

#### About the Chino Creek Wetlands and Educational Park

The Chino Creek Wetlands and Educational Park opened in 2007 and was partially funded by a state grant from the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB). It consists of 22 acres and 1.7 miles of trails landscaped with a wide variety of climate appropriate and low-water use plants and features a state-of-the-art irrigation management system. The Park was designed to restore native habitat and natural drainage, showcasing the environmental values of the Prado Basin, the largest riparian forest remaining in southern California. These habitats have many important functions such as: providing a home for many wildlife and plants, filtering pollutants, holding floodwaters back, and storing water.

The Park is open to the public throughout the year to enjoy at their leisure during daylight hours as well as providing an educational experience to students through the Water Discovery Field Trip Program. To learn more about our Water Discovery Field Trip Program, visit our website ieua.org.
