Staff recommends that the Board approve the total disbursements for the month of May 2019, in the amount of \$13,142,309.82.

Total disbursements for the month of May 2019 were \$13,142,309.82. Disbursement activity included check payments of \$4,079,136.21 to vendors and \$3,795.31 for worker's compensation related costs. Electronic payments included Automated Clearing House (ACH) of \$4,248,769.09 and wire transfers (excluding payroll) of \$3,271,574.01. Total payroll was \$1,532,029.00 for employees and \$7,006.20 for the Board of Directors.

Subject: Napa Lateral License Agreement with BNSF Railroad Company

Executive Summary:

In November 2015, IEUA coordinated with the City of Fontana, Fontana Water Company, California Steel Industries (CSI), and the Auto Club Speedway (Speedway) to provide recycled water for delivery to CSI and Speedway for industrial and irrigation use.

This project is utilizing a design-build delivery method. The design phase is complete, and construction phase is ready to proceed. In order to complete the construction phase of the project, IEUA will need to encroach on the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Corporation (BNSF) Railroad Company's Right of Way for 1,100 linear feet. A draft agreement has been received, and the fees reflected on the agreement were higher than anticipated. Therefore, an appraisal has been ordered to determine a fair value of the encroachment. Once the appraisal has been received, staff will begin negotiating with BNSF over the agreement terms. In order to maintain the project schedule, staff is requesting approval to execute the agreement for the maximum not-to-exceed amount requested of \$163,569.

Staff's Recommendation:

- 1. Execute the license agreement with BNSF Railway Company for a not-to-exceed amount of \$163,569; and
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to negotiate and execute the agreement, subject to non-substantive changes.

PIPELINE LICENSE

THIS PIPELINE LICENSE ("License") is made to be effective ______, 2019 (the "Effective Date") by and between BNSF RAILWAY COMPANY, a Delaware corporation ("Licensor") and INLAND EMPIRE UTILITIES AGENCY, a California corporation ("Licensee").

In consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, the parties agree to the following:

GENERAL

- 1. Grant of License. Licensor hereby grants Licensee a non-exclusive license, subject to all rights, interests, and estates of third parties, including, without limitation, any leases, use rights, easements, liens, or other encumbrances, and upon the terms and conditions set forth below, to construct and maintain, in strict accordance with the drawings and specifications approved by Licensor as part of Licensee's application process (the "Drawings and Specifications"), One (1) pipeline, 24 inches in diameter inside a 36 inch Steel casing (collectively, the "Pipeline"), across or along Licensor's rail corridor at or near the station of Cucamonga, County of San Bernardino, State of California, Line Segment 7683, Mile Post 44.67 as shown on the attached Drawing No. 73696, dated September 12, 2018, attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by reference (the "Premises").
- 2. <u>Term.</u> This License shall commence on the Effective Date and shall continue for a period of twenty-five (25) years, subject to prior termination as hereinafter described.
- 3. <u>Existing Improvements</u>. Licensee shall not disturb any improvements of Licensor or Licensor's existing lessees, licensees, easement beneficiaries or lien holders, if any, or interfere with the use, repair, maintenance or replacement of such improvements.
- 4. <u>Use of the Premises</u>. Licensee shall use the Premises solely for construction, maintenance, and use of the Pipeline in accordance with the Drawings and Specifications. The Pipeline shall carry Recycled Water, and Licensee shall not use the Pipeline to carry any other material or use the Premises for any other purpose.
- 5. <u>Alterations</u>. Except as set forth in this License, Licensee may not make any alterations to the Premises or permanently affix anything to the Premises or any buildings or other structures adjacent to the Premises without Licensor's prior written consent.

COMPENSATION

- 6. <u>License Fee</u>. Licensee shall pay Licensor, prior to the Effective Date, the sum of One Hundred Sixty Three Thousand Five Hundred Sixty Nine and No/100 Dollars (\$163,569.00) as compensation for the use of the Premises.
- 7. Costs and Expenses.
 - 7.1 For the purpose of this License, "cost" or "costs" and "expense" or "expenses" includes, but is not limited to, actual labor and material costs including all assignable additives, and material and supply costs at current value where used.
 - 7.2 Licensee agrees to reimburse Licensor (pursuant to the terms of **Section 8** below) for all costs and expenses incurred by Licensor in connection with Licensee's use of the Premises or the presence, construction and maintenance of the Pipeline, including but not limited to the furnishing of Licensor's flaggers and any vehicle rental costs incurred, inspection coordination, safety, mobilization and/or other observation services described in this License (collectively, the "**Services**").. Licensee shall bear the cost of the Services, when deemed necessary by Licensor's representative. Flagging costs

shall include, but not be limited to, the following: pay for at least an eight (8) hour basic day with time and one-half or double time for overtime, rest days and holidays (as applicable); vacation allowance; paid holidays (as applicable); railway and unemployment insurance; public liability and property damage insurance; health and welfare benefits; transportation; meals; lodging and supervision. Negotiations for railway labor or collective bargaining agreements and rate changes authorized by appropriate Federal authorities may increase flagging rates. Flagging rates in effect at the time of performance by the flaggers will be used to calculate the flagging costs pursuant to this **Section 7**.

- 7.3 Licensor, at is sole discretion, may elect to designate a third party (the **"Scheduling Agent"**), to perform and/or arrange for the performance of the Services.
- 8. Payment Terms. All invoices are due thirty (30) days after the date of invoice. If Licensee fails to pay any monies due to Licensor within thirty (30) days after the invoice date, then Licensee shall pay interest on such unpaid sum from the due date until paid at an annual rate equal to the lesser of (i) the prime rate last published in *The Wall Street Journal* in the preceding December plus two and one-half percent (2-1/2%), or (ii) the maximum rate permitted by law.

LICENSOR'S RESERVED RIGHTS

- 9. Reserved Rights of Use. Licensor excepts and reserves the right, to be exercised by Licensor and any other parties who may obtain written permission or authority from Licensor:
 - to maintain, use, operate, repair, replace, modify and relocate any utility, power or communication pipe/lines/cables and appurtenances (other than the Pipeline) and other facilities or structures of like character upon, over, under or across the Premises existing as of the Effective Date;
 - 9.2 to construct, maintain, renew, use, operate, change, modify and relocate any tracks or additional facilities, structures and related appurtenances upon, over, under or across the Premises; or
 - 9.3 to use the Premises in any manner as Licensor in its sole discretion deems appropriate, provided Licensor uses all commercially reasonable efforts to avoid material interference with the use of the Premises by Licensee for the purpose specified in **Section 4** above.
- 10. Right to Require Relocation. If at any time during the term of this License, Licensor desires the use of its rail corridor in such a manner as would, in Licensor's reasonable opinion, be interfered with by the Pipeline, Licensee shall, at its sole expense, within thirty (30) days after receiving written notice from Licensor to such effect, make such changes in the Pipeline as in the sole discretion of Licensor may be necessary to avoid interference with the proposed use of Licensor's rail corridor, including, without limitation, the relocation of the Pipeline, or the construction of a new pipeline to replace the Pipeline. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Licensee agrees to make all emergency changes and minor adjustments, as determined by Licensor in its sole discretion, to the Pipeline promptly upon Licensor's request.

LICENSEE'S OPERATIONS

- 11. Construction and Maintenance of the Pipeline.
 - Licensee shall not enter or commence construction unless accompanied by Licensor's representative, the Scheduling Agent or its designee. Licensee shall notify Licensor's Roadmaster, at , telephone 909-386-4060, at least fifteen (15) business days prior to installation of the Pipeline and prior to entering the Premises for any subsequent maintenance thereon. In the event of emergency, Licensee shall notify Licensor of Licensee's entry onto the Premises at the telephone number above as soon as practicable and shall promptly thereafter follow up with written notice of such entry.

- 11.2 Licensee's on-site supervisors shall retain/maintain a fully executed copy of this License at all times while on the Premises.
- 11.3 While on the Premises, Licensee shall use only public roadways to cross from one side of Licensor's tracks to the other.
- Any contractors or subcontractors performing work on the Pipeline or entering the Premises on behalf of Licensee shall be deemed servants and agents of Licensee for purposes of this License.
- Under no conditions shall Licensee be permitted to conduct any tests, investigations or any other activity using mechanized equipment and/or machinery, or place or store any mechanized equipment, tools or other materials, within twenty-five (25) feet of the centerline of any railroad track on the Premises unless Licensee has obtained prior written approval from Licensor. Licensee shall, at its sole cost and expense, perform all activities on and about the Premises in such a manner as not at any time to endanger or interfere with (i) the existence or use of present or future tracks, roadbeds, or property of Licensor, (ii) the safe operation and activities of Licensor or existing third parties, or (iii) the rights or interests of third parties. If ordered to cease using the Premises at any time by Licensor's personnel due to any hazardous condition, Licensee shall immediately do so. Notwithstanding the foregoing right of Licensor, the parties agree that Licensor has no duty or obligation to monitor Licensee's use of the Premises to determine the safe nature thereof, it being solely Licensee's responsibility to ensure that Licensee's use of the Premises is safe. Neither the exercise nor the failure by Licensor to exercise any rights granted in this Section will alter the liability allocation provided by this License.
- Licensee shall, at its sole cost and expense, construct and maintain the Pipeline in such a manner and of such material that the Pipeline will not at any time endanger or interfere with (i) the existence or use of present or future tracks, roadbeds, or property of Licensor, (ii) the safe operation and activities of Licensor or existing third parties, or (iii) the rights or interests of third parties. The construction of the Pipeline shall be completed within one (1) year of the Effective Date, and any subsequent maintenance shall be completed within one (1) year of initiation. Within fifteen (15) days after completion of the construction of the Pipeline or the performance of any subsequent maintenance thereon, Licensee shall, at Licensee's own cost and expense, restore the Premises to substantially their state as of the Effective Date, unless otherwise approved in advance by Licensor in writing. On or before expiration or termination of this License for any reason, Licensee shall, at its sole cost and expense, surrender the Premises to Licensor pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth in **Section 24** hereof.
- Licensor may direct one or more of its field engineers or inspectors to observe or inspect the 11.7 construction and/or maintenance of the Pipeline at any time for compliance with the Drawings and Specifications and Legal Requirements (defined below). Licensee shall reimburse Licensor for the cost of such observation or inspection related services pursuant to Section 8. If ordered at any time to halt construction or maintenance of the Pipeline by Licensor's personnel or representatives due to non-compliance with the Drawings and Specifications or any other hazardous condition, Licensee shall immediately do so. Notwithstanding the foregoing right of Licensor, the parties agree that Licensor has no duty or obligation to observe or inspect, or to halt work on, the Pipeline, it being solely Licensee's responsibility to ensure that the Pipeline is constructed and maintained in strict accordance with the Drawings and Specifications and in a safe and workmanlike manner in compliance with all terms hereof. Neither the exercise of, nor the failure by Licensor to exercise, any right granted by this Section will alter in any way the liability allocation provided by this License. If at any time Licensee shall, in the sole judgment of Licensor, fail to properly perform its obligations under this Section 11, Licensor may, at its option and at Licensee's sole expense, arrange for the performance of such work as it deems necessary for the safety of its operations and activities. Licensee shall promptly reimburse Licensor for all costs and expenses of such work, pursuant to the terms of Section 8. Licensor's failure to perform any obligations of Licensee shall not alter the liability allocation hereunder.

12. Boring and Excavation.

- 12.1 Prior to Licensee conducting any boring, excavation, or similar work on or about any portion of the Premises, Licensee shall explore the proposed location for such work with hand tools to a depth of at least three (3) feet below the surface of the ground to determine whether pipelines or other structures exist below the surface, provided, however, that in lieu of the foregoing, Licensee shall have the right to use suitable detection equipment or other generally accepted industry practice (e.a., consulting with the Underground Services Association) to determine the existence or location of pipelines and other subsurface structures prior to drilling or excavating with mechanized equipment. Licensee may request information from Licensor concerning the existence and approximate location of Licensor's underground lines, utilities, and pipelines at or near the vicinity of the proposed Pipeline by contacting Licensor's Telecommunications Helpdesk at least thirty (30) business days prior to installation of the Pipeline. Upon receiving Licensee's timely request, Licensor will provide Licensee with the information Licensor has in its possession regarding any existing underground lines, utilities, and pipelines at or near the vicinity of the proposed Pipeline and, if applicable, identify the location of such lines on the Premises pursuant to Licensor's standard procedures. Licensor does not warrant the accuracy or completeness of information relating to subsurface conditions of the Premises and Licensee's operations will be subject at all times to the liability provisions herein.
- 12.2 For all bores greater than 26-inch diameter and at a depth less than 10.0 feet below bottom of rail, a soil investigation must be performed by Licensee and reviewed by Licensor prior to construction. This study is to determine if granular material is present, and to prevent subsidence during the installation process. If the investigation determines in Licensor's reasonable opinion that granular material is present, Licensor may select a new location for Licensee's use, or may require Licensee to furnish for Licensor's review and approval, in Licensor's sole discretion, a remedial plan to deal with the granular material. Once Licensor has approved any such remedial plan in writing, Licensee shall, at Licensee's sole cost and expense, carry out the approved plan in accordance with all terms thereof and hereof.
- Any open hole, boring, or well constructed on the Premises by Licensee shall be safely covered and secured at all times when Licensee is not working in the actual vicinity thereof. Following completion of that portion of the work, all holes or borings constructed on the Premises by Licensee shall be:
 - 12.3.1 filled in to surrounding ground level with compacted bentonite grout; or
 - 12.3.2 otherwise secured or retired in accordance with any applicable Legal Requirement. No excavated materials may remain on Licensor's property for more than ten (10) days, but must be properly disposed of by Licensee in accordance with applicable Legal Requirements.

