance Review. Federal funding of any portion of this Project will have

separate, additional reporting accountability on the use of funds. Should grant and SRF funding be approved as applied for, the conditions will be added to the Contract via Amendment.

11. <a href="INDEMNIFICATION">INDEMNIFICATION</a>: Consultant shall indemnify the Agency, its directors, employees and assigns, and shall hold them harmless from all liabilities, demands, actions, claims, losses and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, which arise out of or are related to the negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct of the Consultant, its directors, employees, agents and assigns, in the performance of work under this contract. Notwithstanding the foregoing, to the extent that this Contract includes design professional services under Civil Code Section 2782.8, as my be amended from time to time, such duties of Consultant to defend and to indemnify Agency shall only be to the full extent permitted by Civil Code Section 2782.8.

Consultant shall have no duty to defend Agency, but Consultant shall pay as damages to Agency all reasonable attorney's fees and costs incurred by Agency to the extent incurred by Agency arising out of Consultant's actual or alleged negligent acts, errors, or omissions. Further, Consultant shall assume sole responsibility for the investigation, analysis, and defense of any and all issues alleged against Agency or Consultant to the extent alleged, based on, or arising out of Consultant's scope of work, or Consultant's actual or alleged negligent acts, errors, or omissions.

12. OWNERSHIP OF MATERIALS AND DOCUMENTS/CONFIDENTIALITY: The Agency retains ownership of any and all partial or complete reports, drawings, plans, notes, computations, lists, and/or other materials, documents, information, or data prepared by the Consultant and/or the Consultant's subcontractor(s) pertaining to this Contract. Said materials and documents are confidential and shall be available to the Agency from the moment of their preparation, and the Consultant shall deliver same to the Agency whenever requested to do so by the Project Manager and/or Agency. The Consultant agrees that same shall not be made available to any individual or organization, private or public, without the prior written consent of the Agency.

#### 13. TITLE AND RISK OF LOSS:

- A. <u>Documentation</u>: Title to the Documentation shall pass to Agency when prepared; however, a copy may be retained by Consultant for its records and internal use. Consultant shall retain such Documentation in a controlled access file, and shall not reveal, display or disclose the contents of the Documentation to others without the prior written authorization of Agency or for the performance of Work related to the Project.
- B. <u>Material</u>: Title to all Material, field or research equipment, and laboratory models, procured or fabricated under the Contract shall pass to Agency when procured or fabricated, and such title shall be free and clear of any and all encumbrances. Consultant shall have risk of loss of any Material or Agency-owned equipment of which it has custody.

C. <u>Disposition:</u> Consultant shall dispose of items to which Agency has title as directed in writing by the Agreement Administrator and/or Agency.

#### 14. PROPRIETARY RIGHTS:

A. <u>Rights and Ownership:</u> Agency's rights to inventions, discoveries, trade secrets, patents, copyrights, and other intellectual property, including the Information and Documentation, and revisions thereto (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Proprietary Rights"), used or developed by Consultant in the performance of the Work, shall be governed by the following provisions:

Proprietary Rights conceived, developed, or reduced to practice by Consultant in the performance of the Work shall be the property of Agency, and Consultant shall cooperate with all appropriate requests to assign and transfer same to Agency.

If Proprietary Rights conceived, developed, or reduced to practice by Consultant prior to the performance of the Work are used in and become integral with the Work or Documentation, or are necessary for Agency to have complete enjoyment of the Work or Documentation, Consultant shall grant to Agency a non-exclusive, irrevocable, royalty-free license, as may be required by Agency for the complete enjoyment of the Work and Documentation, including the right to reproduce, correct, repair, replace, maintain, translate, publish, use, modify, copy or dispose of any or all of the Work and Documentation and grant sublicenses to others with respect to the Work and Documentation.

If the Work or Documentation includes the Proprietary Rights of others, Consultant shall procure, at no additional cost to Agency, all necessary licenses regarding such Proprietary Rights so as to allow Agency the complete enjoyment of the Work and Documentation, including the right to reproduce, correct, repair, replace, maintain, translate, publish, use, modify, copy or dispose of any or all of the Work and Documentation and grant sublicenses to others with respect to the Work and Documentation. All such licenses shall be in writing and shall be irrevocable and royalty-free to Agency.

- B. <u>No Additional Compensation</u>: Nothing Set forth in this Contract shall be deemed to require payment by Agency to Consultant of any compensation specifically for the assignments and assurances required hereby, other than the payment of expenses as may be actually incurred by Consultant in complying with this Contract.
- 15. <u>INFRINGEMENT:</u> Consultant represents and warrants that the Work and Documentation shall be free of any claim of trade secret, trade mark, trade name, copyright, or patent infringement or other violations of any Proprietary Rights of any person. Consultant shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless, Agency, its officers, directors, agents, employees, successors, assigns, servants, and volunteers free and harmless from any and all liability, damages, losses, claims, demands, actions, causes of action, and costs including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses arising out of any claim that use of the

Work or Documentation infringes upon any trade secret, trade mark, trade name, copyright, patent, or other Proprietary Rights.

Consultant shall, at its expense and at Agency's option, refund any amount paid by Agency under the Contract, or exert its best efforts to procure for Agency the right to use the Work and Documentation, to replace or modify the Work and Documentation as approved by Agency so as to obviate any such claim of infringement, or to put up a satisfactory bond to permit Agency's continued use of the Work and Documentation.

16. <u>NOTICES</u>: Any notice may be served upon either party by delivering it in person, or by depositing it in a United States Mail deposit box with the postage thereon fully prepaid, and addressed to the party at the address set forth below:

Any notice given hereunder shall be deemed effective in the case of personal delivery, upon receipt thereof, or, in the case of mailing, at the moment of deposit in the course of transmission with the United States Postal Service.

- 17. <u>SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS</u>: All of the terms, conditions and provisions of this Contract shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the Agency, the Consultant, and their respective successors and assigns. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no assignment of the duties or benefits of the Consultant under this Contract may be assigned, transferred or otherwise disposed of without the prior written consent of the Agency; and any such purported or attempted assignment, transfer or disposal without the prior written consent of the Agency shall be null, void and of no legal effect whatsoever.
- 18. <u>PUBLIC RECORDS POLICY:</u> Information made available to the Agency may be subject to the California Public Records Act (Government Code Section 6250 et seq.) The Agency's use and disclosure of its records are governed by this Act. The Agency shall use its best efforts to notify Consultant of any requests for disclosure of any documents pertaining to Consultant.

In the event of litigation concerning disclosure of information Consultant considers exempt from disclosure; (e.g., Trade Secret, Confidential, or Proprietary) Agency shall act as a stakeholder only, holding the information until otherwise ordered by a court or other legal process. If Agency is required to defend an action arising out of a Public Records Act

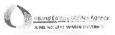
request for any of the information Consultant has marked "Confidential," "Proprietary," or "Trade Secret." Consultant shall defend and indemnify Agency from all liability, damages, costs, and expenses, including attorneys' fees, in any action or proceeding arising under the Public Records Act.

- TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE: The Agency reserves and has the right to 22. immediately suspend, cancel or terminate this Contract at any time upon written notice to the Consultant. In the event of such termination, the Agency shall pay Consultant for all authorized and Consultant-invoiced services up to the date of such termination.
- FORCE MAJEURE: Neither party shall hold the other responsible for the effects of acts 23. occurring beyond their control; e.g., war, riots, strikes, natural disasters, etcetera.
- NOTICE TO PROCEED: No services shall be performed or furnished under this Contract 24. unless and until this document has been properly signed by all responsible parties and a Notice to Proceed order has been issued to the Consultant.

## **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Award a construction contract for the Headquarters Building A Parking Lot Repairs, Project No. EN16047, to W.A. Rasic Construction in the amount of \$264,138; and
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to execute the construction contract.

## **BACKGROUND**

In February 2010, RMS Engineering & Design Inc. prepared a condition assessment for the Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) Headquarter Buildings. A portion of the report focused on parking slab failures related to invasive roots of Shamel Ash trees. Based on the condition assessment, it was determined that improvements were needed to be made in phases over an extended ten-year period.

The current phase of the project will remove the remaining Shamel Ash trees affecting parking slabs at Building A, remove and replace damaged concrete parking slabs, and repair affected asphalt areas. This effort will minimize potential tripping hazards, allow water to continue to percolate into the ground, and increase the utilization of parking stalls. The trees will be considered for replacement once a determination on parking lot solar power generation is complete.

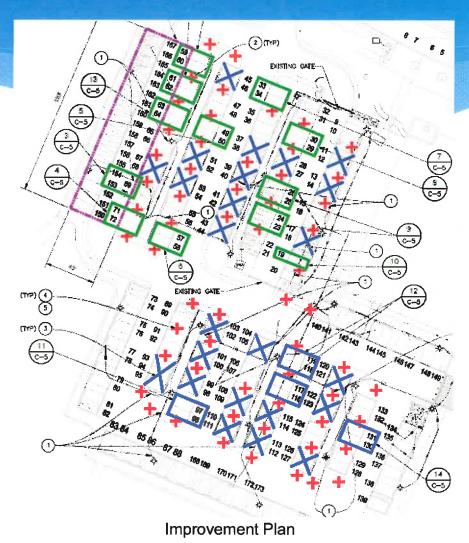


Typical Root Damage to Parking Slabs

# RECOMMENDATION

#### **BACKGROUND**

In 2009 and 2015, the Agency retained consultants to assess the condition of the RP-1 Headworks facility. Based on these assessments numerous deficiencies were identified which include inoperable/leaking gates, unreliable aerated grit chamber air system, concrete degradation in headworks structures, grit classifier corrosion, vortex grit chamber inaccessibility and limited automation integration of all equipment in the headworks. These deficiencies have resulted in reduced headworks performance and additional maintenance from staff. In order to maintain the operation of the existing RP-1 headworks, rehabilitation measures were necessary until the headworks undergoes full rehabilitation planned for 2030. On January 16, 2016, IEUA retained RMC Water and Environment for engineering and design services on the Headworks Improvements Project. During the development of the 50% design package, operations staff identified additional items not included in the original assessment including concrete corrosion,

unstable aluminum covers, damaged fiberglass covers, a new flowmeter, and associated electrical and controls.

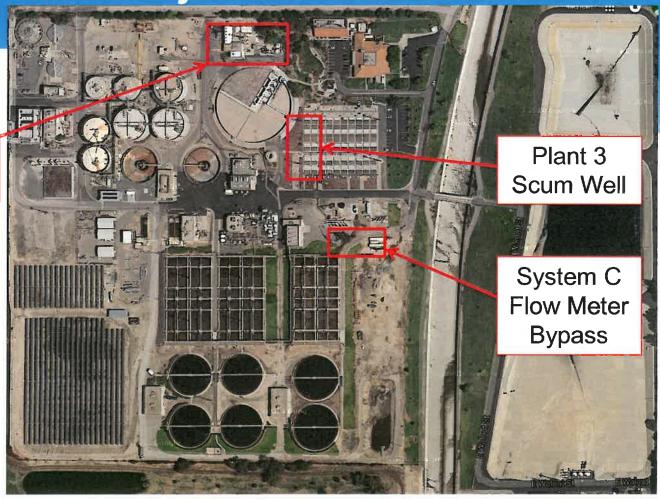

## **RECOMMENDATION**

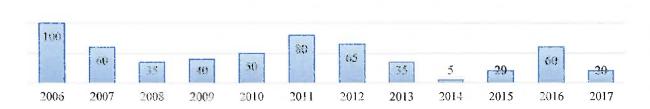
It is recommended that the Board of Directors adopt Resolution No. 2017-1-3 in support of San Bernardino Valley Municipal Water District's pursuit of acquiring supplemental water from the Sites Reservoir Project.

# **BACKGROUND**

The reliability of northern California imported water supply for the Inland Empire and all southern California is at risk due to pumping restrictions, deteriorating environmental conditions, and ongoing environmental regulatory challenges in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. Being able to identify and secure additional supplemental water, will enhance the reliability of our future water resources.

Since 2007, SWP water supply delivers from the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta has been unreliable and continually limited into southern California. The last full SWP allocation (100%), which is difficult to achieve even in wet years because of pumping restrictions, was in 2006. Historical SWP allocations made available to the SWP Contractors are provided below. Under a full allocation, SWP Contractors are entitled to 4.124 million acre-foot (AF). Of this amount, the San Bernardino Valley Municipal Water District (SBVMWD) is entitled to 102,600 AF and the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) 2.011 million AF.

# Historical SWP Allocations (%)



To respond to these challenges, the CALFED Bay-Delta Program (CALFED), a cooperative Federal and State agency partnership, recommended further study of storage reservoirs located north-of-the-Delta. Through a robust planning process, many reservoir locations were considered, but the Sites Reservoir was selected as one of the preferred locations. The Sites Reservoir is located in northern California and has been evaluated as a water supply project for more than 30 years. The SBVMWD, along with the MWD have been following the Sites Reservoir project closely.

