5. AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES' REPORTS

A. SANTA ANA WATERSHED PROJECT AUTHORITY REPORT

Director Tule reported that at the June 7 Board meeting, the Commission approved the application of a grant under the 2021 Urban and Multi-benefit Drought Relief Grant Program for Disadvantaged Community Involvement Set-Aside Funding. The Commission also authorized staff to issue an RFP for the Santa Ana River Watershed Weather Modification Pilot Program Operations services. He added that the Commission discussed creating an onboarding package for new commissioners.

B. METROPOLITAN WATER DISTRICT OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA REPORT

General Manager Shivaji Deshmukh reported that on June 1 the allocation officially began and the data for Week 1 shows that together the State Water Project (SWP)-dependent agencies met the target and were 6% under the Week 1 limit of 1157 AF/day, with an actual usage of 1088 AF/day. IEUA agencies were 35% under the target for Week 1. He stated that staff is working closely to support customer agencies and keeping this momentum as we continue in the allocation.

General Manager Deshmukh added that Metropolitan is also increasing the message that it is imperative to save water now in its drought messaging as well as distributing marketing materials throughout our service area to promote participation in Water-Use Efficiency programs. Metropolitan staff introduced proposed policy principles for the Bay Delta, which would serve to update and consolidate older policy principles from 2006 – 2009. The draft policy principles identify regulatory constraints at the SWP's South Delta export facilities as the main issue in being able to move Metropolitan's water through the Delta. It further states that projects such as new Delta Conveyance and Sites Reservoir would improve Metropolitan's ability to capture and move water in wetter water years. Metropolitan plans to bring a final version of the updated Bay Delta policy principles to the Board in September for adoption. Consistent with Metropolitan's energy and climate plans, the Board authorized the purchase and installation of two 500 kW/2,000 MWh Battery Energy Storage Systems adjacent to the two existing solar facilities at the Weymouth plant at a total estimated cost to complete the project of \$12.5 million.

C. REGIONAL SEWERAGE PROGRAM POLICY COMMITTEE REPORT

Director Tule reported that at the June 2 Committee meeting, the Committee approved the May 5, 2022 Policy meeting minutes; FY 2022/23 Proposed Budget Amendment for the Regional Wastewater Programs; and FY 2022/23 -2031/32 Ten-Year Forecast.

D. CHINO BASIN WATERMASTER REPORT

President Elie reported that at the May 26 Chino Basin Watermaster Board meeting, Watermaster approved the Fiscal Year 2022/23 budget. The Board also discussed storage recovery expenses.

E. CHINO BASIN DESALTER AUTHORITY REPORT

Director Tule reported that at the June 2 Special Board meeting, the Board approved contract amendments with King Lee Technologies and American Water Chemicals and the other items were routine in nature.

F. INLAND EMPIRE REGIONAL COMPOSTING AUTHORITY REPORT

Director Hofer reported that at the June 6 Special IERCA meeting, the Board approved the purchase of wheel loaders and reviewed the budget.

6. GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

General Manager Deshmukh stated that a new National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit was adopted by the California Regional Water Quality Control Board, Santa Ana Region, on Friday, June 3, 2022. This permit renews the existing NPDES permit issued in 2015 that the Regional Board had administratively extended after it expired in October 2020. NPDES permits are required to be renewed every five years. Starting in 2009, IEUA had consolidated all the regional water recycling facilities under a single permit to streamline the permit renewal process and reporting. He shared that the new permit includes new effluent permit limitations for several compounds and metals. Other significant changes include requirements for an Asset Management Plan, Climate Change Action Plan, effluent toxicity limit, effluent toxicity reporting using TST statistical method, and effluent PFAS, 1,2,3-Trichloropropane and primary maximum contaminant level monitoring.

7. BOARD OF DIRECTORS' REQUESTED FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

Director Tule requested an overview of landscape design and rebate programs. Director Hofer requested a summary of the drought updates provided at weekly meetings with MWD staff.

8. <u>DIRECTORS' COMMENTS AND CONFERENCE REPORTS</u>

Vice President Camacho stated he attended the Los Angeles Beirut Sister Cities Committee Dinner Banquet on June 4 and the IERCF Celebration on June 7. Vice President Camacho commended Manager of Regional Compost Authority Jeff Ziegenbein and his staff for the great work happening at IERCF.

Director Hall stated she attended the Orange County Water District Webinar on May 24; the STAR Employee Awards Virtual Ceremony on June 8; the WELL 2022 Southern

California Conference on June 10 and 11; and the IEWorks Pre-apprenticeship Program Graduation and IE Black Workers Center Building Trades Career Fair on June 13.

Director Tule commended staff on the NPDES permit and ELAP certification.

President Elie stated that he attended the Chino Hill State of the City on May 31 and the Chino Hills City Council Meeting for the Solar Cup Team Recognition on June 14.

Groundwater Recharge operations and maintenance requires periodic cleaning of basins to restore infiltration rates and optimize recharge. At this time, Banana Basin requires infiltration restoration to remove accumulated fine-grained storm sediments that have significantly reduced the site's recharge capacity. Restoration includes mechanical removal of these sediments. The Banana site was last restored in July 2019. A Request for Proposal (RFP-GD-22-007) was posted on PlanetBids on May 11, 2022. A non-mandatory job site walk was conducted on May 18, 2022 and was attended by one firm. One proposal was received from Jeremy Harris Construction with a proposed cost of \$127,068.

The proposed cost to conduct the scope of work is within expectations considering increases in fuel prices. Therefore, Jeremy Harris Construction, Inc. is recommended to be awarded the Banana Basin Infiltration Restoration contract.

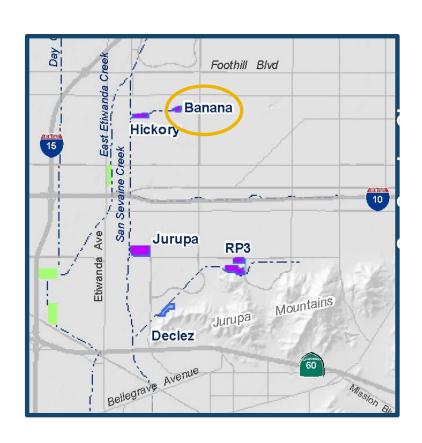

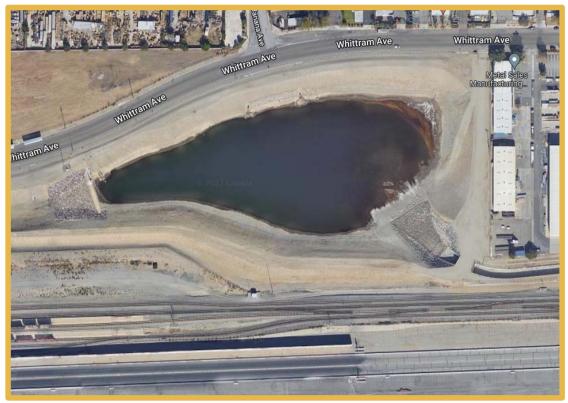

Executive Summary:

The Inland Empire Utilities Agency (Agency) has 31 buildings throughout Agency-owned facilities that require the occasional plumbing service. One of the responsibilities of Facilities Management Unit is to make sure all restrooms are suitable for staff and visitors to use. To consistently meet this task, the Agency contracts with a plumbing service provider to perform the needed services such as hydro jetting, snake draining, leak repairs, fixture replacements, and even restroom restoration.

To maintain the appropriate level of service for the Agency, a Request for Proposal (RFP) RFP-GD-22-005 was posted publicly on PlanetBids on April 12, 2022, for a new Plumbing Service contract. Out of five potential contractors who participated in the mandatory job-walk, three submitted proposals. The evaluation team scored Pro-Craft Construction the highest due to submitting the most comprehensive proposal, demonstrating that they understood the scope of work, and continues to meet all Agency expectations. Pro-Craft Construction had the lowest proposed cost and highest overall score. Based on the committee evaluation, it is recommended that Pro-Craft Construction, Incorporated be awarded the Plumbing Services Contract.

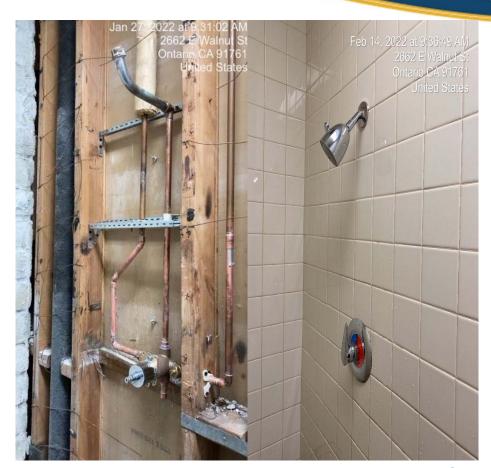

Executive Summary:

In late 2020, CDM Smith was awarded a consulting service contract to conduct the condition assessment on 41 sewer siphons as part of the Collection System Condition Assessment and Optimization project. This initial effort will lead towards CDM Smith's development of a comprehensive sewer system maintenance optimization program which will enhance Inland Empire Utilities Agency's (IEUA) planning and maintenance of the collection assets. To-date, CDM Smith gathered condition data on 39 siphons.

The current contract amount to complete the assessment of the last two siphons will not be adequate due to the significant bypass efforts needed, larger volume for debris removal, and extensive traffic control at each site. Staff is recommending an amendment to CDM Smith's contract for a not-to-exceed amount of \$669,325 to complete the two remaining assessments. This will increase the contract from \$2,967,409 to \$3,636,734 (23% increase). The proposed contract amendment will support the development of a comprehensive sewer system maintenance optimization program.

Staff is also recommending a total project budget augmentation to support the amended services requested in the amount of \$329,000 for EN19024 and \$341,000 for EN19028.

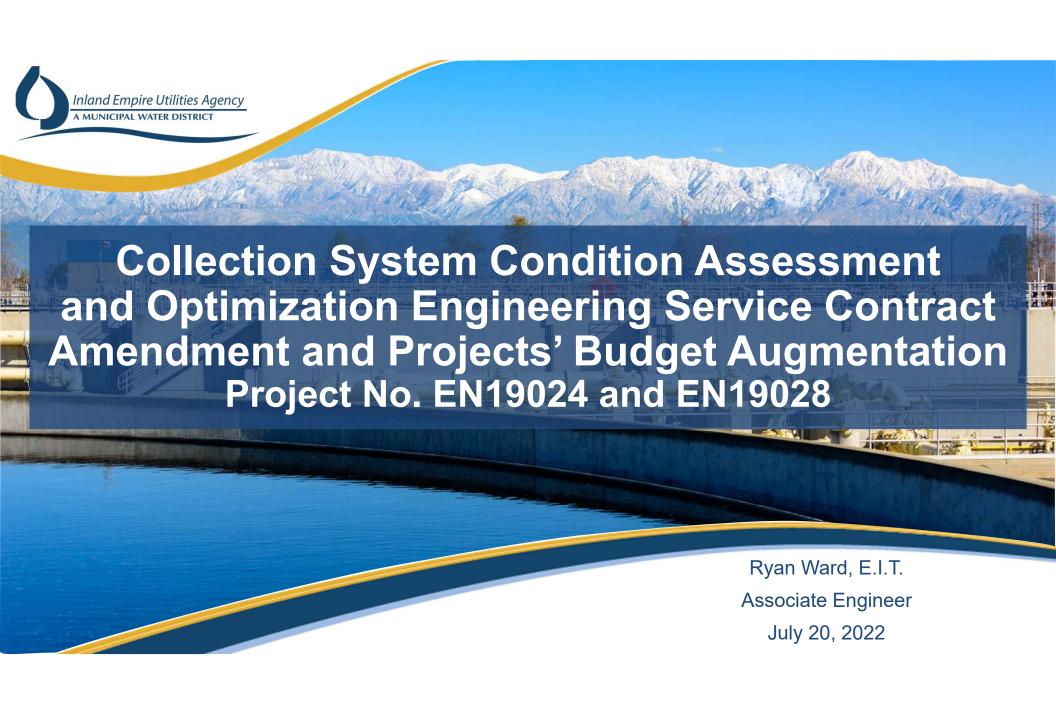

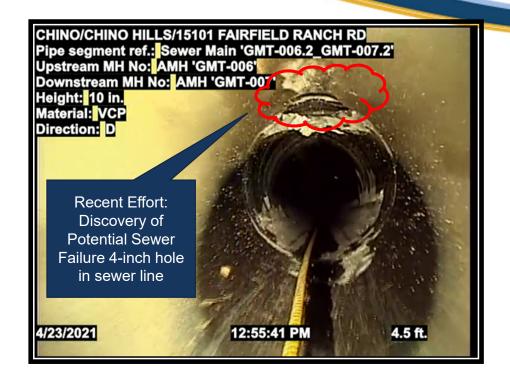

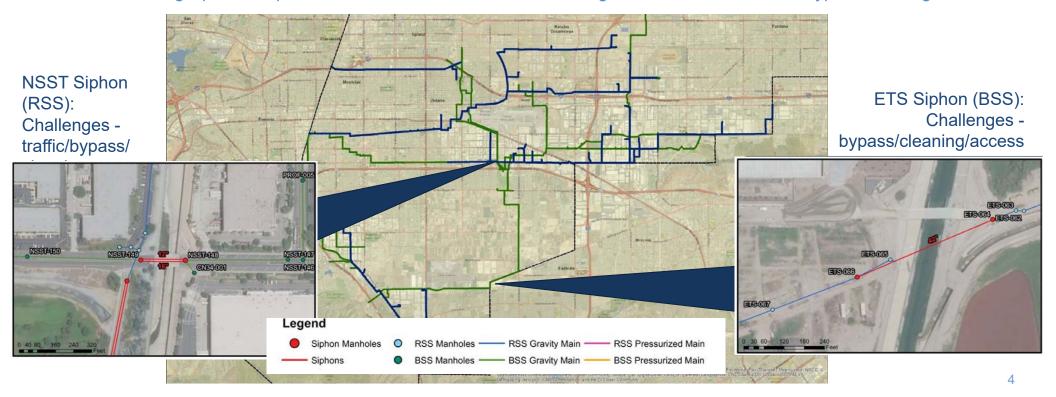

Dear Mr. Ignacio:

CDM Smith was retained in September 2020 by the Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) to clean and conduct inspections of 72 siphon barrels within IEUA's regional sewer system (RSS) and brine sewer system (BSS). To date, a total of 65 barrels have been cleaned and inspected, with two additional barrels (Cucamonga Interceptor Relief Sewer CUIR_067-068 and CUIR_065-066) scheduled for repairs and cleaning and inspection in late-May/June. Upon completion of these two barrels, approximately 93% of the originally scoped siphon barrels will have been cleaned and inspected within the established contract budget for field work.

Based on progress to date and modified field work plans described below, the cost to complete the remaining four sites consisting of five not-yet-inspected siphon barrels will exceed the remaining project budget due to site conditions that differ significantly from what assumed during scoping and initial field work planning. Generally, at the four remaining sites, the following conditions necessitate a greater level of planning, engineering, onsite coordination, and work to complete the cleaning and CCTV inspections:

- Higher than Anticipated Flows. During field reconnaissance and in preparation of the Condition Assessment Implementation Plan (CAIP), it was determined that flow monitoring was necessary to verify sewer flow rates and patterns at certain sites in order to properly design bypass pumping systems. Flow monitoring, authorized through a scope amendment and funded through the contract contingency was conducted in September 2021. This flow monitoring confirmed higher than anticipated flow rates for thirteen siphons. The higher flow rates required CDM Smith's team to re-design and rent larger, more expensive bypass pumping systems to safely divert flow while the siphons are cleaned and inspected.
- Sonar Pre-Inspection. The base scope assumes CCTV inspection for all siphons in accordance with NASSCO-PACP protocols, allowing for sonar inspections where CCTV inspections is infeasible. During the field work planning, sonar pre-inspections were employed on several siphons to gauge debris volumes, providing important data that allowed us to refine field work plans and work durations prior to mobilization.
- **Higher than Anticipated Debris.** Siphon dewatering and cleaning, a critical initial step in preparing the barrels for a CCTV inspection, can vary significantly from site to site, depending on

the volume and characteristics of the accumulated debris encountered – conditions that cannot be accurately predicted until the cleaning commences (in some cases pre-sonar inspections were conducted to assess volumes prior to mobilization). Several siphons contained substantially more debris than was initially assumed. As an example, the most severe debris accumulation was encountered on the Eastern Trunk Sewer (ETS_022-023; Project Subtask 2.2.26), which required 17 back-to-back shifts in January 2022 to clean and inspect. This operation ultimately produced 36 cubic yards (CY) of material (25% more than anticipated), and the characteristics and siphon geometry (length and depth) resulted in cleaning and bypassing effort that doubled the original estimate. Consistent with predefined field work strategy and following protocols established in the CAIP, IEUA authorized the CDM Smith Team to proceed with additional labor, bypass and traffic control costs to complete the work on Subtask 2.2.26 including successful CCTV inspection. This debris accumulation example is of particular interest with respect to Eastern Trunk Sewer (ETS_065-066, Project Subtask 2.2.25) that still needs to be completed, as described below.

• Stuck Stop Plates Prohibiting Multi-Barrel Sequencing. As a basis for scoping, it was assumed that dual-barrel sites would allow for sequencing of work by manipulating stop plates to divert flow and avoiding bypass pumping. During field reconnaissance and development of the CAIP, a number of stop plates were found to be frozen in their frames, due to either damaged plates or deteriorated guide rails. The inability to rely on these stop plates to sequence the work necessitates revisions to field work planning to include aboveground, pumped bypass systems or installation of flow-through plugs to isolate barrels. The cost for unanticipated pumps and plugs exceeds the original budget for these siphons. In the case of two siphon sites on the Cucamonga Interceptor Relief (CIR_067-068, Subtask 2.2.19 and CIR_065-066, Subtask 2.2.20), project budget will be repurposed to a special field operation to remove, rehabilitate and re-install stop plates in order to facilitate cleaning and inspection under this contract and to restore functionality for IEUA's collections maintenance department.

Summary of Additional Effort to Complete Field Work

CDM Smith is requesting additional budget to complete field work as proposed below. We have organized the proposed additional work to prioritize siphon sites 2.1.10 (NSST, two barrels) and 2.2.25 (EST, single barrel) for which no inspection work has been completed so far under this contract. Sites 2.2.17 (GAO) and 2.2.22 (FIR), are double barrel siphons on which condition assessment (cleaned and fully inspected with CCTV) has been completed on one barrel of each siphon. Completing the parallel barrel at these two remaining sites could be accomplished under this contract with additional funding or deferred to a future project at IEUA's option. As summarized in the table below, additional funding is requested to complete cleaning and inspection work. Descriptions for each line item follow the table, and a cost breakdown for each siphon location is included in attachments.

• North System South Trunk (NSST_149-150, Subtask 2.1.10) - Base Amendment Scope.

Siphon Subtask 2.1.10 is a dual-barrel (197 LF each, 12-in and 18-in diameter, CIP) siphon system. The original scope/budget for this site assumed that the parallel barrels could be isolated to sequence cleaning and construction without a bypass. Due to higher-than-expected flowrates that cannot be reduced, an aboveground bypass is necessary to allow safe access to the upstream and downstream manholes and to complete the cleaning and inspection of both barrels. This site is particularly complicated for bypass pumping, requiring the use of "ramp-overs" for multiple crossings of the heavily truck-trafficked Philadelphia Street and a buried portion of bypass pipe to accommodate access to the Ontario Soccer Park. In consultation with the City of Ontario, the use of "ramp-overs" on this busy street will necessitate more substantial traffic control including continuous flaggers to regulate the speed and truck access to industrial driveways within the work area. The additional costs for planning, bypass pumping, and traffic control as required by work permits are included in the above estimate to complete. Based on siphon configuration and debris volumes encountered on similar brine sewer system siphons, six days of cleaning and inspection are projected for this site. The base proposal scope assumes that Philadelphia Street will need to remain open and that cleaning/inspection shifts will be staged at night outside of typical truck traffic, resulting in six working days, stretching across two calendar weeks (bypass would remain in place through weekend, although not operated) in order to complete the work. Ongoing discussions with City of Ontario may allow for a partial or full street closure that would allow for simplified bypass pumping and double-shifting of cleaning/inspection work which

would significantly reduce the costs associated with bypass pumping and traffic control at this site.

- Eastern Trunk (ETS_065-066, Subtask 2.2.25) Base Amendment Scope. Siphon Subtask 2.2.25 is a long, single-barrel (433-LF, 42-in diameter, PVC Lined RCP) siphon. This siphon is located downstream of Eastern Trunk (ETS_022-023, Subtask 2.2.26), which as noted above exhibited significantly higher debris volume accumulation when cleaned in January 2022 than the other siphons cleaned under this contract. Based on the CDM Smith Team's recent experience at the similar upstream siphon on the same trunk sewer system, we have revised our work plan and estimate to complete to allow for extended work duration and associated field logistics. The additional costs associated with higher than anticipated debris removal, extended work duration, bypass pump rental setup and operation, and traffic control as required by work permits are included in the above estimate to complete. Based on our recent experience at upstream site ETS_022-023, we anticipate up to sixteen shifts of cleaning and inspection for this site. The City of Ontario has confirmed that a full street closure can be accommodated for this site, simplifying the bypass pumping and traffic control. We have assumed double-shifting of the cleaning and inspection work, spanning continuous calendar days over an approximate 10-day period.
- Grove Avenue Outfall (GAO_065-066, Subtask 2.2.17) Supplemental Amendment Scope. Siphon Subtask 2.2.17 is a dual-barrel (133 LF each, 33-in and 36-in diameter, VCP) siphon system. Barrel 1 (33-in), isolated behind existing stop plates was dewatered, cleaned, and inspected under the original contract on November 22, 2021. The original scope/budget for this site assumed flow in this parallel siphon system would be controlled through the use of flow-through plugs, allowing passive siphon diversion without the need for bypass pumping. However, as a result of a flow study early in the project and review of system hydraulics, it was determined that flow-through plugs would present an unsafe surcharge condition and an aboveground pumped system would be necessary to divert flow while the siphons were cleaned and inspected. The additional costs to rent and set up an aboveground pumped system and traffic control as required by work permits are included in the above estimate to complete. Based on siphon configuration and debris volumes encountered on similar regional sewer system siphons, three days of cleaning and inspection are projected for this site.
- Fontana Interceptor Relief (FIR_064-065, Subtask 2.2.22) Supplemental Amendment Scope. Siphon Subtask 2.2.22 is a dual-barrel (196 LF each, 27-in and 48-in diameter, RCP) siphon system. Barrel 1 (66-in) isolated behind existing stop plates was dewatered, cleaned, and inspected under the original contract on September 1, 2021. The original scope/budget assumed that flow in this parallel siphon system would be controlled using flow-through plugs or stop plates installed in the upstream and downstream siphon structures, allowing passive siphon diversion without the need for bypass pumping. During field investigation, it was discovered that the stop plates were frozen, making the use of flow-through plugs infeasible. Field reconnaissance determined that fixing the stop plates to restore functionality would be capital-intensive and is not included in the current work plan or estimate to complete. Since the immovable stop plates obstruct the use of flow-through plugs, an aboveground pumped system was determined to be necessary to divert flow while the siphons are cleaned and inspected. The

additional costs to rent and set up an aboveground pumped system and traffic control as required by permit is included in the above estimate to complete. Based on siphon configuration and debris volumes encountered on similar regional sewer system siphons, four days of cleaning and inspection are projected for this site.

Engineering/Management. As described above, the field work associated with identifying and resolving field work logistics, as well as coordinating the implementation of solutions, has resulted in additional engineering and management costs above the current scope and budget. This time has been split between the base and supplemental scopes itemized above to provide flexibility to IEUA in authorizing additional field work.