LIABILITY AND INSURANCE

- 13. <u>Liability and Indemnification</u>.
 - For purposes of this License: (a) "Indemnitees" means Licensor and Licensor's affiliated companies, partners, successors, assigns, legal representatives, officers, directors, shareholders, employees, and agents; (b) "Liabilities" means all claims, liabilities, fines, penalties, costs, damages, losses, liens, causes of action, suits, demands, judgments, and expenses (including, without limitation, court costs, reasonable attorneys' fees, costs of investigation, removal and remediation, and governmental oversight costs) environmental or otherwise; and (c) "Licensee Parties" means Licensee or Licensee's officers, agents, invitees, licensees, employees, or contractors, or any party directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or any party they control or exercise control over.
 - 13.2 TO THE FULLEST EXTENT PERMITTED BY LAW, LICENSEE SHALL, AND SHALL CAUSE ITS CONTRACTOR TO, RELEASE, INDEMNIFY, DEFEND AND HOLD HARMLESS INDEMNITES FOR, FROM, AND AGAINST ANY AND ALL LIABILITIES OF ANY NATURE, KIND, OR

DESCRIPTION DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY ARISING OUT OF, RESULTING FROM, OR RELATED TO (IN WHOLE OR IN PART):

- 13.2.1 THIS LICENSE, INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, ITS ENVIRONMENTAL PROVISIONS,
- 13.2.2 ANY RIGHTS OR INTERESTS GRANTED PURSUANT TO THIS LICENSE,
- 13.2.3 LICENSEE'S OCCUPATION AND USE OF THE PREMISES,
- 13.2.4 THE ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITION AND STATUS OF THE PREMISES CAUSED BY OR CONTRIBUTED TO BY LICENSEE, OR
- 13.2.5 ANY ACT OR OMISSION OF ANY LICENSEE PARTY.
- TO THE FULLEST EXTENT PERMITTED BY LAW, LICENSEE NOW AND FOREVER WAIVES 13.3 ANY AND ALL CLAIMS THAT BY VIRTUE OF ENTERING INTO THIS LICENSE, LICENSOR IS A GENERATOR, OWNER, OPERATOR, ARRANGER, OR TRANSPORTER FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE COMPREHENSIVE ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE, COMPENSATION, AND LIABILITY ACT, AS AMENDED ("CERCLA") OR OTHER ENVIRONMENTAL LAWS (DEFINED BELOW). LICENSEE WILL INDEMNIFY, DEFEND, AND HOLD THE INDEMNITEES HARMLESS FROM ANY AND ALL SUCH CLAIMS. Licensee shall pay all costs and expenses incident to such defense, including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees, investigators' fees, litigation and appeal expenses, settlement payments, and amounts paid in satisfaction of judgments.

- 14. Personal Property Risk of Loss. ALL PERSONAL PROPERTY, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, FIXTURES, EQUIPMENT, OR RELATED MATERIALS UPON THE PREMISES WILL BE AT THE RISK OF LICENSEE ONLY, AND NO INDEMNITEE WILL BE LIABLE FOR ANY DAMAGE THERETO OR THEFT THEREOF, WHETHER OR NOT DUE IN WHOLE OR IN PART TO THE NEGLIGENCE OF ANY INDEMNITEE.
- 15. <u>Insurance</u>. Licensee shall, at its sole cost and expense, procure and maintain during the life of this License the following insurance coverage:
 - 15.1 <u>Commercial General Liability Insurance</u>. This insurance shall contain broad form contractual liability with a combined single limit of a minimum of \$5,000,000 each occurrence and an aggregate limit of at least \$10,000,000 but in no event less than the amount otherwise carried by Licensee. Coverage must be purchased on a post 2004 ISO occurrence or equivalent and include coverage for, but not limited to, the following:
 - Bodily Injury and Property Damage
 - Personal Injury and Advertising Injury
 - Fire legal liability
 - Products and completed operations

This policy shall also contain the following endorsements or language, which shall be indicated on the certificate of insurance:

- The definition of insured contract shall be amended to remove any exclusion or other limitation for any work being done within 50 feet of railroad property.
- Waiver of subrogation in favor of and acceptable to Licensor.
- Additional insured endorsement in favor of and acceptable to Licensor and Jones Lang LaSalle Brokerage, Inc.
- Separation of insureds.
- The policy shall be primary and non-contributing with respect to any insurance carried by Licensor.

It is agreed that the workers' compensation and employers' liability related exclusions in the Commercial General Liability Insurance policy(s) required herein are intended to apply to employees of the policy holder and shall not apply to Licensor's employees.

No other endorsements limiting coverage may be included on the policy.

- 15.2 <u>Business Automobile Insurance</u>. This insurance shall contain a combined single limit of at least \$1,000,000 per occurrence, and include coverage for, but not limited to the following:
 - Bodily injury and property damage.
 - Any and all vehicles owned, used or hired.

This policy shall also contain the following endorsements, which shall be indicated on the certificate of insurance:

- Waiver of subrogation in favor of and acceptable to Licensor.
- Additional insured endorsement in favor of and acceptable to Licensor.
- Separation of insureds.
- The policy shall be primary and non-contributing with respect to any insurance carried by Licensor.
- 15.3 <u>Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance</u>. This insurance shall include coverage for, but not limited to:
 - Licensee's statutory liability under the workers' compensation laws of the state(s) in which the services are to be performed. If optional under state laws, the insurance must cover all employees anyway.

■ Employers' Liability (Part B) with limits of at least \$500,000 each accident, \$500,000 by disease policy limit, \$500,000 by disease each employee.

This policy shall also contain the following endorsements or language, which shall be indicated on the certificate of insurance:

- Waiver of subrogation in favor of and acceptable to Licensor.
- 15.4 Railroad Protective Liability Insurance. This insurance shall name only Licensor as the Insured with coverage of at least \$5,000,000 per occurrence and \$10,000,000 in the aggregate. The coverage obtained under this policy shall only be effective during the initial installation and/or construction of the Pipeline. THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE PIPELINE SHALL BE COMPLETED WITHIN ONE (1) YEAR OF THE EFFECTIVE DATE. If further maintenance of the Pipeline is needed at a later date, an additional Railroad Protective Liability Insurance Policy shall be required. The policy shall be issued on a standard ISO form CG 00 35 12 03 and include the following:
 - Endorsed to include the Pollution Exclusion Amendment.
 - Endorsed to include the Limited Seepage and Pollution Endorsement.
 - Endorsed to include Evacuation Expense Coverage Endorsement.
 - No other endorsements restricting coverage may be added.
 - The original policy must be provided to Licensor prior to performing any work or services under this License.
 - Definition of "Physical Damage to Property" shall be endorsed to read: "means direct and accidental loss of or damage to all property owned by any named insured and all property in any named insured's care, custody and control arising out of the acts or omissions of the contractor named on the Declarations."

In lieu of providing a Railroad Protective Liability Policy, for a period of one (1) year from the Effective Date, Licensee may participate in Licensor's Blanket Railroad Protective Liability Insurance Policy available to Licensee or its contractor. The limits of coverage are the same as above. The cost is \$1266.

- 15.5 Intentionally Deleted
- 15.6 Other Requirements:
 - 15.6.1 Where allowable by law, all policies (applying to coverage listed above) shall contain no exclusion for punitive damages.
 - 15.6.2 Licensee agrees to waive its right of recovery against Licensor for all claims and suits against Licensor. In addition, Licensee's insurers, through the terms of the policy or a policy endorsement, must waive their right of subrogation against Licensor for all claims and suits, and the certificate of insurance must reflect the waiver of subrogation endorsement. Licensee further waives its right of recovery, and its insurers must also waive their right of subrogation against Licensor for loss of Licensee's owned or leased property, or property under Licensee's care, custody, or control.
 - 15.6.3 Licensee is not allowed to self-insure without the prior written consent of Licensor. If granted by Licensor, any self-insured retention or other financial responsibility for claims shall be covered directly by Licensee in lieu of insurance. Any and all Licensor liabilities that would otherwise, in accordance with the provisions of this License, be covered by Licensee's insurance will be covered as if Licensee elected not to include a self-insured retention or other financial responsibility for claims.

- 15.6.4 Prior to entering the Premises, Licensee shall furnish to Licensor an acceptable certificate(s) of insurance including an original signature of the authorized representative evidencing the required coverage, endorsements, and amendments. Licensee shall notify Licensor in writing at least 30 days prior to any cancellation, non-renewal, substitution, or material alteration. In the event of a claim or lawsuit involving Licensor arising out of this License, Licensee will make available any required policy covering such claim or lawsuit.
- 15.6.5 Any insurance policy shall be written by a reputable insurance company acceptable to Licensor or with a current Best's Guide Rating of A- and Class VII or better, and authorized to do business in the state(s) in which the service is to be provided.
- 15.6.6 If coverage is purchased on a "claims made" basis, Licensee hereby agrees to maintain coverage in force for a minimum of three years after expiration or termination of this License. Annually, Licensee agrees to provide evidence of such coverage as required hereunder.
- 15.6.7 Licensee represents that this License has been thoroughly reviewed by Licensee's insurance agent(s)/broker(s), who have been instructed by Licensee to procure the insurance coverage required by this License. Allocated Loss Expense shall be in addition to all policy limits for coverages referenced above.
- 15.6.8 Not more frequently than once every five years, Licensor may reasonably modify the required insurance coverage to reflect then-current risk management practices in the railroad industry and underwriting practices in the insurance industry.
- 15.6.9 If any portion of the operation is to be subcontracted by Licensee, Licensee shall require that the subcontractor shall provide and maintain insurance coverages as set forth herein, naming Licensor as an additional insured, and shall require that the subcontractor shall release, defend and indemnify Licensor to the same extent and under the same terms and conditions as Licensee is required to release, defend and indemnify Licensor herein.
- 15.6.10 Failure to provide evidence as required by this **Section 15** shall entitle, but not require, Licensor to terminate this License immediately. Acceptance of a certificate that does not comply with this Section shall not operate as a waiver of Licensee's obligations hereunder.
- 15.6.11 The fact that insurance (including, without limitation, self-insurance) is obtained by Licensee shall not be deemed to release or diminish the liability of Licensee, including, without limitation, liability under the indemnity provisions of this License. Damages recoverable by Licensor shall not be limited by the amount of the required insurance coverage.
- 15.6.12 These insurance provisions are intended to be a separate and distinct obligation on the part of the Licensee. Therefore, these provisions shall be enforceable and Licensee shall be bound thereby regardless of whether or not indemnity provisions are determined to be enforceable.
- 15.6.13 For purposes of this **Section 15**, Licensor shall mean "Burlington Northern Santa Fe, LLC", "BNSF Railway Company" and the subsidiaries, successors, assigns and affiliates of each.

COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS, REGULATIONS, AND ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

- 16. Compliance with Laws, Rules, and Regulations.
 - Licensee shall observe and comply with any and all laws, statutes, regulations, ordinances, orders, covenants, restrictions, or decisions of any court of competent jurisdiction ("Legal Requirements") relating to the construction, maintenance, and use of the Pipeline and the use of the Premises.

- Prior to entering the Premises, Licensee shall and shall cause its contractor(s) to comply with all of Licensor's applicable safety rules and regulations. Licensee must ensure that each of its employees, contractors, agents or invitees entering upon the Premises completes the safety orientation program at the Website "www.BNSFcontractor.com" (the "Safety Orientation") within one year prior to entering upon the Premises. Additionally, Licensee must ensure that each and every employee of Licensee, its contractors, agents and invitees possess a card certifying completion of the Safety Orientation prior to entering upon the Premises. Licensee must renew the Safety Orientation annually.
- Licensee shall obtain on or before the date it or its contractor enters the Premises, any and all additional rights-of way, easements, licenses and other agreements relating to the grant of rights and interests in and/or access to the Premises (collectively, the "Rights") and such other rights, licenses, permits, authorizations, and approvals (including without limitation, any necessary local, state, federal or tribal authorizations and environmental permits) that are necessary in order to permit Licensee to construct, maintain, own and operate the Pipeline and otherwise to perform its obligations hereunder in accordance with the terms and conditions hereof.
- Licensee shall either require that the initial stated term of each such Rights be for a period that does not expire, in accordance with its ordinary terms, prior to the last day of the term of this License or, if the initial stated term of any such Right expires in accordance with its ordinary terms on a date earlier than the last day of the term of this License, Licensee shall, at its cost, exercise any renewal rights thereunder, or otherwise acquire such extensions, additions and/or replacements as may be necessary, in order to cause the stated term thereof to be continued until a date that is not earlier than the last day of the term of this License.
- 16.5 Upon the expiration or termination of any Right that is necessary in order for Licensee to own, operate or use the Pipeline in accordance with the terms and conditions of this License, this License thereby shall automatically expire upon such expiration or termination of the Right.

17. Environmental.

- 17.1 Licensee shall strictly comply with all federal, state and local environmental Legal Requirements and regulations in its use of the Premises, including, but not limited to, the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, as amended (RCRA), the Clean Water Act, the Oil Pollution Act, the Hazardous Materials Transportation Act, and CERCLA (collectively referred to as the "Environmental Laws"). Licensee shall not maintain a treatment, storage, transfer or disposal facility, or underground storage tank, as defined by Environmental Laws on the Premises. Licensee shall not release or suffer the release of oil or hazardous substances, as defined by Environmental Laws on or about the Premises.
- Licensee covenants that it will not handle or transport "hazardous waste" or "hazardous substances", as "hazardous waste" and "hazardous substances" may now or in the future be defined by any federal, state, or local governmental agency or body through the Pipeline on Licensor's property. Licensee agrees periodically to furnish Licensor with proof, satisfactory to Licensor that Licensee is in compliance with the provisions of this **Section 17.2**.
- 17.3 Licensee shall give Licensor immediate notice to Licensor's Resource Operations Center at (800) 832-5452 of any known (i) release of hazardous substances on, from, or affecting the Premises, (ii) violation of Environmental Laws, or (iii) inspection or inquiry by governmental authorities charged with enforcing Environmental Laws with respect to Licensee's use of the Premises. Licensee shall use the best efforts to promptly respond to any release on, from, or affecting the Premises. Licensee also shall give Licensor immediate notice of all measures undertaken on behalf of Licensee to investigate, remediate, respond to or otherwise cure such release or violation.
- 17.4 If Licensor has notice from Licensee or otherwise of a release or violation of Environmental Laws arising in any way with respect to the Pipeline which occurred or may occur during the term of this License, Licensor may require Licensee, at Licensee's sole risk and expense, to take timely

- measures to investigate, remediate, respond to or otherwise cure such release or violation affecting the Premises or Licensor's right-of-way.
- 17.5 Licensee shall promptly report to Licensor in writing any conditions or activities upon the Premises known to Licensee which create a risk of harm to persons, property or the environment and shall take whatever action is necessary to prevent injury to persons, property, or the environment arising out of such conditions or activities; provided, however, that Licensee's reporting to Licensor shall not relieve Licensee of any obligation whatsoever imposed on it by this License. Licensee shall promptly respond to Licensor's request for information regarding said conditions or activities.

