3. GENERAL MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Deputy General Manager Christiana Daisy stated that on Thursday, September 1, General Manager Shivaji Deshmukh, Director of Planning & Resources Michael Hurley, and former employee Josh Aguilar attended a workshop on the 2020 Optimum Basin Management Plan (OBMP) Environmental Review Process at the Chino Basin Watermaster. The meeting discussed the objectives of the 2020 OBMP and the benefits of developing a programmatic environmental impact report (EIR) for the OBMP, which would provide initial environmental coverage for all projects submitted by the participating agencies and municipalities. Other key benefits of the programmatic EIR would be the consideration of the cumulative impacts of the identified projects and the avoidance of duplicative reconsideration of basic policy considerations under each project EIR. With the certification of the Chino Basin Program (CBP) EIR in May 2022, the CBP will now be considered part of the baseline condition for the purposes of the programmatic EIR.

IEUA received the 2022 Excellence in Public Information and Communication (EPIC) Award for the Agency's FY 2019/20 Annual Report at the California Association of Public Information Officials (CAPIO) Annual Conference. The EPIC Awards program recognizes the most creative and effective efforts in the areas of communication and marketing campaigns, newsletter production, and more. Deputy General Manager Daisy extended congratulations to the External Affairs team and all staff involved in the preparation of the report.

Deputy General Manager Daisy provided an update on the significant heat issue and resulting energy shortage in the state. She explained that while we had anticipated outages at several Agency facilities and Operations staff was mobilized to address any such outages, the Agency did not experience any blackouts. IEUA continues to be proactive in assessing operation needs and complying with any requests from the state to conserve energy.

Qualifications for Program Management/Owner Engineering services to implement the
CBP was issued on August 17. An industry presentation was held last week to provide
an overview of the solicitation which was attended by over 30 companies. After a
shortlist of qualified firms is created, a selection is expected to be made in March 2023,
and the contract award is expected in May 2023.

Ms. Munoz added that the scope of work will include supporting IEUA in the capital delivery and implementation of the CBP projects which is anticipated to have a duration of five to eight years. The areas of service include procuring and managing design services, providing subject matter experts to perform technical reviews, permitting and public outreach support, construction administration and management, and coordination with IEUA and stakeholders throughout the duration of the projects.

On March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom declared a state of emergency pursuant to Government Code 8625 due to the COVID-19 pandemic and recommended, together with local officials, measures for social distancing to assist in abating the spread of COVID-19; and on March 17, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order N-29-20 which, among other things, suspended certain Brown Act rules governing the use of teleconferencing for local agency board meetings. Executive Order N-29-20 expired on September 30, 2021. In response to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the California legislature enacted, and the Governor signed into law, AB 361 amending portions of Government Code 54953, allowing for the continued use of teleconferencing for local agency board meetings while suspending the conditions and restrictions of Government Code 54953(b)(3) if the legislative body of the local agency makes certain findings. The legislative body must make these findings every 30 days to continue the use of teleconferencing.

Staff is recommending that the Board of Directors makes the necessary findings and determinations and Adopt Resolution No. 2022-10-1 to continue to conduct meetings through teleconference for a period of 30 days.

WHEREAS, On September 21, 2022 the Board of Directors of the Inland Empire Utilities Agency approved Resolution No. 2022-9-3 again making certain factual findings, and authorizing the continued use of teleconferencing for IEUA Board meetings for an effective period of 30 days; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors must now determine whether to extend the effective period of Resolution No. 2022-10-1 for an additional 30 days, making the appropriate factual findings in support thereof;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Inland Empire Utilities Agency hereby make the following findings and determinations:

SECTION 1. The Governor has proclaimed a state of emergency on March 4, 2020 which continues.

SECTION 2. The Governor and local officials have promoted the use of social distancing as a method to abate the spread of COVID-19 within the community. The Board of Directors finds that conducting in person meetings of the IEUA Board of Directors would be inimical to social distancing and would present imminent risks to the health or safety of the attendees and conducting meetings by teleconference would diminish that risk.

SECTION 3. The Board of Directors will continue to conduct Board meetings by teleconference in compliance with Government Code 54953(e) until such time as the Governor has terminated the state of emergency and the risk to health and safety of meeting

attendees is sufficiently diminished or as otherwise required by law. Notice of meetings and posted agendas will contain information which allows members of the public to access the meeting and address the Board of Directors and offer public comment including an opportunity for all persons to attend via a call-in option or an internet-based service option.

SECTION 4. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective for 30 days or until such time as the Board of Directors adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which meetings of the Board of Directors may be conducted by teleconference without compliance with Government Code 54953(3)(b).

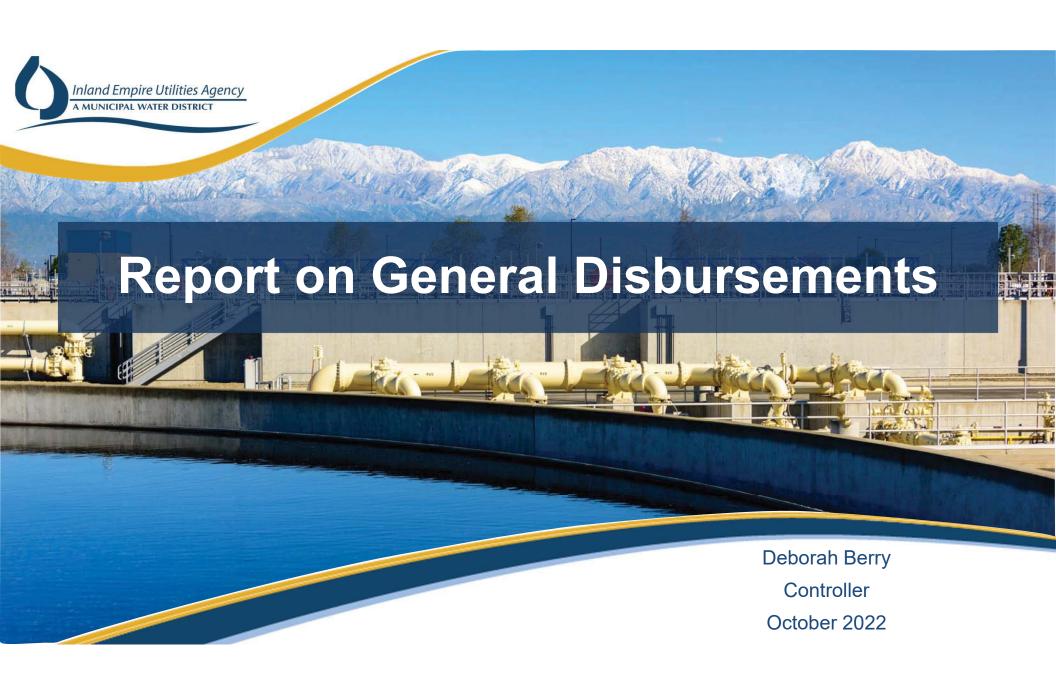

Executive Summary:

The Agency's recycled water distribution and sewage collection systems are simulated using the InfoWater/Sewer software. The system components such as pipes, pumps, reservoirs, recycled water customers, sewerage pipelines and tributary flows are depicted within the models. Various scenarios are created to represent changes in demands, operations and facilities in which the results are evaluated for system deficiencies and optimization. Under direction from Engineering and Planning staff, consulting engineering services are required to create the scenarios, update the model components, analyze the results and provide recommendations on resolving operational challenges. These recommendations will result in initiating the scope of work of future capital improvement projects. The previous hydraulic modeling consulting services contract expired in June 2022.

A Request for Proposal for on-call hydraulic modeling services was issued on April 18, 2022 which resulted in the submittal of four proposals on May 16, 2022. A review committee consisting of Planning, Engineering and member agency staff evaluated each proposal and selected Carollo Engineering as the best qualified to pursue the work.

Staff's Recommendation:

- 1. Approve the master services contract award for Hydraulic Modeling to Carollo Engineers, Inc. for a not-to-exceed amount of \$500,000; and
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to execute the contract, subject to non-substantive changes.

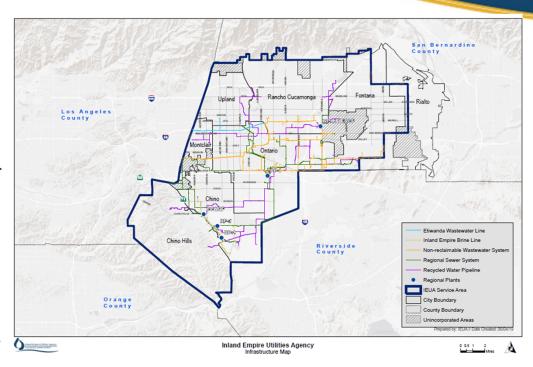

Executive Summary:

To meet Chino Basin water quality objectives and wastewater permit compliance requirements, IEUA needs to augment its recycled water system when the demands are higher than the available supplies during the months between May and October to provide a constant monthly supply to a proposed advanced water purification facility (AWPF) located at Regional Plant No. 4. The City of Rialto is interested in monetizing its recycled water to achieve ecosystem benefits by removing this flow to reduce adverse impacts to native species and financial security with the sale of their recycled water to IEUA.

The purchase agreement will consolidate the needs of both IEUA and the City. The proposed terms include the design and construction of recycled water facilities by IEUA, the diversion of 3,500 acre-feet per year (AFY) between May and October into IEUA's recycled water system at \$275 per AF for a period of 50 years, and the right of first purchase for any amount above the baseline or the remaining six months at \$400 per AF subject to annual rate adjustments. A 20% supply deposit fee will be imposed during the time between the execution of this agreement and the beginning of recycled water deliveries to IEUA to be applied towards future purchases.

Staff's Recommendation:

- 1. Approve the IEUA-City of Rialto Recycled Water Purchase Agreement Term Sheet for acquiring recycled water supplies from the City of Rialto.
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to execute the agreement, subject to non-substantive changes.

Background

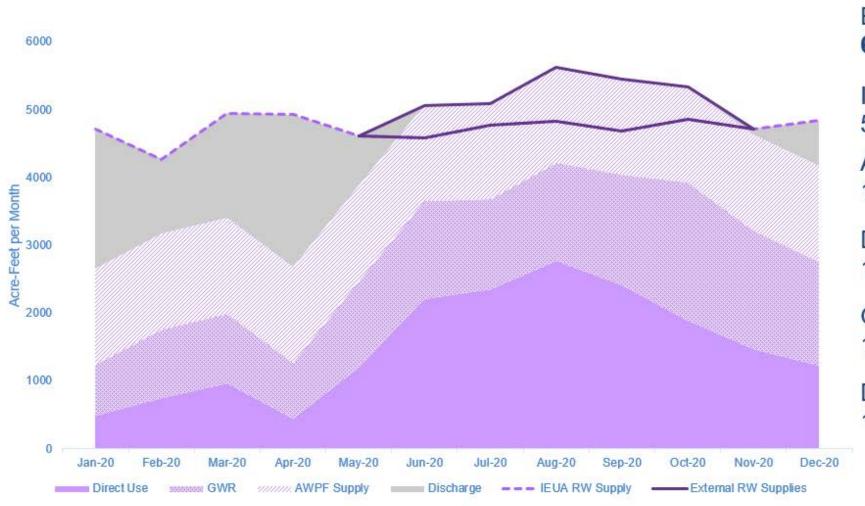


- The Santa Ana River Multi Species Habitat Conservation Plan (SAR HCP) identified the benefit of removing flows from the City of Rialto wastewater treatment plant during the summer months due to the adverse impact to native species.
- City of Rialto is interested in monetizing its recycled water as an annual revenue source.
- Due to seasonality of recycled water supplies, IEUA needs to augment its recycled water supply during peak demand months between May and October.
- IEUA and City of Rialto initiated water resources partnership discussions in 2019.
- The City of Rialto Water Resources Partnership Principles of Agreement was approved by the Board in February 2022.
- Rialto City Council approved the IEUA City of Rialto Recycled Water Purchase Agreement last month.