Executive Summary:

The Regional Water Recycling Plant No.1 (RP-1) Solids Thickening Project will improve the processes upstream of the digesters and construct additional capacity to permit future improvements that would increase the overall treatment capacity. During the review of the Design Intent Memorandums, staff identified necessary modifications and additions to the scope of the existing design consultant contract with Carollo Engineering, Inc. The proposed amendment, No. 3, is intended to encapsulate these modifications in the design contract: (a) analyze the existing plant capacity at RP-1 to better plan future projects; (b) add an additional boiler to supply heat demand while maintaining redundancy; (c) re-evaluate a prior evaluation of beneficial use of digester gas; (d) rehabilitate Disolved Air Floatation Thickeners (DAFT) 1 & 2 to treat scum from the treatment processes; (e) remove items from the scope that were originally intended for demolition; (f) remove the planned 12 kV facility and associated appurtenances; (g) consolidate the SCADA controls for the digesters into a single location; (h) update the asset register to facilitate IEUA Asset Management processes; and (i) plan and provide an increased level of treatment of digester gas based on needs identified in the design process. The contract amendment to Carollo Engineering, Inc., for a not-to-exceed amount of \$880,393, increases the maximum authorized contract from \$13,677,502 to \$14,557,895 (6.0% increase).

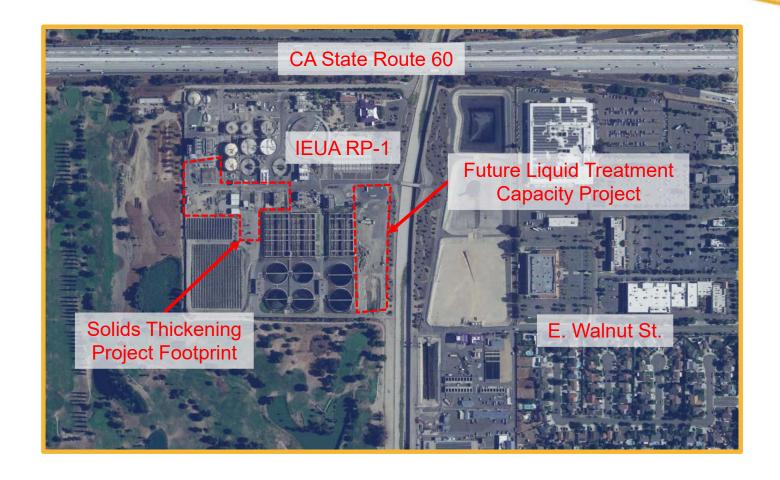

Presented herein is Amendment No. 3 for the Regional Plant 1 (RP-1) Solids Thickening Project (EN22044). This amendment is intended to address several changes to the scope of work at the request of Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) and to provide the anticipated level of effort needed for implementation. The following provides the basis for the amendment as well as descriptions for the work tasks required to allow the requested changes.

Basis for Amendment

Over the course of developing the project through the Design Information Memoranda (DIMs) preparation and 30 percent design stages, regular progress meetings and review workshops were conducted to allow IEUA the opportunity to provide feedback on the main elements of the design. Through this process, IEUA identified a number of items that they felt warranted further investigation/analysis, updated confirmation, or design changes. These items are as follows:

- 1. Stress test the secondary treatment process to confirm the current RP-1 capacity, and work with IEUA's Planning Group to determine timing for the conversion to a membrane bioreactor (MBR) system.
- 2. Addition of a new boiler to the RP-1 digester heating system.
- 3. Updating of DIM 14, Digester Gas Beneficial Use Study, based on recently received comments from IEUA.
- 4. Design for the rehabilitation and modification of dissolved air flotation thickeners (DAFTs) 1 and 2 for scum thickening.
- 5. Changes to the demolition drawings. This will include changes to the project demolition requirements and removal of demolition drawings that will not be developed beyond the 30 percent design stage.
- 6. Removal of the new 12 kilovolt (kV) electrical building from the design, as a new building will no longer be needed for the project.
- 7. Digestion Control Strategies Review of the process control narrative (PCN) for the existing digester system developed as part of the SCADA Migration Project (EN13016.05) so that the RP-1 system can operate in either three-phase or single-phase digestion mode.
- 8. Updating the IEUA Asset Register with the new equipment and hardware to be added through this project.
- 9. Evaluation of alternatives for scrubbing digester gas from the acid digesters.

The work needed to implement the above items is presented in the tasks below.



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Task 1 – Stress Test Secondary Treatment Process to Confirm the Current RP-1 Capacity

IEUA wishes to confirm the current liquid phase capacity of the RP-1 secondary treatment process to better anticipate when the MBR expansion project is expected to be needed. As part of Amendment 1, Carollo Engineers, Inc. (Carollo) was tasked to review the plant data from the past three years and update the process model, developed as part of the 2019 Preliminary Design Report (PDR). Additionally, IEUA would also like to complete a stress test of the RP-1 secondary treatment processes. The test data will be reviewed and incorporated into the updated process model to determine the current RP-1 secondary treatment system capacity, as part of Addendum 2. In turn, this will be used with future flow projections for RP-1 and Regional Plant 4 (RP-4) to determine the timing for when conversion of the secondary treatment process to an MBR is needed. Specific work to be done under this task includes:

- 1. Develop Stress Test Plan including testing and sampling requirements to confirm the plant capacity.
- 2. Conduct a virtual coordination meeting (i.e., Microsoft® (MS) Teams call) with IEUA plant staff to review the test plan requirements and confirm staffing/staff responsibilities.
- 3. Visit the site periodically (up to three times) during the Stress Test to visually observe the testing and answer any questions regarding the Stress Test Plan and sampling requirements.
- 4. Obtain plant performance data from the stress testing from IEUA and incorporate into the BioWin process model to determine the RP-1 treatment capacity.
- 5. Coordinate with IEUA's Planning Group to obtain future flow projections to RP-1 and RP-4. Flow projections will be used together with current wastewater characteristics to determine the anticipated timing for conversion of the secondary treatment process to an MBR. It is our understanding that the flow projection analysis for both facilities being conducted by IEUA is still in progress and will not be completed until early 2023.
- 6. Prepare and submit Draft and Final report. Conduct a virtual meeting with IEUA to review comments on the Draft report. Incorporate IEUA's comments into the Final report.

Deliverables:

- Draft and Final Stress Test Plan submitted in electronic format.
- Draft and Final report submitted in electronic format.

Scope of Work Assumptions:

- 1. IEUA plant staff will conduct the Stress Test per the Plan and collect samples as called for in the Plan. Analysis of samples will be performed at IEUA's laboratory facility. If samples require offsite laboratory analysis, IEUA will work directly with a contract laboratory to perform the requisite analyses.
- 2. IEUA's Planning Group will provide information regarding the anticipated future flow projections to RP-1 and RP-4 to assess the timing for the MBR expansion project. Our understanding is preliminary information from IEUA will only be available in early 2023. This will be documented in the report once it is available.

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Task 2 – Addition of New Boiler to RP-1 Digester Heating System

At the start of the project, IEUA indicated that the existing RP-1 boiler system had sufficient heat supply capacity available to support the addition of the Acid Phase Digester (APD) system. The existing plant boiler system consists of two boilers arranged in a duty/standby configuration. A preliminary analysis of the projected heating needs performed during development of the 30 percent design indicated that this was correct; however, doing so would require the operation of both boilers simultaneously during the winter months when heat demand is the highest. A more comprehensive analysis of the heating requirements and boiler system using current plant data was subsequently requested by IEUA, which confirmed the initial findings. IEUA noted that the risk of operating without a redundant backup boiler unit would not be acceptable. Therefore, IEUA requested that a new third boiler be added to the RP-1 boiler system as part of this project. In addition to adding the third boiler, IEUA also specified that the boiler system will need to operate as follows:

- All three of the boilers must have the ability to run on digester gas.
- During operation, the intent will be to run the two duty boilers solely on digester gas.
- Natural gas will be available to all three boilers as a backup in the event of an interruption to the digester gas supply.

This will require some modifications to the existing digester gas piping system to the boiler system. These changes will be included with the new boiler addition.

Specific work required for this task includes the following:

- 1. Perform a detailed analysis of the projected plant heat demand after addition of the APD system and compare it to the supply capacity of the existing boiler system factoring in the observed low water temperature for the most recent winter season as well as input from plant staff on actual heating demands observed for the existing digester system during the winter months. This analysis was performed following the DIM 9S, Anaerobic Digestion, workshop.
- 2. Review the existing gas system, hot water system, and Air Quality Management District (AQMD) requirements.
- 3. Obtain current digester gas data and coordinate with boiler vendors for suitable sizing. Digester gas data needs will include, but may not be limited to, major fixed gases (methane, carbon dioxide, oxygen, and nitrogen), British thermal unit content, and concentrations of sulfur compounds (including hydrogen sulfide), siloxanes and other volatile organic compound. These data will be used with vendor equipment information and the findings from the heat demand analysis to establish design criteria for the new boiler and required ancillary equipment.
- 4. Establish the site for the new boiler. This subtask will entail the following:
 - a. Locate available areas and coordinate with IEUA to identify potential sites.
 - b. Perform a site visit with IEUA staff to evaluate potential sites and land at a recommended location.
 - c. Conduct a virtual follow up meeting (i.e., MS Teams call) with IEUA to review the site visit findings. Develop consensus for a recommended site to move forward with during design.

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- 5. Evaluate the existing digester gas blower system to determine the modifications needed to accommodate the addition of the new boiler. This subtask will entail the following:
 - a. Obtain information from IEUA on the existing digester gas blowers. This will include the blower design criteria, existing control systems, and current operating practices/procedures.
 - b. Develop a process model for the digester gas system using the information obtained from IEUA. The model will assume the addition of a third digester gas blower will be needed to meet the gas supply requirements of the new boiler and provide the redundancy/reliability needed for the overall system. The model results will be used to recommend modifications to the blowers (e.g., upsizing, incorporation of variable frequency drives, etc. as appropriate) as well upsizing and/or modifications to the existing digester gas piping where needed.
 - c. Conduct a virtual follow up meeting (i.e., MS Teams call) with IEUA to review the process model findings and recommendations. Develop consensus for modifications to the digester gas system to incorporate into the design.
- 6. Develop design drawings, specifications, and opinion of probable cost for the new boiler and digester gas system modifications. The anticipated drawings to add to the project drawing set are presented in Table 1, and total 24.

Drawings and specifications for a new boiler were not provided in the 30 percent submittal, as the initial effort for this task had just begun at that stage. However, a planning level cost was developed at 30 percent. The effort to develop the cost at the 30 percent stage as well as the effort going forward to develop the drawings, specifications, and costs for the 60 percent, 90 percent, and 100 percent deliverable milestones are included in this task.

7. Incorporate construction requirements for the new boiler into the final version of DIM 13S, Preliminary Work Restrictions and Construction Schedule.

Deliverables:

- Drawings, specifications, and opinion of probable cost for the 60 percent, 90 percent, 100 percent design milestones. Drawings, specifications, and cost will be submittal in electronic format as part of the combined set.
- Incorporate selected boiler details and design criteria into the Final DIM 13S. The Final DIM 13S will be submitted in electronic format as per the original scope of work.

Task 3 – Update DIM 14, Digester Gas Beneficial Use Study

DIM 14 was originally developed as part of the 2019 PDR for RP-1 Liquids & Solids Capacity Recovery Project (EN24001 & EN24002). Per IEUA, this DIM was not updated as part of the current scope of work. However, IEUA has since provided recent updated review comments that they would like to have incorporated into an updated version of this document. Work to be conducted in this task will include incorporating the updated review comments into DIM 14 and reissuing the revised document to IEUA as DIM 14S, Digester Gas Beneficial Use Study.

<u>Deliverables</u>:

Updated Final DIM 14S submitted in electronic format.

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Task 4 - DAFT Rehabilitation and Modifications

The original scope of work included routing of scum from the Plant 2 Primary Clarifiers, Plant 3 Primary Clarifiers, and Secondary Clarifiers along with waste streams from the centrifuge wash cycle and digester cleaning lagoons directly to the new APD system. DAFTs 1 and 2 would be decommissioned and abandoned in place or demolished, as they would no longer be needed at RP-1. However, further analysis and discussions with IEUA conducted after the start of the project showed that rehabilitation of DAFTs 1 and 2 and modifying them for scum thickening upstream of the APD system could provide significant benefits; thickening the scum stream would reduce the flow volume to the APD system, which would decrease the required size of the APD units and the associated heat energy needed for operation/heating. In addition, thickening of scum in the rotary drum thickener (RDTs) is not recommended, as discussed in DIM 8S. Based on these findings, IEUA requested that the rehabilitation and modification of DAFTs 1 and 2 to provide scum thickening upstream of the APD system be incorporated into the project. During the DIM and 30 percent design review, a suggestion was made to consider scum concentrators instead of DAFTs for handling the scum. Accordingly, an evaluation of this treatment approach was carried out, which determined that rehabilitation of DAFTs 1 and 2 was still the preferred approach. Specific work required for this task includes the following:

- 1. Review the as-built drawings for DAFTs 1 and 2 to determine mechanical components that may need rehabilitation and/or modifications.
- 2. Perform a condition assessment and operational review of the DAFTs:
 - a. The initial direction from IEUA for rehabilitation of the DAFTs was to address the mechanical and structural components of the system and that the electrical and I&C (EI&C) elements would not need to be addressed. With this approach, a site visit was conducted on January 11, 2022, to determine the mechanical and structural rehabilitation/modifications needed to the extent possible while the DAFTs were in operation. Carollo personnel also coordinated with plant staff while onsite to identify additional mechanical changes that would improve operation of the system.
 - b. The approach above was carried through the 30 percent design submittal, after which IEUA provided direction that rehabilitation of the DAFT EI&C elements would also be needed. The decision to expand the effort beyond mechanical/structural stemmed from IEUA feedback indicating that the electrical was in poorer condition than initially thought, and that instrumentation and controls (I&C) was operationally limiting. The subtasks below will determine the EI&C rehabilitation needs and improvements for the DAFTs:
 - i. Site trip to perform the EI&C condition assessment and an operation review.
 - ii. Develop summary of findings and recommendations.
 - iii. Review meeting with IEUA staff to review finding/recommendations.

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- 3. Develop DIM 17S Dissolved Air Flotation Thickener System Rehabilitation:
 - a. Through the 30 percent design submittal, design criteria and requirements for the mechanical and structural rehabilitation/modification of DAFTs 1 and 2 along with a preliminary opinion of probable cost were developed. This information was incorporated into DIM 9S. Rehabilitation will entail demolition of existing DAFT mechanical components; replacement of mechanical components in kind with new unless otherwise stated; and concrete repairs as needed. Modifications rather than in-kind replacement will be made where appropriate to improve DAFT system operation or longevity; such modifications will be based on input from IEUA staff and equipment manufacturer recommendations as the design if further developed.
 - b. With the direction to add EI&C rehabilitation of the DAFTs, the decision was made to capture the DAFT rehabilitation requirements in a stand-alone DIM 17S document. The mechanical/structural findings and information developed as noted above will be migrated from DIM 9S to DIM 17S. Furthermore, DIM 17S will capture the following:
 - i. Scum Thickening Alternatives Analysis Following the 30 percent submittal review, IEUA requested an analysis of scum concentrators be performed as an option to the rehabilitation of the DAFTs. The findings indicated that rehabilitation of the DAFTs would still be the preferred option.
 - Develop of criteria and requirements for the EI&C elements of the DAFTs to allow rehabilitation and implementation of improvements, as appropriate.
 - iii. Preliminary opinion of probable cost.
- 4. Regular communication with IEUA's SCADA Migration Project team so that monitoring and control upgrades are incorporated into the SCADA upgrades for the DAFTs.
- 5. Develop design drawings, specifications, and opinion of probable cost for the rehabilitation and modifications to DAFTs 1 and 2. The anticipated drawings to add to the project drawing set are presented in Table 2, and total 35. Some of the new drawings were prepared and incorporated into the 30 percent design set to keep the project moving. Table 2 indicates which drawings were included and which still need to be developed.

The work already done for this project element includes Task 4 Subtasks 1, 2a, and 3a as described above, and development of the drawings noted in Table 2 for the 30 percent submittal. This work, along with the remaining anticipated effort to continue development of this project element through the 60 percent, 90 percent, and 100 percent deliverable milestones, is included in this task.

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Deliverables:

- Draft and Final DIM 17S submitted in electronic format.
- Drawings, specifications, and opinion of probable cost for the 60 percent, 90 percent, 100 percent design milestones. PCNs will also be developed and added to the specifications to address modified operation of DAFTs 1 and 2. Deliverable documents will be submitted in electronic format.

Scope of Work Assumptions:

- 1. Field condition assessments will consist of visual observations only. No power meter data collection, testing, ground testing, or voltage/current measurements will be completed.
- 2. Energized equipment will not be opened as part of the condition assessment.
- 3. It is assumed by the design and evaluation team that sufficient existing standby power is provided to the electrical distribution system for the DAFTs 1 and 2. Standby power condition assessment and recommendations are not part of the EI&C assessment.
- 4. DAFTs 1 and 2 equipment will be replaced with like kind and size.
- 5. Electrical distribution system capacity increase design is not included as part of this work.
- 6. EI&C condition assessment does not include SCADA improvements, programming, or radio path survey evaluation.
- 7. Complete or partial SCADA system cybersecurity analysis, patching, verification, and validation will not be provided.
- 8. Security, fire alarm, lightning protection, lighting, and audio-visual systems are not included in the condition assessment.
- 9. PLC cabinet as built drawing development is not included in this scope of work.
- 10. Design will not include CATV internet service, telephone service or system; or cathodic protection systems, additions, or modifications.
- 11. Electrical and control circuit wiring, cables, and conduit to be shown on single-line and control single-line diagrams.

Task 5 – Changes to Demolition Drawings

The original scope of work included evaluating the demolition of the Belt Press Building. However, IEUA noted at the start of the project that this item should be viewed as an optional element, as it could be removed depending on how its demolition might impact other ongoing plant projects and existing plant operations. As the design was carried through the 30 percent stage, it was determined that demolition of the Belt Press Building would be removed and deferred to a future project. As such, its corresponding demolition sheet will be removed from the drawing set; this is presented in Table 3.

A credit for this demolition sheet will be credited to the project, less the work already performed to develop it to the 30 percent design stage.

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Task 6 - Removal of 12 kV Electrical Building

The original scope of work included providing new 12 kV electrical service and a new electrical building to supply power to the new facilities in this project. However, a review of the existing RP-1 electrical infrastructure conducted during development of DIM 11S, Electrical, Instrumentation and Control, showed that the existing Power Reliability Building (PRB) has sufficient available capacity to meet these needs. IEUA agreed that the available capacity and facilities at the PRB could be allocated to this project, eliminating the need for a new service and a new electrical building. Therefore, the scope of work will be modified to remove the electrical building from the design and a credit will be issued to the project to reflect the reduced level of effort. The drawings to remove from the project drawing set are presented in Table 4; a total of 18.

Removal of the electrical building from the project did not eliminate the new electrical hardware needed for the new RDT and APD systems; these would now be housed in their entirety in the new Thickener Building. This necessitated increasing the size of the electrical room in the Thickening Building as well as the building itself. The added electrical hardware and revised building size also increased the magnitude and complexity of the building cooling requirements. To adequately design for the expanded cooling needs of the Thickener Building, additional HVAC sheets will be needed for the project. These are presented in Table 5; a total of 8 drawings to be added.

Based on the 18 drawings to be removed from the drawing set for the 12 kV electrical building and the 8 HVAC drawings to be added for the new Thickener Building, a net credit will be provided to the project for 10 deleted drawings.

Task 7 - Digestion Control Strategies

The original scope of work calls for developing PCNs for the new systems in this project to integrate the three-phase digestion process into the overall RP-1 system. However, IEUA has stated that the digester system will also need to retain the capability to operate as a single-phase process. IEUA is also currently conducting the separate SCADA Migration Project, which could affect or change some of the existing digester system controls. To minimize potential control continuity issues between this project and the SCADA Migration Project, while providing the operating flexibility desired, IEUA has requested that Carollo revise the PCN for the existing digester system after the changes from the SCADA Migration Project are completed so that the plant has the capability to operate in either single-phase or three-phase digestion modes. To this end, the following will be performed in this task:

- Revise the PCN for the existing digester system, as needed, once the changes from the SCADA
 Migration Project are complete that will allow single-phase operation as an option to three-phase
 operation.
- Conduct up to six review meetings with IEUA to review and comment on the PCNs. The intent of
 these additional meetings is to coordinate with IEUA I&C and plant staff so that consensus can be
 developed on a uniform control strategy and methodology that can be implemented to allow plant
 operation in either three-phase or single-phase digestion mode.

Deliverables:

Revised PCN for the existing digester system will be included in the final design specifications.

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Scope of Work Assumptions:

1. The PCN for the existing digester system will be revised, assuming that modifications to allow single-phase digestion operation can be implemented through programming or software control changes. Changes that require the modification of existing hardware/instrumentation or addition of new hardware/instrumentation are not included in this scope of work.

Task 8 - Update IEUA Asset Register

The original scope of work did not include updating the IEUA Asset Register, as our understanding was that IEUA would perform this update internally once the design is complete. However, IEUA has since requested that this be added to the project. Items to incorporate into the asset register include new mechanical equipment (motorized, electrically, pneumatically, or manually operated), new electrical equipment (MCCs, switchgear, transformers) as well as new instrumentation and control hardware for the following systems:

- DAFTs 1 and 2 and related support systems.
- APD and related support systems.
- Acid gas scrubbing system.
- RDT system and related support systems.
- New Boiler Unit and related support systems.
- New Odor Control System.
- Digester No. 1 (for components affected by this project).
- Primary Clarifier 3 Sludge Pumps (for components affected by this project).
- Secondary Clarifier Scum and Waste Activated Sludge Pumps (for components affected by this project).

Deliverables:

Updated IEUA Asset Register for IEUA RP-1 facility in MS Excel format.

Task 9 – Acid Digester Gas Scrubbing Evaluation

The original scope of work included the design of iron sponges to condition the digester gas generated from the new APD system so that that the conditioned gas could be conveyed to the existing RP-1 flare system. The initial work done for this project element consisted of an analysis of iron sponge media using hydrogen sulfide concentration data from RP-1 to confirm that the media life would be acceptable. However, the findings suggested a media life shorter than initially anticipated, with replacement at 85-day intervals potentially being needed. Subsequent discussions with IEUA lead to the recommendation to investigate other options including technology and configuration alternatives. The work done for this task includes the following:

- Coordination with equipment manufacturers to determine technology options.
- Develop preliminary configuration options suitable for RP-1 for media technologies (iron sponge in single and dual train configurations; PureAir media; SulfaTreat media) and biological treatment systems. Also develop preliminary capital and media replacement cost information for each alternative to allow comparison.

- Conduct a workshop with IEUA to review the findings and develop consensus on a recommended technology and configuration to move forward with in the project design.
- Prepare an Attachment to DIM 9S to document the comparison of acid digester gas technologies, selection of the preferred approach, and design criteria and budget cost estimate for the selected system.

Budget

The additional new facilities that are being added to the project described above, such as the new boiler system and rehabilitation of DAFTs 1 and 2, are expected to add approximately \$10.6 million to the project construction cost.

We have estimated a fee of \$880,393 to complete the associated work presented in the tasks described above. A summary of the budget by task is presented in Table 6, and a detailed breakdown of tasks with anticipated level of effort and cost is included in Exhibit A. Negative values shown in Table 6 indicate areas where scope was reduced.

Subject: RMPU Project Construction Contract Change Order Ratification

Executive Summary:

On June 16, 2021, the Board of Directors awarded the construction contract for the Project No. RW15003.06 to MNR Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$15,480,880 for the construction of the Wineville/Jurupa/Force Main groundwater recharge improvements. The project will yield approximately 2,921 acre-feet per year (AFY) of captured storm water and 2,905 AFY of recycled water for groundwater recharge. As part of the Recharge Master Plan Update (RMPU), Chino Basin Watermaster is fully funding the stormwater improvements with available SRF loans and nearly \$9.0 million in grants. During construction, MNR potholed the path of the new 30-inch force main pipeline on Jurupa Road and identified buried utilities not shown on the construction plans. These additional utilities required revisions to the bid documents to avoid conflicts. The changes resulted in added cost of materials and labor above MNR's bid price. Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) is requesting ratification of the change order in the amount of \$188,188.27 with MNR for the additional material cost for manufacturing the pipe to meet the revised alignment and avoid utility conflicts. Currently, IEUA is still in negotiation with MNR on the final price to implement the revised plans. Due to material availability concerns and to reduce delay on the project, IEUA is requesting ratification of the change order on just the 30-inch pipeline. This is a 1.2% increase to MNR's contract.