DISCLAIMER OF WARRANTIES

- 18. No Warranties.
 - LICENSOR'S DUTIES AND WARRANTIES ARE LIMITED TO THOSE EXPRESSLY STATED IN THIS LICENSE AND SHALL NOT INCLUDE ANY IMPLIED DUTIES OR IMPLIED WARRANTIES, NOW OR IN THE FUTURE. NO REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES HAVE BEEN MADE BY LICENSOR OTHER THAN THOSE CONTAINED IN THIS LICENSE. LICENSEE HEREBY WAIVES ANY AND ALL WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, WITH RESPECT TO THE PREMISES OR WHICH MAY EXIST BY OPERATION OF LAW OR IN EQUITY, INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, ANY WARRANTY OF MERCHANTABILITY, HABITABILITY OR FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE.
 - LICENSOR MAKES NO WARRANTY, REPRESENTATION OR CONDITION OF ANY KIND, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, CONCERNING (A) THE SCOPE OF THE LICENSE OR OTHER RIGHTS GRANTED HEREUNDER TO LICENSEE OR (B) WHETHER OR NOT LICENSEE'S CONSTRUCTION, MAINTENANCE, OWNERSHIP, USE OR OPERATION OF THE PIPELINE WILL VIOLATE OR INFRINGE UPON THE RIGHTS, INTERESTS AND ESTATES OF THIRD PARTIES, INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, ANY LEASES, USE RIGHTS, EASEMENTS AND LIENS OF ANY THIRD PARTY.
- 19. <u>Disclaimer of Warranty for Quiet Enjoyment</u>. **LICENSOR DOES NOT WARRANT ITS TITLE TO THE PREMISES NOR UNDERTAKE TO DEFEND LICENSEE IN THE PEACEABLE POSSESSION OR USE THEREOF. NO COVENANT OF QUIET ENJOYMENT IS MADE.**
- 20. <u>Eviction at Risk of Licensee</u>. In case of the eviction of Licensee by anyone owning, claiming title to, or claiming any interest in the Premises, or by the abandonment by Licensor of the affected rail corridor, Licensor shall not be liable (i) to refund Licensee any compensation paid hereunder, except for the pro-rata part of any recurring charge paid in advance, or (ii) for any damage Licensee sustains in connection with the eviction.

LIENS AND TAXES

- 21. <u>Liens and Charges</u>. Licensee shall promptly pay and discharge any and all liens arising out of any construction, alterations or repairs done, suffered or permitted to be done by Licensee on Premises. Licensor is hereby authorized to post any notices or take any other action upon or with respect to Premises that is or may be permitted by law to prevent the attachment of any such liens to Premises; provided, however, that failure of Licensor to take any such action shall not relieve Licensee of any obligation or liability under this **Section 21** or any other Section of this License.
- 22. <u>Taxes</u>. Licensee shall pay when due any taxes, assessments or other charges (collectively, "Taxes") levied or assessed by any governmental or quasi-governmental body upon the Pipeline or any other improvements constructed or installed on the Premises by or for Licensee (collectively, the "Improvements") or any Taxes levied or assessed against Licensor or the Premises that are attributable to the Improvements.

DEFAULT, TERMINATION, AND SURRENDER

- 23. <u>Default and Termination</u>. In addition to and not in limitation of Licensor's right to terminate for failure to provide evidence of insurance as required pursuant to the terms of **Section 15**, the following events are also deemed to be events of default pursuant to which Licensor has the right to terminate as set forth below:
 - 23.1 If default shall be made in any of Licensee's covenants, agreements, or obligations contained in this License and Licensee fails to cure said default within thirty (30) days after written notice is provided to Licensee by Licensor, or in case of any assignment or transfer of this License in violation of **Section 26** below, Licensor may, at its option, terminate this License by serving five (5) days' notice in writing upon Licensee. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Licensor shall have the right to terminate this License immediately if Licensee fails to provide evidence of insurance as required in **Section 15**.
 - 23.2 Should Licensee not comply fully with the obligations of **Section 17** regarding the handling or transporting of hazardous waste or hazardous material, notwithstanding anything contained in any other provision of this License, Licensor may, at its option, terminate this License by serving five (5) days' notice of termination upon Licensee.
 - 23.3 Any waiver by Licensor of any default or defaults shall not constitute a waiver of the right to terminate this License for any subsequent default or defaults, nor shall any such waiver in any way affect Licensor's ability to enforce any Section of this License. The remedy set forth in this **Section 23** shall be in addition to, and not in limitation of, any other remedies that Licensor may have at law or in equity.
 - In addition to and not in limitation of Licensor's rights to terminate this License for failure to provide evidence of insurance or occurrence of defaults as described above, this License may be terminated by either party, at any time, by serving thirty (30) days' written notice of termination upon the other party. Such termination shall not release either party hereto from any liability or obligation under the License, whether of indemnity or otherwise, resulting from any acts, omissions or events happening prior to the date of termination or thereafter in case by the terms of the License it is provided that anything shall or may be done after termination hereof.

24. Surrender of the Premises.

- On or before expiration or termination of this License for any reason, Licensee shall, at its sole cost and expense:
 - 24.1.1 if so directed by Licensor in writing, remove the Improvements, the Pipeline and all appurtenances thereto, or, at the sole discretion of Licensor, fill and cap or otherwise appropriately decommission the Pipeline with a method satisfactory to Licensor;
 - 24.1.2 report and restore any damage to the Premises or Licensor's other property arising from, growing out of, or connected with Licensee's use of the Premises;
 - 24.1.3 remedy any unsafe conditions on the Premises created or aggravated by Licensee; and
 - 24.1.4 leave the Premises in substantially the condition which existed as of the Effective Date.
- 24.2 Upon any expiration or termination of this License, if Licensee fails to surrender the Premises to Licensor or if Licensee fails to complete its obligations under **Section 24.1** above (the "**Restoration Obligations**"), Licensee shall have a limited license to enter upon the Premises solely to the extent necessary for Licensee to complete the Restoration Obligations, and all liabilities and obligations of Licensee hereunder shall continue in effect until the Premises are surrendered and the Restoration Obligations are completed. Neither termination nor expiration shall release Licensee from any liability or obligation under this License, whether of indemnity or otherwise, resulting from any acts,

- omissions or events happening prior to the date of termination, or, if later, the date when Licensee surrenders the Premises and all of the Restoration Obligations are completed.
- If Licensee fails to complete the Restoration Obligations within thirty (30) days after the date of such termination of its tenancy, then Licensor may, at its election, either: (i) remove the Pipeline and the other Improvements or otherwise restore the Premises, and in such event Licensee shall, within thirty (30) days after receipt of bill therefor, reimburse Licensor for cost incurred, (ii) upon written notice to Licensee, take and hold the Pipeline and the other Improvements and personal property as its sole property, without payment or obligation to Licensee therefor, or (iii) specifically enforce Licensee's obligation to restore and/or pursue any remedy at law or in equity against Licensee for failure to so restore. Further, if Licensor has consented to the Pipeline and the other Improvements remaining on the Premises following termination, Licensee shall, upon request by Licensor, provide a bill of sale in a form acceptable to Licensor conveying the Pipeline and the other Improvements to Licensor.

MISCELLANEOUS

25. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. All provisions contained in this License shall be binding upon, inure to the benefit of, and be enforceable by the respective successors and assigns of Licensor and Licensee to the same extent as if each such successor and assign was named a party to this License.

26. Assignment.

- 26.1 Licensee may not sell, assign, transfer, or hypothecate this License or any right, obligation, or interest herein (either voluntarily or by operation of law, merger, or otherwise) without the prior written consent of Licensor, which consent may not be unreasonably withheld or delayed by Licensor. Any attempted assignment by Licensee in violation of this **Section 26** shall be a breach of this License and, in addition, shall be voidable by Licensor in its sole and absolute discretion.
- For purposes of this **Section 26**, the word "assign" shall include without limitation (a) any sale of the equity interests of Licensee following which the equity interest holders of Licensee immediately prior to such sale own, directly or indirectly, less than 50% of the combined voting power of the outstanding voting equity interests of Licensee, (b) any sale of all or substantially all of the assets of (i) Licensee and (ii) to the extent such entities exist, Licensee's parent and subsidiaries, taken as a whole, or (c) any reorganization, recapitalization, merger or consolidation involving Licensee. Notwithstanding the foregoing, any reorganization, recapitalization, merger or consolidation following which the equity interest holders of Licensee immediately prior to such reorganization, recapitalization, merger or consolidation own, directly or indirectly, at least 50% of the combined voting power of the outstanding voting equity interests of Licensee or any successor thereto or the entity resulting from such reorganization, recapitalization, merger or consolidation shall not be deemed an assignment. THIS LICENSE SHALL NOT RUN WITH THE LAND WITHOUT THE EXPRESS WRITTEN CONSENT OF LICENSOR, SUCH CONSENT TO BE IN LICENSOR'S SOLE DISCRETION.
- Notwithstanding the provisions of **Section 26.1** above or anything contained in this License to the contrary, if Licensee sells, assigns, transfers, or hypothecates this License or any interest herein in contravention of the provisions of this License (a "**Purported Assignment**") to another party (a "**Purported Transferee**"), the Purported Transferee's enjoyment of the rights and privileges granted under this License shall be deemed to be the Purported Transferee's agreement to be bound by all of the terms and provisions of this License, including but not limited to the obligation to comply with the provisions of **Section 15** above concerning insurance requirements. In addition to and not in limitation of the foregoing, Licensee, for itself, its successors and assigns, shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Licensor for all Liabilities of any nature, kind or description of any person or entity directly or indirectly arising out of, resulting from or related to (in whole or in part) a Purported Assignment.
- 26.4 The provisions of this **Section 26** shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this License.

Notices. Any notice, invoice, or other writing required or permitted to be given hereunder by one party to the other shall be in writing and the same shall be given and shall be deemed to have been served and given if (i) placed in the United States mail, certified, return receipt requested, or (ii) deposited into the custody of a nationally recognized overnight delivery service, addressed to the party to be notified at the address for such party specified below, or to such other address as the party to be notified may designate by giving the other party no less than thirty (30) days' advance written notice of such change in address.

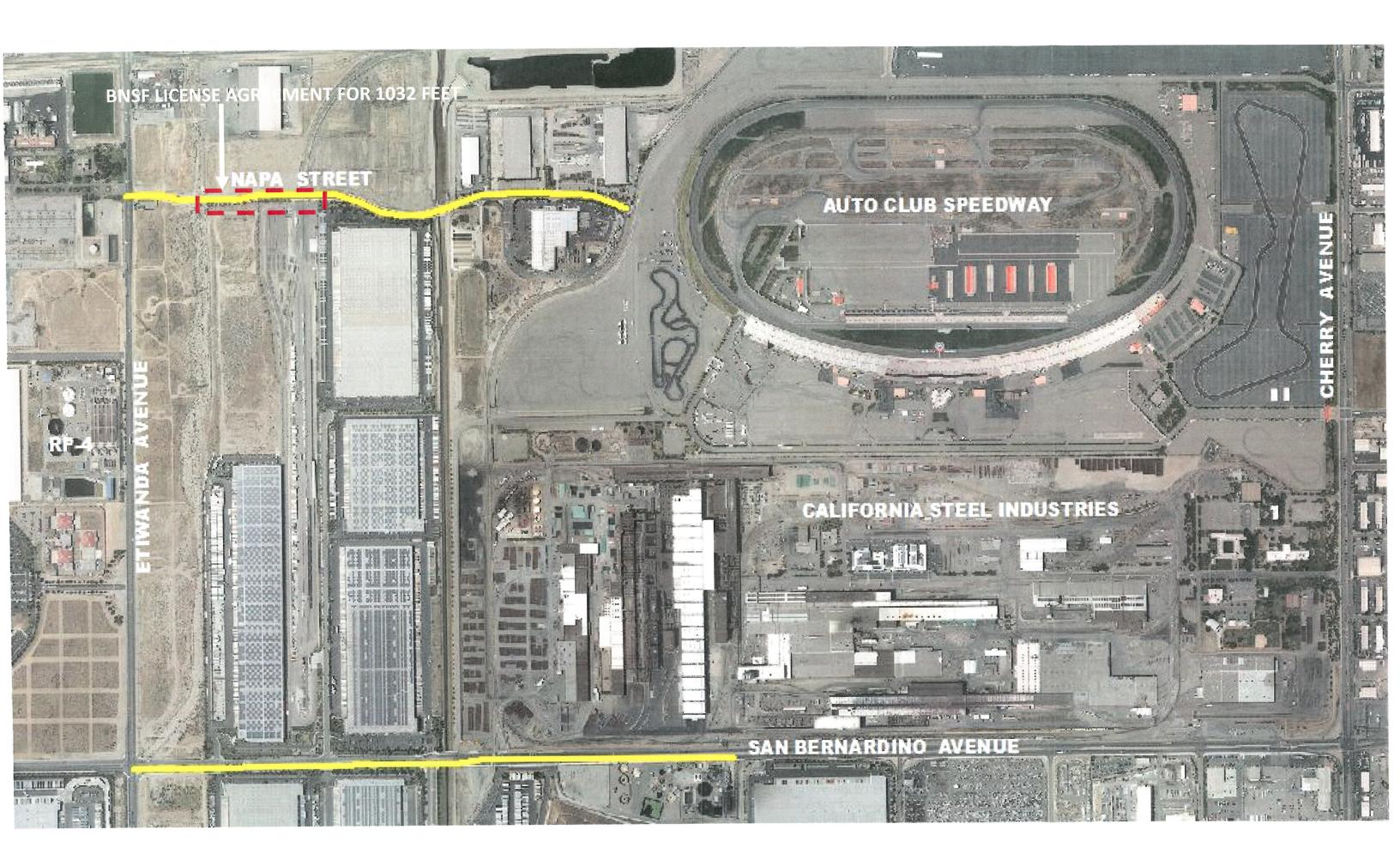
- 28. <u>Survival</u>. Neither termination nor expiration will release either party from any liability or obligation under this License, whether of indemnity or otherwise, resulting from any acts, omissions or events happening prior to the date of termination or expiration, or, if later, the date when the Pipeline and the other Improvements are removed and the Premises are restored to its condition as of the Effective Date.
- 29. <u>Recordation</u>. It is understood and agreed that this License shall not be placed or allowed to be placed on public record.
- 30. <u>Applicable Law.</u> All questions concerning the interpretation or application of provisions of this License shall be decided according to the substantive laws of the State of Texas without regard to conflicts of law provisions.
- 31. <u>Severability</u>. To the maximum extent possible, each provision of this License shall be interpreted in such manner as to be effective and valid under applicable law, but if any provision of this License shall be prohibited by, or held to be invalid under, applicable law, such provision shall be ineffective solely to the extent of such prohibition or invalidity, and this shall not invalidate the remainder of such provision or any other provision of this License.
- 32. <u>Integration</u>. This License is the full and complete agreement between Licensor and Licensee with respect to all matters relating to Licensee's use of the Premises, and supersedes any and all other agreements between the parties hereto relating to Licensee's use of the Premises as described herein. - 36. Counterparts. This License may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall, for all purposes, be deemed an original but which together shall constitute one and the same instrument, and the signature pages from any counterpart may be appended to any other counterpart to assemble fully executed documents, and counterparts of this License may also be exchanged via email or electronic facsimile machines and any email or electronic facsimile of any party's signature shall be deemed to be an original signature for all purposes.