The Sites Reservoir project is an offstream reservoir with 1.3 to 1.8 million AF of storage capacity that would be filled from several diversions off the Sacramento River. The water supply benefits have been studied for years and currently estimated to be 500,000 AF per year. Currently, 50% of the annual water supply benefit (250,000 AF) is being reserved for public benefit purposes like habitat and recreational uses with the hope to be funded by Proposition 1 grants. The remaining 250,000 AF is being offered for water supply purposes and will be managed to emphasize water supply during drier conditions.

SBVMWD has begun the process to actively pursue agreements with the Sites Project Authority (Authority). The Authority is made up of ten northern California water agencies and is leading the development and construction of the Sites Reservoir project. To date, six northern California water agencies, along with several others in the Sacramento Valley have agreed to purchase 130,000 AF of the available 250,000 AF of storage at Sites Reservoir. The remaining 120,000 AF is being offered exclusively by the Authority to the SWP and Central Valley Project (CVP) Contractors at this time. The Authority is currently requesting proposals to participate from SWP and CVP Contractors that want to become funding members of the Sites Reservoir project. The SBVMWD has submitted a request for 30,000 AF to the Authority. SBVMWD can potentially offer 15,000 AF for uses outside of their district for projects, such as the Santa Ana River Conservation and Conjunctive Use Project (SARCCUP).

IEUA, along with its retail and wholesale water service providers, recognize the importance of securing new supplemental water supplies for the Chino Basin and the Santa Ana River Watershed. The current estimated cost per AF from the Sites Reservoir project, after Delta losses and power costs, is estimated to be approximately \$1,000 per AF. Although these are higher than the current imported water rates, the region recognizes the fact that our imported water supply from the SWP continues to be challenged and unreliable. Supporting a program to secure additional supplemental water supplies, independent of our SWP supply would be beneficial to the region.

There is no single solution to our many water challenges. Climate change, population growth and various environmental regulatory challenges will require actions on every front to ensure a reliable water future for the Chino Basin and the larger Santa Ana River Watershed. For this reason, staff is recommending that the Board of Directors adopt Resolution 2017-1-3 in support of SBVMWD's pursuit of acquiring water supply from the Sites Reservoir project.

Adopting Resolution 2017-1-3 aligns with IEUA's business goal of *Water Reliability*, committed to the development and implementation of water resources that promotes cost-effectiveness, reliability, efficient and sustainable water use within the region.

None.

## IMPACT ON BUDGET

There is no financial commitment at this time. Should the sites reservoir project proceed into capital design and construction, IEUA staff will bring this item back to the Board for further consideration.

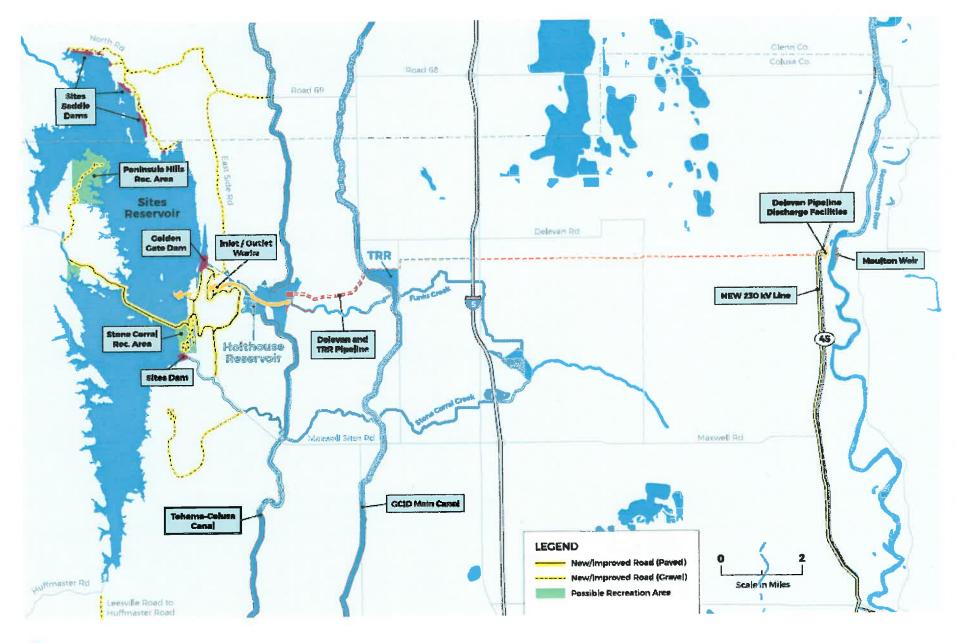

WHEREAS, in response to these challenges, CALFED Bay-Delta Program (CALFED), a cooperative Federal and State agency partnership recommended the development of the Sites Reservoir. The Sites Reservoir is an offstream reservoir that would be filled from several diversions off the Sacramento River,

WHEREAS, the water supply benefit from Sites Reservoir is currently estimated to be 500,000 acre-foot (AF) per year, with 250,000 AF being reserved for public benefits such as habitat enhancement and recreational uses, and the remaining 250,000 AF being offered for water supply,

WHEREAS, the development and construction of the Sites Reservoir is led by the Sites Project Authority (Authority), a collection of ten northern California water agencies and to date, northern California water agencies have agreed to purchase 130,000 AF of the available 250,000 AF of storage at Sites Reservoir,

WHEREAS, the Authority is offering the remaining 120,000 AF exclusively to the State Water Project (SWP) and Central Valley Project Contractors,

WHEREAS, the San Bernardino Valley Municipal Water District (SBVMWD) is a SWP Contractor and submitted a request for 30,000 AF to the Authority, and

WHEREAS, to enhance water reliability in the Santa Ana River Watershed, the SBVMWD is offering up to 15,000 AF of their 30,000 AF request for uses outside their district; such as the Santa Ana River Conservation and Conjunctive Use Project, which IEUA is participating in.

**NOW, THEREFORE,** the Board of Directors hereby RESOLVES, that IEUA is supportive of SBVMWD's pursuit of acquiring water supply from the Sites Reservoir project. Recognizing the importance of securing additional supplemental water supplies, independent of the State Water Project (SWP), will be key to ensure water supply reliability for the Chino Basin and the larger Santa Ana River Watershed.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Award a design-build contract for the RP-2 Microturbine Installation Project No. EN17065, to Geveden Industrial in the amount of \$1,876,809;
- 2. Approve a total project budget in the amount of \$2,210,000 and FY budget in the amount of \$850,000 for Project No. EN17065; and
- 3. Authorize the General Manager to execute the construction contract and approve the establishment of the project budget.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Since 1990, Regional Plant No. 2 (RP-2) has produced renewable energy by fueling a cogeneration engine with digester gas. Due to stringent emissions limits imposed by South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) Rule 1110.2, the engine is no longer able to operate in compliance. In anticipation of the engine shutdown, Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) staff evaluated alternative technologies that could comply with environmental regulations while beneficially and cost effectively utilizing the digester gas produced on site in consideration of RP-2's scheduled decommissioning in 2023.

RP-2 Microturbine Design-Build Contract Award January 18, 2017 Page 2 of 3

Analysis showed that a digester gas-fueled microturbine was the most cost effective option. IEUA issued a Design-Build Request for Proposals (RFP) in October 2015, but subsequently rejected the proposal when the payback period for the only responsive cost proposal exceeded the remaining life of the RP-2 facility. Since that time, IEUA's continued discussions with prospective microturbine suppliers indicated that a modified RFP would yield more competitive responses while still meeting IEUA's payback and operational requirements.

Although a prerequisite of the project's evaluation criteria is to achieve a return on investment within the remaining life of RP-2, the installation will be designed to facilitate an economical relocation of the microturbine following the facility decommissioning, if desirable.

On November 21, 2016, an RFP was advertised on *Planet Bids* to all microturbine suppliers. Two prospective contractors participated in the job walk on November 28, 2016. On December 13, 2016, two proposals were received. A technical committee reviewed the proposals to determine the most qualified, responsive, and responsible bidder. Following the technical evaluation, the fee proposals were considered to determine the best value to IEUA. The following fee proposals were received:

In consideration of the technical evaluation and fee proposals, the evaluation committee selected Geveden Industrial to perform the design and construction of the RP-2 microturbine.

It should be noted that the cost effectiveness of this project is dependent upon receipt of Self Generation Incentive Program (SGIP) funding. Should the project fail to receive the SGIP incentive, the contract with Geveden Industrial will be voided and all work will be stopped immediately. The SGIP incentive notification is expected to be received by March 2017, prior to the project design completion in April 2017.

The RP-2 Microturbine Installation Project No. EN17065 is consistent with the *IEUA's Business Goal of Wastewater Management* that renewable resources will be effectively managed to achieve peak power independence in an environmentally responsible and cost effective manner. The project is also consistent with the Energy Management Plan's goals of reducing digester gas flaring and achieving carbon neutrality by 2030.

#### PRIOR BOARD ACTION

On June 15, 2016, the Board of Directors rejected the November 17, 2015, proposal from Regatta Solutions for design/build services for the not-to-exceed amount of \$3,112,450.

#### IMPACT ON BUDGET

If approved, the design-build contract award for the RP-2 Microturbine Installation Project No. EN17065, in the amount of \$1,876,809, will be within the total project budget of \$2,210,000 and FY16/17 budget of \$850,000 in the Regional Operations (RO) Fund. An estimated amount of \$850,000 will be spent on the project this fiscal year, with the remaining amount of \$1,360,000 to be spent in future fiscal years. The future year funding will be re-appropriated accordingly during the FY17/18 review of the Ten Year Capital Improvement Plan.

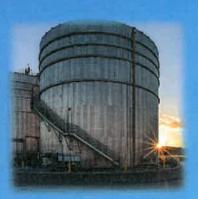

- 4. SCOPE OF WORK AND SERVICES: Contractor services and responsibilities shall be in accordance with the Agency's Request for Proposals RFP-SM-17-004, dated November 21, 2016, incorporated herein by this reference.

NOTE: Contractor shall advise Agency within two (2) weeks of any changes to the written Scope of Work/Schedule based upon discussions from any meetings. Any changes must be made in writing by an Amendment to the Contract. Work initiated without written approval, shall be at Contractor's own risk, and shall not be reimbursed by the Agency.

Payment shall be made only after review and acceptance of the work by the Agency's Project Manager.

- 7. <u>LIQUIDATED DAMAGES</u>: Liquidated damages, in the amount of \$2,000 per calendar day, shall apply for each full day that the Contractor's completion of the project is delinquent. Any and all liquidated damages shall be paid by the Contractor, or at the Agency's discretion, credited to towards payment for the project. Contractor's acceptance of an award resulting from this Request for Proposal indicates the Contractor's acceptance of this liquidated damages provision and the daily amount expressed herein.
- 8. <u>CONTROL OF THE WORK</u>: Contractor shall perform the Work in compliance with the work schedule. If performance of the Work falls behind schedule, the Contractor shall accelerate the performance of the Work to comply with the work schedule as directed by the Project Manager. If the nature of the Work is such that Contractor is unable to accelerate the Work, Contractor shall promptly notify the Project Manager of the delay, the causes of the delay, and submit a proposed revised work schedule.

#### 8. FITNESS FOR DUTY:

- A. <u>Fitness:</u> Contractor and its Subcontractor personnel on the Jobsite:
  - 1. Shall report for work in a manner fit to do their job
  - 2. Shall not be under the influence of or in possession of any alcoholic beverages or of any controlled substance (except a controlled substance as prescribed by a physician so long as the performance or safety of the Work is not affected thereby)
  - 3. Shall not have been convicted of any serious criminal offense which, by its nature, may have a discernible adverse impact on the business or reputation of Agency.
- B. <u>Compliance:</u> Contractor shall advise all personnel and associated third parties of the requirements of this Contract ("Fitness for Duty Requirements") before they enter on the Jobsite and shall immediately remove from the Jobsite any employee determined to be in violation of these requirements.     - 2. Automobile Liability: ISO Form Number CA 00 01 covering any auto (Code 1), or if Contractor has no owned autos, covering hired, (Code 8) and non-owned autos (Code 9), with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
    - 3. Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability: Workers' compensation limits as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.
    - 4. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions): Insurance appropriates to the Contractor's profession, with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence or claim, \$2,000,000 aggregate.
  - B. <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retention</u>: Any deductibles or self-insured retention must be declared to and approved by the Agency. At the option of the Agency, either: the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retention as respects the Agency, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers; or the Contractor shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claims administration and defense expenses.
  - C. <u>Other Insurance Provisions</u>: The insurance policies are to <u>contain</u>, or be <u>endorsed to contain</u>, the following provisions:

- General Liability and Automobile Liability Coverage
  - a. Additional Insured Status: The Agency, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Contractor including materials, parts or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the Contractor's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; and CG 20 37 forms if later revisions used). The insurance shall include coverage for each of the following hazards:

(1) Premises – Operations

(2) Owners and Contractors Damage

(3) Broad Form Property Damage

- (4) Contractual for Specific Contract
- (5) Severability of Interests or Cross-Liability
- (6) XCU [Explosion, Collapse and Underground] Hazards
- (7) Personal Injury with the "Employee" Exclusion Deleted
- b. Primary Coverage: The Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance coverage at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the Agency, its officer, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Agency, its officers, officials, employees, volunteers, property owners or engineers under contract with the Agency shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- c. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Agency, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- d. The Contractor's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- e. The Contractor may satisfy the limit requirements in a single policy or multiple policies. Any such additional policies written as excess insurance shall not provide any less coverage than that provided by the first or primary policy.
- 2. Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability Coverage

The insurer hereby grants to Agency a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Contractor may acquire against the Agency by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Contractor agrees to obtain any

endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the Agency has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.