Staff's Recommendation:

1. Ratify the change order for the construction contract for the Wineville, Jurupa, Force Main, Project No. RW15003.06, to MNR Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$188,188.27.

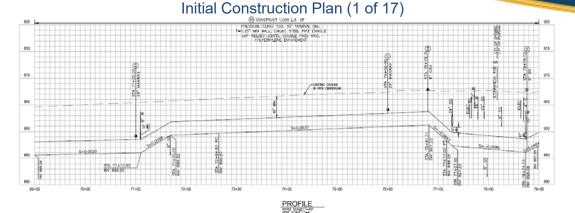

In May 2022, a Request for Proposal (RFP) RFP-GD-004 for federal legislative advocacy services was posted publicly on Planet Bids. A total of eight proposals were received. Following evaluation of the written proposals, the review committee held interviews with the six top scoring firms. - 3. <u>ORDER OF PRECEDENCE</u>: The documents referenced below represent the Contract Documents. Where any conflicts exist between the General Terms and Conditions the governing order of precedence shall be as follows:
 - 1. Amendments to Contract Number 4600003162.
 - 2. Contract Number 4600003162 General Terms and Conditions.

- 3. Agency Request for Proposal Number RFP-GD-22-004.
- 4. Contractor's Proposal dated April 25, 2022.
- 4. <u>SCOPE OF WORK AND SERVICES</u>: Contractor services and responsibilities shall include and be in accordance with the following:
 - A. Federal Government Advocacy Services shall be in accordance with the Agency's scope of work and services which is attached hereto as Exhibit B and Contractor's proposal attached as Exhibit A.
 - B. Contractor shall provide Agency with a Schedule of Work and Services, documenting the anticipated completion of the work within the timeframe set forth in Subsection 4.A., above. The Schedule of Work and Services will be prepared and submitted, to the Project Manager, for review and approval.
 - C. The Agency may, at any time, make changes to this Contract's Scope of Work; including additions, reductions, and other alterations to any or all of the Work. However, such changes shall only be made via written amendment to this Contract. The Contract compensation and Schedule of Work and Services shall be equitably adjusted, if required, to account for such changes and shall be set forth within the mutually approved Contract Amendment.
 - 1. <u>TERM</u>: The term of this Contract shall commence on July 1, 2022, and terminate on June 30, 2025, unless agreed upon by both parties, reduced to writing, and amended to this Contract. Agency hereby reserves the right to exercise two (2) one-year optional extensions to the Contract term. In the event the Agency desires to exercise the Contract extension option provided for in this Section, the Agency shall provide written notice to the Contractor, prior to the expiration of the original Contract term. If such option is exercised, the rates established within the fee schedule shall cease to be effective as of the first day of the "option" term.

5. PAYMENT, INVOICING, AND COMPENSATION:

- A. The Contractor may submit an invoice not more than once per month during the term of this Contract to the Agency's Accounts Payable Department. Agency shall pay Contractor's properly executed invoice, approved by the Project Manager, within thirty (30) days following receipt of the invoice.
- B. As compensation for the Work performed under this Contract, Agency shall pay Contractor's monthly invoice, for a total contract price NOT-TO-EXCEED \$7,000 per month for all services satisfactorily provided during the term of this Contract.
- C. Concurrent with the submittal of the original invoice to the Agency's Accounts Payable Department, the Contractor shall forward (mail, fax, or email) a copy

- of the invoice to the designated Project Manager, identified in Section 1, on Page 1 of this Contract.
- D. No Additional Compensation: Nothing set forth in this Contract shall be interpreted to require payment by Agency to Contractor of any compensation specifically for the assignments and assurances required by the Contract, other than the payment of expenses as may be actually incurred by Contractor in complying with this Contract, as approved by the Project Manager.
- E. Contractor shall invoice IEUA electronically for Federal Government Advocacy Services fees to IEUA's Accounts Payable Office at APGroup@ieua.org. Each invoice shall cite the Contractor's name, address, and remit to address, description of the work performed, the time period covered by the invoice, any related contract and/or purchase order numbers, and the amount of payment requested.
- 6. <u>CONTROL OF THE WORK</u>: The Contractor shall perform the Work in compliance with the Schedule of Work and Services. If performance of the Work falls behind schedule, the Contractor shall accelerate the performance of the Work to comply with the Schedule of Work and Services as directed by the Project Manager. If the nature of the Work is such that Contractor is unable to accelerate the Work, Contractor shall promptly notify the Project Manager of the delay, the causes of the delay, and submit a proposed revised Schedule of Work and Services.
- 7. <u>INSURANCE</u>: During the term of this Contract, the Contractor shall maintain, at Contractor's sole expense, the following insurance.
 - A. Minimum Scope of Insurance: Coverage shall be at least as broad as:
 - 1. Commercial General Liability ("CGL"): Insurance Services Office ("ISO") Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (ISO CG 25 03 or 25 04) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
 - 2. Automobile Liability: ISO Form Number CA 00 01 covering any auto (Code 1), or if Contractor has no owned autos, covering hired, (Code 8) and non-owned autos (Code 9), with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
 - 3. Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability: Workers' compensation limits as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.

- B. <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retention</u>: Any deductibles or self-insured retention must be declared to and approved by the Agency. At the option of the Agency, either: the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retention as respects the Agency, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers; or the Contractor shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration and defense expenses.
- C. <u>Other Insurance Provisions</u>: The insurance policies are to <u>contain</u>, or be <u>endorsed to contain</u>, the following provisions:
 - 1. Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Coverage
 - a. Additional Insured Status: The Agency, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Contractor including materials, parts or equipment supplied in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the Contractor's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85; or by either CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38 and CG 20 37 forms if later revisions are used).
 - b. Primary Coverage: The Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance coverage at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the Agency, its officer, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Agency, its officers, officials, employees, volunteers, property owners or engineers under contract with the Agency shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
 - c. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Agency, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
 - d. The Contractor's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
 - e. The Contractor may satisfy the limit requirements in a single policy or multiple policies. Any additional policies written as excess insurance shall not provide any less coverage than that provided by the first or primary policy.

2. Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability Coverage

Contractor hereby grants to Agency a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of the Contractor may acquire against the Agency by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the Agency has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.

3. All Coverages

Each insurance policy required by this Contract shall be <u>endorsed</u> to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled by either party, or reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Agency pursuant to Section 14, page 12 of this Contract.

- D. <u>Acceptability of Insurers</u>: Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A minus:VII, and who are admitted insurers in the State of California.
- E. <u>Verification of Coverage</u>: Contractor shall provide the Agency with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Agency before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Contractor's obligation to provide them. The Agency reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time.
- F. <u>Submittal of Certificates</u>: Contractor shall submit all required certificates and endorsements to the following:

- 8. FITNESS FOR DUTY:
 - A. <u>Fitness</u>: Contractor and its Subcontractor personnel on the Jobsite:
 - 1. Shall report to work in a manner fit to do their job;

- 2. Shall not be under the influence of or in possession of any alcoholic beverages or of any controlled substance (except a controlled substance as prescribed by a physician so long as the performance or safety of the Work is not affected thereby); and
- 3. Shall not have been convicted of any serious criminal offense which, by its nature, may have a discernible adverse impact on the business or reputation of the Agency.
- B. <u>Compliance</u>: Contractor shall advise all personnel and associated third parties of the requirements of this Contract ("Fitness for Duty Requirements") before they enter on the Jobsite and shall immediately remove from the Jobsite any employee determined to be in violation of these requirements. Contractor shall impose these requirements on its Subcontractors. Agency may cancel the Contract if Contractor violates these Fitness for Duty Requirements.

9. LEGAL RELATIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

- A. <u>Professional Responsibility</u>: The Contractor shall be responsible to the level of competency presently maintained by other practicing professionals performing the same or similar type of work.
- B. <u>Status of Contractor</u>: The Contractor is retained as an independent Contractor only, for the sole purpose of providing the services described herein, and is not an employee of the Agency.
- C. Observing Laws and Ordinances: The Contractor shall keep itself fully informed of all existing and future state and federal laws and all county and city ordinances and regulations which in any manner affect the conduct of any services or tasks performed under this Contract, and of all such orders and decrees of bodies or tribunals having any jurisdiction or authority over the same. The Contractor shall at all times observe and comply with all such existing and future laws, ordinances, regulations, orders and decrees, and shall protect and indemnify, as required herein, the Agency, its officers, employees and agents against any claim or liability arising from or based on the violation of any such law, ordinance, regulation, order or decree, whether by the Contractor, its employees, or subcontractors.
- D. <u>Subcontract Services</u>: Any subcontracts for the performance of any services under this Contract shall be subject to the written approval of the Project Manager and shall comply with State of California, Department of Industrial Relations, SB 854 requirements.
- E. <u>Hours of Labor</u>: The Contractor shall comply with all applicable provisions of California Labor Code Sections 1810 to 1815 relating to working hours. The Contractor shall, as a penalty to the Agency, forfeit \$25.00 for each worker

employed in the completion of the Contract by the Contractor or by any subcontractor for each calendar day during which such worker is required or permitted to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day and forty (40) hours in any one calendar week in violation of the provisions of the Labor Code.

- F. <u>Travel and Subsistence Pay</u>: The Contractor shall make payment to each worker for travel and subsistence payments which are needed to complete the work and/or service, as such travel and subsistence payments are defined in an applicable collective bargaining agreements with the worker.
- G. <u>Liens</u>: Contractor shall pay all sums of money that become due from any labor, services, materials or equipment provided to Contractor on account of said services to be rendered or said materials to be provided under this Contract and that may be secured by any lien against the Agency. Contractor shall fully discharge each such lien at the time performance of the obligation secured matures and becomes due.
- H. <u>Indemnification</u>: Contractor shall indemnify the Agency, its directors, employees, and assigns, and shall defend and hold them harmless from all liabilities, demands, actions, claims, losses and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, which arise out of, or are related to, the negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct of the Contractor, its directors, employees, agents, and assigns, in the performance of work under this contract.
- I. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>: No official of the Agency, who is authorized in such capacity and on behalf of the Agency to negotiate, make, accept or approve, or to take part in negotiating, making, accepting or approving this Contract, or any subcontract relating to services or tasks to be performed pursuant to this Contract, shall become directly or indirectly personally interested in this Contract.
- J. <u>Equal Opportunity</u>: During the performance of this Contract, the Contractor shall not unlawfully discriminate against any employee or employment applicant because of race, color, religion, sex, age, marital status, ancestry, physical or mental disability, sexual orientation, veteran status or national origin. The Agency is committed to creating and maintaining an environment free from harassment and discrimination.

K. Disputes:

1. All disputes arising out of or in relation to this Contract shall be resolved in accordance with this section. The Contractor shall pursue the work to completion in accordance with the instruction of the Agency's Project Manager notwithstanding the existence of a dispute. By entering into this Contract, both parties are obligated, and hereby agree, to submit all disputes arising under or relating to the Contract which remain

- unresolved after the exhaustion of the procedures provided herein, to independent arbitration. Except as otherwise provided herein, arbitration shall be conducted under California Code of Civil Procedure Sections 1280, et seq., or their successor.
- 2. Any and all disputes prior to the work starting shall be subject to resolution by the Agency's Project Manager; and the Contractor shall comply, with the Agency Project Manager instructions. Contractor is not satisfied with the resolution directed by the Agency Project Manager, they may file a written protest with the Agency Project Manager within seven (7) calendar days after receiving written directive of the Project Manager's decision. Failure by Contractor to file a written protest within seven (7) calendar days shall constitute waiver of protest, and acceptance of the Project Manager's resolution. The Project Manager shall submit the Contractor's written protests to the General Manager, together with a copy of the Project Manager's written decision, for his or her consideration within seven (7) calendar days after receipt of the protest-related documents. The General Manager shall make his or her determination with respect to each protest filed with the Project Manager within ten (10) calendar days after receipt of the protest-related documents. If Contractor is not satisfied with any such resolution by the General Manager, they may file a written request for arbitration with the Project Manager within seven (7) calendar days after receiving written notice of the General Manager's decision.
- 3. In the event of arbitration, the parties to this contract agree that there shall be a single neutral Arbitrator who shall be selected in the following manner:
 - a. The Demand for Arbitration shall include a list of five names of persons acceptable to the Contractor to be appointed as Arbitrator. The Agency shall determine if any of the names submitted by Contractor are acceptable and, if so, such person will be designated as Arbitrator.
 - b. In the event that none of the names submitted by Contractor are acceptable to Agency, or if for any reason the Arbitrator selected in Step (a) is unable to serve, the Agency shall submit to Contractor a list of five names of persons acceptable to Agency for appointment as Arbitrator. The Contractor shall, in turn, have seven (7) calendar days in which to determine if one such person is acceptable.
 - c. If after Steps (a) and (b), the parties are unable to mutually agree upon a neutral Arbitrator, the matter of selection of an Arbitrator shall be submitted to the San Bernardino County

Superior Court pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure Section 1281.6, or its successor. The costs of arbitration, including but not limited to reasonable attorneys' fees, shall be recoverable by the party prevailing in the arbitration. If this arbitration is appealed to a court pursuant to the procedure under California Code of Civil Procedure Section 1294, et seq., or their successor, the costs of arbitration shall also include court costs associated with such appeals, including but not limited to reasonable attorneys' fees which shall be recoverable by the prevailing party.

- 4. Association in Mediation/Arbitration: The Agency may join the Contractor in mediation or arbitration commenced by a contractor on the Project pursuant to Public Contracts Code Sections 20104 et seq. Such association shall be initiated by written notice from the Agency's representative to the Contractor.
- L. <u>Workers' Legal Status</u>: For performance against this Contract, Contractor shall only utilize employees and/or subcontractors that are authorized to work in the United States pursuant to the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986.
- 10. OWNERSHIP OF MATERIALS AND DOCUMENTS/CONFIDENTIALITY: The Agency retains ownership of any, and all, partial or complete reports, drawings, plans, notes, computations, lists, and/or other materials, documents, information, or data prepared by the Contractor and/or the Contractor's subcontractor(s) pertaining to this Contract. Said materials and documents are confidential and shall be available to the Agency from the moment of their preparation, and the Contractor shall deliver them to the Agency whenever requested to do so by the Project Manager and/or Agency representative. The Contractor agrees that all documents shall not be made available to any individual or organization, private or public, without the prior written consent of an Agency representative.

11. TITLE AND RISK OF LOSS:

- A. <u>Documentation:</u> Title to the Documentation shall pass to the Agency when prepared; however, a copy may be retained by Contractor for its records and internal use. Contractor shall retain such Documentation in a controlled access file, and shall not reveal, display, or disclose the contents of the Documentation to others without the prior written authorization of the Agency or for the performance of Work related to the Scope of Work described in this Contract.
- B. <u>Material:</u> Title to all Material, field or research equipment, and laboratory models, procured or fabricated under the Contract shall pass to the Agency when procured or fabricated, and such title shall be free and clear of any and

- all encumbrances. Contractor shall have risk of loss of any Material or Agency-owned equipment of which it has custody.
- C. <u>Disposition:</u> Contractor shall dispose of items to which the Agency has title as directed, in writing, by the Project Manager and/or an Agency representative.

12. PROPRIETARY RIGHTS:

- A. <u>Rights and Ownership:</u> Agency's rights to inventions, discoveries, trade secrets, patents, copyrights, and other intellectual property, including the Information and Documentation, and revisions thereto (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Proprietary Rights"), used or developed by Contractor in the performance of the Work, shall be governed by the following provisions:
 - 1. Proprietary Rights conceived, developed, or reduced to practice by Contractor in the performance of the Work shall be the property of Agency, and Contractor shall cooperate with all appropriate requests to assign and transfer same to Agency.
 - 2. If Proprietary Rights conceived, developed, or reduced to practice by Contractor prior to the performance of the Work are used in and become integral with the Work, or are necessary for Agency to have complete control of the Work, Contractor shall grant to Agency a non-exclusive, irrevocable, royalty-free license, as may be required by Agency for the complete control of the Work, including the right to reproduce, correct, repair, replace, maintain, translate, publish, use, modify, copy or dispose of any or all of the Work and grant sublicenses to others with respect to the Work.
 - 3. If the Work includes the Proprietary Rights of others, Contractor shall procure, at no additional cost to Agency, all necessary licenses regarding such Proprietary Rights so as to allow Agency the complete control of the Work, including the right to reproduce, correct, repair, replace, maintain, translate, publish, use, modify, copy, or dispose of any or all of the Work; and to grant sublicenses to others with respect to the Work. All such licenses shall be in writing and shall be irrevocable and royalty-free to Agency.
- 13. <u>NOTICES</u>: Any notice may be served upon either party by delivering it in person, or by depositing it in a United States Mail deposit box with the postage thereon fully prepaid, and addressed to the party at the address set forth below:

Any notice given pursuant to this section shall be deemed effective in the case of personal delivery, upon receipt thereof, or, in the case of mailing, at the moment of deposit in the course of transmission through the United States Postal Service.

- 14. <u>SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS</u>: All of the terms, conditions and provisions of this Contract shall take effect to the benefit of and be binding upon the Agency, the Contractor, and their respective successors and assigns. No assignment of the duties or benefits of the Contractor under this Contract may be assigned, transferred, or otherwise disposed of, without the prior written consent of the Agency; and any such purported or attempted assignment, transfer, or disposal without the prior written consent of the Agency shall be null, void, and of no legal effect whatsoever.
- 15. PUBLIC RECORDS POLICY: Information made available to the Agency may be subject to the California Public Records Act (Government Code Section 6250 et seq.) The Agency's use and disclosure of its records are governed by this Act. The Agency shall use its best efforts to notify Contractor of any requests for disclosure of any documents pertaining to this work. In the event of litigation concerning disclosure of information Contractor considers exempt from disclosure; (e.g., Trade Secret, Confidential, or Proprietary) Agency shall act as a stakeholder only, holding the information until otherwise ordered by a court or other legal process. If Agency is required to defend an action arising out of a Public Records Act request for any of the information Contractor has marked "Confidential," "Proprietary," or "Trade Secret," Contractor shall defend and indemnify Agency from all liability, damages, costs, and expenses, in any action or proceeding arising under the Public Records Act.

Development; Department of Health and Human Services; Department of Homeland Security;
Federal Emergency Management Agency; Department of the Interior; Bureau of Reclamation; Fish
and Wildlife Service; Department of Justice; Department of Transportation; Federal Aviation
Administration; Federal Transit Administration; Department of Veterans Affairs; and Environmental
Protection Agency.

We also regularly coordinate with regional and national associations exploring every available avenue toward advancing our clients' priorities.

Our Results- Spotlight on Water

Our record of accomplishments is strong. We take great care to ensure that client priorities are well orchestrated through every level of an agency and beyond. We leverage our technical expertise and solid relationships within regional and headquarters levels of an agency and the Office of the Secretary, the White House, and OMB. Given the long review, study, and construction schedules endemic to the federal process, it is not unusual to see shifts in the way the government does business while a project is winding its way through the authorization-and-appropriation process. Such shifts, no matter how major or minor, can have an impact. Our job includes foreseeing these bumps in the road and doing what is necessary to ensure that projects stay on track.

Taking a team-oriented, full-service approach, we have developed multiyear advocacy campaigns aimed at grassroots opinion leaders and congressional delegations alike to foster both public and political support for client projects as priority candidates for federal funding. Below are some examples of our efforts that involved our use of a coordinated congressional and agency approach to achieve the desired outcomes on behalf of our clients.

WIIN-Title XVI. The Title XVI program at Reclamation is an incredibly important program for water utilities in the arid West to obtain federal funding for water reuse and recycling, conservation, and drought projects. In December of 2016, Congress passed the "Water Infrastructure for Improvements to the Nation Act" (WIIN), that created a competitive grant program under the Title XVI grant program for newly, non-Congressionally authorized reuse and recycling projects. While at a previous firm, Laura Morgan-Kessler worked extensively with a coalition of water districts on getting this language included in the bill, as well as ensuring that the House and Senate Appropriations Committees provided funding in the annual Energy and Water Appropriations bill. Now that the \$50 million that was authorized in the WIIN Act has been appropriated, we are closely involved in the efforts to reauthorize the WIIN-Title XVI program and provide additional funding in the future.

Bureau of Reclamation Grants. For Western states, Reclamation's WaterSMART program can be an important financial resource for water resiliency efforts. Through our consistent engagement in the annual congressional appropriations process and our grants support, we have helped to create and monitor opportunities for our clients to secure critical federal funding. For example, we helped deliver six grant



awards from Reclamation providing a combined \$6.4M over three years for the Long Beach Water Department.

COVID-19 Fiscal Recovery Funds Tax Issue. The American Rescue Plan Act included \$350 billion for COVID-19 State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds. This funding was allocated to every city and county throughout the country. The State of California chose to use a portion of its funding to establish utility assistance program. Concerns were raised by many utilities throughout the state that this funding assistance would trigger tax implications, and thus require utilities to issue 1099 tax forms to all recipients. When our water clients raised this issue with us, we immediately started working the phones. We reached out to California Congressional offices, including Senators Dianne Feinstein and Alex Padilla to raise this issue. We also coordinated with national associations to raise the profile of this concern. As a result of these efforts, the Internal Revenue Service issued clarification guidance that this funding would not be considered taxable.

WIFIA. We have worked with clients to navigate and submit letters of interest (LOI) for the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) program at the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). We have helped our clients seek clarification on project eligibility prior to submission of an LOI, which has resulted in their projects being selected to move forward in EPA's WIFIA review process.

Drought Response Plans. Our longtime representation of Valley Water has resulted in hundreds of millions of dollars to reduce flood risks in Silicon Valley. And while the challenge of preparing for flood waters remains a top priority for the agency, they also need to prepare for times when there is not enough water. To that regard, we have been assisting Valley Water to advance large scale water supply projects through Reclamation and a recent award from Reclamation's drought planning grant program is helping Valley Water to improve water supply reliability during times of shortage. We regularly arrange for Valley Water officials to meet with Reclamation in Washington, D.C. and those frequent meetings have helped Valley Water to tell its story and be successful in securing federal grants.

Joint Project Authority. Scoggins Dam at Hagg Lake, located in Washington County, Oregon, is one of the most seismically at-risk facilities in Reclamation's facility inventory. Clean Water Services and the Tualatin Basin Water Supply Partners were looking to not only address the seismic and safety issues with Scoggins Dam, but also create additional storage capacity to address the water needs of a growing Washington County. Unfortunately, Reclamation did not have the statutory authority to consider any additional benefits to a facility in the Safety of Dams program. As a result of a multi-year Congressional lobbying effort by Laura Morgan-Kessler at a previous firm, language was included in an appropriations bill that would allow for Reclamation to consider additional benefits while concurrently addressing seismic issues. Obtaining this language was a critical step for moving this project forward.

Tax-Exempt Municipal Bonds. At the end of 2017, Congress was working to pass a tax reform package. There were many in Washington, D.C. who wanted to cap or eliminate tax-exempt municipal bonds. This move would have presented local governments throughout the country with significant financial challenges to fund necessary projects. On behalf of our public entity clients, we were actively involved in the efforts to ensure that no changes were made to tax- exempt municipal bonds in the bill.