Subject: Purchase of Agency-wide Insurance Policies for FY 2019/20

Executive Summary:

Each year, the Agency purchases insurance policies to protect the Agency and the public against potential liabilities related to General, Auto, Fraud, Errors & Omissions, Property, Workers' Compensation, etc. Staff works closely with the Agency's insurance broker, Alliant Insurance Services, to evaluate the Agency's insurance program and needs, the insurance market and insurance programs available.

The process includes the completion of underwriter applications that identify the Agency's loss history, operations and exposures, operating budget, property and equipment values, as well as total wages. This information is compared against current market trends and industry losses in support of receiving renewal premiums. Premiums for FY 2019/20 are increasing by an average of 10.6 percent, or \$79,989, for a total of \$831,869. As summarized in Table 1 in the Background section, the increase is primarily driven by a 23 percent increase in Property, Boiler & Machinery due to several catastrophic losses in California and globally, as well as an increase in the Agency's Total Insured Value (TIV). The FY 2019/20 insurance premiums are below the adopted budget.

Staff's Recommendation:

Ratify the purchase of Agency-wide insurance policies providing coverage through Fiscal Year 2019/20, for the following amounts:

- a. Excess General Liability insurance in the amount of \$406,495;
- b. Property, Boiler & Machinery insurance in the amount of \$328,580;
- c. Excess Workers' Compensation insurance in the amount of \$76,846; and
- d. Master Crime/Fraud insurance in the amount of \$19,948.

Background

Subject: Purchase of Agency-wide Insurance Policies for FY 2019/20

Insurance premiums for FY 2019/20 are increasing by an average of 10.6 percent, or \$79,989, for a total of \$831,869, as summarized in Table 1. The increase is primarily driven by a 23 percent increase to \$328,580 in the Property, Boiler & Machinery premium due to several catastrophic losses in California and globally, as well as an increase in the Agency's Total Insured Value (TIV). The 2% increase in the premium for Excess Liability to \$406,495 is due to a slight increase in exposures (payroll, budget), with all other policy terms unchanged. The increases in exposure (payroll, employee count), also resulted in an increase of approximately 13 percent to \$76,846 to the Excess Workers' Compensation premium. The premium for the Agency Master Crime policy increased by less than 1 percent to \$19,948.

As we entered 2019, we were in the process of completing property appraisals for several IEUA facilities. In anticipation of significant increases, we increased the budget to absorb the additional premium. However, the appraisals were not finalized in time to apply to the new policy period's schedule of values.

Executive Summary:

Regional Water Recycling Plant No. 1 (RP-1) has had numerous expansions and rehabilitations over the years, resulting in a convoluted and undersized piping network. The purpose of this project is to decommission an obsolete primary effluent pump station to address a flow bottleneck causing operational constraints, reduce odor and vector issues, simplify the associated piping network, and remove other obsolete ancillary equipment in the pump station area.

On February 13, 2019, a request for bids was advertised on PlanetBids to the "two-million and under" prequalified contractors. On May 9, 2019, IEUA received five construction bids. J.R. Filanc Construction, Inc., was the lowest responsive and responsible bidder with a bid price of \$1,853,777.

Staff's Recommendation:

- 1. Award a construction contract for the RP-1 Primary Effluent Conveyance Improvements Phase II, Project No. EN15012.01, to J.R. Filanc Construction, Inc., for the not-to-exceed amount of \$1,853,777; and

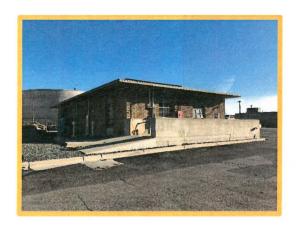

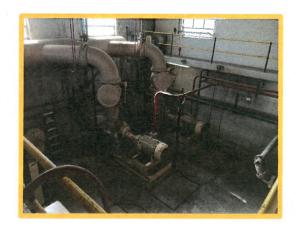

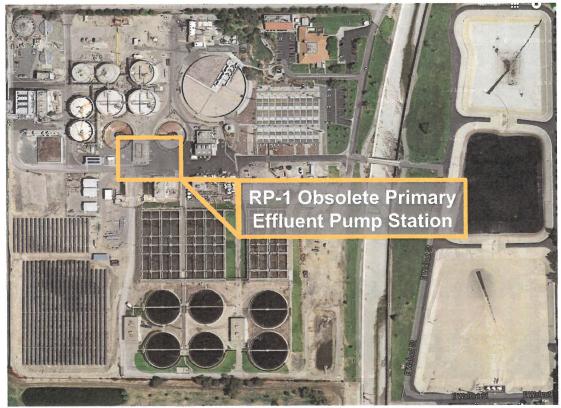

That for and in consideration of the promises and agreements hereinafter made and exchanged, the Agency and the Contractor agree as follows:

- 1. Contractor agrees to perform and complete in a workmanlike manner, all work required under the bidding schedule of said Agency's specifications entitled Specifications for the Construction of the RP-1 Primary Effluent Conveyance Improvements Phase !! Project EN15012.01, in accordance with the specifications and drawings, and to furnish at their own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, tools, and services necessary, except such materials, equipment, and services as may be stipulated in said specifications to be furnished by said Agency, and to do everything required by this Contract and the said specifications and drawings.
- 2. For furnishing all said labor, materials, equipment, tools, and services, furnishing and removing all plant, temporary structures, tools and equipment, and doing everything required by this Contract and said specifications and drawings; also for all loss and damage arising out of the nature of the work aforesaid, or from the action of the elements, or from any unforeseen difficulties which may arise during the prosecution of the work until its acceptance by said Agency, and for all risks of every description connected with the work; also for all expenses resulting from the suspension or discontinuance of work, except as in the said specifications are expressly stipulated to be borne by said Agency; and for completing the work in accordance with the requirements of said specifications and drawings, said Agency will pay and said Contractor shall receive, in full compensation therefore, the price(s) set forth in this Contract.
- 3. That the Agency will pay the Contractor progress payments and the final payment, in accordance with the provisions of the contract documents, with warrants drawn on the appropriate fund or funds as required, at the prices bid in the Bidding and Contract Requirements, Section C Bid Forms and accepted by the Agency, and set forth in this below.

- 5. The Notice Inviting Bids, Instructions to Bidders, Bid Forms, Information Required of Bidder, Performance Bond, Payment Bond, Contractors License Declaration, Specifications, Drawings, all General Conditions and all Special Conditions, and all addenda issued by the Agency with respect to the foregoing prior to the opening of bids, are hereby incorporated in and made part of this Contract, as if fully set forth.
- 6. The Contractor agrees to commence work under this Contract on or before the date to be specified in a written "Notice To Proceed" and to complete said work to the satisfaction of the Agency three hundred (300) calendar days after award of the Contract. All work shall be completed before final payment is made.
- 7. Time is of the essence on this Contract.
- 8. Contractor agrees that in case the work is not completed before or upon the expiration of the contract time, damage will be sustained by the Agency, and that it is and will be impracticable to determine the actual damage which the Agency will sustain in the event and by reason of such delay, and it is therefore agreed that the Contractor shall pay to the Agency the amount of four thousand (\$4,000) dollars for each day of delay, which shall be the period between the expiration of the contract time and the date of final acceptance by the Agency, as liquidated damages and not as a penalty. It is further agreed that the amount stipulated for liquidated damages per day of delay is a reasonable estimate of the damages that would be sustained by the Agency, and the Contractor agrees to pay such liquidated damages as herein provided. In case the liquidated damages are not paid, the Contractor agrees that the Agency may deduct the amount thereof from any money due or that may become due to the Contractor by progress payments or otherwise under the Contract, or if said amount is not sufficient, recover the total amount.
- 9. In addition to the liquidated damages, which may be imposed if the Contractor fails to complete the work within the time agreed upon, the Agency may also deduct from any sums due or to become due to the Contractor, penalties and fines for violations of applicable local, state, and federal law.
- 10. That the Contractor will pay, and will require subcontractors to pay, employees on the work a salary or wage at least equal to the prevailing salary or wage established for such work as set forth in the wage determinations and wage standards applicable to this work, contained in or referenced in the contract documents.
- 11. That, in accordance with Section 1775 of the California Labor Code, Contractor shall forfeit to the Agency, as a penalty, not more than Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for each day, or

portion thereof, for each worker paid, either by the Contractor or any subcontractor, less than the prevailing rates as determined by the Director of the California Department of Industrial Relations for the work.

- 12. That, except as provided in Section 1815 of the California Labor Code, in the performance of the work not more than eight (8) hours shall constitute a day's work, and not more than forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work; that the Contractor shall not require more than eight (8) hours of labor in a day nor more than forty hours of labor in a week from any person employed by the Contractor or any subcontractor; that the Contractor shall conform to Division 2, Part 7, Chapter 1, Article 3 (Section 1810, et seq.) of the California Labor Code; and that the Contractor shall forfeit to the Agency, as a penalty, the sum of Twenty-Five (\$25.00) Dollars for each worker employed in the execution of the work by Contractor or any subcontractor for each day during which any worker is required or permitted to labor more than eight (8) hours in violation of said Article 3.
- 13. That the Contractor shall carry Workers' Compensation Insurance and require all subcontractors to carry Workers' Compensation Insurance as required by the California Labor Code.
- 14. That the Contractor shall have furnished, prior to execution of the Contract, two bonds approved by the Agency, one in the amount of one hundred (100) percent of the contract price, to guarantee the faithful performance of the work, and one in the amount of one hundred (100) percent of the contract price to guarantee payment of all claims for labor and materials furnished.
- 15. The Contractor hereby agrees to protect, defend, indemnify and hold the Agency and its employees, agents, officers, directors, servants and volunteers free and harmless from any and all liability, claims, judgments, costs and demands, including demands arising from injuries or death of persons (including employees of the Agency and the Contractor) and damage to property, arising directly or indirectly out of the obligation herein undertaken or out of the operations conducted by the Contractor, its employees agents, representatives or subcontractors under or in connection with this Contract to the extent permitted by law.

The Contractor further agrees to investigate, handle, respond to, provide defense for and defend any such claims, demands or suit at the sole expense of the Contractor.

Executive Summary:

In July 2018, the Agency submitted a Letter of Interest (LOI) to the U.S. Department of Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) credit assistance program for the RP-5 Expansion Project. Through a highly competitive process, EPA selects projects from the LOIs submitted that it intends to fund and invites them to continue the full application. The RP-5 Expansion project is one of 42 projects in 17 states and District of Columbia (DC) invited to negotiate a WIFIA loan.

Similar to the State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan program, WIFIA loans provide a low-cost alternative to credit-worthy borrowers by allowing repayment to be deferred up to 5 years and a fixed interest rate equal to or greater than the 30 year U.S. Treasury. A total project budget of \$329 million makes the RP-5 Expansion project the largest construction project the Agency has undertaken. Having a diversified financing strategy is essential to ensure the Agency leverages federal and state low-cost borrowing program to ensure the project is completed at the lowest cost to ratepayers. If approved, staff will submit the WIFIA application by July 31, 2019. If approved by EPA, the WIFIA loan agreement will be brought to the Board for approval.

Staff's Recommendation:

Approve to apply for a WIFIA loan in the not-to-exceed amount of \$161,124,250 to finance the RP-5 Expansion project.

Background

Subject: Approval for Submittal of WIFIA Loan Application

In July 2018, the Agency submitted a Letter of Interest (LOI) to the U.S. Department of Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) credit assistance program for the RP-5 Expansion Project. Established by the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act of 2014, the WIFIA program is a federal loan and guarantee program at EPA that aims to accelerate investment in the nation's water infrastructure by providing long-term, low-cost supplemental loans to credit-worthy water and wastewater projects of national and regional significance. Similar to the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) loan program, WIFIA loans provide a low-cost alternative to credit-worthy borrowers by allowing repayment to be deferred a maximum of five years from substantial completion of the project. Based on program regulations, WIFIA loans are limited to 49 percent of total project costs and fixed interest rate equal to or greater than the U.S. Treasury rate of a similar maturity (e.g. 30-year U.S. Treasury).

Through a highly competitive process, EPA selects projects from the LOIs submitted that it intends to fund and invites them to continue the full application. The RP-5 Expansion project is one of 42 projects in 17 states and D.C. invited to negotiate a WIFIA loan to support approximately \$11.1 billion in total project costs.

In addition to the WIFIA loan, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB), through competitive selection process, committed \$101,530,000 in the form of a CWSRF loan for the RP-5 Expansion Project for Fiscal Year 2019/2020. The Fundable Project List was adopted by the SWRCB Board on June 18, 2019. The table below depicts the diversification of the funding sources for the RP-5 Expansion project.

Given the significant project costs of \$328.8 million, having a diversified financing strategy that leverages federal and state low-cost borrowing programs will ensure the project is completed at the lowest cost to ratepayers.

Staff recommends the Board approve submittal of a WIFIA application for the maximum 49 percent of total project costs allowable by the EPA WIFIA loan program. If approved, the Agency will be required to pay an application fee of \$100,000 due at the time of filing. Upon filing of the application, the Agency agrees to reimburse EPA for any credit processing fees payable upon execution of the credit agreement, or in the event the Agency elects to withdraw from the process. Credit processing fees include legal, financing, engineering, and other services contracted by EPA to process the Agency's application. Fees can range between \$250,000 to \$700,000 depending on the complexity of the application. For the first five (5) loans issued by WIFIA, the fees ranged

between \$213,000 and \$398,000. Additionally, the Agency will be required to provide EPA a preliminary credit rating on the project upon filing of the loan application and two final credit ratings prior to the execution of the loan agreement. The costs of these credit ratings are estimated at \$55,000 each, or \$165,000. Other Agency incurred costs include fees for financial and legal advisory services estimated at \$95,000. In total, fees are projected to range between \$500,000 and \$800,000.