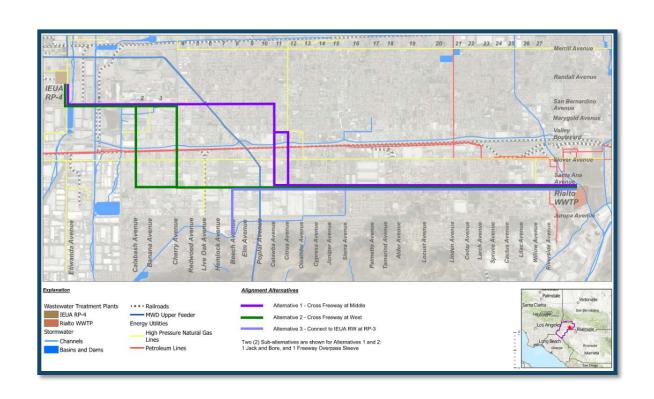

Agreement Terms



- IEUA to design, construct, and operate recycled water facilities with 7,000-acre-foot capacity (i.e., 24" pipeline, pump station, telemetry, interconnection).
- IEUA to have exclusive rights to divert 3,500 acre-feet of Rialto's recycled water into IEUA system between May and October annually.
- The purchase rate of \$275 per acre-feet is established for a period of 50 years.
- IEUA and its partnering agencies have right of first purchase for the remaining six months or future expanded flows at \$400 per acrefeet.
- The rates are subject to annual rate adjustment of 2% or the CPI index, whichever is higher.
- A 20% supply deposit fee will be imposed after execution of this agreement and cease when recycled water deliveries begin. The deposit will be applied to future recycled water purchases.

Terms and Conditions for the Sale of Recycled Water from the City of Rialto to the Inland Empire Utilities Agency

September 20, 2022

Background

- a. Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) intends to fund the design and construction of an Advanced Water Purification Facility (AWPF) and groundwater injection facilities to beneficially use recycled water to meet water quality objectives in the Chino Basin and provide water supply augmentation benefits associated with its Chino Basin Program (CBP).
- b. Inland Empire Utilities Agency is interested in securing local supplies of tertiary treated recycled water from Rialto and others, along with its own recycled water supplies, for treatment at its AWPF located at the RP-4 treatment plant. IEUA may also choose to use recycled water from Rialto at IEUA's RP-3 spreading basins or in its 1158 Pressure Zone, in-lieu of sending it to RP-4.
- c. The City of Rialto, as agent for the Rialto Utility Authority (hereinafter "Rialto") currently has approximately 6.2 MGD of recycled water produced at its wastewater treatment plant that is discharged to the Santa Ana River. As the City of Rialto grows, it anticipates receiving additional flows up to its maximum treatment plant capacity of 11.7 MGD. Rialto desires to sell a portion of its recycled water to the Inland Empire Utilities Agency.
- d. This agreement provides terms and conditions for the sale and procurement of recycled water and related infrastructure and operations and is entered into between the Rialto and the IEUA, collectively referred to herein as the "parties".

II. Proposed Terms

- a. Recycled Water Purchase Amount and Compensation Base Supply
 - i. IEUA shall purchase from Rialto 3,500 acre-feet of tertiary treated recycled water at a constant flow rate of 6.2 MGD over a six-month period from May 1 through October 31 of each year ("Base Supply").
 - ii. The purchase of Base Supply shall be on a take-or-pay basis, whereby IEUA shall pay Rialto for all Base Supply offered regardless if IEUA takes delivery of the recycled water. Exceptions to IEUA's take-or-pay obligation include either the following circumstances:
 - 1. Rialto is unable to meet the 3,500 acre-feet flow obligation required for the operation of IEUA's recycled water AWPF; OR.
 - 2. Rialto is unable to meet recycled water quality requirements as described in Section II.(f)(iv), below.

For each day in which either of these circumstances occur, an amount of 19.0 acre-feet shall be deducted from the Base Supply amount to determine IEUA's payment obligation.

iii. The initial purchase price for the Base Supply shall be \$275/acre-foot. The purchase price for the Base Supply shall be adjusted annually commencing one year after the effective date of this agreement by an amount of 2% (two percent), or the year over year percentage increase

- in the CPI-U All Urban Consumers Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario Index published by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics (CPI), whichever is greater.
- iv. In the circumstances of a Force Majeure Event, as defined in Section II.(i)(i), that renders Rialto unable to provide the Base Supply or any material portion thereof, Rialto's obligation shall be excused (or excused as to that material portion) for the duration of the Force Majeure Event, provided however that Rialto shall not sell or otherwise convey any portion of the Base Supply to any other water purveyor during such period.

b. Recycled Water Purchase Amount and Compensation – Optional Supply

- i. IEUA shall have the option and right of first refusal to purchase from Rialto an additional supply of up to 3,500 acre-feet of tertiary treated recycled water available during the sixmonth period from November 1 to April 1 of each year, or any amount of tertiary treated recycled water supply over 7,000 acre-feet on an annual basis ("Optional Supply").
- ii. The initial purchase price for the Optional Supply shall be \$400/acre-foot. The purchase price for the Optional Supply shall be adjusted annually commencing one year after the effective date of this agreement by an amount of 2% (two percent), or the year over year percentage increase in the CPI or based on the percentage increase of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California Full Service Untreated Rate, whichever is greater. The purchase of the Optional Supply shall be at the sole discretion of IEUA.
- iii. Should Rialto offer IEUA the Optional Supply, and IEUA elects not to purchase, Rialto may offer the Optional Supply to other third-party buyers. If such an offer to a third-party buyer is made, IEUA will have a first right of refusal to purchase the recycled water included in the offer at the identical price and terms under which Rialto is offering the recycled water to the third-party buyer. Under no circumstances shall the sale of Optional Supply adversely affect IEUA's Option and Right of First Refusal in subsequent years.
- iv. If Rialto determines it has additional recycled water to sell above the Base Supply and Optional Supply amounts, IEUA would have a right of first refusal to purchase the water under the same pricing and terms as the Optional Supply.
- v. In the circumstances of a Force Majeure Event, as defined in Section II.(i)(i), that renders Rialto unable to make available the Optional Supply or any material portion of thereof, Rialto's obligation shall be excused (or excused as to that material portion) for the duration of the Force Majeure Event, provided however that Rialto shall not sell or otherwise convey any portion of the Option Supply to any other water purveyor during such period.

c. Additional Compensation Terms

i. All payments for Base Supply and Optional Supply purchases shall be made by IEUA to Rialto on a quarterly basis. Base Supply payments shall be on a take-or-pay basis, as described in Section II(a). Optional supply payments shall be based upon metered flow deliveries of recycled water to IEUA.

- ii. It is understood the Base Supply purchase price of \$275/acre-foot and Optional Supply purchase price of \$400/acre-foot are discounted in recognition of IEUA's capital investment for conveyance improvements needed to deliver water to IEUA'S RP-4 facility. IEUA and Rialto acknowledge that conveyance and point of delivery alternatives are being evaluated that may materially reduce construction, permitting, or operations and maintenance costs for recycled water conveyance to IEUA. Should a mutually agreeable alternative that provides material cost savings relative to the currently proposed RP-4 delivery infrastructure be identified and implemented, IEUA and Rialto shall negotiate in good faith an increase in price for the Base Supply and Optional Supply or other consideration that reflects a shared benefit of the conveyance cost savings.
- iii. IEUA will provide Rialto an amount of up to \$1,000,000 (one million dollars) for the construction of one groundwater well adjacent to the Santa Ana River, or the construction of a gravity pipeline from the bottom of the future Lake Rialto sufficient to satisfy Rialto's obligation for discharge into the Santa Ana River ("HCP supply project"). The selection of the HCP supply project shall be at the sole discretion of Rialto. Upon the completion of the HCP supply project, Rialto shall present a full cost accounting to IEUA for review and approval to determine the final amount of compensation.
- iv. Upon the effective date of this agreement until the commencement of delivery of recycled water from Rialto to IEUA, a Supply Deposit fee shall be paid by IEUA to Rialto. The Supply Deposit fee shall be in recognition of the time that may elapse between the effective date of this agreement and the commencement of recycled water deliveries from Rialto to IEUA. Payment of the Supply Deposit fee is not conditioned upon Rialto's prior satisfaction of its obligation to obtain water diversion permits under Section II.(e)(vii). Rialto may enter into one-time or short-term recycled water sales or other conveyances to third parties during the period it is receiving the Supply Deposit provided no such sale or conveyance will prevent or materially impair Rialto's ability to provide the Base Supply to IEUA upon the date IEUA begins to take recycled water under the agreement. The fee payment made by IEUA to Rialto shall be based upon the Base Supply purchase price of \$275/acre-foot, escalated annually in accordance with Section II.(a)(iii), multiplied by twenty percent (20%) of the Base Supply amount, or 700 acre-feet. Payments shall be made to Rialto on a quarterly basis and escalated annually on the anniversary of the effective date of this agreement.
 - Upon the commencement of delivery of recycled water from Rialto to IEUA, the Supply Deposit payment shall cease and IEUA shall pay Rialto the full amount for deliveries pursuant Section II.(a), less a 20% credit for the Supply Deposit. IEUA's quarterly payments to Rialto shall be reduced by 20% until the total Supply Deposit amount previously paid by IEUA to Rialto is fully credited.
 - 2. Should IEUA's AWPF not be constructed or if the agreement is terminated in accordance with Section II.(h)(i), Supply Deposit payments made to Rialto shall not be refundable to IEUA. The exception to this provision would be a Force Majeure as provided in Section II.(i)(i). Under such circumstances, IEUA would be eligible to be

refunded 50% of Supply Deposit payments received by Rialto subject to a repayment plan mutually agreed-to by the parties.

d. Facilities and Ownership

- i. The proposed facilities to be constructed and operated by IEUA generally consist of an approximately 550 HP pump station and associated site piping and appurtenances located at the Rialto Wastewater Treatment Plant (RWWTP) in Rialto (hereinafter referred to as "Pump Station") and eleven (11) miles of 24-inch conveyance piping through the cities of Rialto, Fontana, and Rancho Cucamonga to convey the tertiary recycled water from RWWTP to the IEUA's RP4 wastewater treatment facility (hereinafter referred to as "Conveyance").
- ii. IEUA will have full ownership of the Pump Station and Conveyance facilities.
- iii. The Pump Station will be cited within the property of the RWWTP at a location mutually agreed to by the parties, with the Point of Connection (POC) established at the current RWWTP tertiary effluent discharge.

e. Design, Permitting and Construction

- i. IEUA shall be responsible for design, permitting and construction of the Pump Station and Conveyance facilities and all associated costs shall be the responsibility of IEUA.
- ii. The Pump Station shall be designed and constructed to engineering standards determined by IEUA and shall not materially interfere with the operations of the RWWTP.
- iii. IEUA shall prepare and submit to Rialto a preliminary engineering report, final design plans and specifications and bid documents for the Pump Station for review and approval. Rialto shall review these submittals and provide timely comments to IEUA for incorporation, as appropriate, into final documents.
- iv. Upon approval of the preliminary engineering report, Rialto shall convey to IEUA the following at no cost:
 - 1. Such agreements (inclusive of leases, licenses or easements as Rialto shall determine are most appropriate) for the Pump Station site and for the portion of the Conveyance within the RWWTP, including full ingress and egress rights for long-term operation and maintenance during the term of the agreement.
 - 2. A temporary construction easement and materials storage area to be utilized by IEUA during construction.