Army Corps of Engineers Project Authorization and Funding. When homes were originally being built the town of Desert Hot Springs in the 1950s, located in the Coachella Valley, they were hooked up to septic tanks. As a community that relies heavily on groundwater for both its drinking water supply, as well as to support their economy (boutique spas with naturally hot water), this became a significant cause for concern. In the 1990s, the local water district (Mission Springs Water District) decided to embark on a septic abatement



program to ensure the future safety of the groundwater supply. After obtaining an initial Corps of Engineers study authorization in the Water Resources Development Act in 2000, the Water District was ready to move the project towards construction. While at a previous firm, Laura Morgan-Kessler worked closely with the District's congressional delegation, as well as the Corps, to successfully get construction authorization included in the 2007 WRDA bill. To date, the District has received over \$8 million in federal funding and been able abate 4,500 parcels, install 33 miles of sewer and prevent 782 million gallons of sewage from percolating into the ground water annually.

Coronavirus Relief Fund. In the CARES Act, Congress established the \$150 billion Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) for states and local governments with populations of about 500,000. The Treasury Department was interpreting the legislation in a manner that would have prevented 12 counties throughout the country, including Fresno County, who had a population above 500,000 from being eligible for funding. We took the initiative to contact the impacted counties and created an informal coalition to lobby against the Department's interpretation. Through conference calls, development of advocacy tools, and a coordinated campaign targeting Congress, the White House, and the Department of Treasury, we successfully reversed the interpretation. All 12 counties were deemed eligible entities, and each received a direct CRF allocation amounting to millions in fiscal relief from the Treasury Department.



OUR APPROACH

Scope of Service

We propose the following strategic path to help IEUA achieve its federal priorities. Built into the plan is the necessary flexibility to accommodate changes in Washington, D.C., as well as issues that may emerge at the local level. When it comes to Washington, issues that appear straightforward never are. Success requires a nimble approach capable of coordinating multiple federal agencies that operate in silos. We view our relationships with our clients as being an extension of their team and the approach below indicates the activities we will initiate on your behalf.

Strategic planning and consultation. Upon selection, we would schedule a virtual intensive strategic planning session with IEUA. Knowing your issues in detail helps us to establish strong, value-added relationships based on trust on a variety of policies and topics. This is the starting point for any successful advocacy strategy. We would use this opportunity to review IEUA's current legislative agenda, discuss project and regulatory priorities with IEUA leadership and meet with elected officials and staff as appropriate. We would present the IEUA with an assessment of opportunities and challenges in Washington, D.C., as well as insight on the legislative climate and political dynamics. We would also evaluate IEUA's current federal presence with a view toward maximizing advocacy potential and increasing IEUA's federal footprint. We have experience planning for and preparing legislative agendas for local government clients. We work to synchronize IEUA's federal agenda with what Congress and the federal agencies will be doing, including those unanticipated issues that need attention but are not specifically delineated in the agenda. Once finalized, we ensure the priority issues are communicated to Congress and the federal agencies.

Maintain relationships with Congress and federal agencies. As your "boots on the ground" in Washington, D.C., we will ensure that IEUA's federal projects and priorities are front and center with Congress, the Administration, and relevant federal agencies. We will ensure that federal decision-makers view us as an extension of IEUA in Washington, D.C. and are an available resource to them at any time to discuss funding, legislative, and regulatory priorities. Additionally, we will use our extensive network of congressional and federal agency relationships to extend IEUA's reach well beyond your congressional delegation. We will work to help raise your profile with the federal government and be viewed as a thought leader on important issues. We work regularly with authorizing and appropriating committee staff in both the House and the Senate. We are also in frequent communication with the Administration, numerous federal agencies, and OMB. We will serve as a liaison between IEUA and your Congressional delegation.

Legislative and regulatory advocacy. We closely track all federal activity as it relates to local government entities. We will keep IEUA abreast of any legislation or potential legislation that could affect your residents. We will provide legislative text, detailed bill analysis, and status updates on federal legislation of importance. We also monitor the *Federal Register* daily for any new federal agency regulatory actions that may be of interest to our clients. We will ensure that IEUA is made aware of all pending federal regulatory actions that could have either a positive or negative impact on your operations or your residents. We will work to prepare detailed and thoughtful comments in



response to proposed federal agency regulations, sharing these comments with your Congressional delegation.

Federal funding advocacy and grant support. IEUA does not have unlimited financial resources, and as such, federal funding is critical for IEUA operations and to maintain services for your customers. We will closely monitor the President's budget and the annual Congressional appropriations process, providing IEUA with a detailed summary and funding levels of programs of importance. We will work with the IEUA to ensure that your Congressional delegation is aware of the IEUA's annual appropriations priorities and community project requests, complete and submit all appropriations request forms, and work to get the delegation to sign onto appropriations Dear Colleague letters. Additionally, we understand the dynamics of the federal grant process and have secured numerous grants for local communities. Our work has involved identifying appropriate grants, assisting with the preparation and submittal of grants, and the necessary advocacy with the federal agencies. We will work with your grant writers to tailor a grants management strategy that looks to specific programs and expected grant offerings. We will provide timely notice of federal grant announcements and share all materials relevant to the grants. We will also organize meetings for you with those federal agency decision-makers. This will help IEUA position its grant proposals, understand an agency's priority focus for funding, and develop relationships with federal decision makers. In addition, we work very closely with a grants management firm that identifies federal grant opportunities.

In-Person and virtual visits. You are your own best advocates. We want IEUA to be personally involved in your Washington, D.C. advocacy. We will support all facets of IEUA's advocacy trips to ensure the most advantageous use of your time. Whether traveling to Washington, D.C. or doing a virtual visit, we will accommodate your needs. Working with IEUA, we will prepare a list of potential dates and targeted meetings in Washington, D.C. We can help schedule meetings, in-person or via video conferencing, including meetings with IEUA's congressional delegation, key committee staff, and relevant federal agency officials. We will keep IEUA apprised of meetings as they are secured. In addition, we will assist in the preparation of associated white papers, letters, and talking points. Even in a virtual world, we will accompany IEUA to all your meetings with federal decision-makers.

Communication. We believe that communication is key to the successful implementation of your federal advocacy goals. We maintain regular contact with our clients, both through email and phone calls. This accessibility and communication will be critical to the success of IEUA's legislative platform. We recognize both short- and long-term trends in funding opportunities before they become apparent and will work with IEUA to connect priorities with those federal opportunities. We will monitor key legislation, congressional hearings, grant opportunities, and regulations that affect IEUA and its priorities. We are committed to providing regular written reports that outline the monitoring of key legislative initiatives related to IUEA's legislative agenda. These reports will detail any actions that we have taken on your behalf with Congress or the Administration. We will closely monitor legislative and regulatory developments in Washington, D.C. (including tracking discussions, drafts, emerging issues, research reports and other activities that may ultimately affect legislation, regulations, or other client interests) and promptly convey through email, conference call or report, as directed, whatever we learn that is important to IEUA. As with our other clients, we will use all available technology to bridge the geographic and temporal divide separating California and Washington, D.C.

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SECTION 1 - SUBMITTAL INFORMATION

- A. <u>INTRODUCTION</u>: The Inland Empire Utilities Agency ("Agency") is a regional wastewater treatment agency that provides sewage treatment for the cities located within the west end of San Bernardino County. Additionally, the Agency serves as a supplemental source of potable water and recycled water to the same geographic area. The Agency was incorporated in June 1950, under the Municipal Water District Act of 1911, as a municipal corporation. The Agency's service area encompasses approximately 242 square miles, including the Cities of Chino, Chino Hills, Fontana, Montclair, Ontario, Rancho Cucamonga, and Upland: and several of the unincorporated areas of western San Bernardino County.
 - 1. The Agency has a dedicated team of approximately 300 professionals, operating five regional water recycling facilities that treat approximately 50 million gallons of wastewater per day. - B. <u>DESCRIPTION OF WORK:</u> The Inland Empire Utilities Agency ("IEUA" or "Agency") is accepting electronic proposals through PlanetBids for Federal Government Advocacy Services. - F. <u>INTERPRETATION OF DOCUMENTS</u>: During the Proposal solicitation period, should an Offeror find discrepancies or omissions in the specifications of the "Request for Proposals," or should the Offeror be in doubt as to their interpretation, the Offeror shall immediately notify the contact indicated in Section 1(C). Should it be found necessary, an addendum will be posted on PlanetBids. Any addenda issued prior to the scheduled Proposal closing date and time, shall form a part of this solicitation and shall become a part of the submitted Proposal.

- G. **PROPOSAL FEES**: Offeror's shall submit a fully-burdened fee schedule, for each task or specific skill category required to provide the Contractor's Services, clearly identifying the firm's staff classifications by category, by hourly billing rates, and any associated administrative costs.
- H. - J. <u>PUBLIC RECORD</u>: Be advised that all information contained in proposals submitted in response to this solicitation, shall become a matter of public record, be subject to the California Records Act of 2004 (Government Code Section 6250 et seq.), and the information's use and disclosure are governed by this Act.
- K. <u>ACCEPTANCE AND PAYMENT</u>: The selected Offeror's invoice(s), subsequent to the completion of a valid and binding contract, shall include a specific reference to the Contract Number, the associated Purchase Order number, and be accompanied by detailed supporting documentation. The Agency shall pay the Offeror's properly executed invoice, subject to approval by the Project Manager, within thirty (30) days following receipt of the invoice.
- L. <u>INSURANCE</u>: The Contractor shall furnish IEUA with certificates of insurance and with original endorsements effective coverage required by IEUA for themselves and all subcontractors, prior to commencing work or allowing any subcontractor to commence work under any subcontract. The certificates and endorsements for each insurance policy are to be signed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. All certificates and endorsements are to be approved by IEUA before work commences. IEUA reserves the right to require complete. Certified copies of all required insurance policies, at any time. The minimum scope of insurance required:

- 1. General Liability: Insurance Services Office (ISO) Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence \$2,000,000 aggregate. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (ISO CG 25 03 or 25 04) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
- 2. Automobile Liability: ISO Form Number CA 00 01 covering any auto (Code 1), or if Contractor has no owned autos, covering hired, (Code 8) and non-owned autos (Code 9), with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 3. Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability: Workers' compensation limits as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.

- M. RELEASE OF LIABILITY: The selected Offeror shall execute a Release of Liability form. Contractor Agrees and understands that the Contractor's personal property, if left at any of the Agency's sites, during the course of the Work, may be exposed to the risk of, but not limited to theft, fire damage, water damage, and wind damage; for which the Contractor agrees to assume any and all such risk, and consequences as a result thereof. The Contractor shall be responsible for the completion of the Agency's Waiver/Release of Liability form (see Section 4) as part of a complete proposal.
- N. <u>CONTRACT EXECUTION(S)</u> / <u>EXCEPTIONS</u>: The selected Offeror shall execute a contract with the Agency which establishes the terms and conditions covering the services provided. Executive Summary:

An estimated 35 percent of the Agency's workforce will be eligible for retirement within five years. In addition to risks created by the impending retirements, we depend on critical positions requiring specialized certifications that provide operational reliability. As the need to secure our future work force continues, the Agency has expanded its workforce development efforts to include participation in IE Works, a collaborative between local water and wastewater agencies to increase the number of highly qualified candidates for mission-critical positions in the water/wastewater industry, while promoting equity across the Inland Empire. As a signatory of IE Works, the Agency continues to work collaboratively with IE Works to ensure that the region will have the reliable workforce needed to serve the community. Additionally, as a signatory of IE Works, the Agency can elect to continue participating as either a customer or a governing member. Staff is recommending that the Agency participate in IE Works as a customer.

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BYLAWS OF IEWORKS

ARTICLE 1 PRINCIPAL OFFICE

The principal office of the corporation is located at 855 Base Line Road, Rialto, California.

ARTICLE 2 MEMBERSHIP

Section 2.01 Classification of Members. The corporation shall have one class of voting members, designated as "Voting Members," with voting rights as specified in these Bylaws. The qualifications of or eligibility requirements for membership and the rights and obligations of members shall be as provided in these Bylaws or under applicable law. The Board of Directors ("Board") may, by resolution, establish one or more classes of nonvoting members, and provide for their rights and obligations. The Board may establish dues for voting and nonvoting members. Unless otherwise stated or established, members of the corporation are the agencies, and not the respective representatives that are designated by the agency.

- Section 2.02 Qualifications for Membership. Water agencies, community-based organizations, collective bargaining units, community college districts, and other water companies in the state of California shall be eligible to be voting members of the corporation.
- Section 2.03 Admission of Members. Any application for membership must be made in writing and may be submitted to the Board at any time. The Board, or a person or committee authorized by the Board, will review each application and, if appropriate, will certify that the applicant meets the qualifications for membership. Membership shall begin upon such certification and agreement to pay applicable member dues. Processes and procedures for confirmation and approval of the admission of new members shall be set by resolution of the Board.
- **Section 2.04 Membership Dues, Fees, and Assessments**. Each member must pay, within the time and on the conditions set by the Board, the dues, fees, and assessments in amounts to be fixed by the Board. Such dues, fees, and assessments shall be computed by a formula applied for all members of the class.
- **2.04.1 Tiered Membership Status**. The corporation may create a tier of membership(s) that require fees that are non-uniform in nature and creates a special designation for those member agencies that accept such designation and fees. Such fees and designations shall be set by resolution of the Board.
- **Section 2.05 Members in Good Standing**. Those members who have paid the required dues, fees, and assessments, if any, and who are not suspended, shall be members in good standing of the corporation.

- **Section 2.06 Membership Roster**. The corporation shall keep a membership roster containing the name and last known street address, telephone number, and e-mail address of each member. The roster shall indicate whether the member is in good standing. A copy of the membership roster shall be kept at the corporation's principal place of business.
- **Section 2.07 Nonliability of Members**. No member of the corporation shall be personally liable for the debts, liabilities, or obligations of the corporation.
- **Section 2.08 Transferability of Memberships**. No member may transfer a membership or any rights arising therefrom, and all rights as a member shall cease upon the member's dissolution.
- Section 2.09 Designated Representatives. Any members of the corporation that are organizations shall exercise all of the rights and obligations of membership, including the right to vote, through a designated representative. Each member organization shall designate its representative in a writing executed by an authorized officer of the organization and delivered to the Secretary of this corporation. Such written designations shall be retained with the membership records of the corporation. Member organizations may change their designated representatives at any time, with 24 hours' written notice prior to any vote of the Board.
- **Section 2.10 Ex-Officio Members**. The corporation may, as it desires, appoint ex-officio members that are not selected representatives of any respective member agency ("Ex-Officio"). Unless otherwise provided for, these members shall be voting members. There are no membership dues, fees, or assessments required to maintain the membership of ex-officio members. The nomination, election, termination, and ability to function without ex-officio members shall be done pursuant to Section 5.04 of these Bylaws.
- **Section 2.11 Basis for Termination**. Membership in the corporation shall terminate upon the occurrence of any of the following:
- (a) A member's failure to pay dues, fees, or assessments (if any), within sixty (60) days after such member is sent written notice of failure to pay. A member may avoid suchtermination by paying the amount of delinquent dues or fees within the sixty-day period.
- **(b)** A member's failure to continue to meet the qualifications for membership set forth in these Bylaws.
- (c) Upon a good faith determination by the Board that continued participation by the member in the corporation is not in the best interests of the corporation or in furtherance of its purposes.
- **Section 2.12 Termination Procedures**. The following procedures shall apply in the case of a suspension or termination under parts (c) or (d) of subsection 2.11.1 above.
- **2.12.1** The Board shall give the member at least 15 days' prior written notice of the suspension or termination, the reasons for it, the effective date, and the date, time, and place (if any) of the hearing described in the next subsection. Notice given by mail must be given by first-class or registered mail to the last address of the member shown on the corporation's records.

- **2.12.2.** The member shall be given an opportunity to be heard, either orally or in writing, not less than five days before the effective date of the proposed suspension or termination, by the Board or a committee authorized by the Board to decide whether the proposed suspension or termination will take place. If the member does not appear and has not notified the Secretary of any adequate reason for not appearing, the suspension or termination shall be effectiveautomatically on the proposed date of suspension or termination.
- **2.12.3** Following the hearing date, the Board or the committee authorized by the Board shall decide whether the member should in fact be terminated, suspended, or sanctioned in some other manner. The member shall be promptly notified of the decision, and that decision shall be final. If the membership is terminated, all membership rights of such member in the corporation shall cease on the effective date in the written notice given pursuant to this Section.
- **2.12.4** The Board may determine whether any prorated refund of dues shall be paid upon termination under this Section.

ARTICLE 3 MEMBERSHIP RIGHTS

- **Section 3.01 Voting Rights**. Members of the corporation shall have the right to vote, as set forth in these Bylaws, on:
 - (a) the election of directors;
- **(b)** the removal of directors without cause, pursuant to California Corporations Code Section 5222;
- (c) any amendment to these Bylaws that materially and adversely affects member voting rights, and any amendment to the Articles of Incorporation, except for amendments permitted to be adopted by the Board alone under California Corporations Code Section 5812(b);
 - (d) the disposition of all or substantially all of the assets of the corporation;
 - (e) any merger of the corporation;
 - (f) any dissolution of the corporation; and
- **(g)** any other matters that are properly presented to the members for a vote, pursuant to the Corporation's Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, Board Resolution, or by operation of the law.

Section 3.02 Inspection Rights

- **3.02.1** Articles and Bylaws. The corporation shall keep at its principal office in Rialto, California, current copies of its Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws, which shall be open to inspection by members during regular business hours of the business.
- **3.02.2** Accounting Records and Minutes. On written request, any member (in person or through an agent or attorney) may inspect and copy the accounting books and records of the corporation, at any reasonable time, for a purpose that is reasonably related to the member's interests as a member.
- **3.02.3** Review of Records by Members of the Public. All agendas, minutes, and supporting documents will be made available for review and inspection by any member of the public as required by the California Brown Act.
- **3.02.4 Membership Records**. The right of members to have access to membership records shall be governed by California Corporations Code Sections 6330 through 6332.
- **Section 3.03 Other Rights**. In addition to the rights described in these Bylaws, members of the corporation shall have any other rights afforded voting members under the California Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation Law.

ARTICLE 4 MEMBER MEETINGS AND VOTING

- **Section 4.01 Brown Act**. The meetings of the corporation shall be subject to the Ralph M. Brown Act (Chapter 9 commencing with section 54950) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Cal. Govt. Code) ("Brown Act").
- **Section 4.02 Member Vote**. Each member in good standing shall have one vote on each matter on which members are entitled to vote.
- **Section 4.03 Annual Member Meetings**. Members shall hold an annual meeting at a date, place, and time determined by the Board for the purpose of electing directors and transacting such business as may be brought before the meeting. Any annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be noticed as a regular meeting under the requirements of the Brown Act.

Section 4.04 Time and Manner of Notice of Regular Meetings.

- **4.04.1** Regular meetings of the corporation's Board of Directors shall be noticed and conducted in-line with the requirements of the Brown Act. The corporation shall, by resolution, provide the time and place for regular meetings. If an otherwise regular meeting is held at a time or place other than that specified for regular meetings, it is a special or emergency meeting. At least 72 hours prior to a regular meeting the corporation shall post an agenda containing a brief general description of the items to be discussed or transacted at the meeting.
- **4.04.2** Non-Agendized Items. Any items not agendized pursuant to the Brown Act may only be considered by the Board during a regular meeting if within the exceptions codified in Cal. Gov't. Code § 54954.2.
- **4.04.3 Public Comment**. The corporation shall provide an opportunity for members of the public to address the Board before or during the Board's consideration of an item.
- 4.04.4 Notice to Any Voting Members. The Secretary shall give written notice of each member meeting to each member who, as of the record date for notice of such meeting, would be entitled to vote at such meeting. The notice shall be delivered to the last addressor e-mail address provided by the member to the corporation for purposes of notice, either personally, by electronic transmission, or by first class, registered, or certified mail not less than ten (10), nor more than ninety (90), days before the date of such meeting, or by any other mail not less than twenty (20), nor more than ninety (90), days before the date of such meeting. Notice shall not be given by electronic transmission by the corporation after either of the following: (a) the corporation is unable to deliver two consecutive notices to the member by that means, or (b) the inability to so deliver the notices to the member becomes known to the Secretary, any assistantsecretary, the transfer agent, or other person responsible for the giving of the notice.

Section 4.05 Special Meetings of Members

- **4.05.1** Special meetings of the corporation's Board of Directors shall be noticed and conducted in-line with the requirements of the Brown Act.
- **4.05.2 Who May Call Special Meetings**. Special meetings of the members may be called by the presiding officer, or a majority of the members of the Board.

- 4.05.3 Procedures for Calling Special Meetings Requested by Members. If a special meeting is called by the presiding officer or a majority of the Board, the requesting members shall deliver a written notice specifying the business proposed to be transacted along with the time and place of the special meeting. Any special meeting must be noticed pursuant to the Brown Act, at least twenty-four (24) hours before the time of the meeting. All special meetings must be conducted pursuant to the Brown Act.
- **4.05.4 Public Comment**. The corporation shall provide an opportunity for members of the public to address the Board before or during the Board's consideration of an item.
- **Section 4.06** Meetings Called Pursuant to Emergency Situation. The corporation may call emergency meetings without abiding by regular notice requirements of the Brown Act in emergency situations as provided for by Cal. Gov't. Code § 54956.5.
- **Section 4.07 Closed Session**. The corporation may hold closed sessions during its meetings as provided for by the Brown Act. All closed session items must be properly agendized pursuant to the requirements of the Brown Act. After a closed session meeting, the corporation shall reconvene to open session and report any action taken as required by the Brown Act.
- **Section 4.08 Contents of Agenda of Meeting**. The notice shall state the place, date, and time of the meeting and in the case of special meetings, the general nature of the business to be transacted, and no other business may be transacted. In the case of the annual meeting, the notice shall state the names of all those who are nominees for director as of the date of the notice, and those matters which the Board, as of the date of the notice, intends to present for action by the members, but any proper matter may also be presented at the annual meeting.
- **Section 4.09 Congregations or Writings as Meetings**. The majority of the Board of Directors of the corporation shall not meet, discuss items, take action, or sign a document binding the corporation at a congregation that is not noticed or conducted pursuant to the Brown Act, or via written means (including e-mail) outside of a meeting of the Board of Directors in violation of the Brown Act.
- **4.09.1 Exceptions.** So long as members of the Board do not discuss amongst themselves specific issues within the jurisdiction of the corporation, the following meeting types shall not constitute a violation of the Brown Act if a majority of the Board is present:
 - (a) Conferences/Retreats
 - **(b)** Other Public Meetings
 - (c) Meetings of other Legislative Bodies
 - (d) Social/Ceremonial Occasions (See Cal. Gov't. Code § 54952.2).
- **4.09.2 Serial Meetings**. Communications that involve less than a quorum, but when taken as a whole, involve a majority of the Board of Directors, are prohibited.
- **Section 4.10 Record Dates.** For any notice, vote at a meeting, or exercise of rights, the Board may, by advance resolution, fix a record date and only members of record on that date shall be entitled to such notice, vote, or exercise of rights, notwithstanding anytransfer of any membership

on the books of the corporation after the record date, except as otherwise required by law. For this purpose, a person or organization holding a membership as ofthe close of business on the record date shall be deemed to be a member of record.