#### 3. All Coverages

Each insurance policy required by this contract shall be <u>endorsed</u> to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled by either party, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Agency.

- 4. Builders Risk Insurance completed value (course of construction). The Agency is to be named as the loss payee.
- Payment, Labor & Material, and Performance Bonds: Bonding is required, per Public Contract Code Article 121, Section 21565, for public works projects. All construction-related labor for this project is designated as the public works portion of this project and therefore subject to prevailing wage. Contractor and subcontractor shall furnish bonding with the use of IEUA forms as furnished by Project Manager or their designee.
- D. <u>Acceptability of Insurers</u>: All insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A-:VII, and who are admitted insurers in the State of California.
- E. Verification of Coverage: Contractor shall furnish the Agency with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Agency before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Contractor's obligation to provide them. The Agency reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time.
- F. <u>Submittal of Certificates</u>: Contractor shall submit all required certificates and endorsements to the following:

### 10. LEGAL RELATIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. <u>Professional Responsibility</u>: The Contractor shall be responsible, to the level of competency presently maintained by other practicing professionals performing the same or similar type of work.
- B. <u>Status of Contractor</u>: The Contractor is retained as an independent Contractor only, for the sole purpose of rendering the services described herein, and is not an employee of the Agency.
- C. Observing Laws and Ordinances: Consistent with the standard of skill and care set forth in 10.A, Professional Responsibility, the Contractor shall keep itself fully informed of all relevant existing state and federal laws and all relevant county and city ordinances and regulations which pertain to structural engineering services or tasks performed under this Contract, and of all such orders and decrees of bodies or tribunals having any jurisdiction or authority over the same. The Contractor shall at all times observe and comply with all such existing laws, ordinances, regulations, orders and decrees, and shall to the extent of Contractor's negligence, protect and indemnify, as required herein, the Agency, its officers, employees and agents against any claim or liability arising from or based on the violation of any such law, ordinance, regulation, order or decree, whether by the Contractor or its employees.

Effective July 1, 2014, all Contractors must be registered with the California Dept. of Industrial Relations as required by law SB-854 for public works construction projects:

### D. Confined Space Work:

- 1. Precautions and Programs:
  - a. The Contractor shall be responsible for initiating, maintaining, and supervising all safety precautions and programs in connection with the work or the activities of subcontractors, suppliers, and others at the work site.
  - b. The Contractors and subcontractors shall comply with the provisions of the Safety and Health Regulations for Construction, promulgated by the Secretary of Labor under Section 107 of the "Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act," as set forth in Title 29 C.F.R. If the Agency is notified of an alleged violation of the Occupational Safety and Health Standards referred to in this Section and it is established that there is a violation, the Contractor shall be subject to liquidated damages as provided in the Contract.
  - c. The Contractor and all subcontractors shall comply with the provisions of the Occupational Safety and Health Standards, promulgated by the United States Secretary of Labor under the "Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970," as set forth in Title 29, C.F.R. Where an individual State act on occupational safety and health standards has been approved by federal authority, then the provisions of said state act shall control.

- d. The Contractor shall take all necessary precautions for the safety of, and shall provide the necessary supervision, control, and direction to prevent damage, injury, or loss to:
  - 1) All employees on the work or work site and other persons and organizations who may be affected thereby;
  - 2) All the work and materials and equipment to be incorporated therein, whether in storage or on or off the work site; and
  - 3) All other property at the site.
- e. Contract work requiring confined space entry must follow Cal-OSHA Regulation 8 CCR, Sections 5157 5158. This regulation requires the following to be submitted to IEUA for approval prior to the start of the project:
  - 7) Proof of training on confined space procedures, as defined in Cal-OSHA Regulation 8 CCR, Section 5157. This regulation also requires the following to be submitted to IEUA for approval prior to the entry of a confined space:
  - 2) A written plan that includes identification of confined spaces within the construction site, alternate procedures where appropriate, contractor provisions, specific procedures for permit-required and non-permit required spaces, and a rescue plan.
- f. The Contractor must also submit a copy of their Safety Program or IIPP prior to the start of the project for approval by the Safety & Risk Department.
- D. <u>Subcontract Services</u>: Any subcontracts for the performance of any services under this Contract shall be subject to the written approval of the Project Manager.
- E. <u>Grant Funded Projects:</u> This is <u>not</u> a grant funded project. For grant-funded projects, the Contractor shall be responsible to comply with all grant requirements related to the Project. These may include, but shall not be limited to: Davis-Bacon Act, Endangered Species Act, Executive Order 11246 (Affirmative Action Requirements), Equal Opportunity, Competitive Solicitation, Record Retention and Public Access to Records, and Compliance Review.
- Conflict of Interest: No official of the Agency who is authorized in such capacity and on behalf of the Agency to negotiate, make, accept or approve, or to take part in negotiating, making, accepting or approving this Contract, or any subcontract relating to services or tasks to be performed pursuant to this Contract, shall become directly or indirectly personally interested in this Contract.
- G. Equal Opportunity and Unlawful Discrimination: During the performance of this Contract, the Contractor shall not unlawfully discriminate against any employee or employment applicant because of race, color, religion, sex, age, marital status, ancestry, physical or mental disability, sexual orientation, veteran status or national origin. The Agency is committed to creating and maintaining an environment free from harassment and discrimination. To accomplish these goals the Agency has

established procedures regarding the implementation and enforcement of the Agency's Harassment Prohibition and Equal Employment Opportunity commitments. Please refer to Agency Policies A-29 (Equal Employment Opportunity) and A-30 Harassment Prohibition for detailed information or contact the Agency's Human Resources Administrator. A copy of either of these Policies can be obtained by contacting the Project Manager for your respective Contract. Please advise any of your staff that believes they might have been harassed or discriminated against while on Agency property, to report said possible incident to either the Project Manager, or the Agency's Human Resources Administrator. Please be assured that any possible infraction will be thoroughly investigated by the Agency.

H. Non-Conforming Work and Warranty: Consistent with the standard of skill and care set forth in Section 10.A, Professional Responsibility, Contractor represents and warrants that the Work and Documentation shall be adequate to serve the purposes described in the Contract. If the Project Manager rejects all or any part of the Work or Documentation as unacceptable, and agreement to correct such Work or Documentation cannot be reached without modification to the Contract, Contractor shall notify the Project Manager, in writing, detailing the dispute and reason for Contractor's position. Any dispute that cannot be resolved between the Project Manager and the Contractor, shall be resolved in accordance with the Dispute Section of this Contract.

#### I. <u>Disputes</u>:

- 1. All disputes arising out of or in relation to this Contract shall be determined in accordance with this section. The Contractor shall pursue the work to completion in accordance with the instruction of the Agency's Project Manager notwithstanding the existence of dispute. By entering into this Contract, both parties are obligated, and hereby agree, to submit all disputes arising under or relating to the Contract, which remain unresolved after the exhaustion of the procedures provided herein, to independent arbitration. Except as otherwise provided herein, arbitration shall be conducted under California Code of Civil Procedure Sections 1280, et. seq, or their successor.
- 2. Any and all disputes during the pendency of the work shall be subject to resolution by the Agency Project Manager and the Contractor shall comply, pursuant to the Agency Project Manager instructions. If the Contractor is not satisfied with any such resolution by the Agency Project Manager, they may file a written protest with the Agency Project Manager within seven (7) calendar days after receiving written notice of the Agency's decision. Failure by Contractor to file a written protest within seven (7) calendar days shall constitute waiver of protest, and acceptance of the Agency Project Manager's resolution. The Agency's Project Manager shall submit the Contractor's written protests to the General Manager, together with a copy of the Agency Project Manager's written decision, for his or her consideration within seven (7) calendar days after receipt of said protest(s). The General Manager shall

make his or her determination with respect to each protest filed with the Agency Project Manager within ten (10) calendar days after receipt of said protest(s). If Contractor is not satisfied with any such resolution by the General Manager, they may file a written request for arbitration with the Project Manager within seven (7) calendar days after receiving written notice of the General Manager's decision.

- 3. In the event of arbitration, the parties hereto agree that there shall be a single neutral Arbitrator who shall be selected in the following manner:
  - a. The Demand for Arbitration shall include a list of five names of persons acceptable to the Contractor to be appointed as Arbitrator. The Agency shall determine if any of the names submitted by Contractor are acceptable and, if so, such person will be designated as Arbitrator.
  - b. In the event that none of the names submitted by Contractor are acceptable to Agency, or if for any reason the Arbitrator selected in Step (a) is unable to serve, the Agency shall submit to Contractor a list of five names of persons acceptable to Agency for appointment as Arbitrator. The Contractor shall, in turn, have seven (7) calendar days in which to determine if one such person is acceptable.
  - c. If after Steps (a) and (b), the parties are unable to mutually agree upon a neutral Arbitrator, the matter of selection of an Arbitrator shall be submitted to the San Bernardino County Superior Court pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure Section 1281.6, or its successor. The costs of arbitration, including but not limited to reasonable attorneys' fees, shall be recoverable by the party prevailing in the arbitration. If this arbitration is appealed to a court pursuant to the procedure under California Code of Civil Procedure Section 1294, et. seq., or their successor, the costs of arbitration shall also include court costs associated with such appeals, including but not limited to reasonable attorneys' fees which shall be recoverable by the prevailing party.
- Joinder in Mediation/Arbitration: The Agency may join the Contractor in mediation or arbitration commenced by a Contractor on the Project pursuant to Public Contracts Code Sections 20104 et seq. Such joinder shall be initiated by written notice from the Agency's representative to the Contractor.
- 11. <u>INDEMNIFICATION:</u> Contractor shall indemnify the Agency, its directors, employees and assigns, and shall defend and hold them harmless from all liabilities, demands, actions, claims, losses and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, which arise out of or are related to the negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct of the Contractor, its directors, employees, agents and assigns, in the performance of work under this contract. Notwithstanding the foregoing, to the extent that this Contract includes design professional services under Civil Code Section 2782.8, as may be amended from time to time, such duties of Consultant to defend and to indemnify Agency shall only be to the full extent permitted by Civil Code Section 2782.8.

Consultant shall have no duty to defend Agency, but Consultant shall pay as damages to Agency all reasonable attorney's fees and costs incurred by Agency to the extent incurred by Agency arising out of Consultant's actual or alleged negligent acts, errors, or omissions. Further, Consultant shall assume sole responsibility for the investigation, analysis, and defense of any and all issues alleged against Agency or Consultant to the extent alleged, based on, or arising out of Consultant's scope of work, or Consultant's actual or alleged negligent acts, errors, or omissions.

12. OWNERSHIP OF MATERIALS AND DOCUMENTS/CONFIDENTIALITY: The Agency retains ownership of any and all partial or complete reports, drawings, plans, notes, computations, lists, and/or other materials, documents, information, or data prepared by the Contractor and/or the Contractor's subcontractor(s) pertaining to this Contract. Said materials and documents are confidential and shall be available to the Agency from the moment of their preparation, and the Contractor shall deliver same to the Agency whenever requested to do so by the Project Manager and/or Agency. The Contractor agrees that same shall not be made available to any individual or organization, private or public, without the prior written consent of the Agency.

Said materials and documents shall not be changed or used for purposes other than those set forth in the Contract without the prior written approval of Contractor. If Agency reuses the materials and documents without Contractor's prior written consent, changes or uses the materials and documents other than as intended hereunder, Agency shall do so at its sole risk and discretion, and Contractor shall not be liable for any claims and/or damages resulting from use or connected with the release of or any third party's use of the reused materials or documents.

#### 13. <u>TITLE AND RISK OF LOSS</u>:

- A. <u>Documentation:</u> Title to the Documentation shall pass, subject to payment therefore, to Agency when prepared; however, a copy may be retained by Contractor for its records and internal use. Contractor shall retain such Documentation in a controlled access file, and shall not reveal, display or disclose the contents of the Documentation to others without the prior written authorization of Agency or for the performance of Work related to the project.
- B. <u>Material</u>: Title to all Material, field or research equipment, subject to payment therefore, and laboratory models, procured or fabricated under the Contract shall pass to Agency when procured or fabricated, and such title shall be free and clear of any and all encumbrances. Contractor shall have risk of loss of any Material or Agency-owned equipment of which it has custody.
- C. <u>Disposition:</u> Contractor shall dispose of items to which Agency has title as directed in writing by the Agreement Administrator and/or Agency.