In addition, Rialto shall provide IEUA the following:

- 1. A sub-metered electrical connection point suitable to provide power to the Pump Station.
- 2. A secured connection to the operating telemetry of the RWWTP.

Costs for electrical service sub-metering and telemetry connection hardware and software shall be the responsibility of IEUA.

- v. Upon execution of the construction contract, IEUA shall be responsible for the management of the contractor and inspection of all facilities under construction. IEUA shall coordinate with Rialto during the construction of the Pump Station, on-site Conveyance piping and interconnection with RWWTP facilities. IEUA shall include Rialto's designated representatives in contractor coordination meetings, as requested. Rialto may also provide separate construction inspection at its expense.
- vi. IEUA shall coordinate with Rialto to ensure the construction contractor carries appropriate forms of insurance and implements safety program measures and other provisions to adequately protect Rialto against any and all claims associated with the construction of the Pump Station not caused by Rialto's negligence.
- vii. Prior to the commencement of construction, Rialto shall secure any needed water diversion permits from the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) for the delivery of recycled water to IEUA. Any recycled water flow requirements imposed by the SWRCB for compliance with the Upper Santa Ana River HCP shall be the responsibility of Rialto.
- viii. It is understood that construction of facilities will occur in Rialto rights-of-way, streets, easements and on Rialto fee owned properties. Rialto will cooperate with IEUA to ensure other future Rialto construction projects will not interfere with IEUA's construction schedule. This includes Rialto Street paving projects, and potential paving moratoriums.

f. Operations and Water Quality

- i. IEUA shall be responsible for all operations and maintenance of the Pump Station and Conveyance facilities, including conducting routine operations, maintenance, and repairs of IEUA owned facilities on the RWWTP site and remote operations through telemetry systems. IEUA operations staff shall routinely coordinate and communicate with RWWTP staff on Pump Station operations.
- ii. All costs associated with operations and maintenance of the Pump Station and Conveyance facilities shall be the sole responsibility of IEUA.
- iii. All flows of recycled water delivered to IEUA shall be treated to tertiary standards and compliant with all NPDES discharge permit requirements in effect for the RWWTP. RWWTP staff shall immediately inform IEUA of any process upsets or other conditions at the RWWTP resulting in, or that may result in, recycled water quality that is not compliant with RWWTP NPDES discharge permit requirements ("non-compliant water"). Upon such notification, IEUA may discontinue taking flows into the Pump Station and shall have no obligation to purchase non-compliant water.
- iv. The parties acknowledge that failure of Rialto to promptly notify IEUA of non-compliant water may result in damage to or permit violation for IUEA's recycled water facilities. Under such circumstances, Rialto's liability would be limited to fines imposed upon IEUA directly related to the non-compliant water and the reasonable cost incurred by IEUA of such additional water treatment mandated by a governmental entity of competent jurisdiction, but not exceeding payments already received by Rialto from IEUA.

v. IEUA, with the concurrence of Rialto, may elect to contract with Rialto or its RWWTP operator to provide certain operations and maintenance services. Such services would be the subject of a separate agreement.

g. Use of Facilities for Delivery to Third Parties

i. The parties acknowledge that the Pump Station and Conveyance facilities may, by mutual agreement, provide existing excess capacity or be upsized in the future to provide additional capacity to distribute and sell additional recycled supplies beyond those needed and purchased by IEUA to third-parties. Any such arrangement to use or expand capacity would be subject to a separate agreement among the parties and would set forth terms including but not limited to the equitable allocation of Pump Station and Conveyance infrastructure expansion costs; use of infrastructure constructed by, owned, and operated by IEUA; and the sharing of water sales revenue resulting from third-party sales.

h. Term and Termination

- The term of the proposed agreement is fifty (50) years commencing with an effective date of (date) and ending date of (date). The parties may terminate the agreement at any time by mutual written consent.
- ii. Should IEUA not commission the AWPF and commence taking full deliveries of recycled water from Rialto within ten (10) years of the effective date of this agreement, Rialto may terminate the agreement at its sole discretion without further obligation. Under such circumstances, Supply Deposit payments made to Rialto by IEUA up to the date of termination shall not be refundable.
- iii. Upon termination of the agreement, IEUA shall be responsible for the removal of all above ground facilities associated with the Pump Station and shall restore the site to its original condition. All below ground facilities shall remain in place and become the property of Rialto.
- iv. At its sole discretion, Rialto may elect not to have IEUA remove the Pump Station or restore the site. Under such circumstance, The Pump Station, on-site Conveyance piping and appurtenant facilities shall become the property of Rialto and IEUA shall have no further obligations.

i. Force Majeure Event.

i. For the purposes of the agreement a Force Majeure Event shall be defined as an event beyond the control of the effected party that prevents full or materially significant implementation of that party's obligation, including acts of God, war, hostilities, invasion, rebellion, embargos, strikes, slow-downs and labor lockouts (other than those directly related to a party), pandemics, and acts or threats of terrorism. 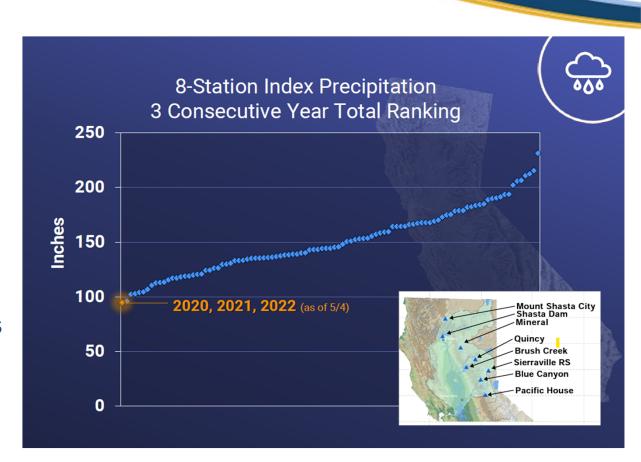

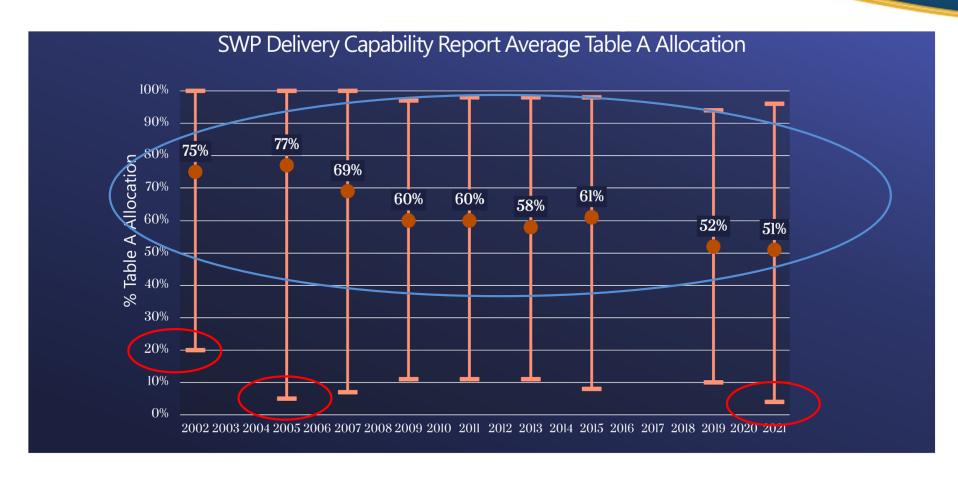

Increasing Regulations Have Steadily Reduced SWP Reliability, Expected to Continue



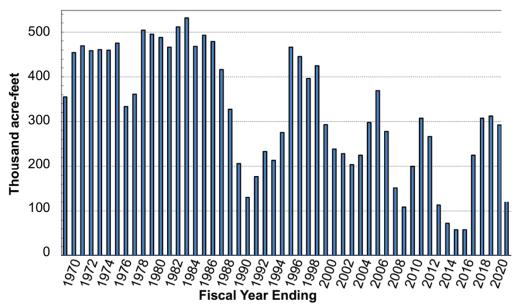


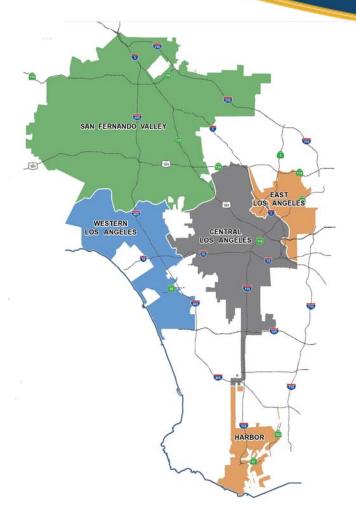

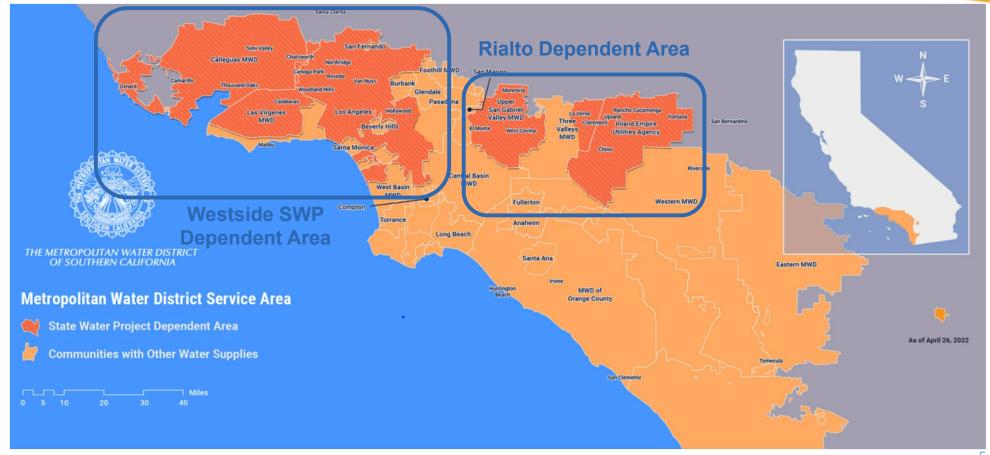
Historical Los Angeles Aqueduct Deliveries