- **4.10.1 Notice of Record Dates of Meetings**. Unless otherwise fixed by the Board, the record date for the purpose of determining which members are entitled to notice of any member meeting, shall be the business day of the corporation preceding the date on which notice for that meeting is given. If the Board, by resolution, fixes a record date for notice, the record date shall not be less than ten (10), nor more than ninety (90), days before the date of the meeting.
- **4.10.2 Voting at Meetings.** Unless otherwise fixed by the Board, the record date for determining which members are entitled to vote at any member meeting shall be the date of that meeting. If the Board, by resolution, fixes a record date for voting, the record date shall not be more than sixty (60) days before the date of the meeting.
- **4.10.3** Other Lawful Action. Unless otherwise fixed by the Board, the record date for determining which members are entitled to exercise any rights in respect to any other lawful action shall be the date on which the Board adopts the resolution relating thereto or the sixtieth (60th) day before the date of such other lawful action, whichever is later. If the Board, by resolution, fixes a record date for determining entitlements, the record date shall not be more than sixty (60) days before the date of such other lawful action.
- **Section 4.11 Notice of Certain Actions Required**. Approval by the members of any of the following actions, other than by unanimous approval by those entitled to vote, is valid only if the notice of the meeting at which the vote occurred specified the general nature of the action: (a) to remove a director without cause, (b) to fill a vacancy on the Board, (c) to amend the corporation's Articles of Incorporation, or (d) to voluntarily dissolve the corporation.
- **Section 4.12 Member Quorum.** Fifty percent (50%) of members then in effect, or seven (7) members of the full thirteen-member Board of Directors (if at full capacity) shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at a meeting of voting members. However, in no event shall the required quorum be less than two directors. A meeting at which a quorum was initially present may continue to conduct business notwithstanding the withdrawal of enough members to leave less than a quorum, so long as any action taken thereafter is approved by a majority of the required quorum.
- **Section 4.13** Acts of the Members. Every decision or act made or done by a majority of voting members present and voting at a duly held meeting at which a quorum is present is the act of the members, unless the law, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws, require a greater number.

Section 4.14 Manner of Voting

- **4.14.1 Voting at Meetings**. Voting at meetings must be done by voice, and may not be done by secret ballot.
- **4.14.2 Proxy Voting Prohibited**. Proxy voting shall not be permitted on any vote put to the members.
 - **4.14.3** Cumulative Voting Prohibited. Cumulative voting shall not be permitted.

- **Section 4.15** Adjournments and Continuances. Regular and Special meetings may be adjourned to a later date. The Board must observe requirements of the Brown Act in any adjournment and later continuance of the meeting.
- **Section 4.16** Curing of Brown Act Violations. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of a timely demand to cure a Brown Act violation, the corporation shall either (1) cure or (2) inform an interested party in writing of its decision not to cure. If the corporation takes no action within the thirty-day period, it will be deemed to be a decision not to cure, and the corporation must give the interested party information regarding its decision not to sure. (See Cal. Gov't. Code § 54960.1)
- **Section 4.17 Electronic Meetings**. A meeting of the members may be conducted, in whole or in part, by electronic transmission or by electronic video screen communication as provided by the Brown Act.
- **4.17.1 Public Health Emergencies**. At any time that the national, state, or local authorities have found that there is a public health emergency necessitating social distancing, all meetings may be held on a virtual platform. The meeting shall still be noticed, agendized, and held pursuant to the Brown Act, and any applicable state or local public health orders, executive orders, and other applicable orders.

ARTICLE 5 BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- Section 5.01 Powers. The corporation shall have powers to the full extent allowed by law. Subject to any limitations in the Articles of Incorporation or these Bylaws relating to actions requiring approval by the members, all powers and activities of the corporation shall be exercised and conducted by or under the direction of the Board. The Board may delegate the management of activities of the corporation to any person or persons, management company, or committee however composed, provided that the activities and affairs of the corporation shall be managed, and all corporate powers shall be exercised under the ultimate direction of the Board.
- Section 5.02 Number and Qualification of Directors. The number of directors shall be thirteen members with the exact authorized number of directors to be fixed by resolution of the Board and shall be composed as follows: up to eight (8) seats for water/wastewater agencies, up to two (2) seats for community-based groups, two (2) seats for Ex-Officio directors, and one (1) seat for an IEWorks student/alumnus or worker representative. Any amendment to the preceding sentence shall require the approval of the members. With the exception of the initial directors appointed by the incorporator, all directors shall be chosen from among the signatory and Ex-Officio members of the Corporation.
- **5.02.1 Selection of Student/Alumni Members**. Selection and appointment of Student/Alumni Members shall be governed by the procedure and process fixed by resolution of the Board of Directors of the Corporation.
- Section 5.03 Election and Term of Office of Directors. Except for the initial directors appointed by the incorporator, Ex-Officio directors, and the Student/Alumni Member, the directors of the corporation shall be representatives selected by their respective member agency and shall serve for a term of two (2) years. Directors designated by a member agency shall hold office until a successor has been elected and qualified.
- **Section 5.04 Ex-Officio Members**. Ex-Officio members do not require designation by any respective member agencies, and unless stated otherwise, shall be voting members on the Corporation's Board of Directors. The nomination, election, termination, and operation of the Corporation without Ex-Officio members shall be done pursuant to this Section.
- **5.04.1 Nomination of Ex-Officio Members**. Ex-Officio members of the Board of Directors shall be nominated by the regular (non-Ex-Officio) members of the Board of Directors. A nomination shall be made by one member of the Corporation's regular (non-Ex-Officio) Directors and shall be seconded or confirmed by a separate member of the regular (non-Ex-Officio) Directors of the Corporation.
- **5.04.2 Election and Term of Ex-Officio Members**. After nomination, Ex-Officio members of the Board of Directors shall be elected by a simple majority vote (51%) the regular (non-Ex-Officio) members of the Board of Directors and shall serve for a term of five (5) years.
- **5.04.3 Existing Ex-Officio Members**. Channing Hawkins and Gracie Torres are recognized by the corporation as ex-officio members due to the integral role each played in the formation of the corporation. Both Existing Ex-Officio members are granted voting status on the Board of Directors.

- **5.04.4 Operation of Corporation without Ex-Officio Members**. In the instance the Corporation, through its Board of Directors elects to operate with Ex-Officio Members, the two (2) seats allocated for Ex-Officio members shall be reallocated as follows: One (1) seat shall become an additional seat to be filled by a water/wastewater agency, one (1) seat shall become an additional seat to be filled by a community-based group.
- **5.04.5 Termination of Ex-Officio Members**. Membership of Ex-Officio Members in the corporation shall automatically terminate at the end of the five (5) year term or shall terminate if a written notice memorializing an Ex-Officio Member's desire to resign is served on the Corporation before the member's term expires. The Corporation also may terminate the Ex-Officio member's membership upon a good faith determination that continued participation by the Ex-Officio Member is not in the best interests of the corporation or the furtherance of its purpose by a simple majority vote (51%) of its non-Ex-Officio members of its Board of Directors.
- **Section 5.05 Limitation on Interested Persons.** No more than 49% of the directors of the corporation may be interested persons. An interested person is:
- (a) any person currently being compensated by the corporation for services rendered to it within the previous twelve months, whether as a full-time or part-time employee, independent contractor, or otherwise, excluding any reasonable compensation paid to a director in his or her capacity as director; and
- **(b)** any brother, sister, ancestor, descendant, spouse, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, mother-in-law, or father-in-law of any such person.
- **Section 5.06 Vacancies.** A vacancy shall be deemed to exist on the Board whenever the actual number of directors is less than the authorized number for any reason. Vacancies may be filled by the remaining directors (unless the vacancy was created by removal of a director by the members) or by the members for the unexpired portion of the term.
- **Section 5.07 Resignation**. Resignations shall be effective upon receipt in writing by the President, the Secretary, or the Board unless a later effective date is specified in the resignation. Except upon notice to the California Attorney General, no director may resign if the corporation would be left without any duly elected directors.
- **Section 5.08 Removal**. The members may remove any director at any time, with or without cause. Removal of a director shall require a majority of all voting members at the time of the decision.
- **Section 5.09 Annual and Regular Meetings**. Annual meetings of the Board shall be held at least once a year. Annual meetings shall be called by the presiding officer or any two directors and noticed in accordance with Section 4.03. The time and place of regular meetings of the Board shall be set by resolution by the corporation and shall be noticed pursuant to the Brown Act.
- **Section 5.10 Special Meetings**. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the presiding officer, or a majority of the Board of the corporation and shall be noticed and conducted pursuant to Section 4.05.
- Section 5.11 Notice of Annual and Special Meetings. Notice of the annual meeting and any special meetings of the Board shall state the date, time, and place of the meeting and shall be

given to each director at least four days before the meeting if given by first-class mail or forty-eight (48) hours before the meeting if delivered personally or by telephone, including a voice messaging system, or by other electronic transmission such as e-mail. All other meetings shall be noticed pursuant to Section 4.05 of these bylaws.

Section 5.12 Waiver of Notice. Notice of a meeting need not be given to any director who, either before or after the meeting, signs a waiver of notice, a written consent to the holding of the meeting, or an approval of the minutes of the meeting. All such waivers, consents, and approvals shall be filed with the corporate records or made a part of the minutes of the meeting. Notice of a meeting need not be given to any director who attends the meeting without protestingthe lack of notice before or at the beginning of the meeting.

Section 5.13 Action at a Meeting; Quorum. Fifty percent (50%) of the directors then in office, or seven (7) members if the Board is at full capacity (thirteen members) shall constitute a quorum of the Board for the transaction of business. However, in no event shall the required quorum be less than two directors. Every action taken or decision made by a majority of the directors present ata meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board, except as otherwise provided in Section 5.05 (filling Board vacancies), Section 5.13 (taking action without a meeting), Section 6.01 (appointing Board Committees), Section 8.03 (approving self-dealing transactions), Section 9.02 (approving indemnification), and Section 10.08 (amending Bylaws) of these Bylaws or in the California Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation Law. Directors at a meeting at which a quorum is initially present may continue to transact business, despite the withdrawal of directors, if any action taken or decision made is approved by at least a majority of the required quorum for such meeting, or a greater number as required by law or by these Bylaws.

Section 5.14 Telephone and Electronic Meetings. Directors may participate in a meeting through use of conference telephone or video screen communication so long as all participating directors can hear each other. Directors may participate in a meeting through the use of other electronic transmission so long as all of the following apply:

- (a) each director participating in the meeting can communicate concurrently with all of the other directors, and
- **(b)** each director is provided with the means of participating in all matters before the Board, including the capacity to propose, or to interpose an objection to, a specific action to be taken by the corporation.

Section 5.15 Standard of Care. A director shall perform the duties of a director, including duties as a member of any Board Committee, in good faith, in a manner such director believes to be in the best interest of the corporation and with such care, including reasonable inquiry, as an ordinarily prudent person in a like position would use under similar circumstances.

In performing such duties of a director, a director shall be entitled to rely on information, opinions, reports, or statements, including financial statements and other financial data, in each case prepared or presented by:

- (a) one or more officers or employees of the corporation whom the director believes to be reliable and competent as to the matters presented;
 - (b) counsel, independent accountants, or other persons as to matters which the

director believes to be within such person's professional or expert competence; or

(c) a committee upon which the director does not serve composed exclusively of any or any combination of directors, persons described in paragraph (a), or persons described in paragraph (b), as to matters within its designated authority, provided that the director believes such committee merits confidence; so long as in any such case, the director acts in good faith after reasonable inquiry when the need therefor is indicated by the circumstances and without knowledge that would cause such reliance to be unwarranted.

Except as provided in California Corporations Code Section 5233, a person who performs the duties of a director in accordance with this Section shall have no liability based upon any alleged failure to discharge that person's obligations as a director, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, any actions or omissions which exceed or defeat a public or charitable purpose to which the corporation, or assets held by the corporation, are dedicated.

Section 5.16 Investments. Except with respect to assets held for use or used directly in conducting the corporation's public or charitable programs, in investing, reinvesting, purchasing, acquiring, exchanging, selling, and managing the corporation's investments, the Board shall avoid speculation, looking instead to the permanent disposition of the funds, considering the probable income, as well as the probable safety of the corporation's capital. No investment violates this Section where it conforms to provisions authorizing such investment contained in an instrument or agreement pursuant to which the assets were contributed to the corporation.

Section 5.17 Inspection. Every director shall have the absolute right at any reasonable time to inspect and copy all books, records, and documents, and to inspect the physical properties of the corporation.

Section 5.18 Compensation. The directors shall not be compensated for their services as directors. The Board may authorize the advance or reimbursement to a director of actual reasonable expenses incurred in performing his or her duties as a director, including expenses forattending meetings of the Board and Board Committees.

ARTICLE 6 COMMITTEES

Section 6.01 Standing Board Committees. The Board may, by resolution adopted by a majority of the directors then in office, create one or more Standing Board Committees, to serve at the pleasure of the Board. Appointments to such Board Committees shall be by a majority vote of the directors then in office. Meetings of Standing Committees shall be conducted pursuant to the Brown Act. Standing Board Committees may be given all the authority of the Board, except for the powers to:

- (a) set the number of directors within a range specified in these Bylaws;
- **(b)** elect directors or remove directors without cause;
- (c) create any other Board Committees or appoint the members of any Board Committees;
- (d) fill vacancies on the Board or any Board Committee;
- (e) fix compensation of directors for serving on the Board or any Board;
- **(f)** amend the Articles of Incorporation;
- (g) amend or repeal these Bylaws or adopt new Bylaws;
- (h) amend or repeal any resolution of the Board which by its express terms is not so amendable or repealable; or approve any merger, reorganization, voluntary dissolution, or disposition of substantially all of the assets of the corporation.

Section 6.02 Advisory Committees. The Board may establish Advisory Committees to the Board. The members of any Advisory Committee may consist of directors or non-directors and may be appointed as the Board determines. Advisory Committees may not exercise the authority of the Board to make decisions on behalf of the corporation but shall be restricted to making recommendations to the Board or Board Committees and implementing Board or Board Committee decisions and policies under the supervision and control of the Board or Board Committee.

Section 6.03 Audit Committee. For any tax year in which the corporation is required to have an audit pursuant to Section 10.05, because it has gross revenues of \$2,000,000 or more, the corporation shall have an Audit Committee appointed by the Board. The Audit Committee may include both directors and non-directors, subject to the following limitations: (a) a majority of the members of the Audit Committee may not consist of members of the Finance Committee; (b) the chair of the Audit Committee may not be a member of the Finance Committee; (c) the Audit Committee may not include any member of the staff or the President or Treasurer; (d) the Audit Committee may not include any person who has a material financial interest in any entity doing business with the corporation; and (e) Audit Committee members may not receive compensation greater than the compensation paid to directors for their Board service.

6.03.1 Advisory Committees Subject to Brown Act. The following types of Advisory Committee meetings shall be conducted pursuant to the requirements of the Brown Act:

(a) Advisory Committee meetings composed of members of the Board of Directors

and non-members of the Board of Directors. (i.e., corporation staff, non-voting members of the corporation, worker representatives)

- **(b)** Advisory Committee meetings where more than a quorum of the Board of Directors is present
- (c) Advisory Committee meetings where the committee has continuing jurisdiction over specific issues presented to the corporation.
- (d) Advisory meetings that has a regular meeting schedule fixed by the corporation's Board of Directors.
- **6.03.2** Advisory Committees not Subject to the Brown Act Where an Advisory Committee is composed solely of less than a quorum of members of the Board of Directors, and has a limited term objective, the meeting need not be noticed or conducted pursuant to the Brown Act. ("Ad Hoc Committee")
- **Section 6.04 Meetings of Board Committees**. Meetings and actions of Board Committees shall be governed by the provisions of Article 5 of these Bylaws concerning meetings adactions of the Board with such changes in the content of those Bylaws as are necessary to substitute the Board Committee and its members for the Board and its members. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting of a Board Committee and shall be filed with the corporate records.
- Section 6.05 Meetings of Advisory Committees. Advisory Committees may determine their own meeting rules and whether minutes shall be kept, subject to the authority of the Board.

ARTICLE 7 OFFICERS

Section 7.01 Officers. The officers of the corporation shall be a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers with such titles and duties as shall be determined by the Board. Any number of offices may be held by the same person, except that neither the Secretary nor the Treasurer may serve concurrently as the President or the Chair of the Board. All officers shall be elected from among the directors of the corporation.

Section 7.02 Election. Except for the initial officers appointed by the incorporator, who shall serve as long as required by the Corporation, the officers of the corporation shall be elected by the Board and shall serve for two (2) years, at the pleasure of the Board.

7.02.1 Process for Election. The election of officers shall be fixed pursuant to the process and procedure set forth by resolution by the board of directors of the corporation.

Section 7.03 Vacancies. A vacancy in any office for any reason shall be filled in the same manner as these Bylaws provide for election to that office.

Section 7.04 Resignation. Any officer may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Board. The resignation shall take effect on the date the notice is received or at any later time specified in the notice. Any resignation shall be without prejudice to any rights of the corporation under any contract to which the officer is a party.

Section 7.05 Removal. The Board may remove any officer with or without cause.

Section 7.06 President. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the corporation and shall, subject to the control of the Board, generally supervise, direct, and control the corporation's activities, affairs, and officers. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board. The President shall have the general powers and duties of management usually vested in the office of President of the corporation and shall have such other powers and duties as may be prescribed by the Board or these Bylaws.

Section 7.07 Vice President. The Vice President shall, in the absence of the President, perform all the duties of the President and shall have such other powers and duties as may be prescribed by the Board or these Bylaws.

Section 7.08 Secretary. The Secretary shall keep or cause to be kept a full and complete record of the proceedings of the members and the Board and its committees, shall supervise the giving of such notices as may be proper or necessary, shall keep or cause to be kept the minute books of the corporation, shall keep or cause to be kept a record of the corporation's members, and shall have such other powers and duties as may be prescribed by the Board or these Bylaws.

Section 7.09 Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the chief financial officer of the corporation and shall keep and maintain, or cause to be kept and maintained, adequate and correctbooks and accounts of the corporation's properties and transactions. The Treasurer shall supervise the charge and custody of all funds of the corporation, shall supervise the deposit of such funds inthe manner prescribed by the Board, shall render reports and accountings as required, and shall have such other powers and duties as may be prescribed by the Board or these Bylaws.

ARTICLE 8 CERTAIN TRANSACTIONS

Section 8.01 Loans. The corporation shall not lend any money or property to, or guarantee the obligation of, any director or officer, except as permitted by California Corporations Code Section 5236. The corporation may, however, advance money to a director or officer of the corporation or of its parent or any subsidiary for expenses reasonably anticipated to be incurred in the performance of the duties of such director or officer so long as such individual would be entitled to be reimbursed for such expenses absent that advance.

Section 8.02 Self-Dealing Transactions. The Board shall not approve or permit the corporation to engage in any self-dealing transaction, except as provided in Section 8.03 below. A self-dealing transaction is a transaction to which the corporation is a party and in which one or more of its directors has a material financial interest and which is not described in California Corporations Code Section 5233(b).

Section 8.03 Approval. Pursuant to California Corporations Code Section 5233(d), the corporation may engage in a transaction that would otherwise be a self-dealing transaction if the transaction is approved by a court or by the California Attorney General; or if the Board determines, before the transaction, that:

- (a) the corporation is entering into the transaction for its own benefit;
- (b) the transaction is fair and reasonable to the corporation at the time; and
- (c) after reasonable investigation, the Board determines that it could not have obtained a more advantageous arrangement with reasonable effort under the circumstances.

Such determinations must be made by the Board in good faith, with knowledge of the material facts concerning the transaction and the director's interest in the transaction, and by a vote of a majority of the directors then in office, without counting the vote of the interested director or directors.

Where it is not reasonably practicable to obtain approval of the Board before entering into a self-dealing transaction, a Board Committee may approve such transaction in a manner consistent with the requirements above; provided that, at its next meeting, the full Board determines in good faith that the Board Committee's approval of the transaction was consistent with the requirements above and that it was not reasonably practicable to obtain advance approval by the full Board, and ratifies the transaction by a majority of the directors then in office without counting the vote of any interested director.

ARTICLE 9 INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE

Section 9.01 Right of Indemnity. To the fullest extent allowed by law, the corporation may indemnify its agents against all expenses, judgments, fines, settlements, and other amounts actually and reasonably incurred by them in connection with any proceeding by reason of the factthat such person is or was an agent of the corporation. "Agent" shall have the same meaning as inCalifornia Corporations Code Section 5238(a) and shall include the corporation's directors, officers, employees, and other agents. "Proceeding" shall have the same meaning as in Section 5238(a) and shall include any threatened, pending, or completed action or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative; "expenses" shall have the same meaning as in Section 5238(a) and shall include reasonable attorneys' fees.

Section 9.02 Approval of Indemnity. On written request to the Board by any agent seeking indemnification, to the extent that the agent has been successful on the merits, the Board shall promptly authorize indemnification in accordance with California Corporations Code Section 5238(d). Otherwise, the Board shall promptly determine, by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of directors who are not parties to the proceeding, whether the agent has met the applicable standard of conduct stated in Section 5238(b) or Section 5238(c), and, if so, may authorize indemnification to the extent permitted thereby. If the Board cannot do so because there is no quorum of directors who are not a party to the proceeding for which indemnification is sought the Board shall promptly call a meeting of the members. At that meeting, the members shall determine whether, in the specific case, the applicable standard of conduct in Section 5238(b) or Section 5238(c) has been met, and, if so, the members shall authorize indemnification to the extent permitted thereby.

Section 9.03 Advancing Expenses. The Board may authorize the advance of expenses incurred by or on behalf of an agent of the corporation in defending any proceeding prior to final disposition, if the Board finds that:

- (a) the requested advances are reasonable in amount under the circumstances; and
- **(b)** before any advance is made, the agent submits a written undertaking satisfactory to the Board to repay the advance unless it is ultimately determined that the agent is entitled to indemnification for the expenses under this Article.

Section 9.04 Insurance. The corporation shall have the power to purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any agent against any liability asserted against or incurred by the agent in such capacity or arising out of the agent's status as such, and such insurance may provide for coverage against liabilities beyond the corporation's power to indemnify the agent under law; provided, however, that the corporation shall have no power to purchase and maintain such insurance to indemnify any agent of the corporation for a violation of California Corporations Code Section 5233.

ARTICLE 10 MISCELLANEOUS

Section 10.01 Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the corporation shall end each year on June 30. Each fiscal year shall begin on July 1.

Section 10.02 Contracts, Notes, and Checks. All contracts entered into on behalf of the corporation must be authorized by the Board or the person or persons on whom such power may be conferred by the Board. Except as required by law, every check, draft, promissory note, money order, or other evidence of indebtedness of the corporation shall be signed by the person or personson whom such power may be conferred by the Board.

Section 10.03 Representation of Corporate Shares. The President and Vice President of the corporation are each authorized to vote, represent, and exercise on behalf of the corporationall rights incident to any and all shares of any other corporation held by the corporation. The authority hereby granted to these officers may be exercised either by such officers in person or by any other person authorized to do so by proxy or power of attorney duly executed by said officers.

Section 10.04 Annual Reports to Members and Directors. The Treasurer shall provide an annual written report to all of the members and directors within 120 days after the end of the corporation's fiscal year. The report shall contain the following information:

- (a) the assets and liabilities, including the trust funds, of the corporation as of the end of the fiscal year;
 - **(b)** the principal changes in assets and liabilities, including trust funds, during the fiscal year;
 - (c) the revenue or receipts of the corporation, both unrestricted and restricted to a particular purpose, for the fiscal year;
- (d) the expenses or disbursements of the corporation, for both general and restricted purposes, for the fiscal year;
- (e) any transaction during the previous fiscal year between the corporation (orits parent or subsidiary, if any) and any of its directors or officers (or the directors or officers of itsparent or subsidiary, if any) or any holder of more than ten percent of the voting power of the corporation (or its parent or subsidiary, if any), involving (i) more than \$50,000 or (ii) any of a number of such transactions, which in the aggregate involved more than \$50,000, in which the same person had a direct or indirect material financial interest. For each transaction, the report must disclose the names of the interested persons involved in such transaction, stating such person's relationship to the corporation, the nature of such person's interest in the transaction and, where practicable, the value of such interest; and
- (f) the amount and circumstances of any indemnifications or advances aggregating more than \$10,000 paid during the fiscal year to any director or officer of the corporation pursuant to California Corporations Code Section 5238; provided that no such report need be made in the case of indemnification approved by the members pursuant to California Corporations Code Section 5238(e).

This annual report shall be accompanied by any report thereon of independent accountants or, if there is no such report, the certificate of an authorized officer of the corporation that such statements were prepared without an audit from the books and records of the corporation.

Section 10.05 Required Financial Audits. The corporation shall obtain a financial audit by an independent certified public accountant for any tax year in which it receives or accrues gross revenues of \$2,000,000 or more, excluding income from any governmental entity for which the governmental entity requires an accounting. Any audited financial statements obtained by the corporation shall be made available for inspection by the Attorney General and the general public within nine months after the close of the fiscal year to which the statements relate.