#### 14. PROPRIETARY RIGHTS:

A. <u>Rights and Ownership:</u> Agency's rights to inventions, discoveries, trade secrets, patents, copyrights, and other intellectual property, including the Information and

Documentation, and revisions thereto (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Proprietary Rights"), used or developed by Contractor in the performance of the Work, shall be governed by the following provisions:

- Proprietary Rights conceived, developed, or reduced to practice by Contractor in the performance of the Work shall be the property of Agency, and Contractor shall cooperate with all appropriate requests to assign and transfer same to Agency.
- 2. If Proprietary Rights conceived, developed, or reduced to practice by Contractor prior to the performance of the Work are used in and become integral with the Work or Documentation, or are necessary for Agency to have complete enjoyment of the Work or Documentation, Contractor shall grant to Agency a non-exclusive, irrevocable, royalty-free license, as may be required by Agency for the complete enjoyment of the Work and Documentation, including the right to reproduce, correct, repair, replace, maintain, translate, publish, use, modify, copy or dispose of any or all of the Work and Documentation and grant sublicenses to others with respect to the Work and Documentation.
- 3. If the Work or Documentation includes the Proprietary Rights of others, Contractor shall procure, at no additional cost to Agency, all necessary licenses regarding such Proprietary Rights so as to allow Agency the complete enjoyment of the Work and Documentation, including the right to reproduce, correct, repair, replace, maintain, translate, publish, use, modify, copy or dispose of any or all of the Work and Documentation and grant sublicenses to others with respect to the Work and Documentation. All such licenses shall be in writing and shall be irrevocable and royalty-free to Agency.
- 4. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein, Contractor's Work and Documentation shall not be changed or used for purposes other than those set forth in the Contract, without the prior written approval of the Contractor. If the Agency reuses the Work or Documentation without Contractor's prior written consent, changes or uses the Work or Documentation other than as intended hereunder, Agency shall do so at its sole risk and discretion, and Contractor shall not be liable for any claims and or damages resulting from use or connected with the release of or any third party's use of the reused materials or documents.
- B. <u>No Additional Compensation:</u> Nothing Set forth in this Contract shall be deemed to require payment by Agency to Contractor of any compensation specifically for the assignments and assurances required hereby, other than the payment of expenses as may be actually incurred by Contractor in complying with this Contract.
- 15. <u>INFRINGEMENT:</u> Contractor represents and warrants that the Work and Documentation shall be free of any claim of trade secret, trade mark, trade name, copyright, or patent infringement or other violations of any Proprietary Rights of any person.

Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless, Agency, its officers, directors, agents, employees, successors, assigns, servants, and volunteers free and harmless from any and all liability, damages, losses, claims, demands, actions, causes of action, and costs including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses to the extent of Contractor's negligence for any claim that use of the Work or Documentation infringes upon any trade secret, trade mark, trade name, copyright, patent, or other Proprietary Rights.

Contractor shall, at its expense and at Agency's option, refund any amount paid by Agency under the Contract, or exert its best efforts to procure for Agency the right to use the Work and Documentation, to replace or modify the Work and Documentation as approved by Agency so as to obviate any such claim of infringement, or to put up a satisfactory bond to permit Agency's continued use of the Work and Documentation.

16. <u>NOTICES</u>: Any notice may be served upon either party by delivering it in person, or by depositing it in a United States Mail deposit box with the postage thereon fully prepaid, and addressed to the party at the address set forth below:

Any notice given hereunder shall be deemed effective in the case of personal delivery, upon receipt thereof, or, in the case of mailing, at the moment of deposit in the course of transmission with the United States Postal Service.

- 17. <u>SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS</u>: All of the terms, conditions and provisions of this Contract shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the Agency, the Contractor, and their respective successors and assigns. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no assignment of the duties or benefits of the Contractor under this Contract may be assigned, transferred or otherwise disposed of without the prior written consent of the Agency; and any such purported or attempted assignment, transfer or disposal without the prior written consent of the Agency shall be null, void and of no legal effect whatsoever.
- 18. <u>PUBLIC RECORDS POLICY:</u> Information made available to the Agency may be subject to the California Public Records Act (Government Code Section 6250 et seq.) The Agency's use and disclosure of its records are governed by this Act. The Agency shall use its best

efforts to notify Contractor of any requests for disclosure of any documents pertaining to Contractor.

In the event of litigation concerning disclosure of information Contractor considers exempt from disclosure; (e.g., Trade Secret, Confidential, or Proprietary) Agency shall act as a stakeholder only, holding the information until otherwise ordered by a court or other legal process. If Agency is required to defend an action arising out of a Public Records Act request for any of the information Contractor has marked "Confidential," "Proprietary," or "Trade Secret, "Contractor shall defend and indemnify Agency from all liability, damages, costs, and expenses, including attorneys' fees, in any action or proceeding arising under the Public Records Act.

- 19. <u>RIGHT TO AUDIT:</u> The Agency reserves the right to review and/or audit all Contractors' records related to the Work. The option to review and/or audit may be exercised during the term of the Contract, upon termination, upon completion of the Contract, or at any time thereafter up to twelve (12) months after final payment has been made to Contractor. The Contractor shall make all records and related documentation available within three (3) working days after said records are requested by the Agency.
- 20. <u>INTEGRATION</u>: The Contract Documents represent the entire Contract of the Agency and the Contractor as to those matters contained herein. No prior oral or written understanding shall be of any force or effect with respect to those matters covered by the Contract Documents. This Contract may not be modified, altered or amended except by written mutual agreement by the Agency and the Contractor.
- 21. GOVERNING LAW: This Contract is to be governed by and constructed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- 22. <u>TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE</u>: The Agency reserves and has the right to immediately suspend, cancel or terminate this Contract at any time upon written notice to the Contractor. In the event of such termination, the Agency shall pay Contractor for all authorized and Contractor-invoiced services up to the date of such termination.
- 23. <u>CHANGES</u>: The Agency may, at any time, make changes to this Contract's Scope of Work; including additions, reductions and other alterations to any or all of the work. However, such changes shall only be made via written amendment to this Contract. The Contract Price and Work Schedule shall be equitably adjusted, if required, to account for such changes and shall be set forth within the Contract Amendment.
- 24. <u>FORCE MAJEURE</u>: Neither party shall hold the other responsible for the effects of acts occurring beyond their control; e.g., war, riots, strikes, natural disasters, etcetera.
- 25. <u>NOTICE TO PROCEED</u>: No services shall be performed or furnished under this Contract unless and until this document has been properly signed by all responsible parties and a Notice to Proceed order has been issued to the Contractor.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Board of Directors approve the revised structure for the IEUA Board of Directors' standing committees.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The current structure of the IEUA Board of Directors' standing committees (standing committees) includes four committees: Public, Legislative Affairs and Water Resources Committee; Engineering, Operations and Biosolids Management Committee; Finance, Legal Administration Committee; and the Audit Committee. The objective of the committee structuring project was to determine the most effective and efficient use of the standing committees; define which items should be taken through each committee, reducing the redundancy of items going through multiple committees; and, develop written guidelines for the standing committees.

Workshops were held with the Board of Directors on October 5, 2017, and January 4, 2017. During these workshops the Board provided comments and feedback regarding the proposed structure and written purposes of the committees. The resulting revised committee structure includes four committees:

- Community and Legislative Affairs Committee
- Engineering, Operations and Water Resources Committee
- Finance and Administration Committee
- **Audit Committee**

The major changes include moving water resources from the Community and Legislative Affairs Committee to the former Engineering, Operations and Biosolids Management Committee and removing biosolids management and legal from the committee titles. Moving water resources will help to reduce the redundancy of items going through multiple committees due to the nature of the water resources items and how they ultimately relate to the engineering, operations and IEUA Standing Committee Recommendation January 18, 2017 Page 2 of 3

maintenance projects of the Agency. Biosolids management was removed from the title because it is a specific subject that is included within the processes of engineering and operations. Lastly, it was decided to remove legal from the committee title because the current practice for legal items is to be taken directly to the Board through closed session. After discussions in the workshops it was decided that the Audit Committee is best suited to remain a separate committee.

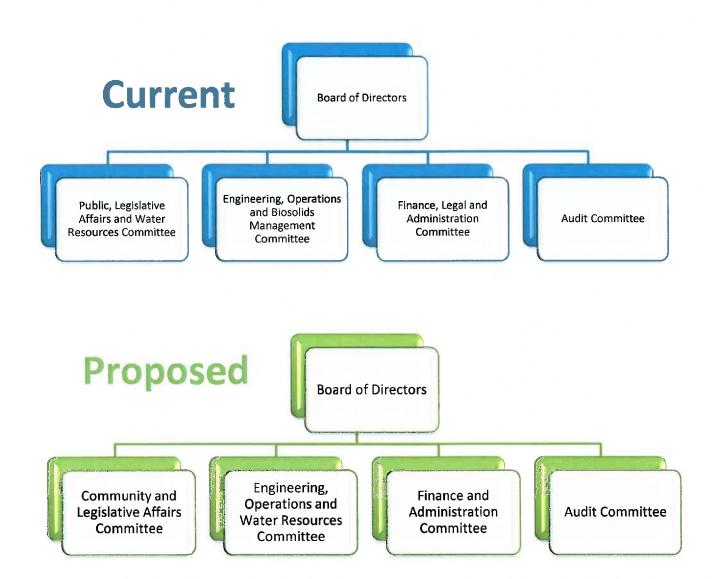

2017A Refunding Revenue Bonds Update

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

This is an informational item for the Board of Directors on the issuance of the Chino Basin Regional Financing Authority Refunding Revenue Bonds, Series 2017A (Inland Empire Utilities Agency).

#### **BACKGROUND**

On December 21, 2016, the Board adopted Resolution 2016-12-2 authorizing the issuance of the 2017A Refunding Revenue Bonds (2017A Bonds) to refund up to \$125,000,000 of the 2008A Revenue Bonds. In evaluating the opportunities to refinance and/or pay down the 20008A Bonds, four scenarios were evaluated as shown in Table 1:

**Table 1: Refunding Scenarios** 

Scenario	Name	Pay Down Funded with Cash	Estimated Savings (Gross)
1	Baseline/Do nothing	\$-	None
2	5 Year Pay Down	\$125 million	\$83 million
3	Partial Refinancing/ Cash Pay Down	\$50 million	\$62 million
4	Full Refinancing	\$-	\$23 million

Of the four scenarios, Scenario 3 Partial Refinancing/Cash Pay Down, recommended by staff and approved by the Board, provided the greatest estimated cost savings over the life of the bonds. A call of Capital Construction Reimbursement Account (CCRA) funds held by the contracting member agencies was made to support the proposed \$50 million cash pay down. CCRA funds are connection fees collected by member agencies on behalf of the Agency for new connections to the Agency's regional wastewater system. In accordance to the Regional Sewage Service Contract (Regional Contract), CCRA funds are held by member agencies until the Agency calls for the funds to finance capital improvements to the regional wastewater system. As of December 23, 2016, all the contracting agencies had remitted payment of their proportionate share of CCRA funds.

In a letter to the IEUA Board dated December 19, 2016, the City of Ontario requested the Board to consider returning the CCRA funds back to the member agencies should market conditions favor the refinancing of the full \$125 million (Scenario 4) rather than paying down a portion of the bonds as proposed under Scenario 3.

#### **ISSUES/ANALYSIS**

Pre-pricing of the 2017A Bonds was executed on January 17, 2017 for the two financing structures; 1) Refinancing of \$75 million and Cash Pay Down of \$50 million, and 2) Full Refinancing of \$125 million. Copies of the pricing analysis, along with staff's final recommended financing structure, will be provided on January 18, 2017.

The 2017A Bonds will be sold to Citi, the sole underwriter for this issuance, subject to the final terms as agreed to by the General Manager, with concurrence of the Chief Financial Officer, within the guidelines established within the Resolutions (2016-12-2 and 2016-11), and the respective Purchase Agreement. It is anticipated that settlement date will occur around February 7, 2017.