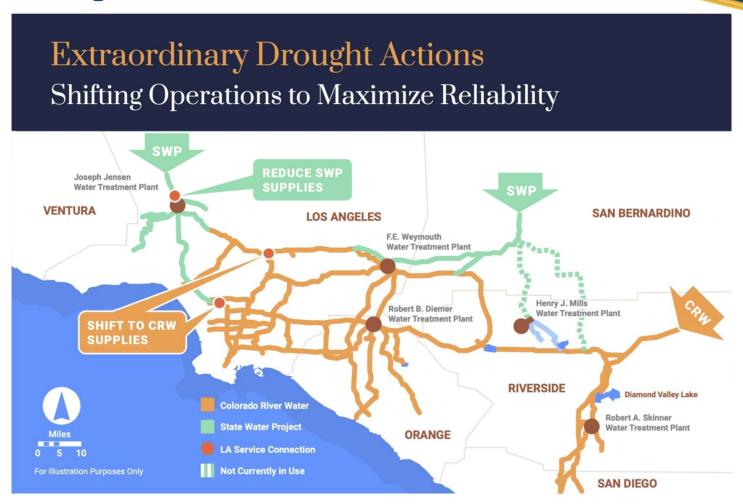

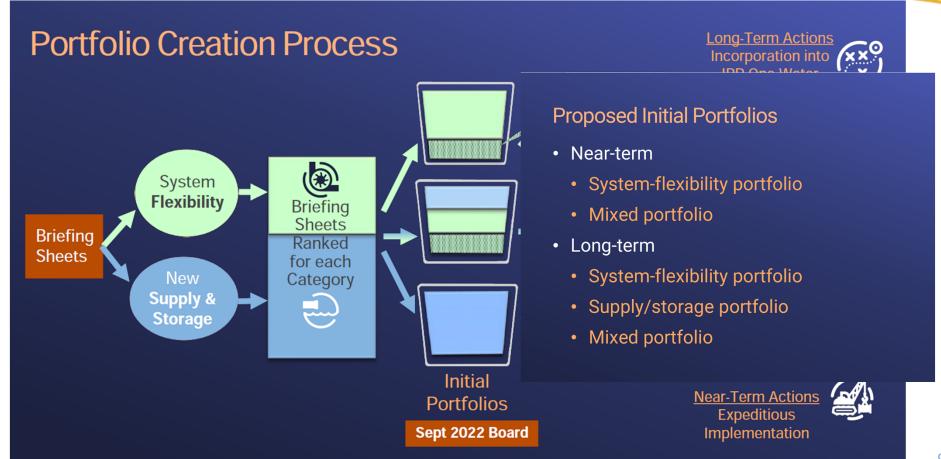

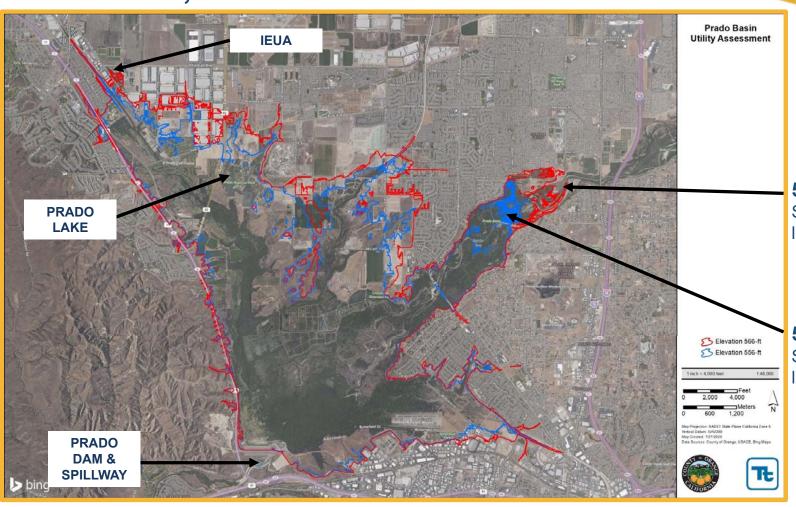


Prado Dam Modifications – Pending 2022

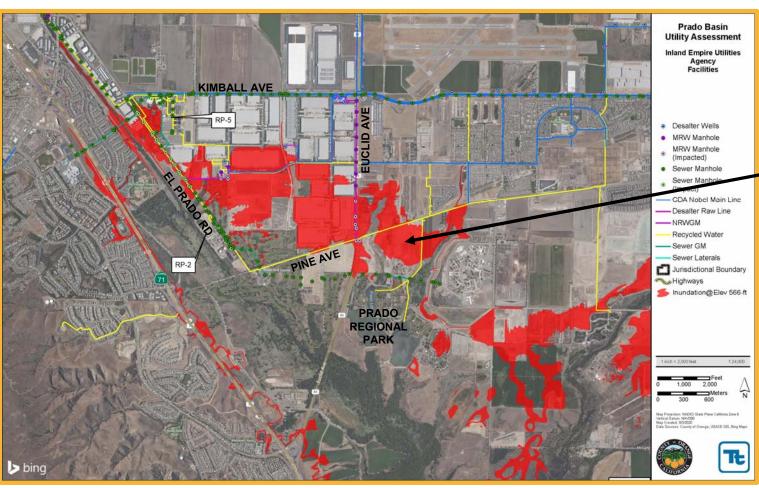

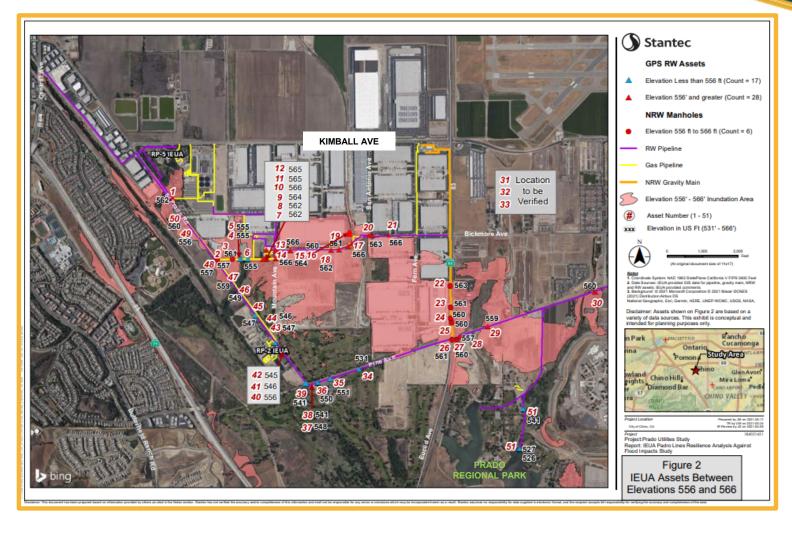

FY23 Appropriations Update

With the federal fiscal year ending on September 30th, Congress is currently considering Continuing Resolution (CR)*. The CR allows the federal government to remain open and funding at current levels until December 16th. Additionally, the CR extends the authorization until December 16th for several federal programs including the National Flood Insurance Program, CALFED Bay-Delta Authorization, and the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families.

*At the time this memo was written, neither the House nor the Senate has passed the CR, but both are anticipated to do so and avoid a government shutdown.

FEMA Announces State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program NOFO

FEMA issued a notice of funding opportunity (NOFO) for the availability of \$1 billion in funding over five years for the State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program established by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL). The program provides state, local, and territorial governments with funding to address cybersecurity risks, strengthen the cybersecurity of critical infrastructure, and resilience against cyber threats. \$155 million in funding is available for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022. Applications for FY 2022 funding are due November 15th, and more information can be found HERE.

Federal Funding Opportunities/Announcements

DOE Announces \$1 Million SolarAPP+ Prize Program. The Department of Energy (DOE) announced it is accepting applications for the \$1 million SolarAPP+ Prize program for local governments. The program will promote the adoption of the SolarAPP+, a new app that issues permits for code-compliant residential solar voltaic systems on demand. Applications are due November 4th. More information can be found <u>HERE</u>.

EPA Announces \$3.5 Million for NEP Watershed Grant Program. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced \$3.5 million in funding for the National Estuary Program (NEP) Watersheds Grant Program. The program will fund projects that treat, remove, or prevent pollution from entering estuaries in addition to climate resiliency projects. More information can be found **HERE**.

Reclamation Announces \$2 Million for Desalination and Water Purification Research Program. The Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) announced it is accepting applications for \$2 million in funding for the Desalination and Water Purification Research Program. The

grants will provide funding for researchers and partners to develop innovative, cost-effective, and technologically efficient ways to desalinate or treat water. Applications are due November 30th, and more information can be found **HERE**.

Reclamation Announces \$20 Million for Small Storage Program. Reclamation announced \$20 million in funding for the Small Storage Program authorized by BIL. The program provides funding for the implementation of small surface storage, groundwater storage, and conveyance projects. Applications are due December 9th, and more information can be found **HERE**.

Reclamation Awards \$10.3 Million in Grants for Native American Affairs Technical Assistance to Tribes Program. Reclamation announced awards totaling \$10.3 million for 26 federally recognized tribes in 12 states as part of the Native American Affairs Technical Assistance to Tribes Program. The program provides funding to support tribal projects that prepare for and mitigate the impacts of drought. More information can be found **HERE**.

Federal Agency Personnel/Regulatory Announcements

President Biden Appoints John Podesta as Senior Advisor to the President for Green Energy Innovation and Implementation. President Biden announced that John Podesta will serve as Senior Advisor to the President for Green Energy Innovation and Implementation. In this role, Podesta will oversee the implementation of energy tax credits and incentives authorized by the Inflation Reduction Act.

President Biden Appoints Richard Revesz as Administrator of OIRA. President Biden announced that he has nominated Richard Revesz as Administrator of the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs (OIRA) at the Office of Management and Budget. The nomination, which requires Senate approval, is currently pending.

White House Office of Science and Technology Policy Nominee Confirmed by Senate. On September 22nd, the Senate confirmed Arati Prabhakar, President Biden's nominee for Director of the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy. President Biden elevated the office to a Cabinet-level position in 2021. Prabhakar will also serve as Science Advisor to the President.

DOI and NOAA Release CMRA Portal. DOI and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) released the Climate Mapping for Resilience and Adaptation (CMRA) portal. The website is a tool for local, tribal, state, and federal government agencies to access data to develop climate resiliency plans. The site also provides information on federal grants for climate resilience projects. More information can be found **HERE**.

EPA Issues NPRM on PFAS Authorized Use for Pesticides. EPA issued a NPRM to remove twelve PFAS chemicals from the list of inert ingredients approved for use in pesticide products. EPA is currently accepting stakeholder feedback on the NPRM. Comments are due October 13th, and more information can be found **HERE**.

EPA Issues Temporary BABA Waiver for WIFIA and SRF Programs. EPA's Office of Water issued a six-month temporary waiver for Build America, Buy America Act (BABA) requirements for its Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) and State Revolving Fund (SRF) programs. The waiver applies to manufactured products and construction materials only. The waiver expires on April 2nd unless extended, and more information can be found **HERE**.

EPA Publishes NPRM on Designating PFOA and PFOS under CERCLA. EPA published its NPRM to designate perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) as hazardous substances under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA), also known as "Superfund." Comments are due November 7th, and more information can be found **HERE**.

EPA Releases Five-Year Strategic Plan. EPA released its FY 2022 – 2026 Strategic Plan that will serve as a roadmap for policy actions over the next five years. The plan includes information about the agency's course of action on climate change, environmental justice, compliance, air quality, and water quality. More information can be found **HERE**.

EPA Releases Technical Cyber Security Support Plan for Public Water Systems. EPA released its Technical Cybersecurity Support Plan for Public Water Systems. The report highlights available tools, including the **Vulnerability Self-Assessment Tool** and the **Cybersecurity Incident Action Checklist**. EPA plans to roll out additional resources and tools in early 2023 according to the report. The Vulnerability Self-Assessment Tool can be EPA's report can be found **HERE**.

Reclamation Releases American River Basin Study. Reclamation released its American River Basin Study which details current and future water conditions for central California. The report found that increased variability of fall and winter precipitation due to rising temperatures and declining snowpacks may amplify the severity of droughts and flooding in the basin. RE: September Report

Overview:

The third consecutive year of drought, the driest on record, ended with the end of the water year on September 30. Climatologists are raising the alarm by predicting a drier-than-normal year again for 2023, but hope that La Nina conditions might shift later in the winter. Despite a fairly significant Northern California storm in September, reservoir levels continue to decline as the state remains at higher-than-normal temperatures for the fall. Lake Oroville is sitting at 64 percent of historical average and 35 percent capacity. San Luis Reservoir, the main south-of-Delta storage facility for the State Water Project, is at just 67 percent of average for this time of the year and 29 percent capacity.