Upon Board approval, staff will proceed with submittal of the WIFIA application by the end of July 2019. If approved by EPA, the WIFIA loan agreement will require Board approval.

Subject: SB 307 (Roth): Water Conveyance: Use of Facility with Unused Capacity

Executive Summary:

SB 307 was introduced by Senator Richard Roth (Riverside) on February 15, 2019. The bill is substantially similar to SB 120 (Roth) and AB 1000 (Friedman), which were introduced in 2018 and 2017, respectively, and failed passage. IEUA has opposed all three of these bills primarily on the basis that they would establish into law additional state environmental review requirements on a project that has already undergone environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Furthermore, the project's plan and Environmental Impact Report (EIR) were in California Superior and Appellate Courts.

IEUA has no agreement to purchase water from Cadiz, Inc. The opposition to the legislation that IEUA has expressed to date has been solely based on the policy aspects of the bill that are in line with Board-adopted legislative policy guidelines. At the June 19, 2019 Board meeting, the Board asked for an update on SB 307 and for this item to be brought back to the Board for re-consideration of IEUA's position on the bill.

Background

Subject: SB 307 (Roth): Water Conveyance: Use of Facility with Unused Capacity

SB 307 (Roth) seeks to require post-CEQA environmental review of a specified project that has fully complied with CEQA requirements and withstood all related court challenges.

Specifically, the bill would prohibit a transferor of water from using a water conveyance facility with unused capacity from transferring water from a groundwater basin underlying certain desert lands, as defined in the bill, unless the State Lands Commission (SLC), in consultation with the Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) and the Department of Water Resources (DWR), finds that the transfer of the water will not adversely affect related natural or cultural resources, including groundwater resources or habitat.

The bill defines "desert lands" in terms of describing the geographic location of the Cadiz project (Project). According to the Cadiz, Inc. website¹, the project "is designed to capture and conserve billions of gallons of renewable native groundwater flowing beneath our property in California's Mojave Desert that is currently being lost to evaporation and salt contamination at nearby dry lakes. Through the active management of the aquifer system and employing a state-of-the-art groundwater protection program, the Project will reduce the loss of groundwater to evaporation from the dry lakes, put this water to beneficial use and create a reliable water supply for Southern California. The total quantity of groundwater to be recovered and conveyed to Project participants will not exceed a long-term annual average of 50,000 acre-feet per year. The aquifer system at the Water Project area also offers storage capacity of approximately one million acre-feet allowing Project participants to carry-over their annual supply and store it in the aquifer system from year to year. In addition, this storage space could be used to bank imported surplus water in wet periods for use in later years when needed."

According to State legislative staff analysis², SLC wrote the project proponents in 2017 and stated that the pipeline that is part of the Cadiz Project crosses State lands under SLC jurisdiction and would require a lease from SLC. In December 2018, DFW Director Charles Bonham sent a letter to Scott Slater, CEO of Cadiz, which stated, "New information demonstrates a hydrologic connection between the aquifer underlying the Project pumping site and nearby Bonanza Spring... data indicated these legally-protected sheep [desert bighorn sheep] utilize the spring. Further analysis and additional review of these effects will be necessary for DFW to evaluate the anticipated lake and streambed alteration notification."

In January 2018, a study entitled "Updated Assessment of Cadiz Water Project's Potential Impacts to Bonanza Springs" was published by Cadiz, Inc. The study finds that recharge to the catchment area of Bonanza Springs is delivered by precipitation and runoff that infiltrates the porous, fractured rock formations up gradient from the spring.

Additionally, Three Valleys Municipal Water District (TVMWD) and Jurupa Community Services District undertook a study that was completed in March 2019 that concluded that monitoring and mitigation measures for the Cadiz Project were appropriate and protective of the surrounding ecosystem, as described in the Groundwater Management, Monitoring and Mitigation Plan (GMMMP) that was adopted by the County of San Bernardino Board of Supervisors in 2012. TVMWD has since committed to funding an additional study to further address concerns related to a potential hydraulic connection between Bonanza Spring and groundwater in the alluvial aquifer in Fenner Valley.

Applicable IEUA Legislative Policy Principles and Explanation of Recommended Position: IEUA does not have a pipeline connection to the Colorado River Aqueduct so it cannot receive water from this Project. IEUA's past opposition to this legislation has been solely based on the policy aspects of the bill that are in line with Board-adopted legislative policy guidelines.

The following two principles are aligned with an "Oppose" position for SB 307:

- Support administrative and legislative actions for environmental compliance (e.g., air, water, hazardous materials and waste) that provide for regulatory compliance flexibility, promote consistency and reduce regulatory duplication.
- Support administrative/legislative actions to improve clarity and workability of California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and eliminate other duplicate state processes.

The California Environmental Quality Act was enacted in 1970 as a system of checks and balances for land-use development and management decisions in California. Environmental review is characterized by an Environmental Impact Report (EIR). The EIR records the scope of the applicant's proposal and analyzes all its known environmental effects. Project information is used by State and local permitting agencies in their evaluation of the proposed project. The core principles of CEQA are³:

- Transparency. CEQA must continue to require public disclosure of the project, its potential environmental impacts and consideration of reasonable alternatives.
- **Mitigation.** CEQA must continue to require mitigation of all significant effects on the environment to the extent feasible.
- Comprehensive protection. CEQA must apply to all significant impacts on the environment, including cumulative impacts, and provide a safety net to cover holes in the existing regulatory structure.
- **Public participation.** CEQA must continue to require public participation in the review of environmental issues, including requiring a written response to public comments.
- Community enforcement. CEQA must continue to provide the public with the right to sue to enforce its protections, a key tool to protect communities, particularly those in disadvantaged areas.

The rigor of CEQA's analysis and stakeholder involvement is substantial and the CEQA process is strongly defended by environmental groups as being an effective tool for protecting the environment. If an EIR is certified and fails to incorporate appropriate responses to legitimate concerns raised, then the certifying agency can be sued in court and the project disallowed from continuing unless and until the court case(s) is resolved.

In the case of the Cadiz project, two public agencies approved the EIR and the Project in 2012⁴. The approvals were challenged but upheld in Superior Court and then sustained by the California Court of Appeal against every claim. No further studies were ordered, or approvals changed.

Of primary concern to IEUA is the precedent-setting nature of SB 307, establishing that CEQA is not the final arbiter of environmental compliance. This precedent would make uncertain the finality of CEQA reviews. This ambiguity would potentially contribute to project costs as project proponents would never know whether or when their review process has concluded or whether or when their project has received definitive, dependable approval.

Support and Opposition

Last year, Governor Newsom (then Lieutenant Governor) wrote a letter of support for a substantially similar bill, SB 120 (Roth). Below is an excerpt from that letter:

This vulnerability of desert ecosystems and high social and cultural value assigned to their stability and persistence requires additional caution in decision-making relating to resources development.

Of particular importance is water extraction, as desert ecosystems are heavily reliant on this scarce resource. SB 120 (Roth) would add additional review to desert water projects to ensure these projects have no adverse impacts to desert ecosystems. This review would also provide additional opportunities for stakeholders to participate in the decision-making process, which would ensure development of desert resources reflects the needs and values of those who rely on or otherwise value desert ecosystems.

Under this bill, review would be conducted by the SLC and the DFW. The SLC is charged with overseeing the responsible development of state land resources in the desert, and thus has the expertise and institutional capacity to consider the merits of a proposed project and its potential impacts to valued desert uses and resources. DFW is similarly equipped to review desert water projects for their impacts to desert wildlife and ecosystems. These agencies would provide balanced, science-based decisions that also account for regional needs and stakeholder input and are thus best suited to review desert water projects.

Related Federal Policies and Decisions

Federal issues related to the Cadiz project are not related to SB 307 and are only included herein as background since it has been in the news lately.

The Cadiz Project has been considered for approximately twenty years. In 1998, Cadiz, Inc. and Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) began discussion about a project that would have imported Colorado River water to Cadiz and exported groundwater from Cadiz to the MWD service area. Ultimately, MWD decided not to go forward with the project, prompting Cadiz to find alternative conveyance options. The pursuit of independent conveyance triggered the need for federal permission to use right-of-way in nearby railroad tracks for the pipelines.

In 2015, during the Obama Administration, the United States Bureau of Land Management (BLM) said Cadiz couldn't use the right-of-way and would therefore have to obtain federal permission to run the proposed pipeline across surrounding federal land. This meant the Cadiz project would need federal approval and be subject to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), a lengthy environmental review that could have imposed new restrictions on the project.

The Trump administration reversed the decision in 2017, asserting that the Cadiz project does not need federal approval, thereby clearing the way for Cadiz, Inc. to build the water pipeline across public land in the California desert.

In recent news, U.S. District Judge George Wu released a decision on June 21, 2019, rejecting the BLM's argument that, under 1875 Railroad Law, any use could be approved along a federal right of way if it did not interfere with the railroad. He stated that courts have consistently found that right-of-way uses should further railroad purposes. He also found that the BLM had failed to legally justify its reversal in position in 2017.

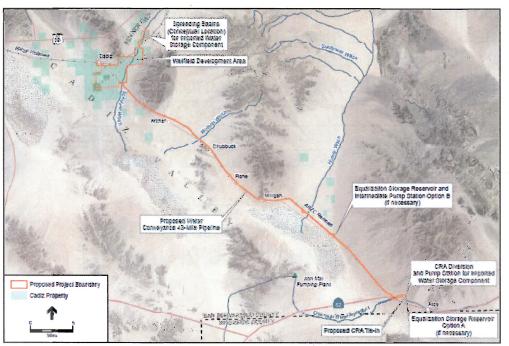

Executive Summary:

The Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs for the month ended May 31, 2019 is submitted in a format consistent with the State requirement.

For the month of May 2019, total cash, investments, and restricted deposits of \$253,506,613 reflects an increase of \$8,326,108 compared to the total of \$245,180,505 reported for April 2019. The increase was primarily due to property tax receipts of \$8.0 million. As a result, the average days cash on hand for the month ended May 31, 2019 increased from 256 days to 267 days.

The unrestricted Agency investment portfolio yield in May 2019 was 2.527 percent, a decrease of 0.045 percent compared to the April 2019 yield of 2.572 percent. The slight decrease in yield is mainly attributed to the decrease in California Asset Management Program (CAMP) and Medium Term note yields.

Background

Subject: Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs

The Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs for the month ended May 31, 2019 is submitted in a format consistent with State requirements. The monthly report denotes investment transactions that have been executed in accordance with the criteria stated in the Agency's Investment Policy (Resolution No. 2019-3-1).

Agency total cash, investments, and restricted deposits for the month of May 2019 was \$253.5 million, an increase of \$8.3 million from the \$245.2 million reported for the month ended April 30, 2019. The increase was primarily due to receipt of \$8.0 million of property taxes.

Table 1 represents the unrestricted Agency investment portfolio, by authorized investment and duration, with total portfolio amount of \$154.7 million. The Agency portfolio excludes cash and restricted deposits in the amount of \$98.8 million held by member agencies and with fiscal agents.