#### PRIOR BOARD ACTION

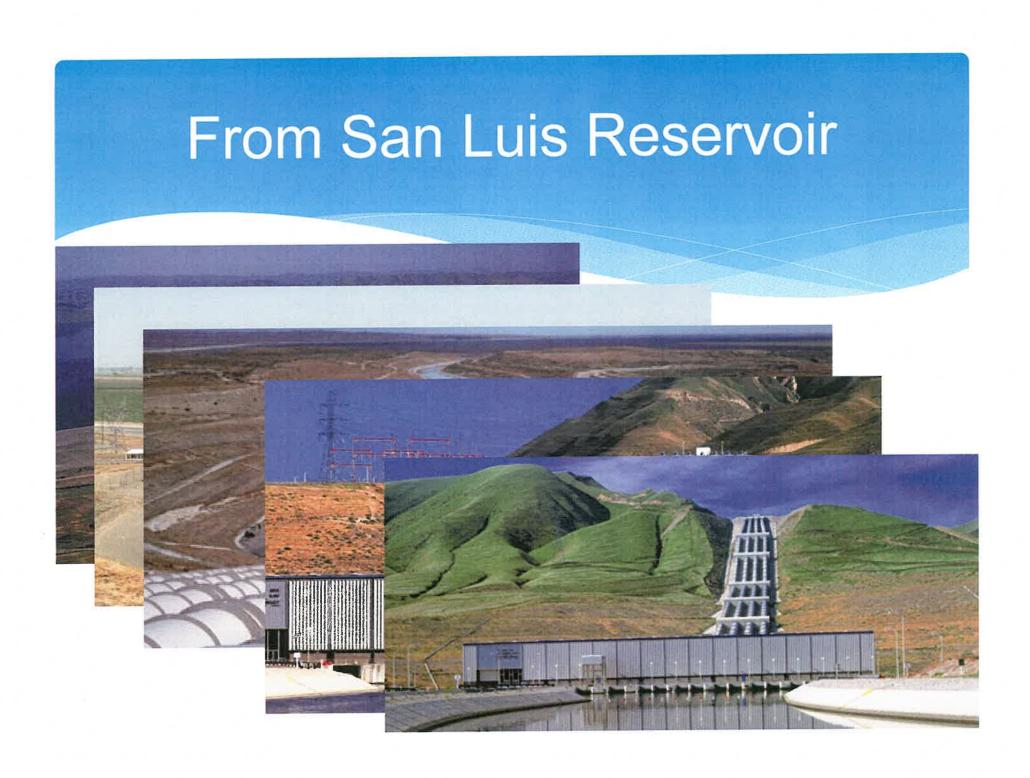

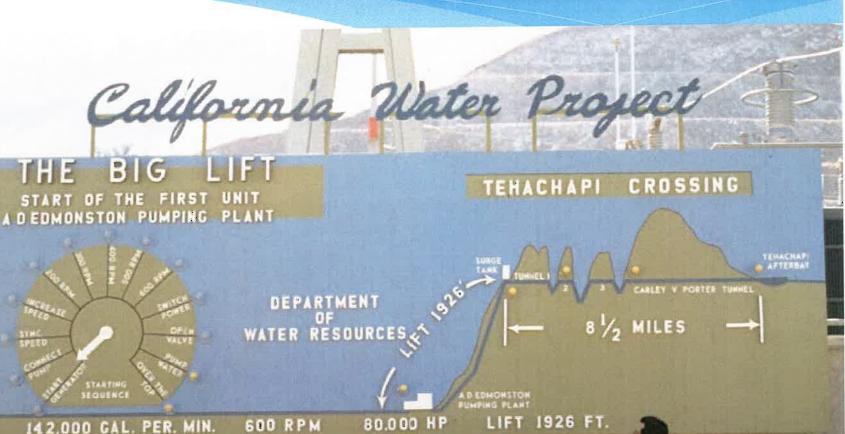

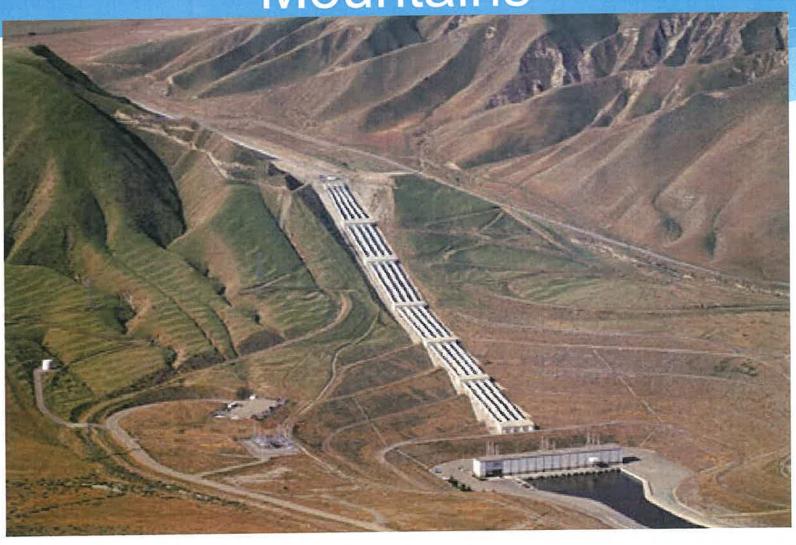

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs for the month ended November 30, 2016 is an informational item for the Board of Director's review.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs for the month ended November 30, 2016 is submitted in a format consistent with State requirements. The monthly report denotes investment transactions that have been executed in accordance with the criteria stated in the Agency's Investment Policy (Resolution No. 2016-5-1).

Total cash, investments, and restricted deposits of \$184,903,210 reflects an increase of \$6,123,795 compared to the total reported for October 2016. The increase can be attributed due to lower than expected operation and capital expenditures. As a result, the average days of cash on hand for the month ended November 30, 2016 increased to 306 days from 276 days as reported in October 2016. Average days of cash on hand is calculated using the monthly ending balance of unrestricted cash and cash equivalents divided by disbursements associated with operating expenses, debt service, and capital expenditures as recorded in the Agency's cash flow. New connection fees collected and held by member agencies are excluded from the days of cash on hand calculation.

The Agency's investment portfolio average rate of return in November 2016 was 0.826%, a slight decrease of 0.055% compared to the average yield of 0.881% reported in October 2016. The

decrease can be attributed to the \$4 million U.S. Government Sponsored Entity investment that was called in November with an average yield of 1.13%.

The Financial Affairs report is consistent with the Agency's Business Goal of Fiscal Responsibility in providing financial reporting that accounts for cash and investment activities to fund operating requirements and to optimize investment earnings.

#### **PRIOR BOARD ACTION**

#### **IMPACT ON BUDGET**

The interest earned on the Agency's investment portfolio increases the Agency's reserves.

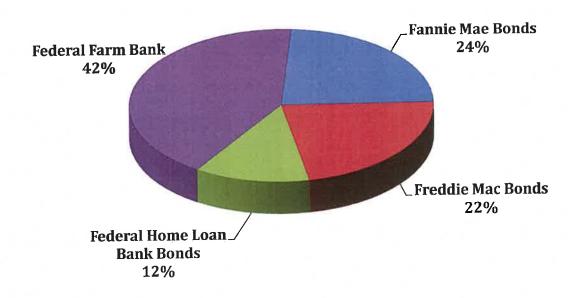

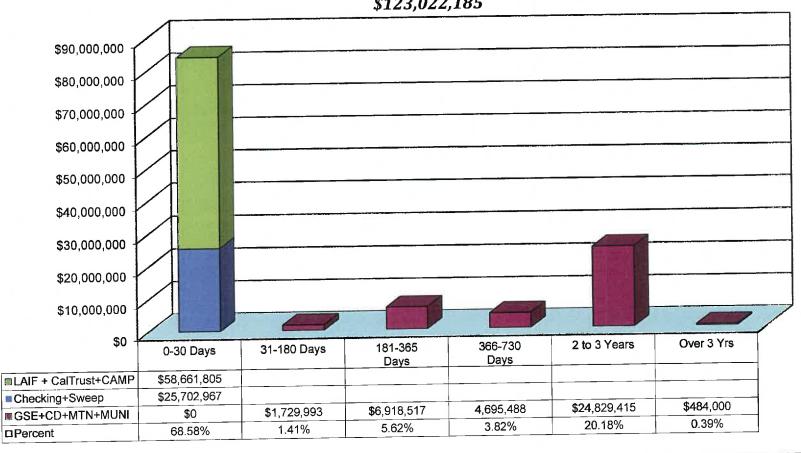
Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs For the Month Ended November 30, 2016 Unrestricted Agency Investment Portfolio \$123,022,185

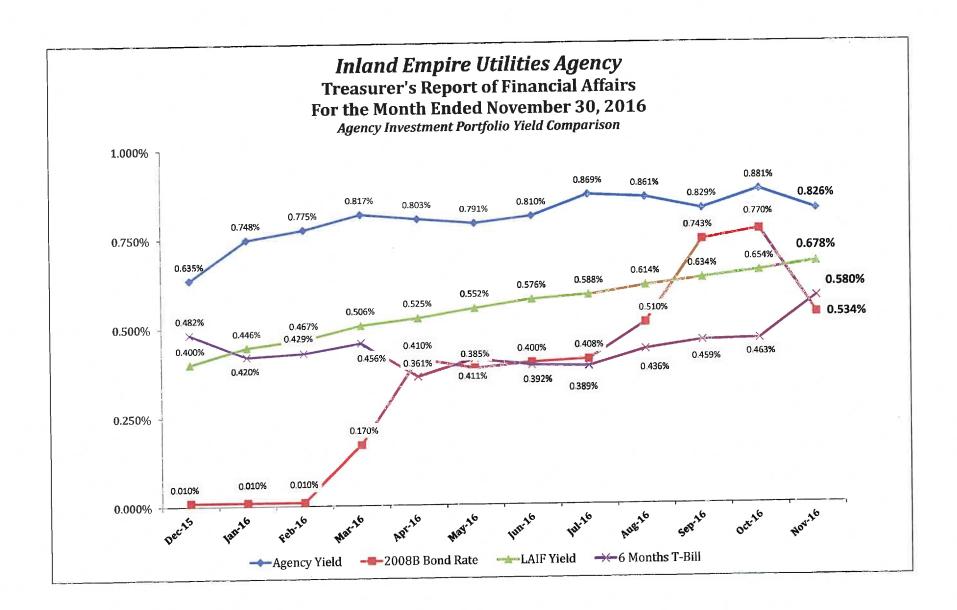

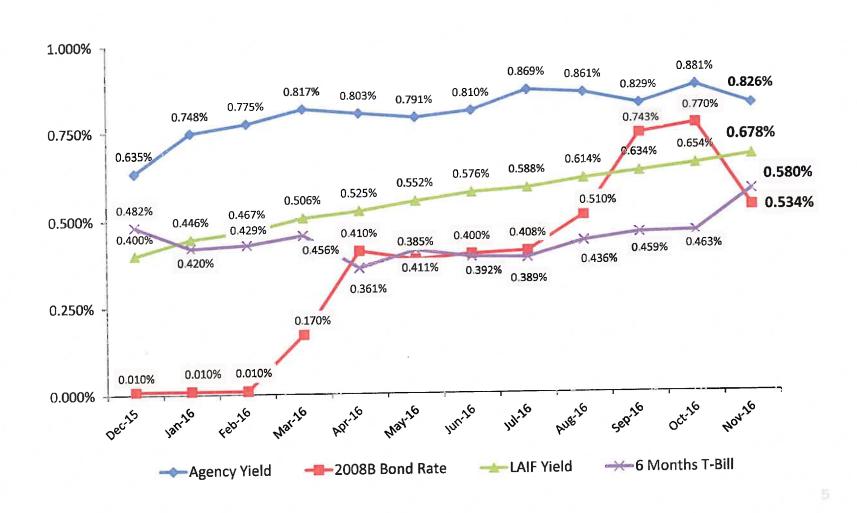

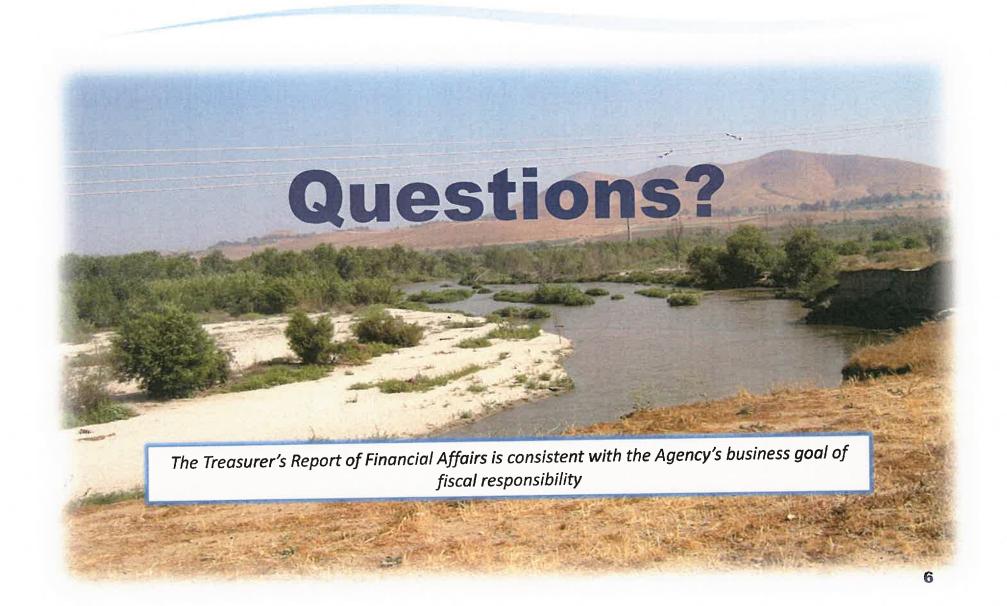


# Day Cash On Hand 12 Months Rolling Average

#### Congress Successfully Returns to Two-Year Cycle on WRDA Authorization

Shortly after 1 am on Saturday, December 10, the Senate cleared a major water infrastructure package in its final vote of the year. The Water Resources Development Act (WRDA), which was rebranded the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act, provides funds to help the city of Flint, Michigan respond to a lead-tainted drinking water crisis and contains the most significant overhaul to California water policy in more than two decades.

The legislation also authorizes 30 new Army Corps of Engineers projects, including a major Everglades restoration effort. The bill approved ecosystem restoration efforts from Lake Tahoe to the Great Lakes and new tribal water rights settlements. It now heads to President Barack Obama's desk. The White House did not issue a Statement of Administration Policy on the legislation, which is typically released in advance of the consideration of bills in the House or Senate if the President indents to veto legislation.