The federal government has recently taken several actions to protect salmon and other habitat on the San Joaquin and Sacramento Rivers. On the San Joaquin, they held back water behind Friant Dam this summer and have just started releasing it at the time when salmon are entering fall spawning season. On the Sacramento, the Bureau of Reclamation is proposing to purchase water from Settlement Contractors to hold water behind Shasta Dam to release when cold water is needed for salmon health. Both actions, especially those on the Sacramento, are helpful to State Water project Contractors. The healthier the watershed the better.

The SWRCB recently adopted a "handbook" implementing a new "microplastics strategy." The strategy will be implemented in two phases. The first phase is monitoring for larger microplastics and the second for smaller particles. The handbook goes into detail about lab accreditation and other specifics about how the state is going to estimate and evaluate risk exposure of microplastics in drinking water.

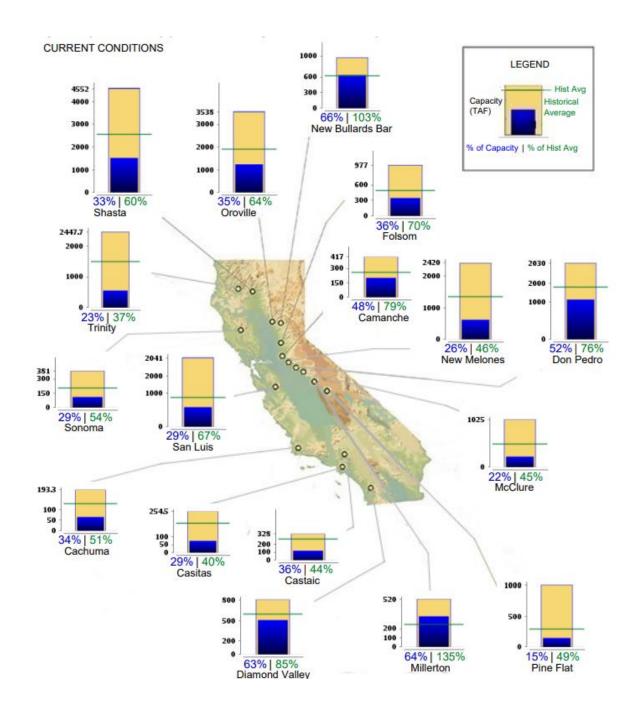
The legislative session is officially over, with the Governor acting on over 700 bills in the final week of September. It was a fairly busy year with more water-related bills than usual. ACWA's legislation to provide for a tax exemption for turf removal rebates was signed by the Governor with greater than normal fanfare. CASA's bill to require products containing PFAS to register their products on a publicly accessible database struggled with significant opposition from manufacturers but was able to pass onto the Governor with just enough votes the Governor vetoed the bill, citing pressure on the state budget. MWD's legislation to allow for alternative project delivery methods for several of their projects easily passed out of both houses of the Legislature and was signed by the Governor, while similar legislation (SB 991, Newman) to allow for progressive design build processes for projects over \$5 million also awaits consideration by the Governor. Unless a bill had an "urgency clause," all legislation will go into effect on January 1, 2023.

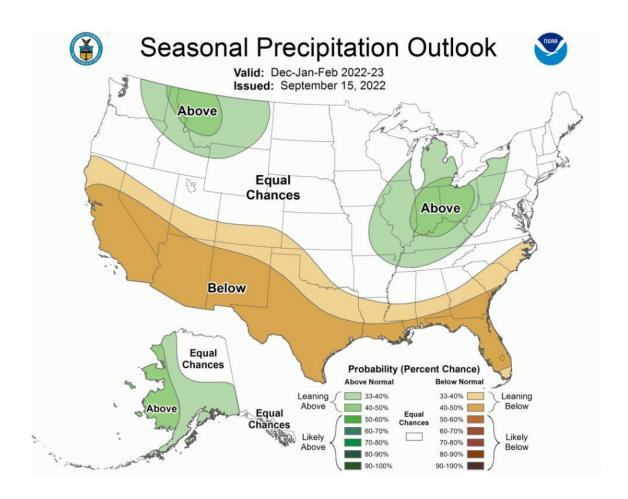
Members will come back to Sacramento in December to swear in new members and "organize" the session, but will return in earnest to start the legislative deliberations in January. With about one-third of the legislature retiring this year, there will be a lot of new members roaming the halls of the Capitol soon.

Inland Empire Utilities Agency Status Report – September 2022

Water Supply Conditions

After the three driest water years on record, 2022 water year came to a close on September 30 with water managers not optimistic the pattern will break this winter. Scientists predict a La Nina, drycondition pattern, to remain in the state through the winter. Lake Oroville is sitting at 64 percent of historical average and 35 percent capacity. San Luis Reservoir, the main south-of-Delta storage facility for the State Water Project, is at just 67 percent of average for this time of the year and 29 percent capacity. Drought conditions continue to worsen with 17 percent of the state in exceptional drought and 41 percent in extreme drought.





Federal Actions to Protect Fish

As the state grapples with balancing depleted water supplies and protecting native fish, federal water managers have implemented several actions to attempt to protect salmon on the Sacramento and San Joaquin Rivers.

San Joaquin River Restoration Program Restoration Administrator has scheduled the resumption of Restoration Flows on the San Joaquin River starting October 1.

Due to unprecedented drought conditions and historic water rights, Restoration Flows were gradually reduced to zero in early April as Friant Dam began making higher releases to supply the San Joaquin River Exchange Contractors at Mendota Pool. From early April through mid-July, Friant Releases ranged upwards of 1,700 cubic feet per second (cfs). Since mid-July, Friant Dam releases have ranged from 230 cfs to 290 cfs to meet Holding Contracts and did not extend past Gravelly Ford, 38 miles downstream from Friant Dam.

Despite extreme drought conditions and lower flows since mid-July, river conditions were adequate to sustain a small cohort of adult spring-run Chinook salmon holding between Friant Dam and Gravelly Ford in Reach 1. Managing Millerton Lake's cold water pool by conserving Restoration Flows for nearly three months benefited river temperatures directly downstream of Friant Dam and the survival of holding adult salmon. These fish are set to begin their final life stage — making redds (fish nests) and spawning this fall (September/October) — before a new cohort of juvenile salmon emerges this winter.

On the Sacramento River, Reclamation is proposing to use drought relief funds to purchase water from Sacramento River Settlement Contractors to support fish and wildlife on the Sacramento River.

The proposed action would allow for up to 100 TAF of conserved water that could otherwise be delivered during October 2022 to remain in Shasta Reservoir to contribute to storage for Water Year 2023. The additional storage may benefit cold-water pool and instream temperature management for WY 2023 and may have additional fish and wildlife benefits as may be needed to meet flow objectives for fish and wildlife on the Sacramento River. Reclamation was appropriated \$200 million.

SWRCB Adopts Microplastics Strategy

As required by 2018 legislation, the State Board recently adopted the <u>Policy Handbook Establishing A Standard Method of Testing and Reporting of Microplastics in Drinking Water</u> The state will employ a two-phase iterative approach for monitoring microplastics to obtain sufficient information to estimate risk through exposure. Each step will last two years, with an interim period to allow for State Water Board staff to assess results from the first phase and plan the second phase of monitoring accordingly. For both phases, the State Water Board will issue orders to public water systems and/or wholesaler providers to monitor microplastics in source waters and/or treated drinking water.

<u>Phase I:</u> monitoring will focus on characterizing occurrence of microplastics larger than 20 or 50 micrometers in length in source waters used for drinking in accordance with the specifications in the method employed by the laboratory

Phase II: monitoring will be directed towards characterizing occurrence of microplastics both smaller than and larger than 20 micrometers in length in treated drinking water.

Legislative Update

The Legislature adjourned the 2021-22 Legislative Session in the early morning hours of September 1. The Governor acted on over 700 bills in the final week of September, the 30th being the Governor's deadline to act on all legislation. With the final approvals and vetoes, the legislative session is officially over. Members will return to Sacramento briefly to "organize" in December and will return in earnest in January to begin the 2023-24 legislative session.

Bill updates:

AB 2142 (Gabriel): This bill would provide an income tax exemption for rebates from a turf removal program. Sponsored by ACWA, the bill didn't receive a single no vote throughout the entire process and was signed by the Governor, who also put out a press release touting the importance of the bill.

AB 1845 (Calderon): MWD sponsored bill to allow for alternative project delivery methods for specific MWD projects. The bill only received one no vote through the process and was signed by the Governor.

SB 991 (Newman): This bill is similar to MWD's AB 1845 but it would allow for progressive design build to be used on any project over \$5 million. The bill didn't receive a single no vote throughout the entire process and was signed by the Governor.

AB 2247 (Bloom): CASA sponsored bill would require products sold in CA that contain PFAS to register the product on a publicly accessible reporting platform. The bill was recently amended to remove some of the enforcement language, which should remove some of the opposition. The bill has

had a rough road, garnering significant opposition from the manufacturing community. It received *just* enough votes to move through the legislative process, but the Governor ultimately vetoed the bill. The veto message cited const pressure on the state budget as his reason for the veto.

AB 2449 (Rubio): Sponsored by Three Valleys Municipal Water District's, this legislation addresses remote participation for elected officials. The author took amendments in the Senate to address concerns from the Senate Governance and Finance and Judiciary Committee concerns surrounding misuse of these allowances to not have to face the public during challenging proceedings. The bill now limits the number of times an official can use remote testimony and requires that "cameras must be on" at all times. AB 2449 was signed by the Governor.

SB 1157 (Hertzberg): The bill would implement the indoor GPCD targets outlined in the DWR/SWRCB draft report to the Legislature for 47 GPCD by 2025 and 42 GPCD by 2030. The bill passed out of Natural Resources and Water Committee despite significant concerns from Senator Ben Hueso (D-San Diego). The bill was quickly moved to the floor of the Senate where it passed 28-9. The author took amendments in the Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee that would require studying the impacts to wastewater and recycled water systems. The bill was further amended to require consideration of variances for recycled water. The bill was seven votes short of passage on the Assembly floor on its first vote, but was brought up under "reconsideration" in the final minutes of the session and secured the necessary votes for passage. The bill was signed by the Governor who included in his signing message, a directive for the SWRCB to consider adopting a recycled water variance.

AB 1279 (Muratsuchi): declares it a policy of the state that as soon as possible, but no later than 2045, the state shall achieve net zero emissions and maintain negative GHG emissions thereafter. The bill also requires an 85 percent reduction in anthropogenic GHG emissions below 1990 levels by 2045. The bill was signed by the Governor.

SB 1020 (**Laird**): established the policy that eligible renewable energy resources and zero-carbon resources supply 90 percent of all retail sales of electricity to CA end-use customers by then end of 2035 and 95 percent by the end of 2040. The bill also requires that eligible renewable energy resources and zero-carbon resources supply 100 percent of electricity procured to serve all state agencies by the end of 2035, ten years sooner then required by existing law.

These provisions also apply to the State Water Project (SWP). While the bill was recently amended to ease the burden on the SWP, this bill is estimated to cost the State Water Contractors \$1.2 billion, with MWD's share likely about \$720 million. The bill was signed by the Governor.