Section 10.06 Electronic Transmissions. Subject to procedures that the Board may adopt, the term "written" and "in writing" as used in these Bylaws includes electronic transmissions, such as facsimile or e-mail, provided that: (a) for electronic transmissions from the corporation, the corporation has obtained an unrevoked written consent from the recipient to the use of such means of communication; (b) for electronic transmissions to the corporation, the corporation has in effect reasonable measures to verify that the sender is the individual purporting to send the transmission; and (c) for electronic transmissions both from and to the corporation, thetransmission creates a record that is capable of retention, retrieval, and review, and may be rendered into clearly legible tangible form.

Section 10.07 Maintenance of Certain Records. The corporation shall keep at itsprincipal office the original or a copy of its Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws as amended to date. The corporation shall keep its accounting books and records, and minutes of the proceedings of the members, Board, and Board Committees at its principal office or at such other place as designated by the Board. The minutes and the accounting books and records shall be kept either in printed form or in any other form capable of being converted to printed form within a reasonabletime. A record of each member's name, address, telephone number, email address, and class of membership shall also be kept at the principal office of the corporation or at such other place as designated by the Board.

Section 10.08 Amendments. Amendments to these Bylaws may be adopted by the vote of a majority of the directors then in office or by the unanimous written consent of the directors, provided that the members must approve any Bylaws amendment that would materially and adversely affect the rights of the members as to voting or transfer. Proposed bylaw amendments shall be submitted in writing to each director at least one week prior to their vote on or written consent to such amendments.

Section 10.09 Governing Law. In all matters not specified in these Bylaws, or in the event these Bylaws shall not comply with applicable law, the California Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation Law, and the California Brown Actas then in effect shall apply.

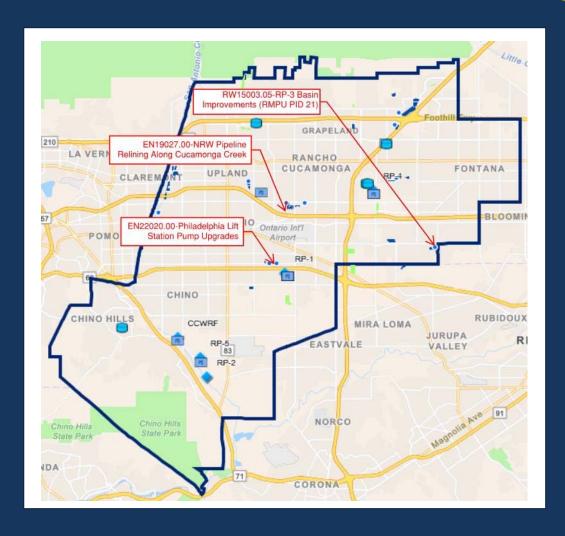

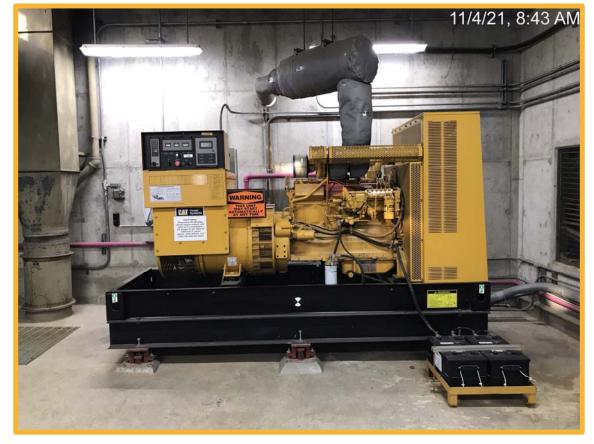




Project Location Map

Supreme Court Curtails EPA Powers

In one of the final cases of the term, the Supreme Court handed down a ruling related to the Environmental Protection Agency's authority to regulate carbon emissions from existing power plants. In a 6 to 3 opinion, the Supreme Court curbed EPA's powers to broadly regulate carbon emissions through a narrow reading of the Clean Air Act.

In 2015, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) promulgated the Clean Power Plan rule, which addressed carbon dioxide emissions from existing coal- and natural-gas fired power plants. For authority, the Agency cited Section 111 of the Clean Air Act, which, although known as the New Source Performance Standards program, also authorizes regulation of certain pollutants from existing sources under Section 111(d).

The Supreme Court stayed the Clean Power Plan in 2016, preventing the rule from taking effect. The Trump administration repealed the rule, which never went into effect, in 2019 saying the plan had exceeded the EPA's statutory authority.

In the case, the Court said there is "every reason to 'hesitate before concluding that Congress' meant to confer on EPA the authority it claims under Section 111(d)." The Court held that the EPA's authority did not extend to determining the "best system of emission reduction" as identified in the Clean Power Plan.

The 6-3 ruling interpreting the US Clean Air Act is likely to keep the administration from imposing the type of wide-ranging emissions-cutting plan the EPA tried to put in place when Barack Obama was president. The ruling could have a broad impact and affect other regulatory agencies.

The majority said that, while the EPA can regulate power plant emissions, the agency can't try to shift power generation away from fossil-fuel plants to cleaner sources, as Obama's Clean Power Plan sought to do. Writing for the court, Chief Justice John Roberts said Congress needs to speak more explicitly to give an agency that much power.

Roberts pointed to the major questions doctrine, saying "we presume that Congress intends to make major policy decisions itself, not leave those decisions to agencies."

The Supreme Court case grew out of a group of legal challenges to the Trump rule. A federal appeals court in Washington said the Trump plan was based on an overly restrictive read of the EPA's authority.

That prompted backers of the Trump rule -- companies including Westmoreland Mining Holdings, and 19 Republican-led states led by West Virginia -- to turn to the nation's highest court. Their appeal said the lower court ruling would let the EPA remake the US electric system, going well beyond what Congress intended when it enacted the Clean Air Act in 1970.

Biden Administration Unveils CWA Section 401 Certification Rule Update

On June 1, the Biden administration unveiled a proposal that would give states more veto power over interstate pipelines, highways, coal terminals, and other projects that it thinks could pollute water within their borders—a rollback of a Trump-era regulation.

If finalized, the Environmental Protection Agency's proposed Water Quality Certification Improvement Rule (https://www.epa.gov/cwa-401/proposed-clean-water-act-section-401-water-quality-certification-improvement-rule) would scrap the Trump administration's 2020 Clean Water Act Section 401 Certification Rule, which remains in effect and resulted in a cascade of litigation that reached US Supreme Court earlier this year.

The Clean Water Act gives states the right to certify any federally-permitted infrastructure project that might discharge pollution into protected stream waters or wetlands. Under the Biden administration's proposal, a state would be allowed to determine whether "any aspect" of an entire federally-licensed pipeline or other project will comply with its water quality standards and then deny certification of the project within state borders if it chooses.

States and tribes would also be able to waive certification, grant it, or do so with conditions.

That's a change from the Trump rule, which limits each state's scope of review to specific possible point-sources of water pollution associated with a federally-licensed infrastructure project. The Trump rule limits states to evaluating possible discharges into waters of the US, or WOTUS.

"Any aspect" of an infrastructure project potentially leading to water pollution can be reviewed by states as reasons to deny certification under the Biden administration's proposed rule.

The proposal expands a state's ability to stymie a major infrastructure project by giving them the right to deny certification of a project if there is the potential for pollution into waters that are not protected under the Clean Water Act. Those waters are considered to be under state or tribal jurisdiction.

Potential pollution into those state waters can't trigger the requirement for state approval of a pipeline or other project, but a state can use it as a reason to veto a project under the draft rule.

But "once the certification requirement is triggered by the prerequisite of a point source

discharge into a water of the United States," a state may deny a project certification "based on the potential impact of the 'activity as a whole' on waters of the United States and other state or tribal waters," the proposed rule says.

The proposed rule empowers "states, territories and tribes to use congressionally granted authority to protect precious water resources while supporting much-needed infrastructure projects," EPA Administrator Michael Regan said in a statement.

The proposal applies to any project needing a Clean Water Act dredge-and-fill permit from the Army Corps of Engineers, a hydroelectric license from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, or a Clean Water Act pollution discharge permit from the EPA.

The proposed new rule is the Biden administration's attempt to reverse Trump-era environmental regulation rollbacks that would have resulted in more potential air and water pollution.

Section 401 traditionally gave states and tribes the power to limit or reject projects that may pollute lakes, rivers, and other waters protected under the Clean Water Act.

In 2020, then-EPA Administrator Andrew Wheeler acknowledged the Trump rule's purpose was to "accelerate and promote the construction of pipelines and other important energy infrastructure," according to Suquamish Tribe v. Wheeler, a lawsuit filed in 2021 challenging the rule.

At around the same time, the Trump administration finalized a different rule that vastly cut the number of streams and wetlands that qualify as waters of the US, lifting Clean Water Act protections for streams across the country and allowing more possible pollution. Federal courts tossed out that rule in 2021.

Eight states controlled by Republicans said in a Supreme Court filing in Louisiana v. American Rivers that some states "abuse" their Section 401 certification authority. Among the most notable offenses, they said, was Washington state's denial of the Millennium Bulk Terminals' coal export terminal certification.

The Trump Section 401 rule remains in effect, but in legal limbo. The rule was vacated in 2021 by a judge in the US District Court for the Northern District of California, but the eight states led by Louisiana intervened and requested that the US Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit stay the ruling.

The US Supreme Court granted the stay in April after the Ninth Circuit denied it, keeping the Trump-era rule in effect.

Sen. Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV) and other Republicans on the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee in 2021 introduced a bill (S. 3277) that would codify the Trump rule.

"Section 401 is meant to protect water quality. It is not a broad license for states to block economic activity or infrastructure based upon political factors," Capito said at the time.

But environmental groups hailed the EPA's move Thursday as a remedy for the Trump-era rule, which they say supports the fossil fuel industry.

"EPA's proposed rule restores the primary role Congress intended for tribes and states to have in reviewing and rejecting projects that would threaten their water quality," Moneen Nasmith, senior attorney at Earthjustice, said in a statement.

President signs SCOTUS Security Bill After Arrest Near Kavanaugh's House

A bill that would grant security to families of Supreme Court justices was signed into law on June 16, 2022.

The Supreme Court Police Parity Act would provide police protection to the immediate families of the nine justices and other officers of the court, if the "Marshal determines such protection is necessary," the legislation says.

The legislation was introduced by Sen. John Cornyn, a Texas Republican, and unanimously passed the Senate last month.

"Threats to the physical safety of Supreme Court Justices and their families are disgraceful, and attempts to intimidate and influence the independence of our judiciary cannot be tolerated," Cornyn said in a previous statement.

A day before the bill was signed, the Justice Department indicted a California man for attempting to murder Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh. The man was arrested near Kavanaugh's Maryland home.

Antisemitic fliers were also found near Kavanaugh's home, the Montgomery County Police Department confirmed.

In May, a protest and vigil was organized at Justice Samuel Alito's house following a leak of a draft Supreme Court opinion that, if unchanged, would overturn Roe v. Wade, the 1973 case that federally legalized abortions.

Biden Officials Ended International Travel COVID Testing Requirement

The Biden administration announced on June 10th it is ending a requirement that international travelers test negative for the coronavirus before coming to the United States.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) "has determined based on the science and data that this requirement is no longer necessary at this time," a senior administration official said.

The requirement ended at 12:01 a.m. Sunday, June 12, 2022.

Some experts noted the requirement did not seem to be serving much purpose, given that COVID-19 is already circulating widely within the United States. The travel industry had also lobbied to remove the requirement, saying it was no longer needed.

The move is another sign of a new era of COVID-19 where some of the measures designed when the virus was seen as an overwhelming crisis are being wound down.

Biden administration officials have touted that even as cases rose in recent weeks, deaths have stayed largely flat, an indication of the protection against severe disease offered by vaccines and booster shots, as well as treatments such as the Pfizer medication Paxlovid.

Still, the administration said it is leaving the door open to reinstating the requirement if a concerning new variant prompts the need.

"If there is a need to reinstate a pre-departure testing requirement — including due to a new, concerning variant — CDC will not hesitate to act," the senior administration official said.

"Unlike many of his other speeches, he did not ad-lib much," Cheney said of his delivery that day.

"He recited them without significant alteration except one. Even then on Jan. 7 2021, the day after the attack on the U.S. Capitol, the president still could not bring himself to say, 'But this election is now over."

House Appropriators Began Work on FY23 Appropriations Bills

On June 15, the House began consideration of more than \$1.6 trillion in proposed government funding for the coming fiscal year, as Democratic leadership set their sights on passing all of the chamber's annual appropriations bills before recess in August.

The House Appropriations Committee has released all twelve appropriations bills. We have included links to summaries of those bills, as released by the Committee, along with links to the bill text and committee report for each bill.

During the week of June 13, Appropriators moved on Democratic-backed funding proposals for a variety of areas like defense, security for the U.S. Capitol, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), child nutrition programs and veterans affairs, among others.

House negotiators began FY23 markups with a closed-door markup on the draft defense funding bill, which outlines proposed fiscal year 2023 funding for the Defense Department and offices like the Central Intelligence Agency and the National Security Agency.

The bill, which passed the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Defense, totals more than \$761 billion in proposed funding, up \$32.207 billion from the previous year's spending levels.

The legislation includes investments in national security and assistance to Ukraine, as well as proposals to shutter the detention facility at Guantanamo Bay and limit U.S. involvement in Yemen.

The price tag is in line with what President Biden requested in his fiscal 2023 budget, but Republicans are expected to press for more money amid rising inflation.

Sen. Jon Tester (D-MT), who chairs the Senate Appropriations defense subcommittee, said this week that his panel is planning to kick up its work "in earnest" in the coming days, but added that he thinks "the Senate bill is going to be different" from the House version.

During the week of June 6, the House kickstarted the annual appropriations process with a deeming resolution instead of a budget resolution, as lawmakers on both sides of the aisle have struggled to reach an agreement on spending top lines.

Democrats say the newly passed resolution, which has prompted mixed reactions from Republicans, aligns with Biden's requested \$1.6 trillion in discretionary spending for fiscal year 2023, which will begin Oct. 1. Negotiators say the procedure allows appropriators to begin their work in a timely fashion, while leaders work out a larger agreement.

"We know that that will not be ... the ultimate number, but it is a number that will give us a parameter in which the House appropriations process can go forward and we can put bills on the floor in July, after they're completed this month by the Appropriations Committee," House Majority Leader Steny Hoyer (D-MD) said last week.

In hearings, Rep. Kay Granger (R-TX), the Ranking Member of the House Appropriations Committee, knocked Democratic-backed draft legislation she compared to a "liberal wish list," while echoing concerns from other Republicans over price tags.

Republicans have drawn battle lines around certain policy proposals in each bill, but have highlighted their overall disagreement with the funding allocations set by the House without input from Republicans.

The Senate, by contrast, has yet to unveil any of its dozen annual government funding bills, in absence of a larger top line agreement, which already has prompted finger-pointing among leaders.

In remarks this month, Senate Appropriations Chairman Patrick Leahy (D-VT) called it a "bad sign that the Republicans say they want a continuing resolution to the end of the year."

The Senate Appropriations Committee may either move to mark up or release their bills and "explanatory statements" next month. Chairman Leahy has said he will be setting and providing subcommittee allocations without a bipartisan, bicameral appropriations deal. "I'm just going to give all the subcommittee chairs an allocation, and tell them to mark up their bills," he said. "I hope the Republicans will join us, and they will be welcome to any of the markups and the negotiations, but we can't sit around and wait forever."

Note that last year, Republicans signaled after the first few markups that they would not allow for the consideration of additional appropriations bills until there was a negotiated topline agreement, which forced the Committee to release the remaining 9 appropriations bills. At the time, Senate Appropriations Committee Ranking Member Richard Shelby (R-AL) said, "We need a topline agreement that does not shortchange our nation's defense and a willingness to set aside partisan politics. Only then will we be able to produce full year bills for the American people."

If Republicans were to threaten to block appropriations markups again this year, the Committee could be forced to release the text of the draft bills and explanatory statements in place of Committee reports.

If lawmakers are unable to pass its spending bills by the annual deadline at the end of September, Congress will likely resort to a continuing resolution, which allows the government to remain funded under the prior year's fiscal levels, to avoid a shutdown.

Last year, Congress passed three continuing resolutions to avert a shutdown before passing a \$1.5 trillion spending omnibus package for fiscal year 2022 in March.

The delayed passage followed months-long disagreements over issues like parity between defense and nondefense spending levels and legacy riders with restrictions in areas such as abortion and marijuana.

But, with the critical midterm elections in November, and both of the Senate's top appropriators retiring, the pressure is on both sides to tie up their work in a timely fashion.

Veterans Toxic Exposure Bill Stalls as Lawmakers Head Home

A bipartisan bill to expand veterans' health care and disability benefits will not make it to President Joe Biden's desk until after the July Fourth congressional recess because of a minor tax provision.

The House is supposed to originate tax bills under the Constitution. So when the Senate passed the bill last week with the tax provision in it, the move created a blue slip problem requiring the bill to be reconsidered.

One June 24, Senate Veterans' Affairs Chairman Jon Tester, one of the bill's chief sponsors, made a rescue attempt as the Senate was preparing to adjourn for the two-week recess. He asked unanimous consent for the Senate to request the return of the papers from the House, and notwithstanding the lack of receipt of the papers that the Senate immediately agree to a resolution dropping the problematic tax provision from the bill.

"Tonight we have a chance to get it back on track," the Montana Democrat said on the floor.

"We have a chance to get it to the House without further delay."

But without agreement from all 100 senators, there was no chance of fixing the bill before the recess. And Sen. Patrick J. Toomey, (R-PA), promptly lodged an objection.

The Senate amended the House-passed bill on June 16 in an 84-14 vote. The measure would make it easier for veterans exposed to burn pits or other toxic substances to access benefits by presuming that certain types of cancer and respiratory illnesses are connected to service-related exposure. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that the bill would cost \$278.5 billion over a decade.

The bill also includes provisions designed to improve care at Veterans Affairs facilities, like one that would give the VA secretary authority to buy out private service contracts of health care professionals if the individual agrees to work at a rural VA facility for at least four years.

The provision that triggered the blue slip issue would have exempted health care professionals receiving those contract buyouts from having to pay taxes on those funds.

The tax provision is "de minimis at best," Tester told reporters Thursday. "Somebody should have caught it long before we got to this point."

Senate staff indicated the House had the text since May but didn't notify the Senate of the blue slip issue until Tuesday. The House had passed an earlier, slightly more expansive version in March.

Speaking to reporters at her weekly news conference Thursday, Speaker Nancy Pelosi said only that Congress would send the bill to Biden "soon."

First, the Senate will have to go through the process of passing the bill again.

"Assuming that nobody plays any games, that means the president probably won't be able to sign it until the middle of July," Tester said.

Biden Signs Gun Bill into Law

President Biden signed into law a bipartisan gun bill intended to prevent dangerous people from accessing firearms and increase investments in the nation's mental health system, ending nearly three decades of gridlock in Washington over how to address gun violence in the United States.

Final passage of the legislation in Congress came one month after a mass shooting at an elementary school in Uvalde, Texas left 19 children and two teachers dead, a horror that galvanized a bipartisan group of lawmakers to strike a narrow compromise.

"God willing," Mr. Biden said as he put his pen down on Saturday morning, "it's going to save a lot of lives."

The president acknowledged that the legislation fell far short of the sweeping measures he had pushed for, but he said it included some long-sought priorities.

"When it seems impossible to get anything done in Washington, we are doing something consequential," Mr. Biden said.

The gun legislation will expand the background check system for prospective gun buyers under the age of 21, giving authorities up to 10 business days to examine juvenile and mental health records. It sets aside millions of dollars so states can fund intervention programs, such as mental health and drug courts, and carry out so-called red flag laws that allow authorities to temporarily confiscate guns from any person found by a judge to be too dangerous to possess them.

It pours more federal money into mental health resources in communities and schools across the country, and it sets aside millions for school safety. The legislation also toughens laws against the trafficking of guns and straw purchasing, the practice of buying a gun on behalf of someone barred from purchasing one. And for the first time, it includes serious or recent dating partners in a ban on domestic abusers buying firearms, tightening what is known as the boyfriend loophole.

"I think the whole country was yearning for something real to happen after the terrible tragedies," Senator Chuck Schumer of New York, the majority leader, said in an interview this past week. Before the Texas shooting, he had spent time in Buffalo, counseling grieving families after a racist attack at a supermarket left 10 Black people dead.

Mr. Biden said he would host both families affected by gun violence and the lawmakers who helped craft the measure at an event at the White House in July, after the Fourth of July recess, and suggested the compromise was a sign that more bipartisan efforts were possible.

"Their message to us was: Do something," Mr. Biden said of the families of gun violence victims. "How many times have you heard that? Just do something. For God's sake, just do something."

"Well, today, we did," the president added.

For Mr. Biden and others, the compromise reflected decades of work on gun safety legislation. After 20 children were shot and killed in Newtown, Conn., in 2012, Mr. Biden, the vice president at the time, was tasked by President Barack Obama with drafting a list of executive actions on guns. Mr. Biden also called on lawmakers to expand background checks, but an effort to pass that measure and other gun control provisions failed in the Senate.

After the shootings in Buffalo and Uvalde, Mr. Biden called for reinstating a ban on assault weapons — a restriction he helped pass as a senator that was in effect for a decade before it expired in 2004.

Most of the congressional efforts on guns have been stymied in recent years by Republican opposition, as the party has largely united to block new gun control measures and prevent that legislation from reaching the 60-vote threshold needed for most bills to advance in the Senate. As lawmakers reeled from the images that came out of the Texas shooting, however, party leaders offered their tacit blessing to a small coalition of senators eager to strike a compromise.

During four weeks of intense negotiations over the legislation, Senators Kyrsten Sinema of Arizona and Christopher S. Murphy of Connecticut, both Democrats, joined Senators John Cornyn of Texas and Thom Tillis of North Carolina, both Republicans, to strike a deal.

But even as Mr. Biden used a rare evening address this month to call on Congress to take sweeping action, such as banning assault weapons and prohibiting the sale of semiautomatic rifles to people under 21, senators focused on measures that could secure enough Republican support to allow for passage in the Senate.

They set aside calls for a federal red flag law, instead agreeing to \$750 million in federal grant funding to help states carry out those laws and fund crisis intervention programs. Lawmakers also agreed to allow the enhanced background checks for younger buyers to expire after a decade and let their successors debate extending it, a tactic that led the assault weapons ban to end in 2004.

And while lawmakers and activists have long fought to close the boyfriend loophole, negotiators also agreed that first-time misdemeanor offenders could regain their ability to purchase a firearm after five years as long as they did not commit any other violent offense. (The ban previously applied only to domestic abusers who had lived with, been married to or had a child with the victim.)

"I have to say that this bill doesn't do everything we would like to do," Speaker Nancy Pelosi said in a floor speech on Friday. But, she added, "It is a necessary step to honor our solemn duty as lawmakers to protect and defend the American people."

Ultimately, 15 Senate Republicans supported the measure, including Mitch McConnell of Kentucky, the minority leader. Fourteen House Republicans voted for it.

Appropriators Include Rider to Extend Title 42

A pandemic-related immigration restriction called Title 42 would effectively stay in place until after the Covid public health emergency is over under an annual Homeland Security funding bill.

On June 24, the House Appropriations Committee advanced its fiscal 2023 Homeland Security appropriations bill in a 32-25 vote, after adding an amendment to ban the processing of migrants who would have been expelled under Title 42 authorities. Title 42 is a pandemic policy that has allowed officials to quickly expel migrants and asylum seekers at the border. The Biden administration wanted to end the program, but a federal court blocked that move in May.

Republicans led by Rep. Dan Newhouse (R-WA) sought to solidify the program's standing by attaching an amendment to the must-pass government funding bill. Democrats criticized the measure but allowed it to be adopted by a voice vote, avoiding a roll call that would have put each member on record.