Faced with returning to the Capitol for votes at 1 am Saturday on the Water Resources Development Act, Senator Barbara Boxer (D-CA) and other west coast Democrats agreed to allow for the expedited consideration of the legislation in what was the final roll call vote of the year. Senator Boxer, along with Senators Patty Murray (D-WA), Maria Cantwell (D-WA), Ron Widen (D-OR), and Jeff Merkley (D-OR), had used much of the debate time earlier in the day and throughout the week to protest the inclusion of drought provisions for California regarding the delta that they believe will ultimately lead to the erosion of endangered species protections.

Senator Boxer, who was one of the original sponsors of the legislation, was one of the fiercest critics of the California drought provisions—putting her at odds with her colleague Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-CA). Senator Feinstein negotiated the final package with California House Republicans which was included in the WRDA bill after several years of negotiations. She indicated she thought this year was the best opportunity to pass a drought bill, fearing that Democrats might get rolled in the future with a new Republican administration.

The WRDA bill was the final roll call vote taken in the Senate for the 114<sup>th</sup> Congress. On Friday, December 16, President Barack Obama signed the water infrastructure bill into law. In signing the legislation into law, the President issued a sharp warning about Endangered

Species Act protections included in the California drought provision. The President said in a statement that his administration has worked to achieve "a careful balance based on existing state and federal law" in trying to send more water to farmers and cities without harming imperiled species during the gripping drought. "It is essential that [that balance] not be undermined by anyone who seeks to override that balance by misstating or incorrectly reading the provisions of Subtitle J," Obama said.

#### Congress Pushes Spending Decisions into 2017

Hours before finishing legislative activity for the year on, Senators averted a government shutdown by approving legislation funding the federal government through April 28, 2017 via a continuing resolution (CR). Before the current fiscal year began on October 1, Congress passed a CR than ran through December 9. While the House cleared the measure on Thursday, December 8, Senate Democrats forced Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) to file a cloture petition on the bill, which could have delayed a vote on final passage until Sunday, thereby triggering a brief government shutdown. As a lapse in funding loomed, an agreement was reached to vote on final passage of the legislation just after 10 pm on Friday, December 9, sending the measure to President Obama without causing a disruption to government operations.

Senator Joe Manchin (D-WV) along with other coal-state Senators were upset that a provision providing for the extension of health benefits and pensions for retired and widows of coal miners only ran through the end of the CR rather than for a whole year. He and a small contingent of Democrats had been using procedural maneuvers to slow down the consideration of the continuing resolution and had also blocked the consideration of non-controversial bills by objecting to unanimous consent requests.

The new Congress will now be forced to deal with government funding decisions early in the year by either passing another CR for the rest of the fiscal year or by passing individual—or and omnibus—spending bill(s). Additionally, Congress will need to act on the federal debt ceiling before March 15, 2017 when the current debt ceiling will no longer be suspended. While the Treasury Department may be able to use "extraordinary measures" to avoid a debt default, Congress will likely need to act early in the Spring to avoid jitters in global markets.

#### Congress looks to Revive Budget Resolution for FY17

The House of Representatives is expected to vote on a budget resolution for fiscal year 2017—the current fiscal year—one week after the new Congress convenes in Washington. A reworked, bare-bones budget resolution would pave the way for a repeal of the Affordable Care Act through a budget reconciliation package. According to a memo released by the incoming chairman of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, a vote on the reworked budget resolution will occur on the House floor the week of January 9.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) has not cited a specific day or week he plans to bring the budget resolution to the Senate floor, but said in an end-of-year press conference that "the Obamacare repeal resolution will be the first item up in the new year." That means the Senate could take the resolution up during the week of January 3, sending it to the House for consideration the following week.

Once both chambers have adopted the resolution, and instructions for budget reconciliation are included, Republicans could draft and pass separate reconciliation legislation to repeal as much of the health care law as they can in the weeks following. Some provisions of the law could not be rolled back through reconciliation. If everything goes according to plan, Senator McConnell and House Speaker Paul Ryan (R-WI) would have the fiscal 2017 budget resolution adopted and committees working on the reconciliation bill to dismantle parts of the health care law before President-elect Donald Trump is inaugurated on January 20.

Republican lawmakers have not agreed to the framework for the actual reconciliation legislation that would repeal the healthcare law, as there has been disagreement on the length of time lawmakers should have to revamp the healthcare system. While Republican leaders have floated a three-year replacement window, conservative lawmakers have called for a two-year replacement window to force the 115th Congress to deal with both the healthcare repeal and replacement.

#### California's Harris Receives Committee Assignments

Senator-elect Kamala Harris (D-CA) will serve on the Senate Homeland Security, Environment and Public Works, Intelligence, and Budget Committees in the 115<sup>th</sup> Congress. Subcommittee assignments will be announced in January when the Senate convenes.

The House and Senate will return on Tuesday, January 3 to officially convene the 115<sup>th</sup> Congress. In addition to organizing and appointing Members to Committees, the House and Senate are expected to adopt a revised fiscal year 2017 budget resolution to set up reconciliation legislation to pass a repeal of the Affordable Care Act.

The Senate is expected to use time in early January at the committee level to confirm Cabinet nominees, with the expectation that some nominees will be confirmed by the Senate the same day President-elect Trump takes office on January 20.

#### Overview:

The Legislature returned to Sacramento very briefly in early December to swear in new and reelected members. New members have been busy setting up their offices, hiring staff and getting ready for the session to start in January. The President Pro Tem of the Senate, Kevin de Leon, released leadership and committee assignments for the coming year. The most notable appointment is Senator Bob Hertzberg as the chairman of Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee. No IEUA delegation Senators were appointed to the Southern California dominated committee. Assembly Speaker Rendon also recently announced his leadership team and committee chairs. Assemblyman Edwardo Garcia (D-Coachella) was named the chair of Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee, replacing Marc Levine.

The long anticipated environmental documents for the California WaterFix were released in late December. The 97,000 page document offers few changes from draft documents released in 2015, but does make some minor revisions in response to the over 30,000 public comments submitted. Administration officials still hope to begin construction in 2018.

The Department of Water Resources recently announced an increase in its estimate of 2017's State Water Project allocation to 45%, up from the initial estimate of 20%, thanks to December storms improving reservoir conditions in much of the state.

Governor Brown appointed Lana Ong Peterson of Orange and Daniel Selmi of Newport Beach, and reappointed William Von Blasingame of Irvine to the Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board. All three must be confirmed by the Senate.

December storms have helped California reservoirs to re-fill after a dry summer. Northern California's reservoirs are between 88 and 120 percent of normal average for this time of the year with unrestricted pumping in the delta helping to move water into San Luis reservoir and storage further south.

The California Air Resources Board released a Discussion Draft of their 2030 Scoping Plan Update. This is the first Scoping Plan Update that includes the now codified goals of reducing greenhouse gas emissions 40 percent below 1990 levels by 2030. The Discussion Draft includes measures for wastewater and water agencies that are also discussed in the Short-Lived Climate Pollutant Plan, including using excess digester capacity for food waste diversion. The Discussion Draft will be updated in January to include specific measures for individual sectors, cost benefit analysis, and potential funding mechanisms for all of the proposals in the Discussion Draft.

Governor Brown appointed two new members to the California Public Utilities Commission to replace members Catherine Sandoval and Michael Florio. Martha Guzman Aceves and Clifford Rechtschaffen both come from within the Governor's administration and have strong environmental backgrounds.

#### Inland Empire Utilities Agency Status Report - December 2016

#### WaterFix EIR/EIS Released

97,000 pages of environmental documents to support the California WaterFix were released on December 21. The proposed \$15.5 billion project would tunnel two pipes 40 feet in diameter for 35 miles and serve as the hub of the state's water-delivery network.

The final environmental impact statement offered few changes from draft documents released in 2015. State officials said the primary differences was that it offered responses and minor revisions after receiving more than 30,000 public comments.

More than 100 alternatives also were considered in the development of the WaterFix EIR/EIS and screened out for lack of feasibility or public benefit, officials said. Now that the EIR/EIS is completed, biological opinions are expected to be finalized in early 2017, clearing the way for final environmental approval, completion of other necessary agreements, and construction that could begin as soon as 2018. However, that timeline might be difficult to meet with significant hurdles still in the way of construction. Hearings on how the tunnels would affect water users and the environment are expected to last well into 2017, and federal permits still need to be secured.

#### Assembly Leadership and Committee Chairs Announced

Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon recently announced his leadership team and committee chair assignments. Water, Parks and Wildlife will be chaired by Edwardo Garcia (D- Coachella) while Natural Resources will see Christina Garcia (D- Bell Gardens) as chair. IEUA delegation member Chris Holden (D-Pasadena and Upland) will chair the Utilities and Energy Committee and Richard Bloom (D- Santa Monica) will retain his chairmanship of the Budget Committee on Resources and Transportation. Eloise Reyes (D-San Bernardino), one of the new members of the IEUA delegation will chair the Legislative Ethics Committee. Speaker Rendon is expected to announce full committee assignments early in the new year.

#### SWP Allocation Estimate Increased to 45%

The Department of Water Resources recently announced an increase in its estimate of 2017's State Water Project allocation to 45%, up from the initial estimate of 20%, thanks to December storms making a "dent" in the drought.

"This winter's wet start gives us hope we'll be able to keep increasing the State Water Project allocation," said DWR Director Mark Cowin. "But the faucet can shut off suddenly and leave us dry for a sixth year in a row. Drought always looms over California, so we must use water wisely and sparingly."

Last year's initial allocation of 10% was raised to 60% by the time it was finalized in May.

#### New Appointees to Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board

Governor Brown appointed Lana Ong Peterson of Orange and Daniel Selmi of Newport Beach, and reappointed William Von Blasingame of Irvine to the Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board.

Peterson is senior public affairs representative at Kaiser Permanente Downey Medical Center and held several positions for Cox Communications.

Selmi has been a professor of law at Loyola Law School since 1983 and was previously deputy attorney general at the California Department of Justice, Office of the Attorney General.

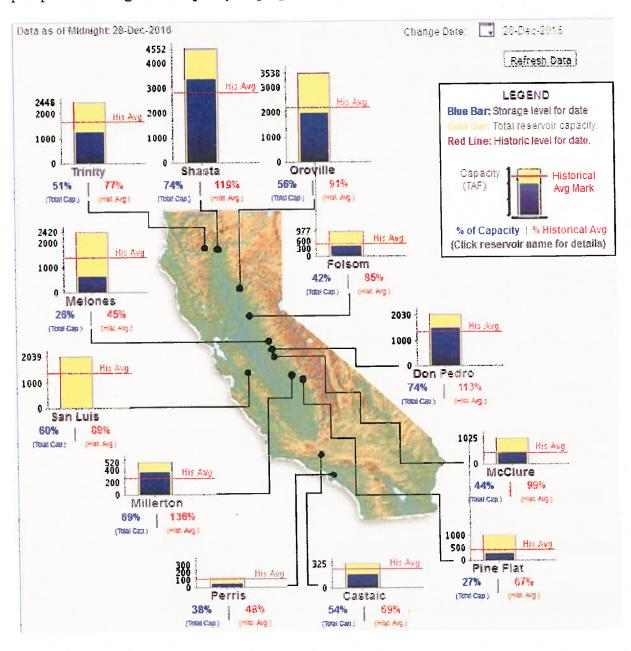
Von Blasingame, a water board incumbent since 2013, has been a member of the finance committee of the OneOC Board of Directors since 2011. He was senior vice president and general manager of Caribbean Operations at Mirant Energy Company from 2005 to 2007 and held several positions at Edison Mission Energy from 1986 to 2005, including vice president and chief financial officer of the Asia Pacific Region.

The appointments require Senate confirmation.

Reservoir Levels Update

Despite California lifting mandatory statewide water restrictions earlier this year, 60 percent of the state is still in a severe or extreme drought, even with significant precipitation in November and December in the northern part of the state.

Reservoir levels have improved across the state due to recent storms, and the state is crossing its fingers the strong precipitation continues throughout the winter. As of the end of December, the pumps are running at full capacity helping to refill critically low south of delta reservoirs.



#### CARB Released 2030 Target Scoping Plan Update Discussion Draft

The California Air Resources Board has released their first Discussion Draft of the 2030 Target Scoping Plan. The Discussion Draft outlines broad goals and policies needed to meet the mandate of reducing greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) 40 percent below 1990 levels by 2030.

While there are still many details missing on how the state will reach these goals, and what the economic cost will be, they do outline some potential measures and supporting actions the waste management sector can take to reach their goals. They go beyond the 2030 goals and state that local water and wastewater utilities should adopt a long-term goal to reduce GHGs 80 percent below 1990 levels by 2050. They state that this would require water and wastewater utilities to move toward a low carbon or net-zero carbon water management system "where technically feasible and cost-effective."

The Discussion Draft notes that in support of the Short-Lived Climate Pollutant Reduction Strategy, the state should encourage resource recovery projects at wastewater treatment plants to help achieve the goal of reducing fugitive methane by 40 percent by 2030. The Discussion Draft lists opportunities to support co-digestion of food-related waste streams at wastewater treatment plants and incentivizing methane capture systems at wastewater treatments to produce renewable electricity, transportation fuel, or pipeline biomethane as tools needed to help met both the GHG and the Short-Lived Climate Pollution goals.

The second half of the plan is due out in January and is expected to include information on the costs and benefits of specific suggestions within the Discussion Draft.