SB 846 (Dodd): extends the operation of the Diablo Canyon Nuclear Generation Station (San Luis Obispo). Diablo Canyon was planned to shut down at the end of 2025, but with supply chain disruptions and other factors, there is significant risk that there will be insufficient new clean energy supplies online before the scheduled retirement. The bill declared that Diablo is crucial to energy reliability throughout the state, therefore all IOU ratepayers will be on the hook for 50 percent of the cost while PG&E ratepayers will be responsible for the remaining half. Because the fee collection is volumetric, high-energy users will be responsible for a majority of the reliability costs. The bill was the last bill of the session voted on by both houses and passed overwhelmingly. The Governor signed the bill.

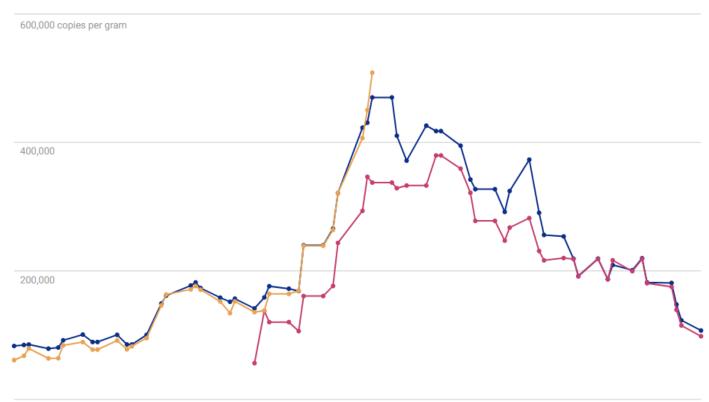

Executive Summary:

The Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) monitors and compiles water use data including recycled water use for the Planning Annual Report. IEUA tracks overall water demands and sources of supply from each of its retail agencies. Total water consumption within IEUA's service area for FY 2021/22 was 196,552 AF (177,292 AF of potable water + 19,260 AF of recycled water direct use). Potable water use is down approximately 3% compared to FY 20/21. Recycled water direct use slightly decreased approximately 1.4% compared to FY 20/21.

IEUA's energy consumption, renewable generation performance, and energy efficiency projects are reported in the Annual Energy Report. IEUA consumed 84,470 MWh of electricity, an increase of 4.1% from FY 21/22, of which 10% was generated by its renewable sources.