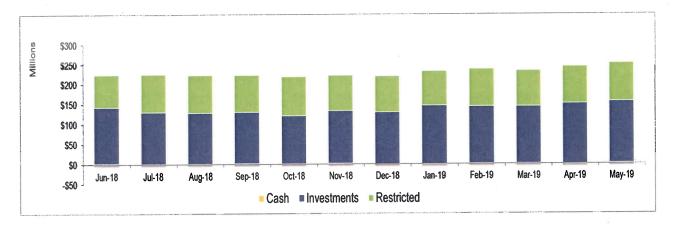


Figure 1: Cash, Investments, and Restricted Deposits

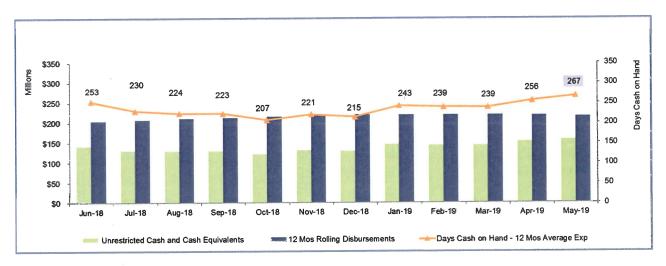


Figure 2: Days Cash on Hand – 12 Month Rolling Average

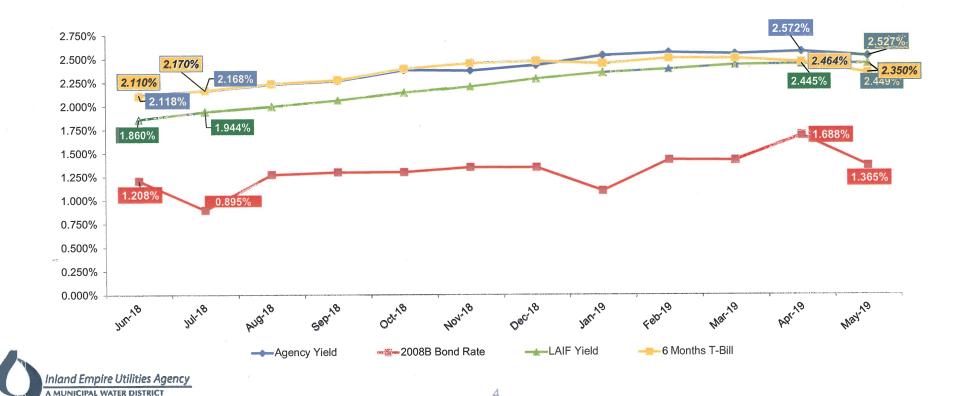

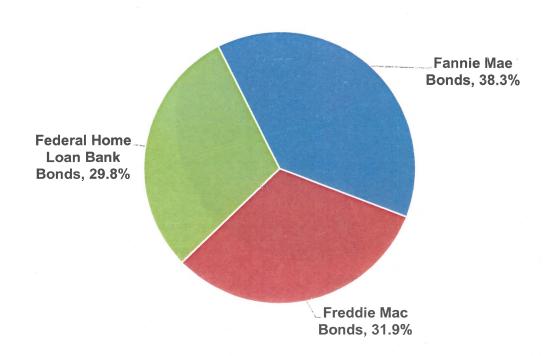

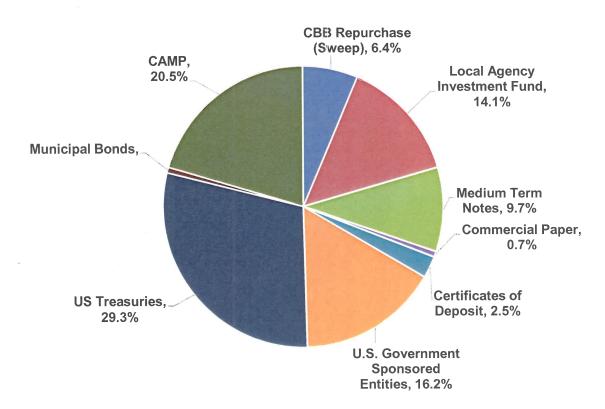

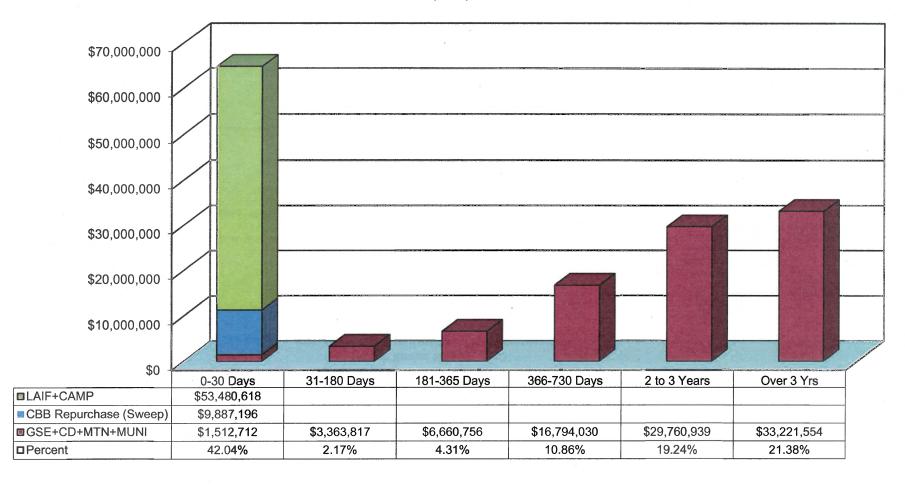

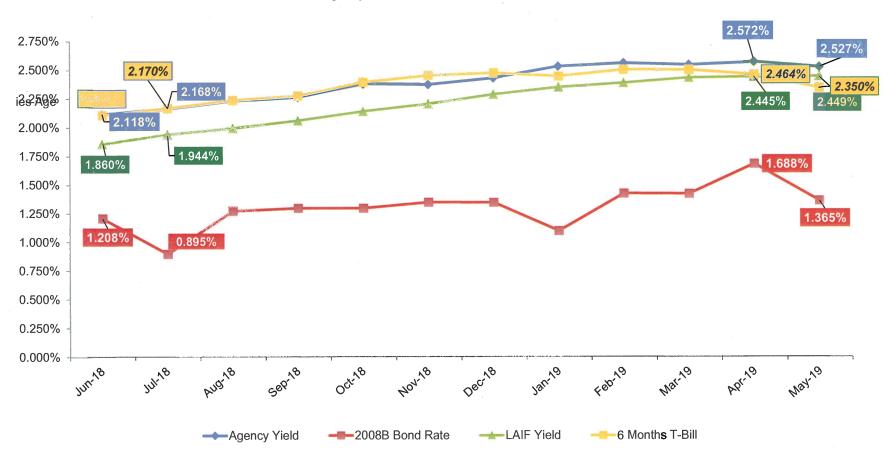

Overview:

The final State Water Project Allocation number has come in at 75 percent. The initial November allocation was 10 percent. Reservoirs remain well above average for this time of year and only four percent of the state is experiencing abnormally dry conditions.

The first state agency to hold a public meeting on the Governor's Executive Order directing state agencies to create a Water Resilience Portfolio was held by the California Water Commission. The panel of presenters included representatives from the Public Policy Institute of California, UC Santa Barbara and River Partners. Their focus was on how climate change is affecting water supply, and what the state can do about it. They all offered broad suggestions about regional cooperation and increasing groundwater storage, but there was very little discussion about actual concepts to be included in the portfolio. They will hold another listening session in August.

The most significant water legislation still pending before the Legislature is Senate Bill 1. The measure seeks to backstop federal environmental rollbacks. SB 1, by President pro Tem Toni Atkins (D-San Diego), is facing some serious opposition by a strong coalition of water, business and agricultural interests, including the State Water Contractors, MWD, the California Chamber of Commerce, the California Farm Bureau Federation, and others. The concern if that the bill could freeze regulations and permits in place a of January 2017. If this were to occur, the voluntary settlement agreements (VSAs) between the state, water users and the environmental community that have been in the works for many months would fall apart. The VSAs are important to state water contractors because they are an alternative to the unimpaired flows proceedings that proceeded the VSAs at the State Water Resources Control Board. Because this is a priority bill of the pro Tem's, it is especially difficult.

The FY 2019-2020 budget was passed by the Legislature, but there are still some lingering issues being worked out in the trailer bill process. The big news is that the Safe and Affordable Drinking Water issue seems to be near completion. The final agreement is for a \$130 million continuous appropriation from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF), however the implementing legislation to create the funds must still be passed.

The legislature is in the final push to meet the second house policy committee deadline, July 12, before they go on a month-long recess. They will return on August 12 for four weeks of session before adjourning until January.

The Department of Water Resources (DWR) recently increased the 2019 State Water Project (SWP) allocation to 75 percent from 70 percent. This is the final allocation for the calendar year. The initial allocation in November 2018 was 10 percent.

California's reservoirs continue to remain above their historical average thanks to the more than 30 atmospheric rivers since the start of the water year. Earlier this month, the statewide Sierra snowpack was 202 percent of normal. It's California's fifth largest snowpack dating back to 1950.

Lake Oroville, the SWP's largest reservoir, is currently at 98 percent of capacity and 118 percent of average for this time of year.

Even in wet years, a 100 percent allocation is rare due to Delta pumping restrictions to protect threatened and endangered fish species. The last time the Project was able to allocate 100 percent was 2006.

The 2019 allocation of 75 percent amounts to 3,145,105 acre-feet of water.

Last year at this time, about 70 percent of the state was experiencing abnormally dry conditions. This year, that number is only 4 percent of the state in dry conditions.

CA Water Commission Conducts Listening Session on Water Resilience Portfolio

The first state agency to hold a public meeting on the Governor's Executive Order directing state agencies to create a Water Resilience Portfolio was held by the California Water Commission. The Director of the Governor's Water Portfolio Program, Nancy Vogel, offered no detail on an outline of the plan or any specific topics to be discussed. She was in attendance to listen to stakeholders.

The Public Policy Institute of California (PPIC) was the first panelist and focused on the effects of climate change on California water supply and management. They cited, and used the same presentation, from their September 2018 report "Managing Drought in a Changing Climate." Their recommendations include:

- Planning ahead for climate change at the local and regional levels by strengthening Urban Water Management Plans and Groundwater Sustainability Plans.
- Upgrading the water grid by improving capacity and conveyance and storage; modernize and integrate operations.
- Updating water allocation roles for equitable and efficient allocation during dry times and promote capture and storage during wet years. This includes controversial environmental water budgets.

John King from River Partners spoke about integrated flood management, mostly in the San Joaquin Valley.

Bob Wilkinson, professor emeritus from UCSB, offered broad comments aimed at framing considerations for developing resilience strategies. He focused on the benefits of multi-benefit approaches and asked the question if the goal is to get more water or is it funding ways to meet demands for water services in cost-effective, equitable ways while avoiding environmental impacts and restoring natural systems.

One of Chairman Quintero's significant points was the need for integrated water management. While he didn't specifically talk about the IRWM program, he talked extensively about the importance of regional collaboration.

The Water Commission will meet again in August for another listening session. Panelists have not been announced. Statewide organizations such as ACWA and WateReuse are working on proposals to submit to the administration.

SB 1 (Atkins)

As previously reported, SB 1 by pro Tem Atkins, is an attempt to backstop any environmental regulations the Trump administration tries to roll back. The State Water Contractors and other water agencies have raised serious concerns about key provisions of the bill. A coalition of business (California Chamber of Commerce) and water interests has formed to try to secure amendments to address those concerns.

The main opposition argument is that the language would handcuff the CA Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) from being able to apply new science, new adaptive management practices or consider current hydrologic conditions, by locking in the current biological opinions, incidental take permits in

place as of January 19, 2017. It would also allow the state to add federally listed endangered species to the California Endangered Species Act, bypassing the whole public process.

Locking these permits in place would essentially end any discussion of voluntary settlement agreements (VSAs). The VSA process began after the State Water Resources Control Board issued a draft plan for 40 percent unimpaired flows on the San Joaquin River (a second phase would consider unimpaired flows on the Sacramento River). Massive backlash led to the start of talks to create VSAs. VSA talks have been fruitful and are close to completion. The VSAs will rely on a series of measures to sustainably manage flows, restore habitat and protect native species. If the 2017 rules are locked into place, the VSAs would fall apart and the state would have to start at the beginning the unimpaired flows process again.

The proponents of the bill, lead by the Defenders of Wildlife, are believed to be seeking these changes because they are unhappy with the VSAs and because they would like to get two species, orca whales and steelhead trout, listed under the CA Endangered Species Act.

Because this bill is by the pro Tem, and clearly a top priority for her as it is the first bill introduced in the year, opponents know that defeating the bill is unlikely. The oppose unless amended coalition, including MWD, ACWA and the State Water Contractors, has offered a set of amendments that would take care of their opposition without compromising the pro Tem's goal of protecting California from any rollback on environmental regulations. The Newsom administration has gotten involved because of the implications for the VSAs and is trying to bring parties together to come up with a solution.

The bill is moving through the Assembly, with members asking some tough questions, but ultimately supporting the bill because it is a priority of the pro Tems. At this point in the legislative process it seems the only way to get the necessary changes is with the help of the administration, who has a vested interested in seeing the VSAs succeed.

Legislative Update

June was a busy legislative month with bills in their second house policy committees and the 2019-2020 budget passing before the June 15 deadline. Policy committees are feverishly meeting to report out bills ahead of the July 12 deadline, which coincides with the start of the month-long summer recess. When members come back on August 12, they will have exactly one month to finish business before the first year of the two-year session ends and members return to their districts until January.

Clean, Safe and Affordable Drinking Water:

One of the big-ticket negotiation items between the Senate, Assembly and the Governor was how to tackle the safe and affordable drinking water issue. As reported in previous reports, the Governor released a trailer bill language that closely follow SB 623 (Monning, 2018). The trailer bill language, similar to SB 623, included a \$00.95 per month charge on residential water customers, with the charge increasing for commercial and industrial customers. The proposal also included fees on agriculture and enforcement protection for ag. The Governor's trailer bill proposal was debated in both budget sub committees but neither house adopted that option.

The Senate passed a majority-vote option that was expected to come from Pro Tem, Toni Atkins. This proposal was a \$150 million per year continuous appropriation from the General Fund. There were no enforcement protection provisions for ag. The Senate tied SB 200 (Monning) and SB 414 (Caballero) to the appropriation as well. SB 200 is the technical bill that would establish the fund and set rules for its use. SB 414 is Eastern MWD's Small System Water Authority Act of 2019.

The Assembly deferred action to the legislative process. Their vehicle is AB 217 (E. Garcia, D-Coachella). AB 217 originally included several options for funding including a trust, a residential fee, and fees on agriculture. The latest version of the bill included a fee for residential and commercial water users and a fee on agriculture. The bill differs from the Governor's proposal because it does not include enforcement protections for agriculture and in fact allows the Attorney General to access the funds collected from ag to be used to prosecute individual dairy or ag operations for legacy contamination. The ag community has been supporting the Governor's proposal and is now in strong opposition to AB 217.

Negotiations over the issue were left to the "Big Three," the Governor, the Speaker and the Pro Tem as they worked out the final major issues of the budget.

The final compromise approved by the conference committee:

- FY 19-20—in main budget bill
 - o \$100 million in Greenhouse Gas Reduction Funds for Safe Drinking Water
 - o \$30 million General Fund for Safe Drinking Water
- FY 2020-FY 2035- In Budget Trailer Bill
 - o 5% GGRF continuous appropriation from GGRF
 - o General fund backstop if GGRF does not produce \$130 million
 - o \$130 million cap
- \$3.4 million General Find for SWRCB administrative costs

After the Budget Conference Committee met and voted out the compromise version of the safe and affordable drinking water package, all that was left to do was pas the trailer bill that had the continuous appropriation language. Both the Senate and the Assembly introduced trailer bills on the matter with different details. Both contained the funding pieces described above, but the Assembly added language that would permit for systems with secondary contaminants to apply for the funding. Secondary contaminants are any chemical in water, basically allowing any water system to apply for this funding. While water agencies are always looking for new sources of funding, most agree that this \$130 million is to solve the safe and affordable drinking water issue specifically, and are therefore supporting the Senate version of the trailer bill.

On Thursday, June 26 (the day this report was submitted) the Senate voted to amend SB 200. (Monning). The amendments are not in print yet, but it is believed that SB 200 is the final compromise between the two houses and will be substantially similar to the Senate trailer bill. It is also believed that the bill will be heard in the Assembly Safety and Toxic Materials Committee on July 2. An urgency clause was added to the bill, making it a 2/3 vote. With the belief that this is the final compromise, it is expected that the bill will pass.

SB 414 (Caballero): Small System Water Authority Act of 2019: SB 414 is Eastern Municipal Water District's re-introduction of AB 2050 (Caballero) from 2018. The bill seeks to address the drinking water issue by enhancing long-term sustainable systems. SB 414 looks at how to manage districts with failing water systems and establish a new category of public water agency by way of merging formerly non-compliant drinking water systems in order to sustainably provide the technical, managerial, and financial capabilities necessary to ensure the consistent delivery of safe drinking water. A similar measure was vetoed in 2018. The bill got tied to the Senate package for safe and affordable drinking water, but was ultimately not considered in the final package, so it is back on the regular policy committee track. The bill has its first Assembly hearing in the Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials Committee on July 2.