Governor Brown Makes Appointments to California Public Utilities Commission Governor Brown has made two appointments to the California Public Utilities Commission to replace Commissioners Catherine Sandoval and Michael Florio whose six-year terms end next month.

Martha Guzman Aceves, 39, of Sacramento, has been a deputy legislative affairs secretary in the Office of the Governor since 2011, focusing on natural resources, environmental protection, energy and food and agriculture. She was sustainable communities program director for the California Rural Legal Assistance Foundation from 2005 to 2011. From 2006 to 2008, she worked with Swanton Berry Farm on human resources issues including a new employee-stock ownership program. She was legislative coordinator for United Farm Workers from 1999 to 2005, working on labor and environmental issues. In 2010 she co-founded Communities for a New California, a charitable organization promoting increased civic engagement of underrepresented communities. Guzman Aceves earned a Master of Science degree in agricultural and resource economics from the University of California, Davis. Guzman Aceves is a Democrat.

Clifford Rechtschaffen, 59, of Oakland, has served as a senior advisor in the Office of the Governor since 2011, where he has worked on climate, energy and environmental issues. In 2011, he also served as acting director of the California Department of Conservation. Rechtschaffen served as special assistant attorney general in the California Department of Justice, Attorney General's Office from 2007 to 2010. From 1993 to 2007, he taught

environmental law, directed the environmental law program and co-founded the Environmental Law and Justice Clinic at Golden Gate University School of Law. In 2005 he was a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Ljubljana in Slovenia. He is the author of several books and numerous articles on environmental law and policy. He was a deputy attorney general in the Environment Section of the California Department of Justice, Attorney General's Office from 1986 to 1993, Reginald Heber Smith Community Lawyer Fellow at the Marin County Legal Aid Foundation from 1985 to 1986 and a law clerk for the Honorable Thelton Henderson at the U.S. District Court, Northern District of California from 1984 to 1985. He earned a Juris Doctor degree from Yale Law School. Rechtschaffen is a Democrat.

With the CPUC suffering from several high-profile scandals in recent years, the Governor hopes these appointments will help bring the transparency and structural changes that have not been achieved through legislation.

#### State of Affairs

- \* Lame Duck (post-election) session ended
- \* 114<sup>th</sup> Congress Adjourned
- \* Eighth year of Obama Administration closing down
- \* Trump transition underway
- \* Trump Cabinet selected (except USDA VA and Trade Rep.)
- \* Federal funding approved through April 28, 2017 (or just over half present of fiscal year)
- WRDA bill passed at close of session
- \* Energy bill killed by House leaders (Senate, on a bi-partisan basis, not pleased)
- \* 115<sup>th</sup> Congress convenes on January 3, 2017

#### House, Senate and New Administration

- \* New Congress convenes January 3.
- \* New Administration begins January 20.
- \* In the House, Chairs are being selected and the House is preparing for the next Congress.
- \* In the Senate, same.
- \* In the new Administration, transition is focused on Cabinet appointments and selection of landing teams staff that walk in on January 21 and assume the responsibility for running departments and agencies, even if only on an "acting" basis.
- \* Trump, House and Senate Rs are developing a "First 100 Days" Agenda.

**Annual Funding Bills** 

- \* To fund the Federal Government, a Continuing Resolution was passed and signed into law during the Lame Duck.
- \* Funding for Departments and Agencies is "continued" until April 28.
- \* The Trump Administration has not decided whether or not to send up a budget, leave it to Congress OR submit targeted funding amendments. This is being discussed, but not yet decided.
- \* Two Prominent Complicating Factors.
  - (1) The 2017-18 Budget and Funding bills will have to be considered at the same time.
  - (2) The Debt Ceiling will be reached in early 2017. Congress will be obligated to enact legislation increasing the debt ceiling. Politically, Trump supporters are divided on this issue. It must be resolved (timing is uncertain) or experience a Government shut-down.

Water Resources Development Act (WRDA)

- \* The long-debated and conferenced WRDA (Army Corps of Engineers and EPA authorization bill was finally enacted at the close of the session.
- \* All language related to EPA's WaterSense program was dropped.
- \* As a result and with the deletion of that language, there is no language of any kind on water softeners.
- \* The water agencies concerned about salt and its impact on water recycling are planning to meet with House and Senate Committee leadership early in 2017.
- \* The next WRDA bill, whenever it is considered, will address this issue.

Interior Department - Secretary Nominated

- \* President-Elect Trump, in early December, announced his selection to serve as Secretary of the Interior.
- \* He picked Rep. Ryan Zinke (R-MT) a one-term Congressman from Montana.
- \* At one time or another, probably as many as 30 different names were considered. Two other House Members, Rep. Cathy McMorris Rodgers (R-WA) and Rep. Raul Labrador (R-ID) were finalists.
- \* Almost every individual considered called for public lands to be turned over to the States except Zinke.

- \* Zinke is an active hunter and outdoorsman. He believes public lands should remain public. Last Summer, at the GOP Convention, he even resigned from the GOP Platform Committee when it adopted a "turn-over-to-the-states" plank.
- \* Trump and Donald Trump Jr. made it clear (publicly), as far back as January, they supported public lands and opposed a turn-over policy. That Trump's son was actively involved in this selection which has been publicly acknowledged.
- \* In the end, the single candidate (among the 30) who supported protecting public lands was picked to head Interior.
- \* Interior has more than 100 presidential and political appointees. The process has just begun.
- \* Transition is now focused on establishing "landing teams" individuals that can assume the levers of power at Interior the morning of January 21.
- \* Little word about who will be nominated to serve as Commissioner, Bureau of Reclamation.

#### Tax Reform

- \* House Ways and Means Committee Chair, Kevin Brady (R-TX) is publicly detailing how he wants to proceed with tax reform. He's calling for rates to be reduced: 20% corporate and 25% personal (some proposals call for corporate to be reduced as low as 15%). In order to pay for rate reduction, major sections of the tax code will have to be repealed or amended.
- \* A major target for elimination deductibility of Municipal Bonds. That 100-year tax code provision is at risk.
- \* The Committee held a widely-publicized Rs-only closed-door meeting in mid-December for W&M Committee Members to outline their tax priorities to Chairman Brady and the Committee staff.
- \* All indications, from Chairman Brady's statements, the House envisions a wholesale reshaping of tax policy and a almost complete repeal of existing tax provisions, with a handful of a few high profile exceptions (mortgage deduction, charitable contributions, etc.)..
- \* Conflcts and contradictions are presently emerging (and are not clarified at this time).
- \* The consensus among tax lobbyists as of mid-December, is that the deduction for municipal bonds would be repealed, reduced or somehow capped.

- \* These changes, if enacted, would impose pressure on the bond market making it more expensive to borrow money for capital projects.
- \* For IEUA, this has the potential to disrupt IEUA's ability to borrow funds in the bond market at favorable rates.
- \* Trump is insisting that his infrastructure program include public-private partnerships.

  The "public" part of that partnership requires public agencies to bring funds to the table and IEUA and others rely on muni bonds as a key source of those funds.
- \* If the House Ways and Means Committee Tax Reform bill eliminates or shaves muni bond deductions, then the cost of local infrastructure will assuredly increase.
- \* Put another way, the Trump infrastructure initiative and the House Tax Reform initiative are on a collision course at least potentially. Tax lobbyists and others all observe the apparent conflict and no one knows, at this time, how it will be addressed or resolved.
- \* Making matters more confusing, President-Elect Trump met with a group of Mayors from the US Conference of Mayors) during December.
  - -- Attendees included Mayors from Oklahoma City, New Orleans and Columbia, South Carolina.
  - -- Mayor Steve Benjamin, from Columbia, South Carolina, is a leader at the Conference AND also head of the Municipal Bonds for America coalition (in which I participate on behalf of IEUA with lobbyists and representatives from more than 20 different industries).
  - The Mayors raised the issue of "muni bonds" and Trump, without even being asked, declared support for continuing them (as a developer, he has first-hand knowledge of the value of muni bonds and the contribution they make to development).
  - -- Mayor Benjamin left the meeting and went straight to the cameras in the Trump Tower lobby and announced Trump's positive statements about muni bonds.
  - -- This development was immediately picked up in the national media, trade press and on social media.
- \* Other lobbyists participating in the Municipal Bonds for America coalition began to report that Trump's statement created a significant backlash (behind closed doors) at the Ways and Means Committee. Trump's statement if it becomes Administration policy interferes with the Committee's desire to lower tax rates.
- \* Right now, there are more questions than answers. Will Trump continue to hold a firm position? What will Ways and Means do? How will they proceed? No one knows and it's the source of endless speculation right now.
- \* The Trump statement in support of deductibility of municipal bonds is significant and a

strong plus for retention of the deduction.

#### Water Situation - Drought

- \* Drought conditions in Northern California have lessened. Early winter rains and snow are encouraging. But note, there's been more rain than snow.
- \* Drought conditions, especially in the San Joaquin Valley and portions of Southern California remain dire.
- \* New Mexico and Texas are almost drought free, but further east Alabama, Georgia and a small portion of South Carolina are now experiencing "Exceptional" drought conditions (most severe). The New England has, throughout the Fall and into early Winter, also experienced drought.

<u>End of the Year – National Status Report</u>. I'm going to do something I don't typically do in Monthly Reports. I'm including an excerpt from a story in Politico. It's uplifting in many respects as it offers a positive snapshot of America today. The author, Michael Grunwald, exuded optimism about the future declaring "Everything Is (Still) Awesome!"

He went on to state that:

"The economy grew at a solid 3.5 percent clip in the third quarter, and is now significantly larger than it was before the Great Recession. The jobless rate is down to 4.6 percent, which almost qualifies as full employment. The stock market and high school graduation rate are at all-time highs, while the uninsured rate, abortion rate and teen pregnancy rate are at all-time lows. Oil imports, crime and health care inflation are also near historic lows, with carbon emissions, foreclosures and illegal immigration falling, too. Meanwhile, retirement assets, auto sales and renewable power have skyrocketed, and the once-teetering Medicare Trust Fund has stabilized. We live in the world's richest and most powerful nation; we can access most of humanity's accumulated knowledge on machines we carry in our pockets; http://politi.co/2hBJNCP