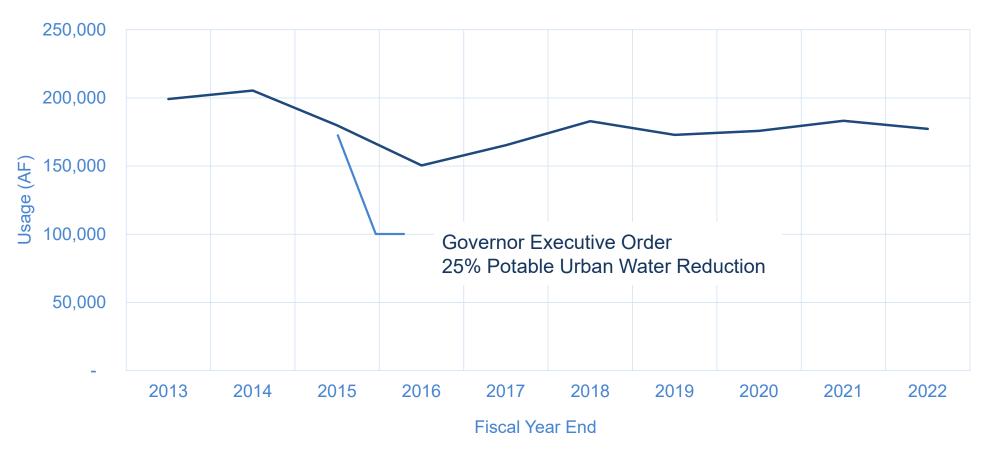

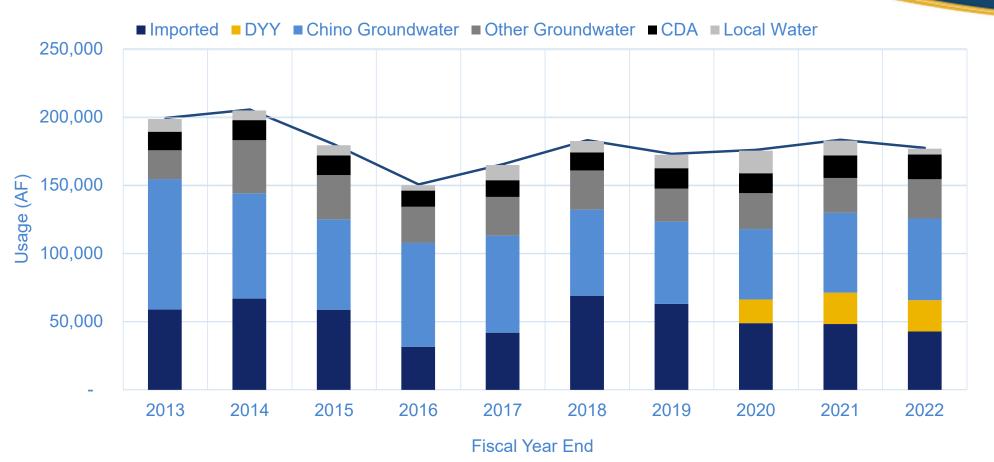


Regional Potable Water Demand



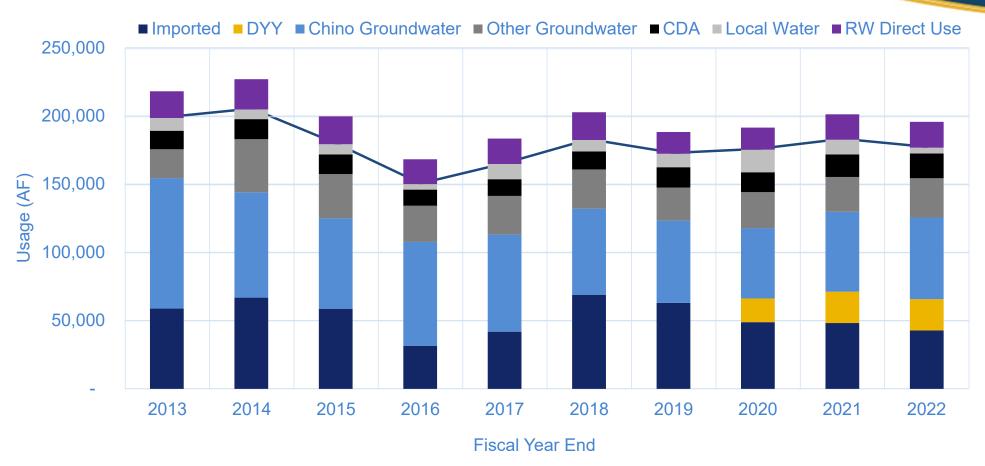


Regional Potable Water Portfolio

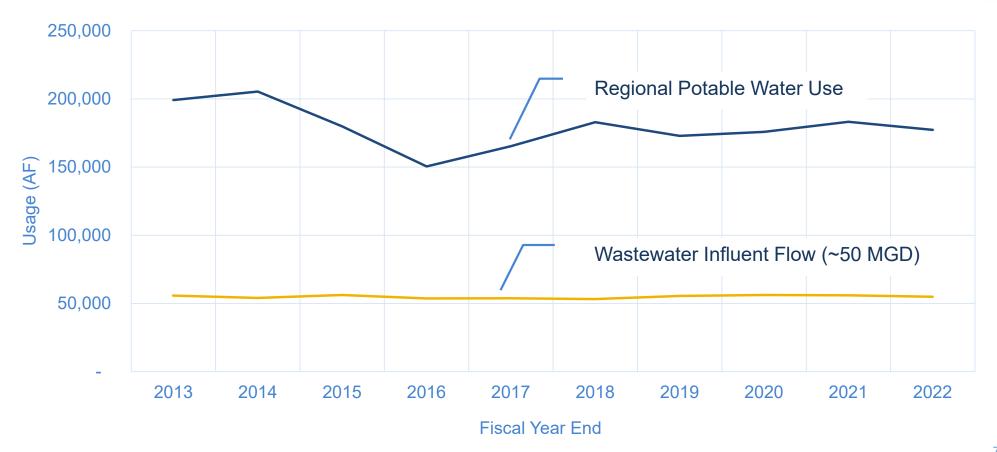
Regional Total Water Use

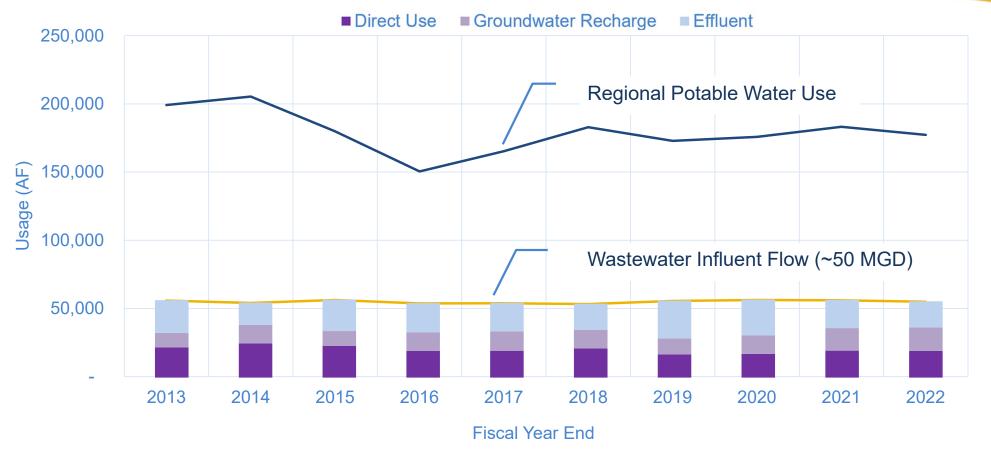


Regional Potable Water Use and Wastewater Influent Flow



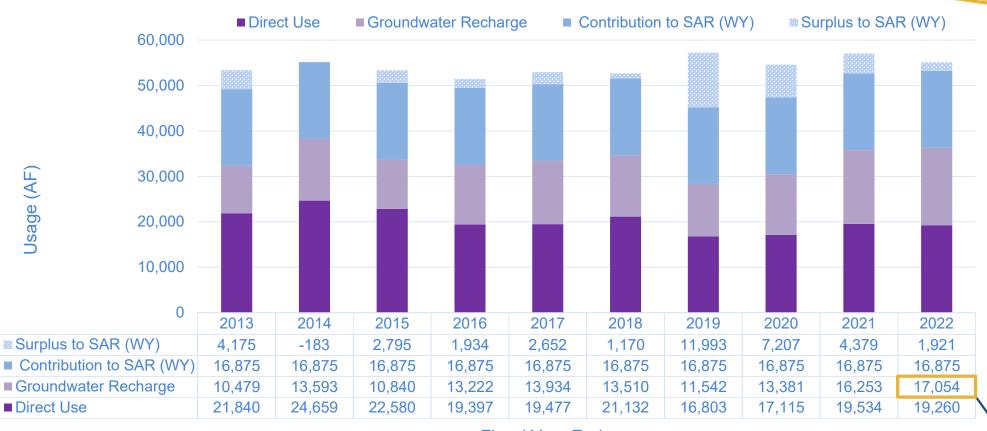


Regional Potable Water Use Wastewater Influent Flow and Recycled Water

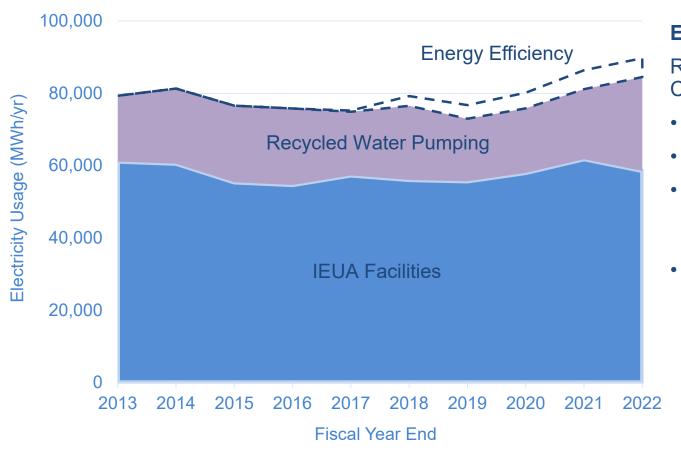

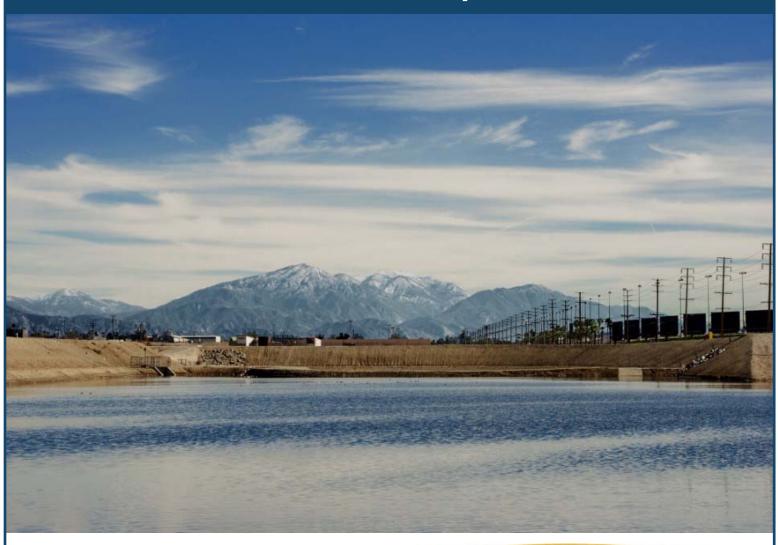

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INTRODUCTION

The Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) is located in Western San Bernardino County and serves approximately 920,000 residents in a 242-square mile service area. As a regional wastewater treatment agency, IEUA provides wastewater utility services to seven regional contracting agencies (RCAs) under the Chino Basin Regional Sewage Service Contract: cities of Chino, Chino Hills, Fontana, Montclair, Ontario, Upland, and Cucamonga Valley Water District (CVWD) in the city of Rancho Cucamonga. In addition to the RCAs, the Agency provides wholesale imported water from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) to seven retail agencies: the cities of Chino, Chino Hills, Ontario, Upland, CVWD in the city of Rancho Cucamonga, Fontana Water Company in the city of Fontana, and the Monte Vista Water District in the city of Montclair.

In addition to providing these key services, IEUA also produces and distributes high quality recycled water, implements the Chino Basin stormwater/groundwater recharge program, and provides regional water resources planning to ensure reliable, cost-effective environmentally responsible water supplies for current and future customers. The purpose of the Planning Annual Report (PAR) is to provide annually updated information about the IEUA service area's potable water, recycled water, groundwater, and wastewater. This report also provides a holistic summary of historic trends, usage patterns, current programs, and future forecasts.

SECTION 1: ANNUAL IEUA SERVICE AREA WATER USE

IEUA monitors and compiles water use data from each of its retail agencies to track overall water demands and sources of supply. Annual water use is split between potable water usage and the direct use of recycled water. IEUA's regional water usage in FY 21/22 was 196,552 AF (177,292 AF potable usage and 19,260 AF recycled direct usage). Recycled water used for groundwater recharge is not included in this total but can be found in Section 2 of the PAR.

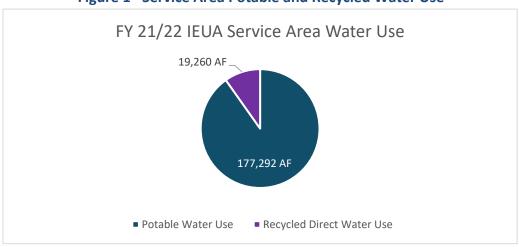


Figure 1 – Service Area Potable and Recycled Water Use

Current Potable Water Use

Total potable water consumption within IEUA's service area for FY 21/22 was 177,292 AF. This is approximately a 3% decrease (5,950 AF) from FY 2020/21 potable consumption of 183,242 AF. The region is now using approximately 14% less potable water than before the drought in FY 13/14 when potable consumption was at 205,381 AF. MWD Tier 1 imported water use in the region slightly decreased from 71,444 AF in FY 20/21 to 65,877 AF in FY 21/22. Both FY 20/21 and FY 21/22 MWD usage includes Dry Year Yield (DYY) water supplies. For more information on DYY, see "Dry Year Yield" in section 2 of the PAR. A breakdown of the IEUA regional usage can be found in Table 2, while a breakdown of the retail water agencies' FY 21/22 water usage can be found in Appendix B.

Projected Imported Water Use

Demands for MWD Tier 1 imported water brought into the region through IEUA were projected to 2045 as part of the 2020 Urban Water Management Plan (2020 UWMP). The 2020 UWMP imported water demand projections were supplied by the retail agencies to IEUA. IEUA expects imported demand to increase over the next 25 years based on the 2020 UWMP projections. The forecast presented on Table 1 below does not take into account imported water restrictions that may be implemented by MWD due to the recent drought.

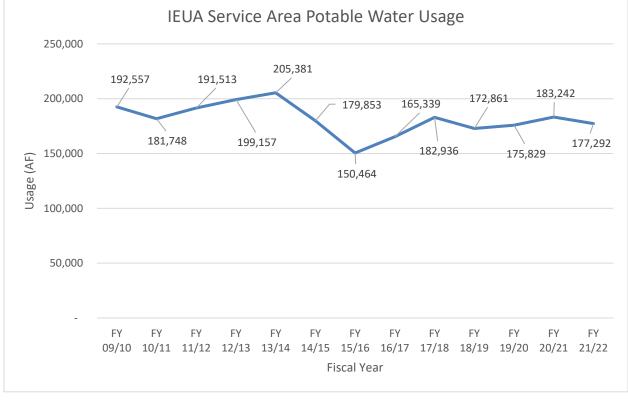


Figure 2 – IEUA Service Area Potable Water Use

Current Recycled Water Use

IEUA is the wholesale recycled water provider to the RCAs which work as or with retail agencies to directly serve their customers. IEUA contracting/retail water agencies which served recycled water in 2021/22 include:

- City of Chino
- City of Chino Hills
- Cucamonga Valley Water District (CVWD)
- City of Fontana (through FWC)
- City of Montclair (through MVWD)
- City of Ontario
- City of Upland

Fontana Water Company (FWC) and Monte Vista Water District (MVWD) are the water retailers in the Cities of Fontana and Montclair, respectively, but are not IEUA regional contracting agencies. FWC and MVWD retail recycled water obtained from their overlying cities, which are IEUA regional contracting agencies. San Bernardino County is currently a direct use customer of IEUA based on long standing historical contracts. Total recycled water direct use within the region was 19,260 AF in FY 21/22.

Projected Recycled Water Use

Direct recycled water use in the IEUA service area has been projected out to 2040 in both the 2020 UWMP and as part of the Recycled Water Demand Forecast Technical Memorandum (Demand Forecast). The 2020 UWMP recycled water projections were supplied by the retail agencies to IEUA as part of the 2020 UWMP. The Demand Forecast recycled water projections utilized land use-based demand modeling completed by IEUA in conjunction with the retail agencies in 2015 and were subsequently updated in 2021.

Projected Regional Water Use

Projected water use was calculated as part of the development of the 2020 UWMP. IEUA collected each retail agencies' projected water use from their respective UWMP and totaled the use to obtain a regional water use projection. Regional water use projections include both potable and recycled water direct use.

Projected water use was also calculated as part of the 2015 Integrated Resources Plan (2015 IRP), which developed a range of demand possibilities to accommodate for future uncertainty caused by the various demand factors including climate change. This analysis came from demand modeling conducted as part of the 2015 IRP and 2015 Urban Water Management Plan (2015 UWMP), which found that new developments in the region are more water efficient due to changes in the plumbing code, higher density developments with less landscaping, and compliance landscape ordinance requirements set forth in AB1881.

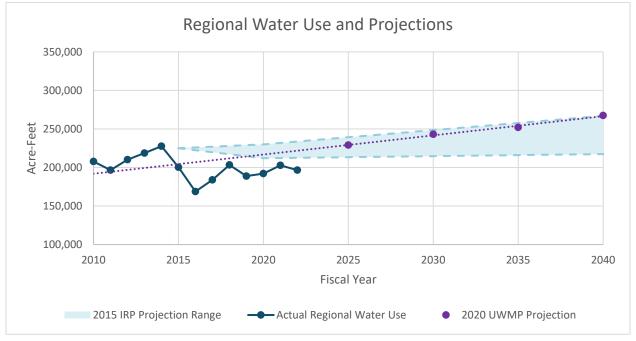


Figure 3 – IEUA Regional Water Use and Projections

The 2020 UWMP and 2015 IRP both reach approximately 267,000 AF in the year 2040. However, IEUA's actual FY 21/22 regional water use of 196,552 AF (177,292 AF potable use and 19,260 AF recycled direct use) is below the 2020 low demand forecast of 212,000 AF outlined in IEUA's 2015 IRP. A continuous focus on water use efficiency and per capita reductions, as required in SB X7-7, AB 1668, and SB 606 is anticipated to reduce per capita water use and demands. IEUA anticipates a slight decrease in FY22/23 water use due to conservation efforts related to the severe drought impacting the region. Long-term demands are not expected to exceed the peak 10-year demand reached during FY 13/14.

An increase to the number of Meter Equivalent Units (MEUs) in the region is anticipated. For FY 22/23 it is projected that the region will contain 418,094 MEUs, an increase of 4,268 MEUs from FY 21/22's actual MEUs count of 413,826.

SECTION 2: GROUNDWATER RECHARGE DELIVERIES

Historical Groundwater Recharge Deliveries

The Chino Basin is one of the largest groundwater basins in Southern California containing approximately 5,000,000 AF of water with an un-used storage capacity of approximately 1,000,000 AF. Groundwater from the Chino Basin accounts for approximately 34% of FY 21/22, regional water supplies. The Chino Basin is an adjudicated basin and has been overseen by the Chino Basin Watermaster (CBWM) since 1978. The basin is dependent on rainfall and supplemental sources for recharge.

IEUA, in coordination with CBWM, the Chino Basin Water Conservation District (CBWCD), and San Bernardino County Flood Control District (SBCFCD) capture water for replenishment. Sources include recycled water from IEUA's regional water recycling plants, stormwater and dry weather flow capture, and imported water recharge.

Recharged imported water is either purchased by a local agency, requested by the Chino Basin Watermaster to maintain safe operating yield of the basin, used to blend down recharged recycled water TDS levels, or as part of the Chino Basin Dry-Year Yield (DYY) Program. Total groundwater recharge delivered to the Chino Basin in FY 21/22 was 25,441 AF. Groundwater recharge deliveries is water delivered to recharge facilities and does not take into consideration evaporative or other losses that may occur prior to recharge.

