1. ACTION ITEMS

A. APPROVAL OF THE SPECIAL MEETING MINUTES OF DECEMBER 7, 2020

2. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

A. ENGINEERING AND CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT QUARTERLY PROJECT UPDATE

Jerry Burke/IEUA provided a brief overview of the following projects: RP-4 Aeration Basin Wall Repair; Agency-wide Roofing Phase III; and RP-4 Influent Screen Replacement.

B. DEBT OVERVIEW UPDATE

Javier Chagoyen-Lazaro/IEUA provided a debt overview update. He expounded on the outstanding debt trend and projections, outstanding debt and projected debt by fund, and debt service trends projected through 2026. Ron Craig/City of Chino Hills asked what the duration is for the availability of interim financing of the RP-5 Expansion Project. Mr. Chagoyen-Lazaro stated that the interim financing started in 2020 and will be available until the completion of the project. The amount issued for interim financing is the same amount awarded by the WIFIA loan. At the end of construction, the Agency will draw the WIFIA loan funds to pay the interim financing principal amount. After construction is completed, the Agency will pay debt service for the WIFIA loan for 35 years. Mr. Craig stated that the debt service shown in the presentation is to 2026 and he would like to see where the debt service goes for the subsequent years. Mr. Chagoyen-Lazaro stated that due to the length of the financing, the overall impact of the debt service is not critical. The Agency is also applying for a State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan and debt service for that loan is also included in the 2026 projection. Mr. Craig stated that he would like to see additional future years debt service projections with and

without the assumption the Agency will be awarded the SRF loans. Mr. Chagoyen-Lazaro stated that staff will provide this information but suggested this be deferred to factor in projects that are being proposed as part of the Ten Year Capital Improvement Plan in order to consider other funding that may be needed.

C. RETURN TO SEWER STUDY UPDATE

Ken Tam/IEUA provided a brief overview of the Pilot Return to Sewer Flow Study final report. He stated that on January 11, the Technical subgroup for the Pilot Return to Sewer Study reconvened to discuss the next steps that were highlighted during the last Technical Committee meeting on December 7. The two options presented at that meeting were 1) move forward with the flow and wastewater monitoring verification phase of the pilot study service area; or 2) perform an expanded Return to Sewer study with other contracting agencies' service areas and postpone the flow and wastewater monitoring portion until the pandemic conditions ease. All members expressed support for the second option. Three contracting agencies - the City of Chino, the City of Ontario, and Cucamonga Valley Water District (CVWD) all expressed a desire to participate in this second option. All Technical subgroup members were interested in discussing the cost for this expanded study. Based on the feedback from the technical subgroup for the expanded study and the need to scope out project costs, it was decided that the costs for the expanded study be reviewed by the Technical subgroup before bringing it to the Technical Committee for action. Mr. Tam stated that he is currently working with the consultant and fielding input from the interested agencies and will analyze the potential cost of the expanded study. Mr. Tam explained that the next steps are to gather additional information, reconvene with the Technical subgroup in February and bring an action item to the Technical Committee for consideration in February.

Eduardo Espinoza/CVWD asked if this study was sole sourced and if it would be sole sourced for the next phase. Mr. Tam stated that the initial Pilot Study was a sole source project at a cost of approximately \$38,000 and added that staff will continue to gather information on the cost and scope of the expanded study.

D. OPERATIONS & COMPLIANCE UPDATES

Mr. Tam stated at RP-1, the Agency experienced an isolated toxicity event at the OO-2 effluent discharge point in December. Subsequent testing shows that the Agency is in compliance.

He also noted that one of RP-1's largest digesters, digester no. 6 came back in service in December after a rehabilitation project. In the southern service area, the Agency was experiencing toxicity issues at the Prado discharge from late November to mid-January. Those toxicity tests have passed for two consecutive tests, so the Agency is moving forward with its regular monthly monitoring frequency. He noted that there were no air compliance issues to report.

Mr. Espinoza asked for the specific location of the toxicity issue in the Cucamonga Creek. Randy Lee/IEUA stated that the discharge point is located right next to RP-1 on the east side of the Cucamonga channel.

Mr. Craig asked if the Agency knew the source of the toxicity spike. Mr. Lee stated that there was an extensive review of the process data and the Agency also hired a third-party consultant. The

conclusion given was that it was a weak toxicity. The Agency uses water fleas for these tests, which are very sensitive. The sample passed the acute portion of the test and failed the chronic portion. Since it was a fairly weak toxicity, staff and the consultant reviewed oxygen, concentration, total dissolved solids, chemical use, and did not find anything conclusive to have caused the toxicity.

General Manager Shivaji Deshmukh/IEUA stated that the Request for Proposal (RFP) for the 2021-2022 Rate Study for the Recycled Water and Non-Reclaimable Wastewater program rates was issued and shared with each of the Finance Directors for coordination with retail agency rates implementation. This will be discussed at the next Finance Directors meeting scheduled for February 3. He gave an update on the second quarter capital call that was shared with the Finance Directors at their November 4, 2020 meeting. Lastly, he recognized Chuck Hays from the City of Fontana for his service on the Technical Committee and congratulated him on his retirement.

B. COMMITTEE MEMBER REQUESTED AGENDA ITEMS FOR NEXT MEETING

There were no Committee Member requests for future agenda items.

C. COMMITTEE MEMBER COMMENTS

Mr. Craig commented that it was approximately a year ago when he heard that the Agency was making modifications and improvements to the ingress/egress off the Kimball Ave. Due to COVID-19, the Committee has not been meeting in-person, but he hopes the Committee members will be able to see each other in person soon and the driveways will be in better condition. General Manager Deshmukh stated that the project schedule was adjusted due to the availability of funds. Mr. Burke stated that the bids received were higher than expected, so the bid process was placed on hold until

next fiscal year. The Agency will be separating the onsite work and the work on the right of way. General Manager Deshmukh commended Mr. Burke and his department and stated that much of the work was done in-house, which helped reduce project costs.






RP-5: January Flyover

REQUESTED INFORMATION

At the February 4, 2021 Regional Policy Committee meeting, Committee member Reed requested a report on the amount of property taxes Inland Empire Utilities Agency (Agency) received from its contracting member agencies.

The Agency's share of ad valorem property taxes includes: proportionate share of the 1% general tax (Proposition 13 enacted in 1978 limited the property tax rate to 1% of assessed property values) and incremental taxes from redevelopment project areas based on formal negotiated pass-through agreements with redevelopment agencies prior to their dissolution in 2012. An Extra-Territorial Sewer Service Charge, or property tax "in-lieu", is also collected for system users outside of the Agency's service boundaries, as summarized below:

The San Bernardino County's (County) allocation of the 1% general tax is based on the change in assessed property values (property tax growth) within a tax rate area (TRA). A TRA is a geographic area composed of a unique combination of taxing entities, as defined by the County, and include agencies such as: County General Fund, City, Fire District, Library, School Districts, Water District, Wastewater District, etc. Some TRA's in the Agency's service area overlap boundaries between contracting member agencies. The Agency's proportionate share of the 1% general tax varies amongst the TRA's throughout its service area and is generally approximately 0.045%. As a result, determining the Agency's proportionate share of the 1% general property taxes received by contracting member agency is not a straight-forward process.