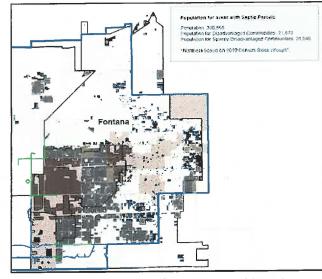

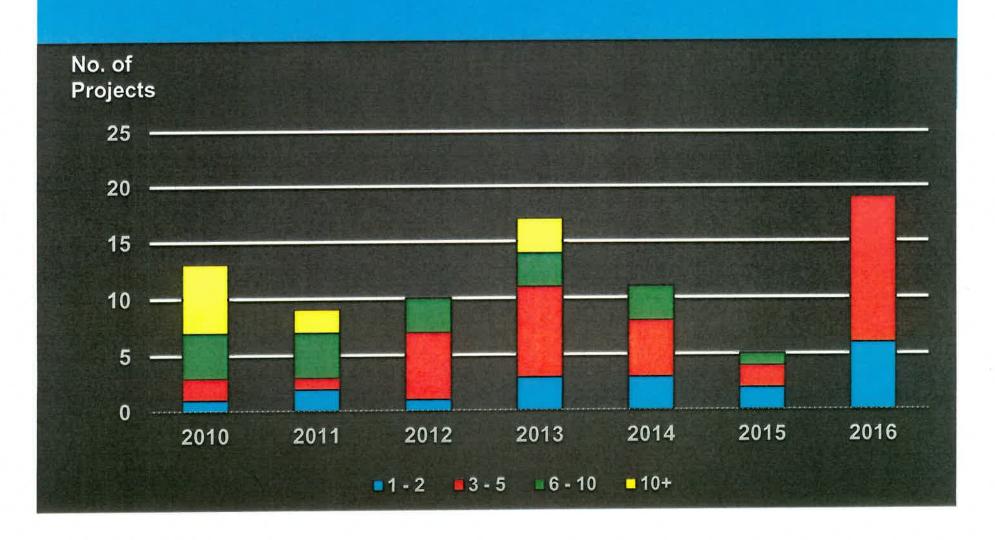

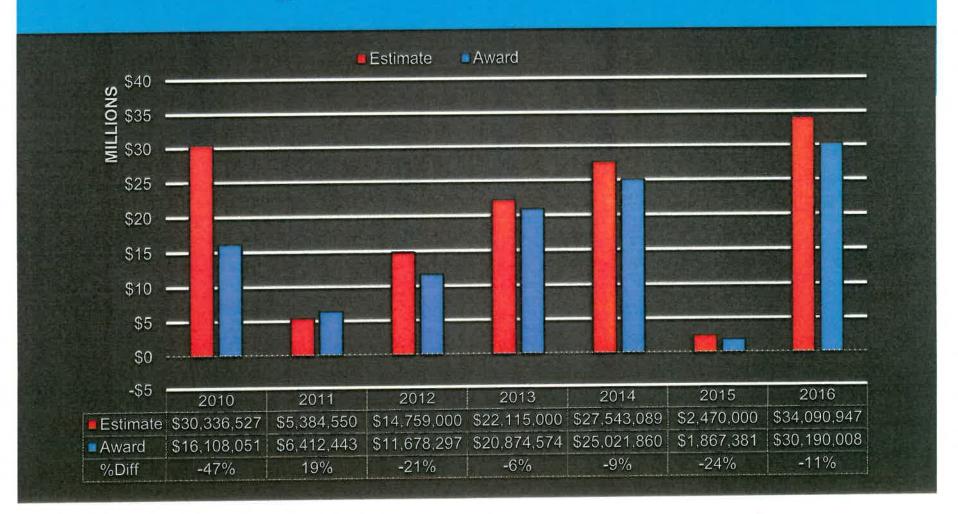




# Average Number of Bids

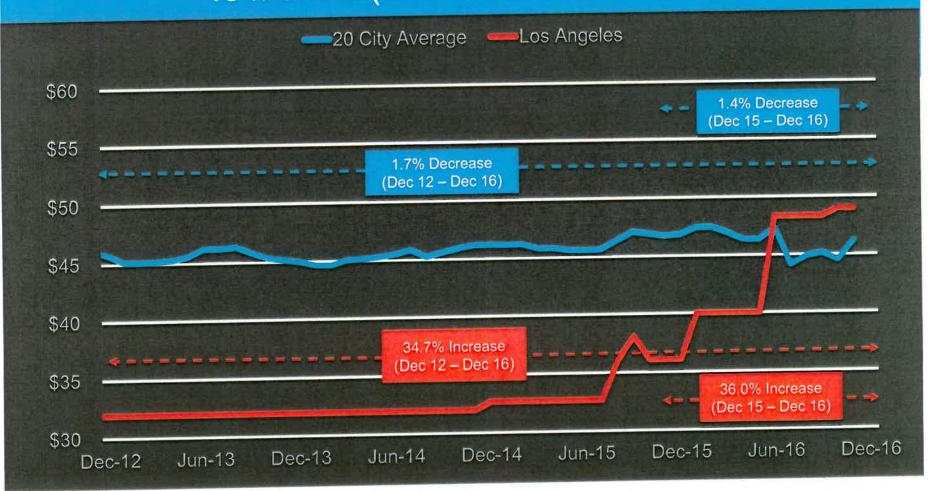
# Construction Cost Index

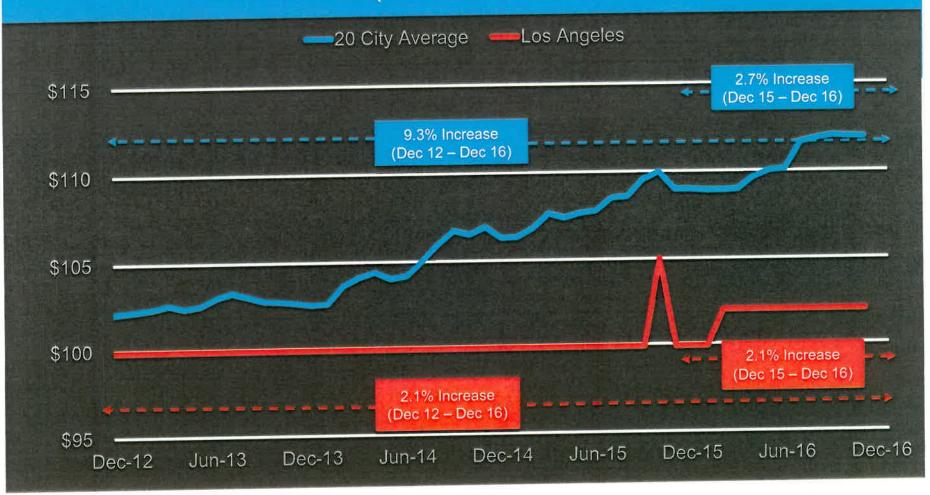
# Reinforcing Bar Grade 60

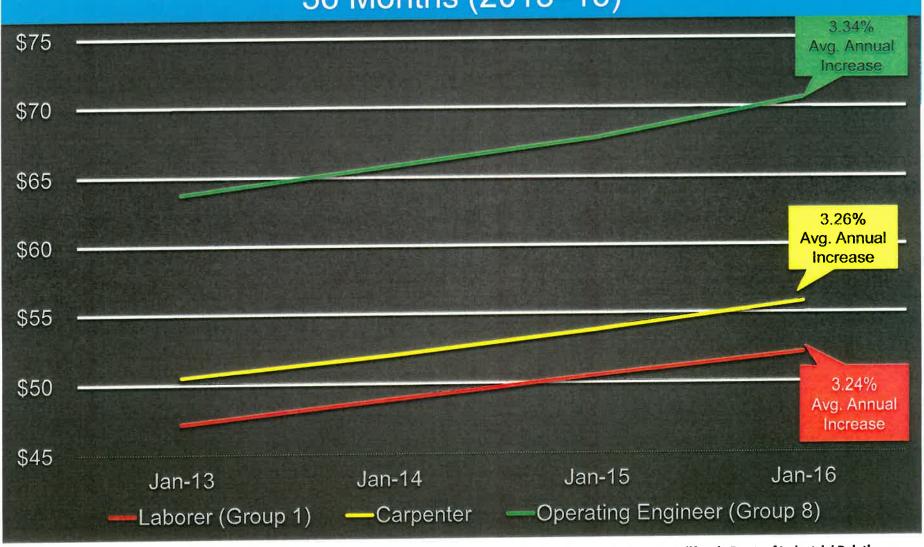

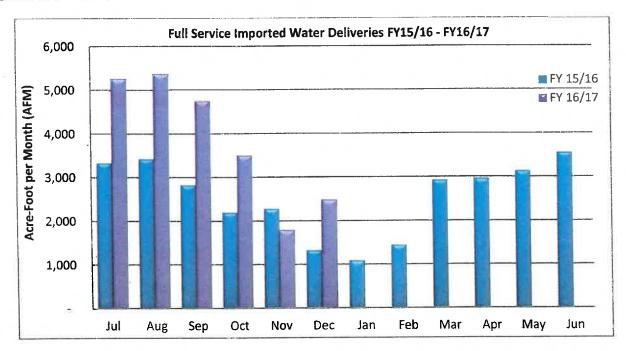

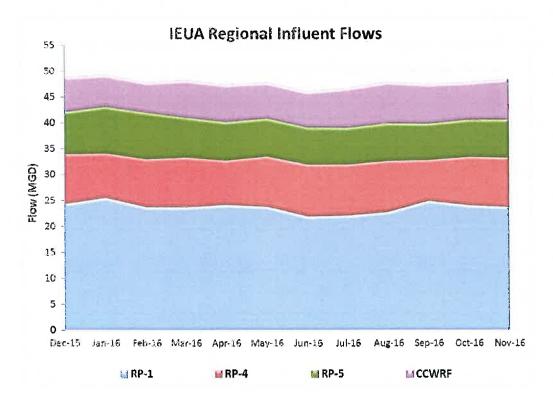
For FY16/17, the full service imported water deliveries for the month of December were at its highest compared to FY15/16.

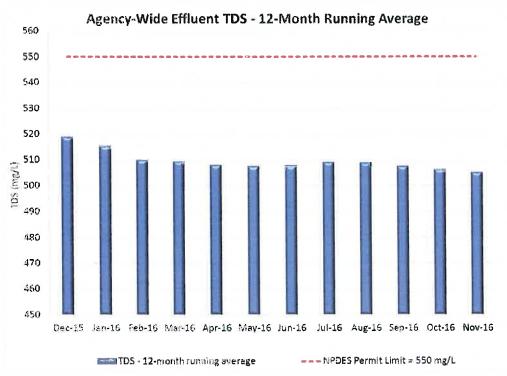


The Agency-wide average influent flow for the month of November 2016 was 48.5 million gallons per day (mgd), which is a 0.6 mgd increase from the October 2016 total influent flow.

The discharge permit effluent limit for total inorganic nitrogen (TIN) is 8 mg/L. The 12-month running average TIN value for November 2016 was 6.0 mg/L.

The discharge permit effluent limit for total dissolved solids (TDS) is 550 mg/L. The 12-month running average TDS value for November 2016 was 505 mg/L.

<u>Compost Sales</u> – Sales in December were greater than last year due to an increase AG demand and an expansion of the sales area. Riverside County issued permits to IERCA authorizing the land application of compost to farms in the county significantly increasing our sales options in the area. IERCA is the first biosolids compost producer to receive this formal authorization and continues to operate with no issues or complaints. Sales are expected to continue strong through the first half of January then decrease per a normal winter cycle. Compost inventory in the storage facility is zero cubic yards of finished material.

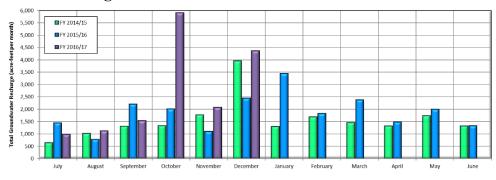
#### **Groundwater Recharge – November 2016**

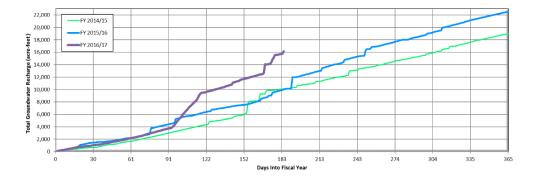
During November 2016, recycled water recharge totaled 1,453 acre-feet. During the draining of the Rialto feeder by MWD, IEUA captured 40 acre-feet of imported water for recharge. The capture of dry weather creek flows totaled 50 acre-feet. There were three rain events in November in which 541 acre-feet of storm water was captured.

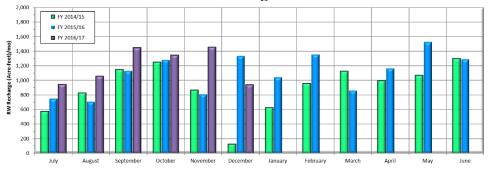

#### **Total Groundwater Recharge – November 2016**



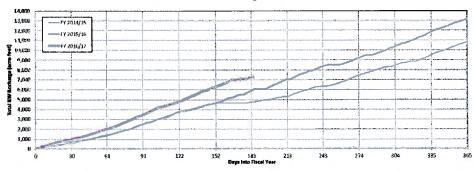


#### Recycled Water Delivered to Groundwater Recharge - November 2016

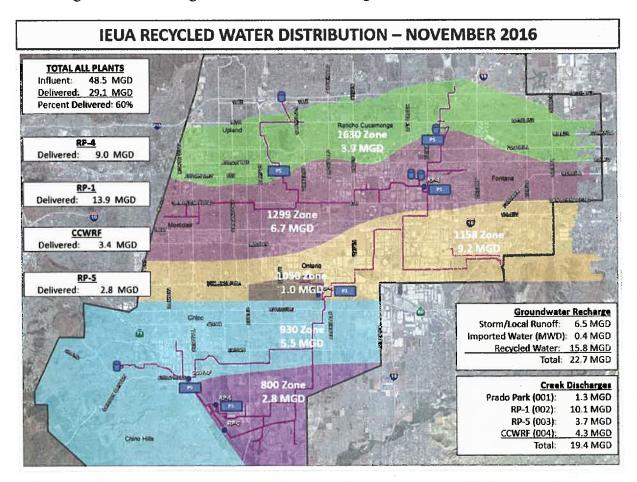

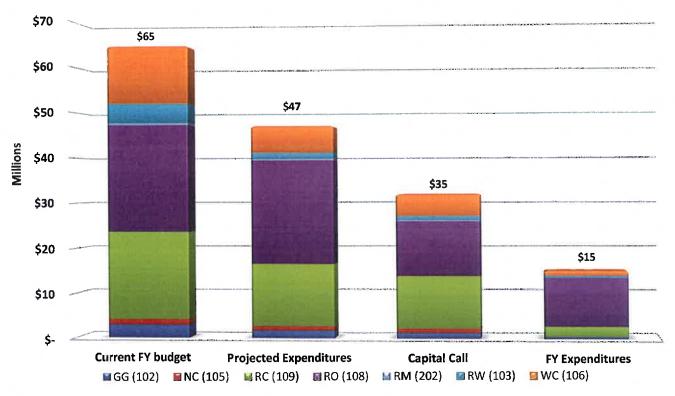

#### **GRANTS UPDATE**

#### **Board Activities:**

Since the last General Manager's report, the following items were processed through the IEUA Board of Directors Meeting:

- Adopt Resolution No. 2016-12-3, authorizing the Agency to enter financial assistance agreements with the U.S. Department of Interior - Bureau of Reclamation (USBR) WaterSMART: Title XVI Water Reclamation and Reuse Program Funding for Fiscal Year 2017; and
- Authorize the General Manager, or in his absence, his designees, to execute the financial assistance agreement, any amendments, and any grant related documents thereto.

#### **Grant Awards:**

On December 20, 2016, the State Water Resources Control Board awarded \$10,000,000 Proposition 1 grant funding for the Storm Water Management Facilities: Wineville, Jurupa, and RP-3 Basins Improvements and Pumping and Conveyance System Project, a joint project that will be implemented by IEUA and Chino Basin Water Master.