Lawmakers are still in the early stages of working on fiscal 2023 funding bills, as House appropriators markup bills that Republicans warn would have no hope of garnering 60 votes in the Senate.

Newhouse's measure would bar funding to process people stopped at the border who would have been processed under Title 42 authorities, until six months after the end of the public health emergency declaration for the Covid-19 pandemic. The Biden administration renewed the declaration for another 90-day period on April 12 and could continue renewing it.

The amendment would offer additional time for border officials to prepare for "what could be a turning point for border operations," Newhouse said, warning of an influx of migrants when Title 42 ends.

With the Biden administration seeking to end the policy, Republicans have sought to attach Title 42 votes to must-pass pieces of legislation, including the Homeland Security funding bill and a long-stalled Senate coronavirus supplemental spending bill.

Subcommittee Chair Lucille Roybal-Allard (D-CA) criticized the measure, saying Title 42 isn't used as an effective immigration policy. Under the policy, migrants can be expelled quickly, but because they're "not considered to have been removed," there's an incentive to make "repeated attempts to come back," Roybal-Allard said.

Border officials are "continuously distracted by migrants who they encounter and expel again and again," she said.

Overall, the Homeland Security funding bill would provide \$60.3 billion under its main funding allocation, a \$2.7 billion increase over the current level. It includes an additional \$20 billion for major disaster response and recovery.

EPA, Interior Apply Biden Justice 40 Equity Plan to 137 Programs

The EPA and the Interior Department are applying President Joe Biden's Justice40 equity effort to nearly 140 programs to steer more federal benefits to disadvantaged populations under programs to reduce lead, increase access to clean water, and restore mining areas and ecosystems.

The announcement by the two agencies on Friday, June 24 is a significant expansion of Biden's effort, which calls for funneling 40% of the overall benefits of clean energy, fighting climate change, affordable housing, and other federal funding to disadvantaged communities.

Lists from the Interior and Environmental Protection Agency include many existing programs funded under last year's bipartisan infrastructure package, including those addressing per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, or PFAS, in drinking water; efforts to remove lead from drinking water service lines; and the Clean School Bus Program to transition schools to zero- and low-emission buses.

The 72 EPA programs now covered under Justice40 include several agency programs already swept into the effort a year ago, including clean water and drinking water State Revolving Funds; Superfund and Brownfields cleanups; and programs to reduce lead in drinking water and emissions from diesel engines.

Additional EPA programs now being brought into the equity effort include pollution prevention grants, the Toxic Release Inventory (TRI) program tracking chemical releases; funding under the Leaking Underground Storage Tank (LUST) program; the sewer overflow control program; and a general assistance program for tribal communities, according to EPA's list (available here) released Friday.

The EPA has committed to "not just meet but exceed the 40 percent goal of benefits flowing from investments to disadvantaged communities" under its Justice40-covered programs, the agency said in its announcement.

This announcement also wraps 65 Interior Department programs (<u>list available here</u>) into the Justice40 effort, including those under the Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, Fish and Wildlife Service, and Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Among the newly covered programs: the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), which expands parkland and bike and hiking trails and is financed mostly from revenue from offshore oil and gas leases. LWCF efforts under the Bureau of Land Management, Fish and Wildlife Service, and National Park Service are now considered covered by Justice40.

Other covered Interior programs include the Bureau of Safety and Environmental Enforcement's Offshore Orphaned Infrastructure Decommissioning, which ensures offshore oil and gas wells are sealed; National Park Service programs promoting conservation and outdoor recreation; and 15 Bureau of Indian Affairs programs including economic development, housing improvement, dam safety, and water sanitation.

Friday's announcement expands upon an initial group of covered programs launched as Justice40 pilot efforts in a July 2021 White House Office of Management interim guidance. Beyond EPA water grants and waste cleanup programs, the pilot covered various energy, transportation, climate change, and affordable housing efforts.

The Biden administration considers a federal program covered under its Justice40 effort if it makes certain investments in any of seven categories: climate change, clean energy and energy efficiency, clean transit, affordable and sustainable housing, training and workforce development, remediation and reduction of legacy pollution, and development of "critical" clean water and wastewater infrastructure.

Federal agencies have been directed to review about a dozen indications of disadvantaged populations to determine the communities that should benefit, including whether a community is low-income or suffering from high or persistent poverty, or high unemployment or underemployment. The array of federal investments for programs swept into the Justice40 effort can include grants and procurement spending, financing, staffing costs, or direct spending or benefits the federal government extends to individuals.

Biden Officially Backs Gas Tax Holiday

One June 22, President Biden announced his support for suspending the federal gas tax for the next 90 days.

The federal gasoline tax is 18 cents per gallon, while state gas taxes average about 26 cents per gallon, according to the American Petroleum Institute.

Biden also alluded to cuts to the 24-cent federal tax on diesel.

His federal effort, however, is likely to face high hurdles in Congress amid skepticism from both Republicans and members of his own party.

Opponents have raised concerns about whether the suspension will be effective — saying some of the cut may not get passed to consumers — and have also noted that the taxes the government collects goes toward the Highway Trust Fund, which helps pay for the country's infrastructure needs.

Biden sought to assuage those concerns in his speech, arguing it's possible to address highway funding at the same time and calling on companies to pass the potential suspension to consumers.

"With the tax revenues up this year and our deficit down over \$1.6 trillion this year alone, we'll still be able to fix our highways and bring down prices of gas, we can do both at the same time," he said.

"I call on the companies to pass this along — every penny of this 18-cent reduction — to the consumers. There's no time now for profiteering," he added.

In a White House press briefing on Wednesday, Energy Secretary Jennifer Granholm_estimated that the highway trust fund would be hit by about \$10 billion, but said that Biden is asking "that the trust fund be repaid."

She added that he was having conversations with Congress about how to do that.

In his speech, Biden also acknowledged that gas tax suspensions won't entirely resolve high prices — as gasoline averaged around \$4.96 nationwide on Wednesday, but still said they would provide important savings.

"I fully understand that a gas tax holiday alone is not going to fix the problem, but it will provide families some immediate relief, just a little bit of breathing room, as we continue working to bring down prices for the long haul."

The president also called for refiners to turn more crude oil into gasoline; refiners can make crude into a range of products that also include diesel or jet fuel.

His comments come as Granholm prepares to meet with industry executives this week. Ahead of that meeting, Chevron CEO Mike Wirth criticized what he described as Biden administration efforts to "vilify" the industry.

Biden said he hopes this meeting spurs near-term solutions to reduce prices.

Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), who in the past expressed reservations about a gas tax suspension, said, "We will see where the consensus lies on a path forward" in a statement on Biden's announcement.

Meanwhile, Republicans have also expressed opposition to the idea — with Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) calling it an "ineffective stunt" in a statement.

Supreme Court Strikes Down Roe v. Wade

One June 24, the Supreme Court struck down Roe v. Wade, eliminating the nearly 50-year-old precedent that established a nationwide right to abortion and handing states authority to drastically limit or ban the procedure.

The 5-3-1 decision by a majority of conservative justices to fundamentally reshape American society by overturning the landmark 1973 precedent is certain to ignite a political firestorm and yield a complex patchwork of state laws that will effectively block large swathes of the population from abortion access.

The ruling upholds Mississippi's 15-week abortion ban, which directly clashed with Roe's requirement that states permit abortion up to the point of fetal viability, around 24 weeks, as well as Planned Parenthood v. Casey, a 1992 decision that reaffirmed Roe's core holding. Chief Justice Roberts joined the majority's judgement that would have allowed the Mississippi law to stand, but did not sign on to the majority opinion overturning Roe.

"Roe was egregiously wrong from the start," Justice Samuel Alito wrote for the majority. "Its reasoning was exceptionally weak, and the decision has had damaging consequences. And far from bringing about a national settlement of the abortion issue, Roe and Casey have enflamed debate and deepened division."

"It is time to heed the Constitution and return the issue of abortion to the people's elected representatives," he continued.

More than two dozen states, primarily in the South and Midwest, are expected to tighten abortion access as a result of Roe falling, including 13 states with "trigger bans" set to take effect automatically or through minimal effort by state officials.

In his opinion concurring with the judgement of the court, Chief Justice Roberts wrote, "If it is not necessary to decide more to dispose of a case, then it is necessary not to decide more. Perhaps we are not always perfect in following that command, and certainly there are cases that warrant an exception. But this is not one of them."

The blockbuster decision comes after a stunning breach of Supreme Court secrecy last month led to the public release of a draft version of the opinion, offering a glimpse at the coming dismantlement of abortion rights as well as the likely upheaval over a ruling that most Americans said they would oppose.

Writing for the majority, Alito emphasizes that his ruling was a narrow one and would not spillover to decisions on issues like same-sex marriage (Obergefell v. Hodges), sex between gay couples (Lawrence v. Texas) and the right to contraception (Griswold v. Connecticut).

"Nothing in this opinion should be understood to cast doubt on precedents that do not concern abortion," Alito wrote.

But the opinion will be almost certain to fuel questions about whether rights that are seen as having a thin historical record and which are not explicitly referenced in the Constitution — so-called "unenumerated rights" — remain on a firm footing.

Justice Clarence Thomas, in a concurring opinion not signed on to by any other justices, wrote that the reasoning underlying Friday's opinion should call into question Obergefell, Lawrence, and Griswold, as they are currently understood. These rights are rooted in the well-established principle that the Due Process Clause of the 14th Amendment protects not only procedural safeguards but also substantive rights — a doctrine that Thomas has long rejected.

"For that reason, in future cases, we should reconsider all this Court's substantive due process precedents, including Griswold, Lawrence, and Obergefell. Because any substantive due process decision is demonstrably erroneous, we have a duty to correct the error established in those precedents," Thomas wrote. "After overruling these demonstrably erroneous decisions, the question would remain whether other constitutional provisions guarantee the myriad rights that our substantive due process cases have generated."

The court's liberal trio of Justices Stephen Breyer, Elena Kagan and Sonia Sotomayor, in a blistering 66-page dissent, condemned the majority for toppling the delicate balancing of interests that Roe and Casey sought to strike.

"Today, the Court discards that balance," they wrote in dissent. "It says that from the very moment of fertilization, a woman has no rights to speak of. A State can force her to bring a pregnancy to term, even at the steepest personal and familial costs."

Overview:

It's dry and hot throughout California. The Governor and State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) emergency water conservation regulations have gone into effect and water managers are bracing for water supplies to just get worse throughout the hot summer. Lake Oroville is sitting at 65 percent of historical average and 49 percent capacity and San Luis Reservoir is at 71 percent historical average and 39 percent capacity.

The SWRCB recently announced that water use in May 2022 was less than in May 2020, leading to hope that the conservation message is getting out to the public and citizens are cutting back. The state board is also working with water providers to obtain water use data each month so they can assess in a timely fashion how conservation measures are performing.

Juvenile chinook salmon from Central Valley fish hatcheries got another ride to the saltwater this year in an effort to prevent the fish from perishing in low, warm water conditions. California Department of Fish and Wildlife announced that the agency is nearing the completion of its efforts to transport 19.7 million hatchery-raised fall-run and 960,000 spring-run juvenile chinook salmon (smolts) to San Pablo Bay, San Francisco Bay and seaside net pens this spring and summer.

Energy managers are bracing for another summer living on the edge of having enough power to supply the state during peak energy events. The Newsom Administration has crafted a package that aims to incentivize load shedding this summer, while also keep retiring resources online in the coming summers while new, clean energy can come online to replace aging natural gas an nuclear plants.

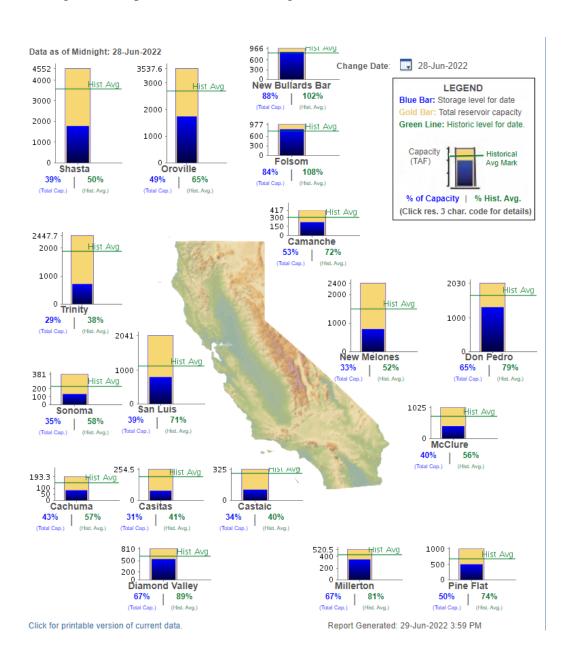
The Legislature has passed several versions and addendums to the 2022-23 state budget. Notably, there is still about \$2 billion in climate and drought funds that will be allocated for specific programs in August.

The Legislature has been moving bills through their second house policy committees. With more water-related bills this year, legislative water discussions have been robust and extensive. ACWA's legislation to provide for a tax exemption for turf removal rebates continues to clear legislative hurdles. CASA's bill to require products containing PFAS to register their products on a publicly accessible database struggled with significant opposition from manufactures but was able to pass out of the Assembly with just enough votes and is moving through the Senate. MWD's legislation to allow for alternative project delivery methods for several of their projects recently also moved out of Senate policy committee, while similar legislation (SB 991, Newman) to allow for progressive design build processes for projects over \$5 million also continues to progress through the legislature. Summer recess begins July 1. When members come back in August, they will have until the end of the month for all action, as the 2021-22 session ends on August 31.

Inland Empire Utilities Agency Status Report – June 2022

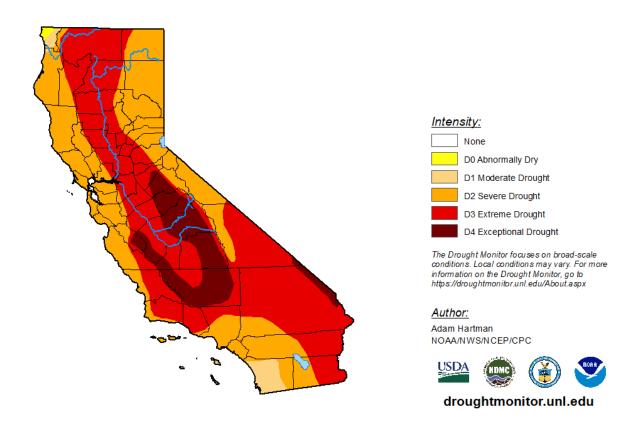
Water Supply Conditions

With summer in full swing, we are starting to see reservior stroage decline. Lake Oroville is sitting at 65 percent of historical average and 49 percent capacity. San Luis Reservoir, the main south-of-Delta storage facility for the State Water Project, is at just 71 percent of average for this time of the year and 39 percent capacity. Drought conditions continue to worsen with 11.5 percent of the state in exceptional drought and 60 percent in extreme drought.

Preliminary Data Shows Water Savings Increase

On June 6, the State Water Board requested that water suppliers submit May water consumption data as soon as possible. The goal is for the state to gain quicker access to data to accurately measure whether California is meeting water conservation goals. Additionally, the State Water Board requested water suppliers voluntary submit the following preliminary information each month, by the third business day or sooner: (1) Production for the reporting period (with units, e.g., gallons), (2) Population served, and (3) Percent of use that was residential. Because these submissions are preliminary, for items 2 and 3, suppliers may use data for the same month from the prior year, if more current data is unavailable.

Board Chair Joaquin Esquivel released a statement on June 28 noting that agencies covering over half of the state's population provided early data, noting that there seems to be a decrease in water use for May 2022 compared to May 2020.

As expected the Chair called for increased conservation, especially outdoors.

Millions of Juvenile Salmon Trucked Again This Year

Juvenile chinook salmon from Central Valley fish hatcheries are getting another ride to the saltwater this year in an effort to prevent the fish from perishing in low, warm water conditions.

California Department of Fish and Wildlife announced that the agency is nearing the completion of its efforts to transport 19.7 million hatchery-raised fall-run and 960,000 spring-run juvenile chinook salmon (smolts) to San Pablo Bay, San Francisco Bay and seaside net pens this spring and summer.

Three consecutive years of drought have resulted in critically low reservoir water storage, low river flows and poor river conditions overall, which decreases the survival of juvenile Chinook salmon as they move toward the Pacific Ocean from upstream hatcheries.

CDFW raises the fish at Feather River, Nimbus, Mokelumne and Merced salmon hatcheries and monitors river conditions carefully to estimate the smolts' chances of successful migration. Conditions are "particularly poor" this year, prompting CDFW to move more than 95 percent of the smolts down river, thus bypassing 50 to 100 miles of "hazardous river conditions."

Summer Energy Reliability

The Western Electricity Coordinating Council recently released information about summer energy reliability throughout the west. They note new factors that have to be considered when trying to predict how summer energy supplies will hold up. Some of those factors include: the war in Ukraine exacerbating cyber security risk; supply chain issues affecting solar storage, coal and natural gas; and accelerated retirement schedules for fossil fuel generation.

The Newsom Administration is pulling as many levers as they can to try to address the very real concern that there will be a significant power supply shortages this summer and in the coming years.

The Legislature passed a \$5 billion proposal on energy reliability in the 2022-23 state budget on June 29. The funding package aims to address a potential 7,000 MW shortage this summer and a potential 10,000 MW shortfall by 2025. The majority of the Governor's proposed general fund dollars would go to the Department of Water Resources to procure 5,000 MW of energy by extending the life of existing natural gas-fired power plants set to expire and providing capital capacity payments for efficiency upgrades and operations and maintenance for more reliable operation; investment in new capacity that can be called upon in an emergency, and power purchase agreements to augment energy resources in and *into* California.

As the Governor's proposal has been discussed in budget sub committees, legislators raised concerns with the proposal. There is significant concern that giving DWR authority to procure energy outside of the normal procurement process is an unnecessary risk.

Budget Update

On Monday, June 13, the Legislature adopted SB 154 (Skinner) and the Governor signed the bill. The legislature passed another round of budget allocations on June 26 in the form of two "Budget Bill Jrs." and a handful of trailer bills.

Those measures included about \$2 billion in a generic "climate and drought" funding, but did not provide specific allocations. The details will be negotiated in the coming weeks and considered when legislators return from summer recess in August.

Legislative Update

Legislators have been working feverishly to shepherd their bills their second house policy committees ahead of the June 30 deadline. The legislature will be on summer recess from July 1 to August 1, when they will come back for the final month of the 2021-2022 legislative session.

Updates on priority bills:

AB 2142 (Gabriel): This bill would provide an income tax exemption for rebates from a turf removal program. Sponsored by ACWA, the bill passed out of the Senate Governance and Finance Committee unanimously and is in the Appropriations Committee.

AB 1845 (Calderon): MWD sponsored bill to allow for alternative project delivery methods for specific MWD projects. The bill recently passed out of the Senate Governance and Finance Committee and will move to the Appropriations Committee.

SB 991 (Newman): This bill is similar to MWD's AB 1845 but it would allow for progressive design build to be used on any project over \$5 million. The bill passed out of the Assembly Local Government Committee unanimously and is in the Appropriations Committee.

AB 2247 (Bloom): CASA sponsored bill would require products sold in CA that contain PFAS to register the product on a publicly accessible reporting platform. The bill was recently amended to remove some of the enforcement language, which should remove some of the opposition. The bill passed out of the Assembly with *just* enough votes and passed out of the Senate Environmental Quality 5-2. It will be heard in the Senate Appropriations Committee on August 1.

AB 2449 (Rubio): Sponsored by Three Valleys Municipal Water District's, this legislation addresses remote participation for elected officials. The author took amendments in the Senate to address concerns from the Senate Governance and Finance and Judiciary Committee concerns surrounding misuse of these allowances to not have to face the public during challenging proceedings. The bill now limits the number of times an offical can use remote testimony and requires that "cameras must be on" at all times. The bill got out of both its Senate policy committees and is awaiting action in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

SB 1157 (**Hertzberg**): The bill would implement the indoor GPCD targets outlined in the DWR/SWRCB draft report to the Legislature for 47 GPCD by 2025 and 42 GPCD by 2030. The bill passed out of Natural Resources and Water Committee despite significant concerns from Senator Ben Hueso (D-San Diego). The bill was quickly moved to the floor of the Senate where it passed 28-9. The author took amendments in the Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee that would require studying the impacts to wastewater and recycled water systems. The bill is now in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

Executive Summary:

The Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs for the month ended May 31, 2022 is submitted in a format consistent with the State requirements.

For the month of May 2022, total cash, investments, and restricted deposits of \$518,987,648 reflects an increase of \$2,763,480 compared to the total of \$516,224,168 reported for April 2022. The increase was primarily due to property tax receipts and grant proceeds. The average days cash on hand increased from 217 days to 234 days for the month of May 2022.

The unrestricted Agency investment portfolio yield in May 2022 was 0.945 percent, a slight increase of 0.103 percent compared to the April 2022 yield of 0.842 percent. The change in yield is mainly attributed to market conditions and an increased earnings yield in the Local Agency Investment Fund and the California Asset Management Program (CAMP) accounts.

Background

Subject: Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs

The Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs for the month ended May 31, 2022, is submitted in a format consistent with State requirements. The monthly report denotes investment transactions that have been executed in accordance with the Agency's Investment Policy (Resolution No. 2021-4-2).

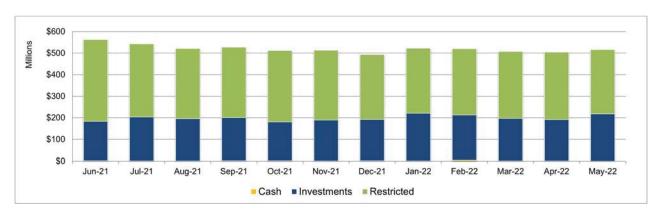


Figure 1: Cash, Investments, and Restricted Deposits

Agency total cash, investments, and restricted deposits for the month of May 2022 was \$519.0 million, an increase of \$2.8 million compared to the \$516.2 million reported for the month ended April 2022 as shown in Figure 1. The increase can be attributed to a combination of property tax receipts and grant proceeds.

PFM continues to focus on investment discipline and maintaining a neutral duration strategy to ensure current investments align with the Agency's Investment Policy's goals of preservation of capital in the overall portfolio, provide sufficient liquidity to meet to operating requirements, and attain a market rate of return throughout budgetary and economic cycles.

Table 1 below represents the unrestricted Agency investment portfolio by authorized investment and duration with a total portfolio amount of \$223.3 million. The Agency portfolio excludes cash and restricted deposits in the amount of \$295.7 million held by member agencies and with fiscal agents, including \$151.8 million in capitalized interest and debt proceeds for the RP-5 Expansion Project.

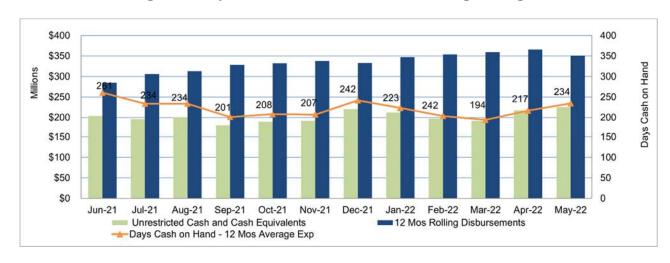

The average days cash on hand increased from 217 days to 234 days for the month of May 2022 as shown in Figure 2. The change in average days cash on hand is due to an increase in unrestricted cash and investments.