Recycled Water:

AB 292 (Quirk): AB 292 builds on previous legislation, AB 574 (Quirk, 2017) which IEUA supported, and recent work by the SWRCB to remove the terms "direct potable reuse" and "indirect potable reuse" in state code in order to better align the terms with how the water agencies are using recycled water. AB 574 (Quirk) created four distinct types of potable reuse projects – "Indirect Potable Reuse for Groundwater Recharge", "Reservoir Water Augmentation", and Direct Potable Reuse, which includes two subcategories, "Raw Water Augmentation" and "Treated Drinking Water Augmentation." With the more precise definitions added by AB 574, the terms "indirect" and "direct" only add to confusion about potable reuse and proposed projects. The term "Direct Potable Reuse" also implies that purified recycled water is going directly into the drinking water supply, which is not the case with Raw Water Augmentation projects. For example, opponents of a groundwater recharge project in the Central Coast incorrectly labeled the project "Direct Potable Reuse" and the confusion in the statute made this difficult to correct. This bill is sponsored by WateReuse California. The bill passed out of the Assembly without a single no vote. Senate Environmental Quality also passed the bill out unanimously and will be considered by the Natural Resources and Water Committees on July 9.

AB 1180 (Friedman): AB 1180 will require the SWRCB to update the state's non-potable recycled water regulations by 2023. These regulations have not been revised since 2000. An update to these regulations, incorporating the knowledge and lessons learned from nearly two decades of non-potable water recycling, will help the state to achieve its ambitious goals for recycled water use. The bill also promotes recycled water use for dual plumbed building and for commercial, industrial and institutional (CII) uses by requiring the Water Board, through its update of Title 17 backflow regulations, to include the use of a change over device, such as a swivel ell. This bill is also sponsored by WateReuse. The bill passed out of the Assembly without a single no vote and was passed out of the Senate Environmental Quality Committee on June 5.

State Water Project:

SB 204 (Dodd): SB 204 originally sought to insert additional transparency and the sharing of information regarding future State Water Project Contract Amendments. If successful, this bill would have significantly delayed action on water conveyance and would be detrimental to any future SWP contract amendments. MWD and the State Water Contractors sought amendments to limit the timelines set in the bill so there wouldn't be an open-ended window in which the contracts could be delayed. The bill had an initial hearing in the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee where it faced serious pushback, mostly from Southern California members. After the pushback the Senator agreed to work with stakeholders, something he was reluctant to do before the hearing, as the bill moves through the process. The Senator failed to address MWD and SWC concerns and they moved to a full oppose position. The author took significant amendments to get out of the Senate Appropriations Committee. The amendments remove the provisions requiring hearings by the budget committee before contracts can be approved, among other amendments. The amendments satisfied concerns of MWD and the Contractors and they have removed their opposition. The bill was scheduled for a hearing in the Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee, but it was abruptly cancelled because the bill was made into a two-year bill. WCA will continue to track this bill very closely next year to ensure the unacceptable provisions aren't reinserted into the bill.

Status of FY20 Appropriation Bills, The House Passes Minibuses

The House has continued to make significant progress on the fiscal year 2020 appropriations bills, passing 10 of the 12 measures before the end of June.

Earlier this month, the House passed the first fiscal year 2020 appropriations minibus consisting of the Defense, Labor-HHS, State-Foreign Ops and Energy and Water Appropriations bills by a vote of 226 to 203. No Republicans voted for the package and 7 Democrats joined them in opposition.

The measure now heads to the Senate.

The House also voted on and passed its second fiscal year 2020 minibus appropriations package (H.R. 3055) including the Agriculture-FDA, Commerce-Justice-Science, Interior-Environment, Military Construction-VA and Transportation-HUD appropriation bills. In total, 290 amendments were made in order for floor consideration. Among the amendments made in order, the following were ultimately adopted with the final bill:

- An amendment to shift funding to oppose the Federal Bureau of Prisons' (BOP) use of contracted private prison facilities for detention and immigration enforcement;
- An amendment to bar the use of funds to enforce the Trump administration's "zero-tolerance" immigration policy, which directs the Justice Department to prosecute all illegal crossings at the U.S.-Mexico border; and,
- An amendment to shift \$5 million within state and local law enforcement funds for targeted violence prevention training.

The House passed the bill by a vote of 227 to 194. A united Republican Conference was joined by only one Democrat in opposing the legislation.

The House also passed the fiscal year 2020 Financial Services appropriations bill (H.R. 3351). The \$24.6 billion bill would boost funding for the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service.

The two measures that have not yet received consideration on the floor of the House include the Legislative Branch and Homeland Security Appropriations bills.

House leadership has kept open the possibility that it will take up the Legislative Branch appropriations bill (H.R. 2779) soon. The legislation was originally included in the first fiscal

year 2020 appropriations minibus, but it was pulled over disagreements surrounding an automatic cost of living adjustment for Members of Congress.

Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) also left the door open to consider the Homeland Security appropriations bill as well, but it is expected to face hurdles to receive enough votes from Democrats if Republicans remain united in their opposition to the appropriations bills.

The House passed measures now head to the Senate, where the Senate Appropriations Committee continues to make slow progress as it has yet to introduce a single fiscal year 2020 appropriations bill. Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Richard Shelby (R-AL) has indicated he planned to see if a budget caps deal could be reached before his committee moved forward marking up appropriations measures. Since the Senate did not reach an agreement before the July 4th recess began, Shelby indicated the Senate would likely "deem" a topline number so the committee could begin markups.

White House Threatens Veto of House Minibus Packages

The White House has released several Statement of Administration Policy (SAP) announcements in recent weeks, which are official statements from the administration that signal the administration's support or opposition of legislation before the House and Senate.

The White House SAP took issue with several provisions included the House's first passed fiscal year 2020 appropriations minibus consisting of the Defense, Labor-HHS, State-Foreign Ops and Energy and Water Appropriations. The Administration expressed concern over "problematic language that would prohibit the transfer and execution of funds to improve Nation's border security, and that would otherwise impede immigration enforcement", charter schools, and several defense and foreign operation funding streams, and issued a veto threat.

In addition, the White House is also threatening to veto H.R. 3055, the second minibus appropriations package consisting of Commerce, Justice, Science, Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, Interior, Environment, Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, Transportation, and Housing and Urban Development Appropriation bills.

In the SAP, the Administration contends that Democrats and the minibus are using a misguided framework, wherein increases to defense spending must be matched or exceeded by increases to non-defense spending. In addition, the Administration took issue on the "problematic provisions implicating key Administration priorities, including provisions that would prohibit the use of FY 2020 or prior-year military construction funding to design, construct, or carry out projects along the southern border".

Within the appropriations bill that would fund the Department of Interior, the Administration is concerned that the bill provides no funding to support the reorganization of DOI, an initiative focused on making DOI more efficient and responsive to the public. The Administration strongly opposes efforts to block these important and bold reforms.

The SAP also highlights the Administration's opposition to the \$3.6 billion provided in the bill for the Community Development Block Grant program, as it feels the program is not well-targeted to the most distressed areas and has not demonstrated measurable impacts on communities.

The SAP addresses other grievances within the minibus, including grants related to the California High Speed Rail Authority, and should the bill be brought to the White House as is, President Trump's advisors would recommend that he veto the measure.

Senate Defense Authorization Makes Changes to PFAS Regulations

Right before the Senate adjourned for the July 4th recess, lawmakers passed their version of the annual National Defense Authorization Act, 2020 by a vote of 86-8. Due to do the amount of time it takes the Senate to dispense with amendments, only three amendments were considered to the legislation while it was on the floor, and only two of the amendments were adopted.

Of the adopted amendments, the Senate cleared a substitute amendment that included the next of more than two dozen amendments offered by lawmakers. Senate leaders from both sides of the isle worked together to clear a package of amendments that enjoyed bipartisan support, which considerably reduced the amount of time it would take the Senate to consider the legislation.

Included in the substitute amendment was sweeping language to address per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, or PFAS. These chemical are used in nonstick coating, firefighting foams, and some food packaging. They are especially valuable as a protective coating because of their resistance to breaking down in the environment.

That same resistance poses a contamination problem for drinking water supplies, particularly in areas near military bases where the PFAS chemical are used in firefighting foam during training exercise. Exposure to these chemicals has been linked to health problems such as low birth

weight, testicular and kidney cancer, and liver damage, plus immune system and thyroid effects, according to studies cited by the EPA.

The amendment includes provisions that would force the EPA to set nationwide drinking water regulations for at least some PFAS chemicals within two years. The agency has been working on PFAS contamination issues for years, but hasn't yet determined whether it will set nationwide standards, let alone when.

If and when the agency sets these standards, every water utility in the country would have to test their water for the presence of PFAS chemicals and then take action if PFAS concentrations rise too high.

Additionally, the Senate's defense bill would add PFAS chemicals to the Environmental Protection Agency's Toxics Release Inventory, which would require companies using or transporting these chemicals to report this activity to the agency.

It would also require the U.S. Geological Survey to sample water bodies nationwide to determine the extent of PFAS contamination. And it would also allow the Defense Department to partner with civilian water utilities to clean up water contamination.

The Senate ultimately didn't adopt an amendment to the bill that would have forced the Air Force to reimburse utilities for the costs of PFAS clean up, a major issue in states such as New Mexico, which is currently suing the Air Force over aquifer contamination there.

The bill also doesn't require the EPA to designate PFAS chemicals as hazardous substances, which would make it easier to recover cleanup costs from the military through the federal Superfund process.

The House Armed Services Committee approved its own version of this annual defense bill (H.R. 2500) several weeks ago, and it also includes some provisions that affect PFAS regulation. But that bill isn't expected to come to the House floor until after the Independence Day recess.

Congressional Leaders, White House Officials Fail to Reach Budget Deal

Congressional leaders from both parties and senior White House officials emerged from a meeting in Speaker Nancy Pelosi's office on Wednesday, June 19 without a deal on raising spending caps and the debt limit.

The meeting included Speaker Pelosi, Senate Democratic Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY), Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) and House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy (R-CA), as well as senior lawmakers from the Senate and House Appropriations committees.

Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin and acting White House Chief of Staff Mick Mulvaney represented the White House.

Congress and the White House have a few more months to go before the new fiscal year starts on October 1, but lawmakers are eager to take the prospect of another government shutdown off the table sooner rather than later.

In a joint statement, Speaker Pelosi and Leader Schumer seemed to put the blame on the administration for impeding progress. "If the House and Senate could work their will without interference from the President, we could come to a good agreement much more quickly," the statement said.

If an agreement isn't reached to raise the spending caps, an automatic sequestration of government funds could lower government funding levels by some 10 percent in the next fiscal year. Additionally, absent an agreement, the House and Senate would unlikely be able to agree to spending legislation, which could trigger a government shutdown or require the passage of a continuing resolution (CR)—putting federal spending on autopilot.

Secretary Mnuchin, who attended the meeting, laid out the GOP's Plan B if no deal is reached. That plan would freeze current spending levels and prevent deep spending cuts from going into effect if no agreement is reached before the end of September.

Pelosi and Schumer said they were committed to avoiding a CR but ensuring the full faith and credit of the U.S. government.

The deadline for addressing the debt limit is expected sometime in September. Failure to act on it would cause the U.S. government to default on its debt, which would lead to extreme volatility in global financial markets.

Some Republican lawmakers would prefer Secretary Mnuchin take the lead in representing the White House, as they see him being more amenable to a two-year spending deal that would also raise the debt limit.

Acting Chief of Staff Mulvaney, on the other hand, is viewed as resistant to striking a two-year deal, which would take the prospect of another government shutdown off the table until after the 2020 election. Mulvaney was a founding member of the conservative House Freedom Caucus and an outspoken critic of big budget deals that swell the federal deficit.

U.S.-Mexico Border Strain and Immigration Takes Center Stage

The head of U.S. Border Patrol defended using military personnel at the U.S.-Mexico border, saying extra resources are needed "as long as we face this crisis" of an influx of migrants.

Speaking at a House Homeland Security hearing earlier this month, Border Patrol Chief Carla Provost said apprehensions and drug seizures at the border have become "overwhelming." She said agency officers are already working 50 hours a week, and in some cases, she must ask them to work more in a physically and emotionally demanding role.

U.S. Customs and Border Protection reported 593,507 apprehensions at the border from October through May, including 332,981 traveling in family units.

Committee Democrats led by Border Security Subcommittee Chairwoman Kathleen Rice of New York acknowledged the influx of migrants, but questioned agency decisions "to take trained border patrol agents away from their jobs that they are trained to do and have them do different things that independent contractors could be hired to do."

Congress has passed the Administration's spending request to bolster resources at the U.S.-Mexico border to address the ongoing humanitarian crisis.

However, following the passage of the Senate border bill supplemental appropriation, Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) presented the Senate with changes by releasing an amended Senate bill that limits how long children can be held, enforces high standards for "influx" facilities, and requires immediate notification of any child deaths in U.S. custody. However, House Democrats failed to gain concessions from the Senate and White House on their border funding bill leaving the House to rely mostly on Republican votes to pass the Senate's \$4.6 billion version of the bill. The House passed the measure 305-102, with 176 Republicans and 129 Democrats supporting the measure. The Senate passed the measure 84-8 on Wednesday.

Adding to the immigration policy discussions, this month the President threatened to deport "millions" of undocumented immigrants. However, the President called off the deportations hours before they were set to begin citing, a request from Democrats. He also explained via a tweet that he had "delayed the Illegal Immigration Removal Process (Deportation) for two weeks to see if the Democrats and Republicans can get together and work out a solution to the Asylum and Loophole problems at the Southern Border."

Prior to that, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents had been poised to start attempting to act on final deportation orders for approximately 2,000 people in 10 cities.

August Recess Under Threat

The lack of a spending deal with fewer than 20 legislative days remaining until the August recess is prompting some GOP senators to discuss the possibility of cutting short the Senate's August break.

Senator David Perdue (R-GA), who is up for reelection next year, said he will ask Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell to consider trimming the annual recess in order to tackle government spending bills.

The effort to shorten the recess was successful in 2018 after Perdue and other lawmakers sounded the alarm on a pileup of spending measures. This year, the Senate is even further behind schedule on its to-do list.

Senators have done little legislating this year and still have on their agenda the highway reauthorization and the annual appropriations bills.

"We only have 19 working days between now and the end of July. If we don't stay here in August at least some of the time, it's hard for me to believe we're going to get all of this appropriated by Sept. 30," Perdue said, citing the end of the fiscal year.

McConnell canceled much of the August recess last year after coming under pressure from colleagues who said the Senate needed to catch up on its backlog of work.

As discussed above, the Senate Appropriations Committee hasn't advanced any spending bills this year, while the House Appropriations panel has already voted on all 12 annual spending measures.

The Senate committee last year had voted on seven of the annual spending bills by mid-June and all 12 by the end of June.

This year's Senate is far behind that pace largely because of a failure to reach a deal with the White House and Democrats in the House on budget caps. The House has moved ahead despite the lack of top-line fiscal numbers.