Figure 2: Days Cash on Hand – 12 Month Rolling Average

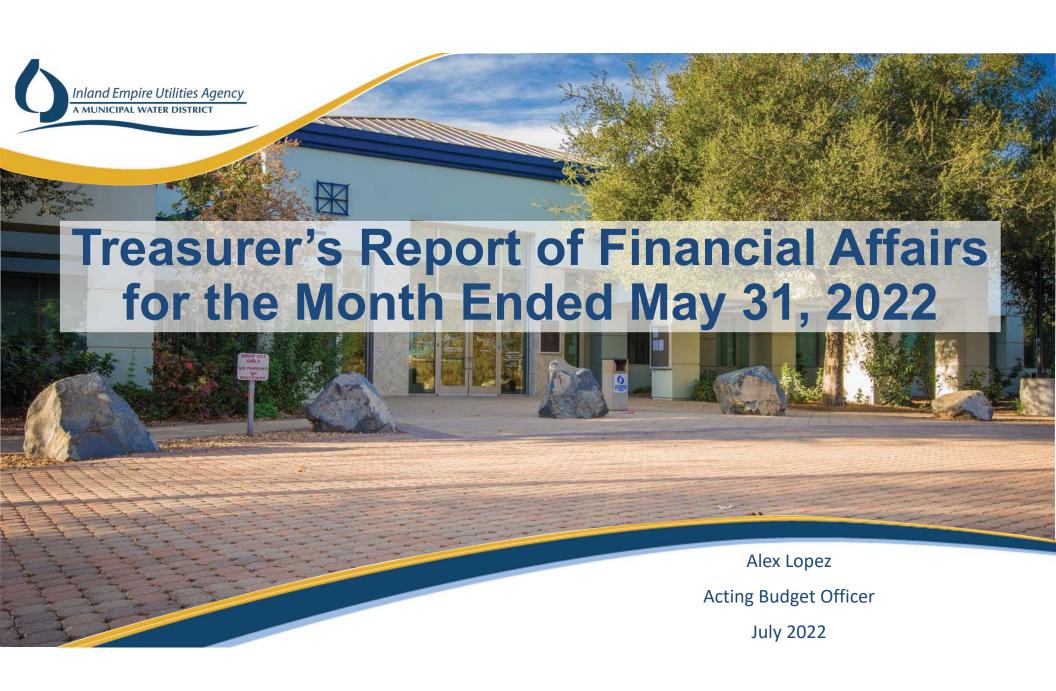

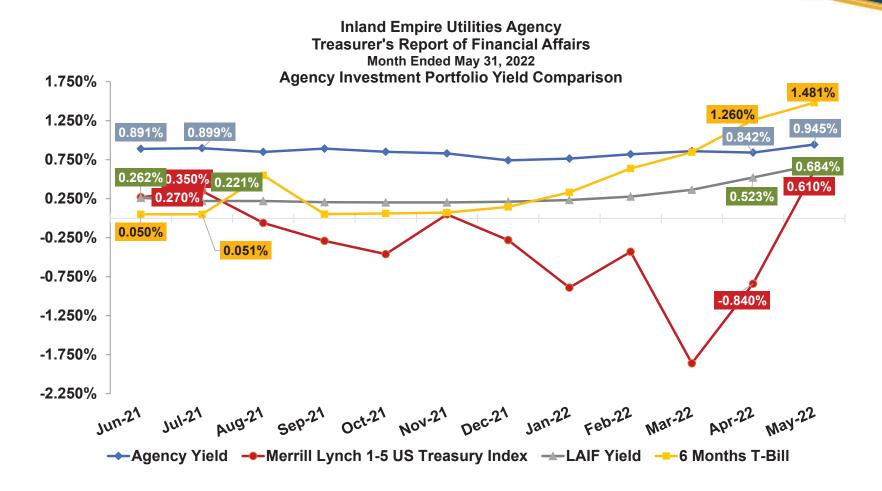

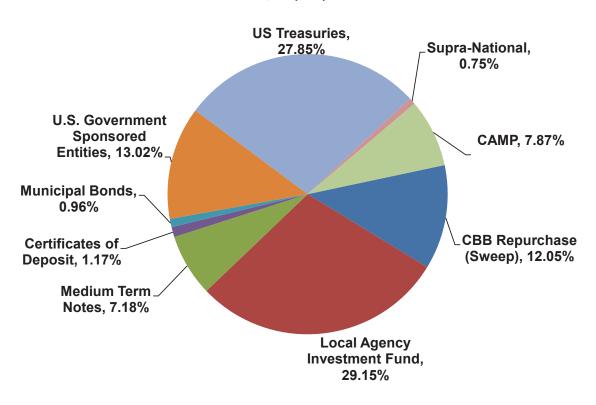

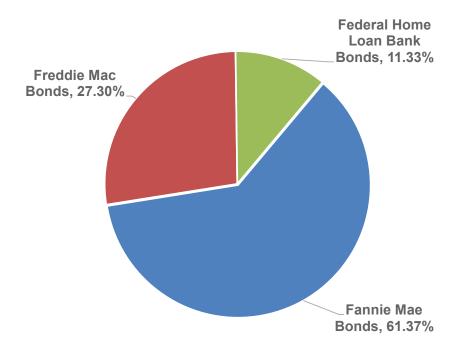

Month Ended May 31, 2022 Unrestricted Agency Investment Portfolio \$223,268,368

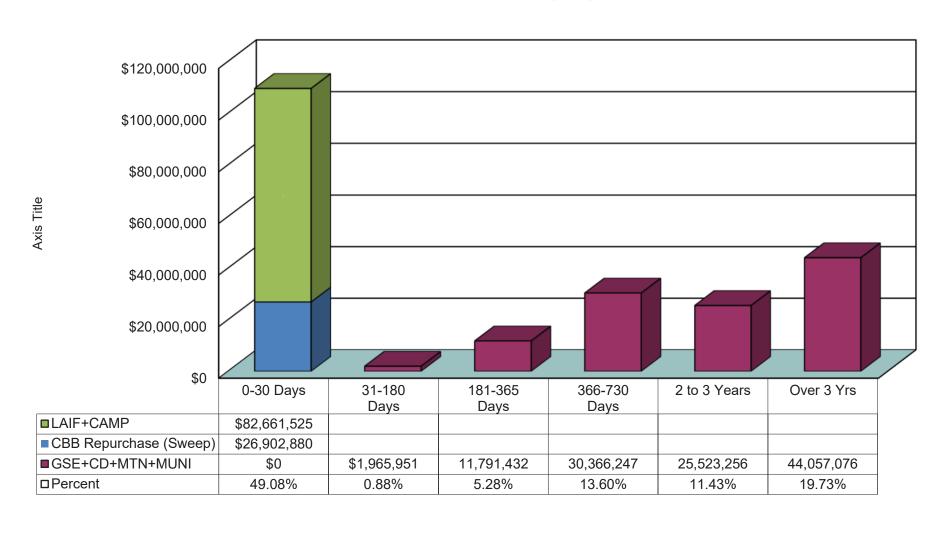


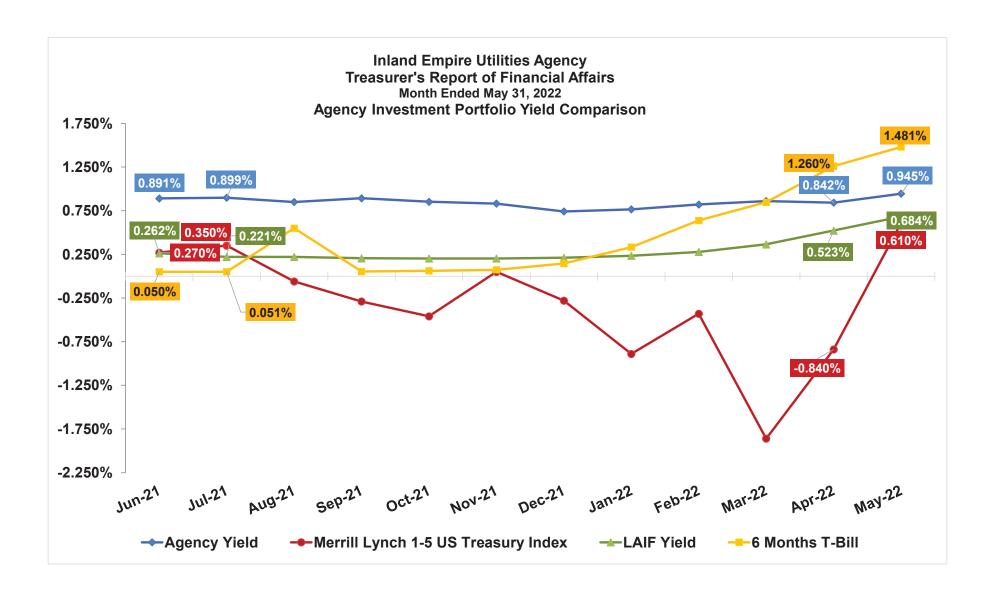

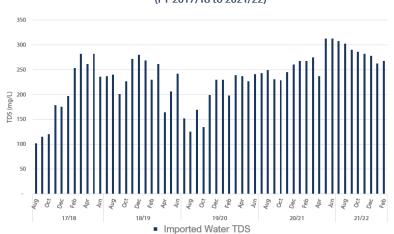

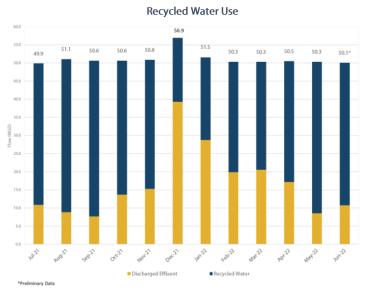
Imported Water



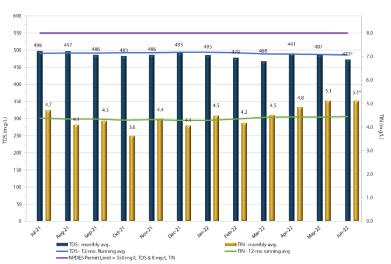
Imported Water TDS Summary (FY 2017/18 to 2021/22)



Recycled Water

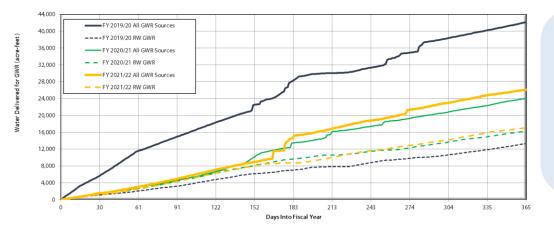


Agency-Wide Effluent TDS & TIN – 12-Month Running Avg



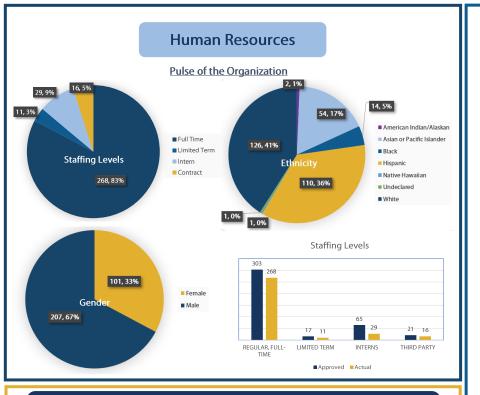

Groundwater Recharge

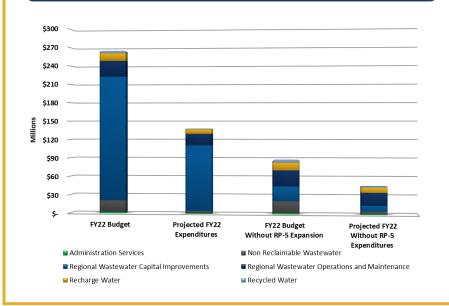

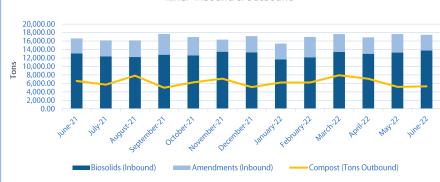


Engineering & Construction Management FY 21/22 Budget Status Update



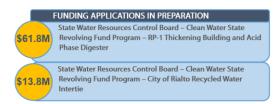

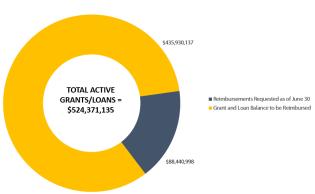

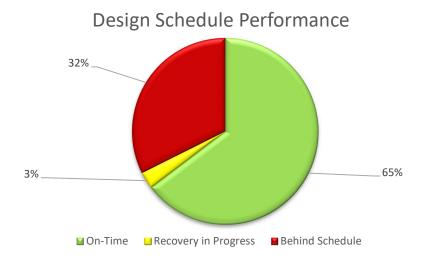
Agency Highlights

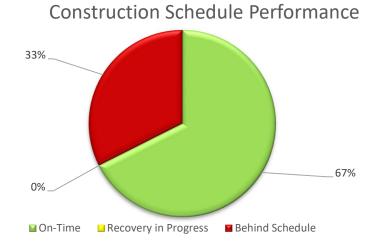
- On May 20, the Operations Unit participated in a Career Fair at Santiago Canyon College. Staff enjoyed promoting Agency recruitment opportunities. Time was spent one on one with job seekers to provide feedback on resumes, discuss options to get into the industry, and to provide recommendations on interview preparation.
- On May 25, at the corner of Kimball Ave. and Euclid Ave., a contract Agency's contractor working on connecting a new sewer line into IEUA's existing large diameter sewer line, accidently ruptured the raw water line that feeds the Chino I Desalter causing a plant-wide shut down. Contractors were called out to make repairs and worked 24/7 and through the weekend until the raw water pipeline was repaired. The Chino I Desalter was placed back online Tuesday afternoon, May 31.
- The laboratory received its completion letter for the Onsite Assessment (OSA) performed in March 2022, which is a Biennial requirement for renewal and/or amendment of its state accreditation. The lab will be able to, in addition to renew, amend its current certificate to add PFAS testing in both potable and non-potable matrices to its capability. The lab is also participating in a gap assessment to determine tools and resources necessary to implement the new accreditation standard before January 1, 2024.
- On June 2, the IERCF team, along with Board Chairperson Jon Blickenstaff, celebrated recent awards for operations and safety and the milestone of 2 million tons of biosolids recycled.
- On June 7, an IERCA Celebration Event was held at IERCF to celebrate the milestone
 of selling three million cubic yards of compost, the US Composting Council
 Manufacturer of the Year Award, and the California Water Environment Association
 Safety Plant of the Year Award. IERCF staff were recognized for their innovation and
 efforts to maintain safety goals and operate at great efficiency.
- Operations and Maintenance staff attended a comprehensive three-day Maintenance Planning and Scheduling course which provided a combination of classroom education with hands-on exercises about planning and scheduling, resource utilization, building successful partnerships, materials management, and work execution.
- A new National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit was adopted by the California Regional Water Quality Control Board, Santa Ana Region on June 3. The new permit includes some new effluent permit limitations for several compounds and some metals. Other significant changes include requirements for an Asset Management Plan, Climate Change Action Plan, effluent toxicity limit, effluent toxicity reporting using TST statistical method, and effluent PFAS, 1,2,3-Trichloropropane & primary maximum contaminant level (MCL) monitoring.
- On June 23, the Agency celebrated all staff for their contributions and commitment to the Agency, industry, and the community on Public Service Day.

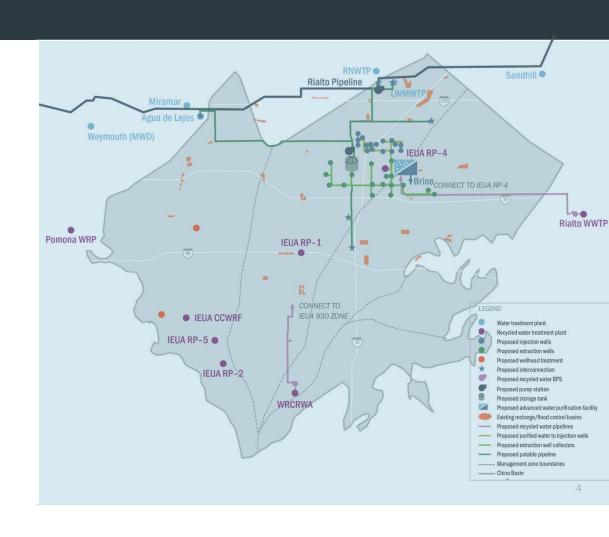

CBP- Local Facilities Overview



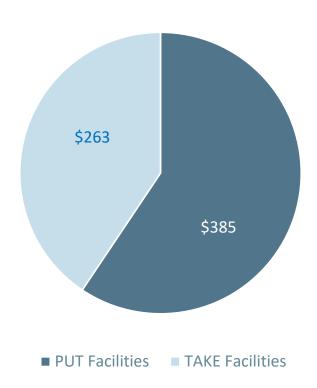

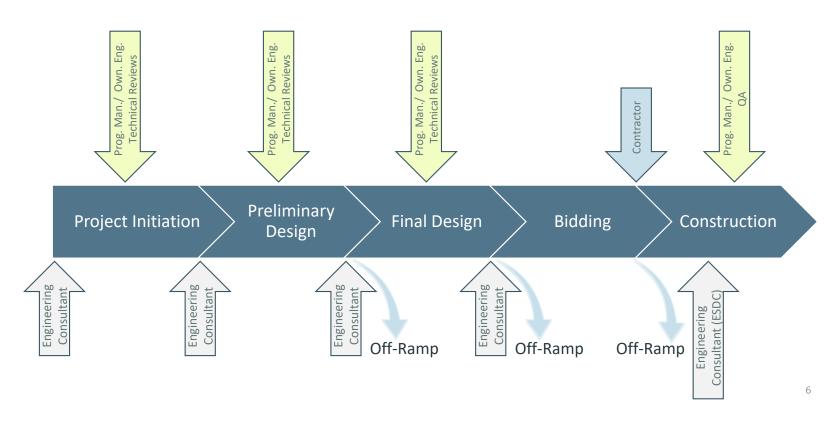
CBP Cost Allocation, 2019 \$M

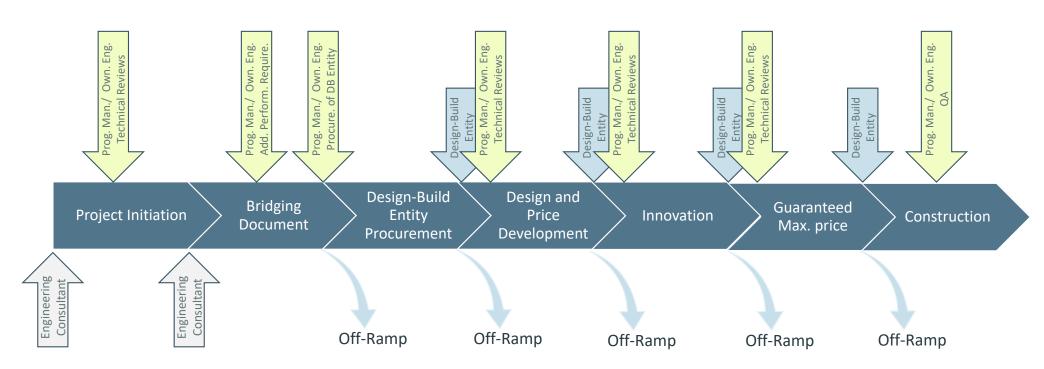

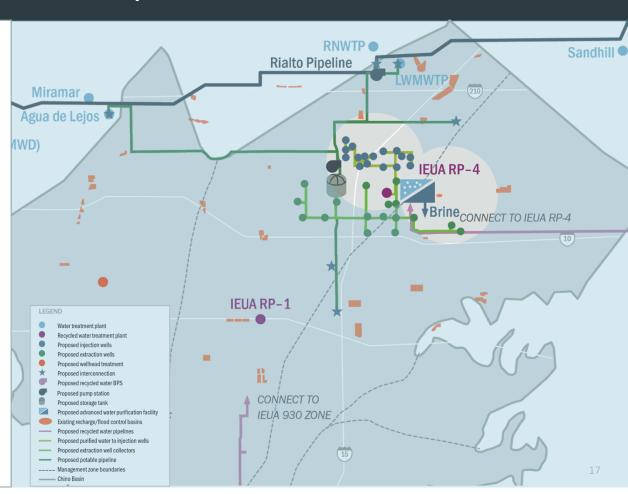

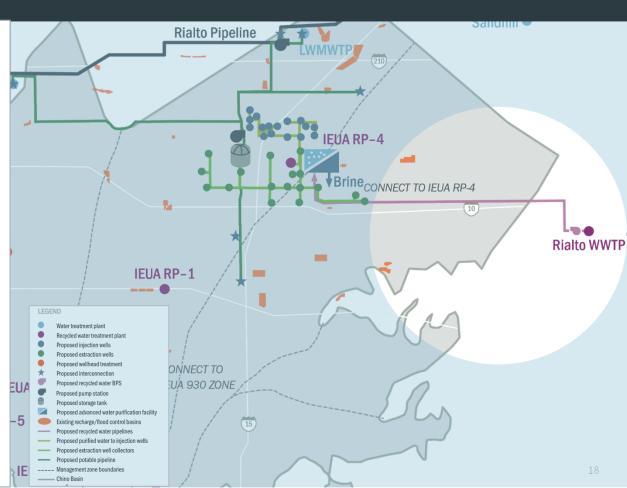

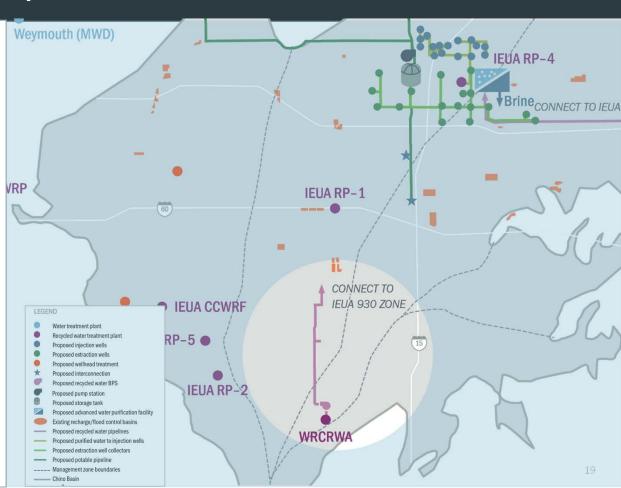

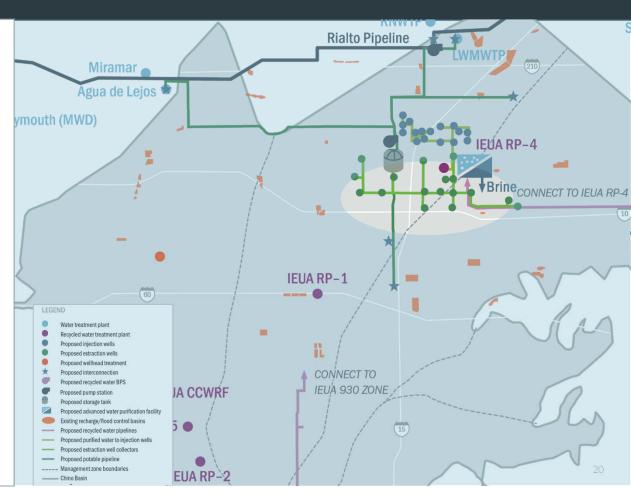

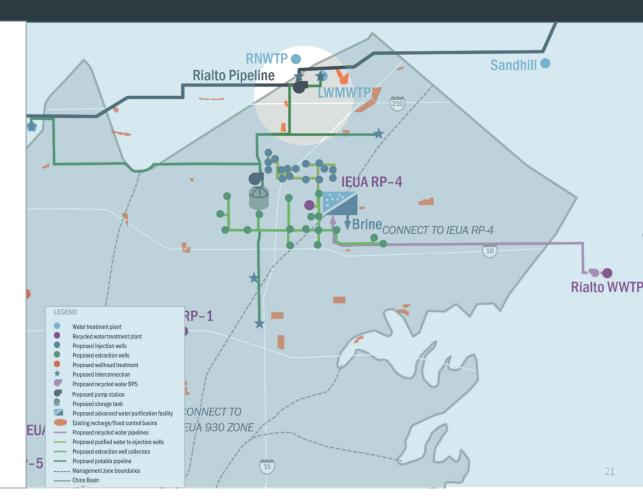