The Senate has spent most of 2019 voting on Trump's judicial and executive branch nominees.

States Work to Block Military Funds for Border Wall

California and New Mexico are asking a federal judge to permanently block President Trump from using military funds to build a border wall in those states.

In a court filing, attorneys for the states asked Judge Haywood Gilliam to rule against the Trump administration in their efforts to build a border wall in their states, claiming that it will cause lasting harm to the environment and will infringe upon those states' rights.

The filing notes that Gilliam found in a prior ruling that states seeking to stop Trump from using military funds for a border wall are likely to win their lawsuit. The motion relates to \$2.5 billion in Department of Defense (DOD) funds that the president has tapped to build the border wall.

California and New Mexico both request that this Court declare that the transfer and use of DOD funds toward Defendants' proposed border wall is unlawful and unconstitutional," the court document reads, calling for Gilliam to issue an injunction.

Gilliam, an Obama appointee, ruled last month to grant a preliminary injunction to stop Trump from using some Pentagon funds for a border wall. The president declared a national emergency earlier this year to divert those dollars toward a border wall.

Trump issued the order at the end of a record 35-day-long partial government shutdown after Congress refused to include his requested amount of funding for border security in a government spending bill.

Several lawsuits have been filed to challenge Trump's authority to divert the military funds, arguing that only Congress has the authority to allocate federal funds.

Disaster Bill Passes House and Senate, Signed by President

The House on Monday, June 3, passed a \$19.1 billion disaster relief package, finally sending legislation to the White House that had been repeatedly blocked by lone Republican lawmakers over the Memorial Day recess.

The legislation was approved in a 354-58 vote.

The measure includes funding for communities hit by various natural disasters across the country. It also includes \$900 million in aid to Puerto Rico, funding that was initially opposed by President Trump as being too much.

The measure passed the Senate in an 85-8 vote in late May.

President Donald Trump on Thursday, June 6 signed a \$19.1 billion disaster aid bill after delays stalled the measure from getting passed.

Grijalva Asks Trump to Explain Vacancies at the Interior Department

House Natural Resources Chairman Raul Grijalva (D-AZ) has asked President Donald Trump to explain why 59 percent of leadership positions at the Interior Department have yet to be filled.

Among those empty slots are directors of the Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, and the Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement. The Interior Department also still doesn't have a deputy secretary or special trustee for American Indians.

The White House didn't immediately respond to a request for comment after the release of the June 12 letter.

The administration is "abdicating its constitutional duty to nominate qualified individuals into these important roles, instead enlisting individuals in 'acting capacity' who are more loyal to a political agenda than the missions of the agencies and departments they should be leading," Grijalva wrote.

The Arizona Democrat asked Trump to send a detailed timeline of all Interior nominations that are either vacant or held by someone in an acting capacity. Some Interior nominees have begun moving through the Senate confirmation process.

For example, Robert Wallace, Trump's pick to become the assistant secretary for fish, wildlife, and parks, had two confirmation hearings earlier this month.

Daniel Jorjani, the administration's nominee for the department's solicitor, and Mark Greenblatt, the Interior inspector general nominee, both had a Senate confirmation hearing in May.

Farmers Ask EPA to Curb How Water Law Affects Some Streams

Farmers and ranchers want the Trump administration to only apply federal clean water protections in an upcoming rule to streams that run at least three months a year.

Todd Fornstrom, president of the Wyoming Farm Bureau, made a case for a clearer definition of "intermittently flowing streams" in his written testimony to the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee June 12. The committee is examining the administration's 2018 rewrite of the Obama-era rule defining the scope of the Clean Water Act over waterways.

Fornstrom—who testified on behalf of the American Farm Bureau Federation—argued that a more precise definition was needed to provide clarity on what's covered by the Environmental Protection Agency. He said the farmers and ranchers would face less federal overreach if the phrase "certain times of the year" in the Obama-era rule is replaced with a concrete duration of time of continuous surface flow, for example 90 days.

The EPA and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers are sifting through hundreds of comments to rewrite the 2015 regulation, which defined where Clean Water Act protections would apply.

The December 2018 proposal, which the agencies expect to issue in August in final form, stopped short of defining intermittent streams. Instead, they described it as "surface water flowing continuously during certain times of a typical year."

Meanwhile, the Obama administration's 2015 Clean Water Rule only remains in effect in about half the country, and is blocked in the other half, including Wyoming.

Executive Summary:

Pursuant to the monitoring and mitigation requirements of the 2010 Peace II Subsequent Environmental Impact Report, in order to receive the benefits of Hydraulic Control and Basin Re-Operation, the Prado Basin Habitat Sustainability Committee (PBHSC) must prepare an Annual Report. The PBHSC has completed the Annual Report for Water Year 2018.

The annual report documents declines to the extent and greenness of the riparian habitat along Chino Creek, Mill Creek, or the Santa Ana River. However, these changes appear to be the effect of dry conditions, wildfires along Chino Creek, and was not due to declining groundwater levels. The PBHSC is not recommending any changes in the Adaptive Management Plan nor any mitigation measures for Hydraulic Control or Basin Re-Operation necessary at this time.

The draft Annual Report for Water Year 2018 was published and distributed in April 2019. Chino Basin Watermaster (CBWM) and IEUA presented the draft report to members of the PBHSC at a meeting on May 14, 2019. A one-month comment period was provided and minimal feedback was received. The CBWM Board of Directors approved the report on June 27, 2019.

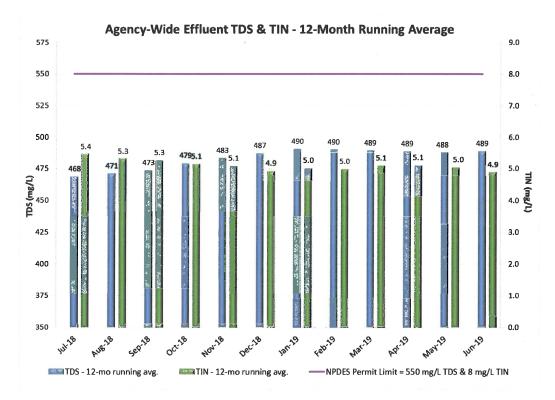
Regional Plants 1, 4, 5 and Carbon Canyon Water Recycling Facility met all the NPDES requirements and effluent/recycled water limitations during the month of June 2019.

1. The Agency-wide average sewer influent flow for the month of June 2019 was 48.4 million gallons per day (mgd) (preliminary value), which is a 0.2 mgd increase from the May 2019 total influent flow.

- 2. The discharge permit effluent limit for total dissolved solids (TDS) is 550 mg/L. The 12-month running average TDS value for June 2019 was 489 mg/L (preliminary value).

Air Quality

There were no reportable incidents relating to air quality compliance during the month of June 2019. During June, the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) conducted on-site inspections at IERCF and RP-4. No issues were raised during the inspections. IEUA is also awaiting notices from the SCAQMD Legal Department for the RP-1 violations received in December 2017.

INLAND EMPIRE REGIONAL COMPOSTING FACILITY

A. Operational Comments

Facility throughput for June averaged approximately 76% of permitted capacity at an average of 388 tons per day of biosolids and 61 tons per day of amendments (based on the 30-day month-to-date). Biosolids volumes are on target for the fiscal year. The facility is operating well with no violations, environmental compliance issues, or lost-time incidents.

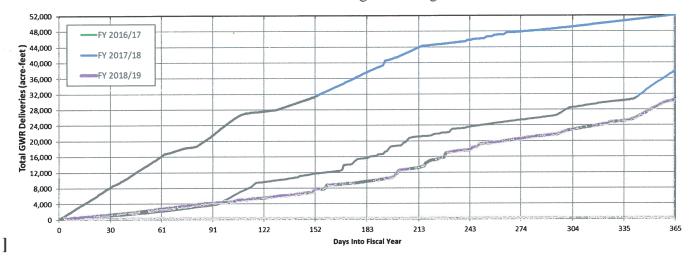

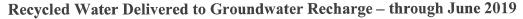

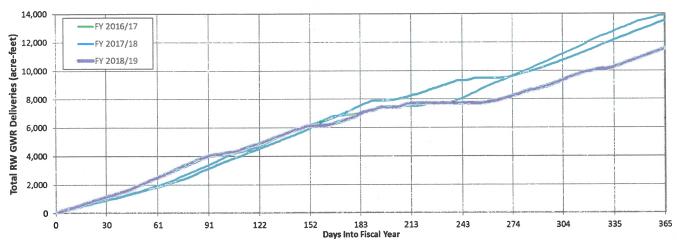
A. Groundwater Recharge - June 2019

During June 2019, recycled water recharge totaled 1,270 acre-feet. Dry weather flow recharge was approximately 31 acre-feet. Approximately 482 acre-feet of imported water was recharged in the Chino basin for storage by San Antonio Water Company. Recharge of imported water from MWD totaled 4,414 acre-feet. For supplemental water deliveries (imported and recycled), Chino Basin Watermaster will remove 4.2% for June evaporation losses. Considering evaporation, total recharge for the month was approximately 5,938 acre-feet.

Total Groundwater Recharge - through June 2019

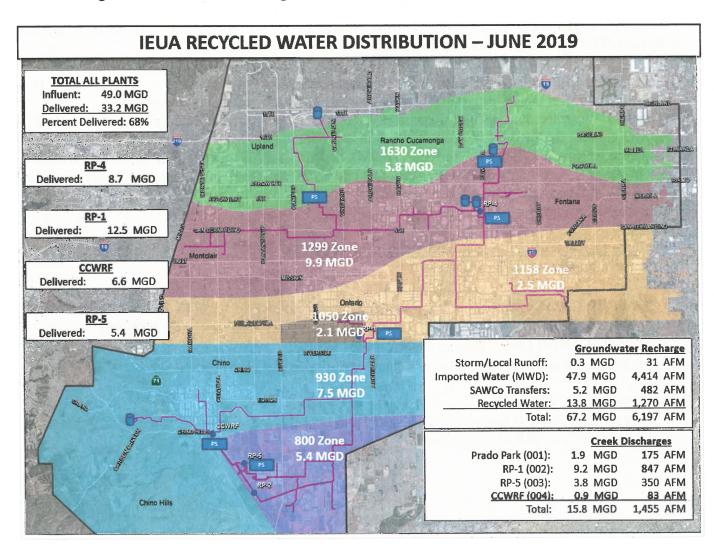






B. Recycled Water Distribution - June 2019

During June 2019, 68% (33.2 MGD) of IEUA recycled water supply (49.0 MGD) was delivered into the distribution system for direct use customers (19.4 MGD) and groundwater recharge (13.8 MGD). Plant discharge to creeks feeding the Santa Ana River averaged 15.8 MGD.

GRANTS UPDATE

A. Grant/Loan Applications Submitted:

1. None.

B. Grant/Loan Applications in Process:

- 1. EPA WIFIA Loan application for the RP-5 Expansion Project (\$159 million).
- 2. On June 4, the SAWPA Commission approved SAWPA's determination to award \$2.6 million in Prop 1 Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) grant funding for the IEUA-JCSD RW Intertie Project. SAWPA will hold pre-application workshops for all projects within the watershed that were selected for funding to compile necessary information for an application to the Department of Water Resources (DWR), which is expected to be completed near the end of 2019.
- 3. Following discussions with the Finance and Engineering Departments, it was determined that the Grants Department will prepare Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) loan applications for the RP-1 Disinfections Improvements Project and the Philadelphia Lift Station Force Main Improvements Project. These applications are due by December 31, 2019 to be considered for Fiscal Year 20/21 CWSRF funding.

C. Grant/Loan Agreement Negotiation:

- 1. On June 18, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) approved the FY 19/20 CWSRF Intended Use Plan (IUP). Four IEUA projects were added to the IUP Fundable List this year and are eligible for low-interest loan agreements with the SWRCB: the RP-5 Expansion Project (\$101.5M), the Wineville/Jurupa/RP-3 Basin Improvements Project (\$11.7M), the Lower Day Basin Improvements Project (\$2.9M), and the Montclair Basin Improvements Project (\$1.3M).
- 2. IEUA executed an agreement with the USBR that awards Federal funds in the amount of \$750,000 for the Wineville and Jurupa Basins Pumping and Conveyance System Project under the WaterSMART: Drought Resiliency Project Grants Program. IEUA is awaiting the fully executed agreement.
- 3. The State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) is in the process of issuing four additional SRF loan agreements for the RP-1 1158 Zone Pump Station Upgrade (\$6.7M), RP-5 Pipeline Bottleneck (\$2.8M), Baseline Expansion/Village of Heritage (\$6.9M), and IEUA-JCSD RW Intertie (\$33M). SWRCB's new fiscal management software has delayed the execution of these agreements by several months, but SWRCB staff recently indicated that progress is being made on the agreement executions. Construction of each of these projects will not be impacted.

 - SWRCB Regional Water Quality Laboratory Invoice #19 for \$146,525

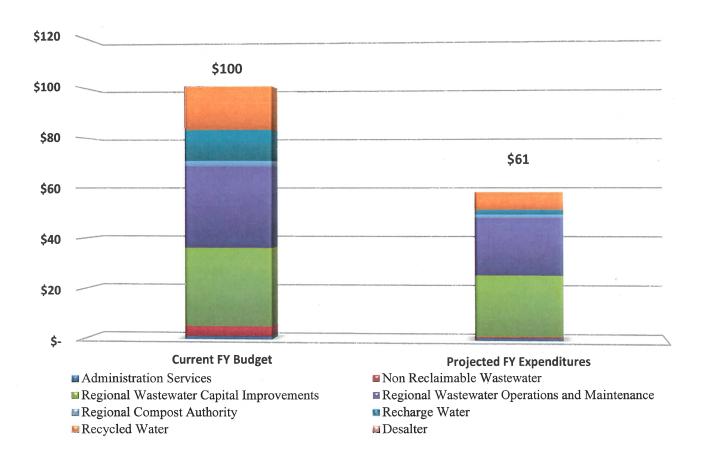
E. Other Department Activities:

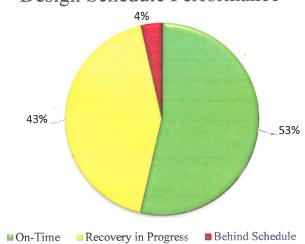

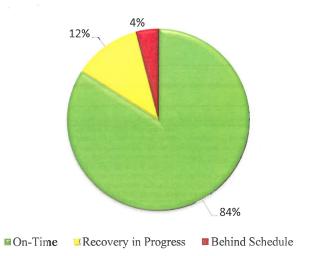