Recycled water groundwater recharge use was 17,054 AFY in FY 21/22, up 5% from FY 20/21's recycled water ground water recharge of 16,253 AF. Recycled water is recharged by IEUA on behalf of its RCAs and retail water agencies.

FY 21/22 was the highest recycled water recharge recorded to date at over 17,000 AF. The decrease in overall recharge from all sources compared to previous years is due in part to lower precipitation rates reducing stormwater availability and MWD not requesting the storage of any water for the DYY program in FY 21/22.

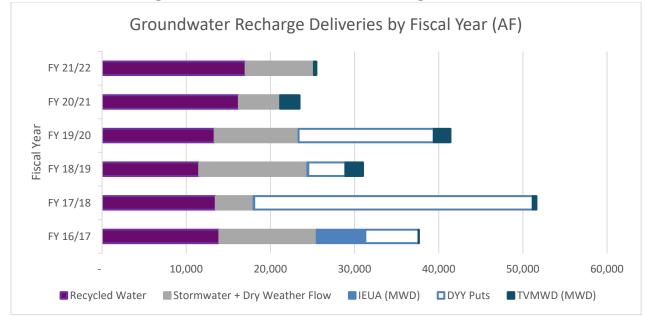


Figure 5 – Historical Groundwater Recharge Deliveries

Projected Groundwater Recharge Deliveries

It is projected that future groundwater recharge delivery projections will remain at an estimated 16,420 AFY of recycled water as outlined in the 2018 Recharge Master Plan Update. Due to the unpredictability of storm events and variability of imported water for groundwater recharge in the IEUA region, the five-year average was taken to determine the projected recharge of stormwater and dry weather flows and imported water. Table 10 below shows the 5-year

Dry Year Yield

The DYY program provides for the storage of up to 100,000 AF of water in a MWD Storage Account in the Chino Basin pursuant to the Groundwater Storage Program Funding Agreement dated June 2003 and as subsequently amended. Signatories to the Phase I Agreement are:

- Metropolitan Water District of Southern California
- Inland Empire Utilities Agency
- Three Valleys Municipal Water District
- Chino Basin Watermaster

The DYY Agreement provides for storage of up to 25,000 AF per year unless Chino Basin Watermaster allows for more, and extraction, at MWD's call during dry years, of up to 33,000 AF per year not to exceed the amount of water in the Metropolitan Storage Account (DYY Account). In February 2019, the signatories expanded the extraction provisions so that water could be voluntarily extracted from the DYY Account outside of call years, with approval from the signatories.

From June 2017 through June 2020 a total of 63,308 AF were stored in the DYY Account; 58,372 AF by groundwater recharge and 4,936 AF by Aquifer Storage and Recovery (ASR) injected water. From July 2019 through June 2022 Cucamonga Valley Water District and Fontana Water Company have voluntarily extracted 63,308 AF, leaving the account with a balance of 0 AF.

The DYY account balance for FY 21/22 is shown in Table 11. The account balance is currently at 0 AF. At this time, there is no plan to store additional water in the DYY account.

SECTION 3: SANTA ANA REGIONAL BASEFLOW OBLIGATION

Santa Ana River Regional Baseflow Obligation

The Santa Ana River has a regional baseflow obligation established by past judgment. The baseflow obligation is a joint obligation between IEUA and Western Municipal Water District to ensure an average of 42,000 AF at Prado Dam. The minimum baseflow obligation was reduced to 34,000 AF after 1986 as long as no cumulative baseflow debt exists. In Water Year 2020/2021, baseflow at Prado Dam was 74,580 AF. More information about the Santa Ana River baseflow obligation can be found in the Santa Ana River Watermaster Annual Report.

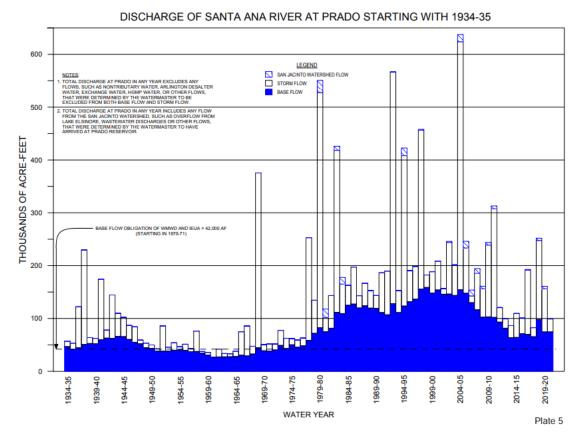


Figure 6 - Discharge of Santa Ana River at Prado

SECTION 4: WASTEWATER

Wastewater Actuals

Over the past decade the IEUA service area has experienced an increase in indoor water use efficiency as a direct result of drought, shifting public policy, more efficient building and plumbing codes, and effective conservation program campaigns. This increased efficiency has decreased the volume of wastewater flows received by IEUA treatment plants by approximately 10% since 2010. The flows have slightly increased over the last year, likely due to the regional population continuing to grow. Still, the combination of an increased population but overall reduced wastewater flow has resulted in an increase in the strength of the wastewater coming into IEUA's treatment facilities. This trend of increased wastewater strength is expected to continue as both the population and regional water efficiency standards continue to increase. Current and future wastewater treatment plant expansions are driven by the increased strength of wastewater flows to the facilities, rather than the volume of flows to the facilities.

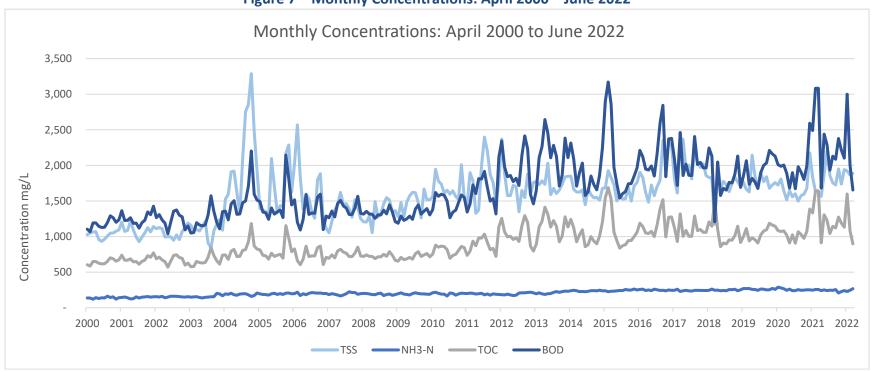


Figure 7 – Monthly Concentrations: April 2000 – June 2022

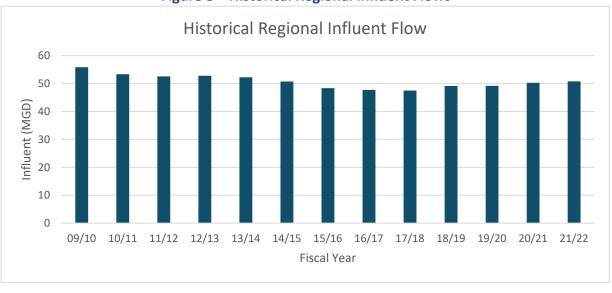


Figure 8 – Historical Regional Influent Flows

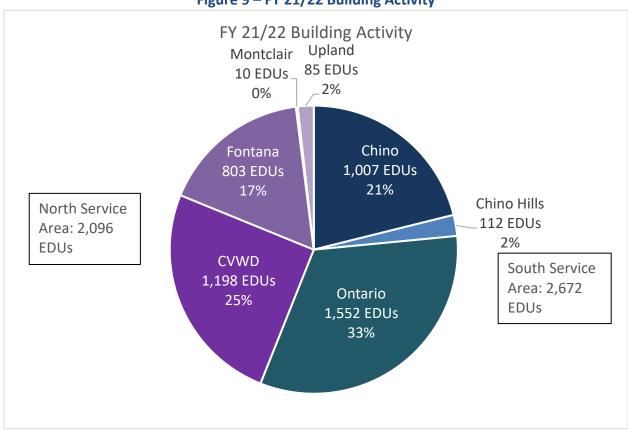
While wastewater flows have generally decreased since FY 09/10, recycled water use has increased. This increase in recycled water utilization can at least partially be attributed to the San Bernardino Avenue Lift Station and the Montclair Lift Station. The Montclair Lift Station pumps wastewater from portions of Montclair, Upland, and Chino to IEUA's RP-1 and CCWRF treatment plants. The San Bernardino Ave Pump Station pumps a portion of the flow from the City of Fontana to IEUA's RP-4 treatment plant. Together, these lift stations help shift flows that would naturally flow from one portion of the service area to a different treatment plant to balance flows and keep water in the northern portion of the service area. This shift in flows allows IEUA to maximize the potential for recycled water use, especially as the majority of recycled water groundwater recharge activity occurs in the northern portion of the service area. These lift stations also increase regional system flexibility and allow the treatment plants to operate as an interconnected system.

Equivalent Dwelling Unit (EDU) activity had increased in FY 21/22 with the addition of 4,767 EDUs to the region. The additional EDUs added in FY 21/22 were 4,377 EDUs lower than the RCAs projections of 9,144 EDUs and 767 EDUs more than the IEUA Budgeted Projections of 4,000 EDUs. Two sets of projections exist to allow for conservative estimates on both the flow and financial aspects of EDUs. The RCAs provide growth projections per the Regional Sewage Service Contract, which are then used to determine plant treatment capacity needs. Budgeted projections on the other hand are used by IEUA to project future funding needs. To ensure fund availability, budgeted projections are conservatively low. The result of both sets of projections is the assumption that projections are conservative, ensuring IEUA treatment plants can handle the added load while also ensuring the agency does not over project fund availability. Moving forward, IEUA will work with the RCAs to develop land use model-based growth projections to enhance projection reliability.

Wastewater Projections

Wastewater flow forecasts are conducted annually and are based on four main components: (1) historical wastewater flow trends; (2) per dwelling unit wastewater generation factors, based on the 2015 Wastewater Facilities Master Plan Update (WWFMPU) projections; (3) actual influent flows measured at the treatment plants; and (4) expected future growth numbers provided by the RCAs. These projections are used to determine future demands on the Agency's facilities and help anticipate the need for modifications to treatment plants and solids handling facilities.

The WWFMPU identified the projected flows to the treatment plants in 2035 through 2060. The WWFMPU estimates that there will be a regional flow of 73.5 MGD by 2035 and an ultimate/build-out flow of 80 MGD by 2060. The increase in flows implies that there will be facility expansions over the next 20 years.

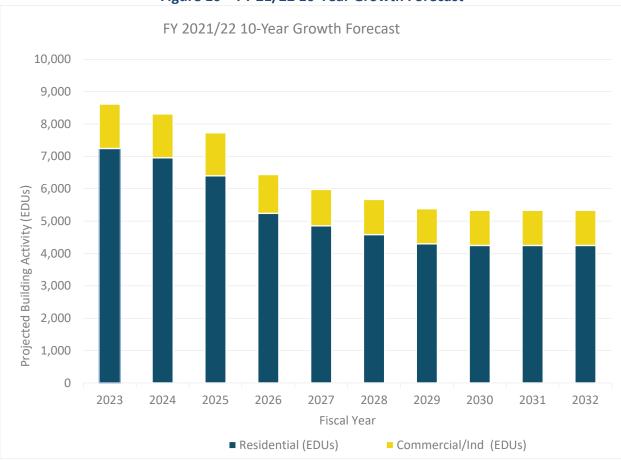


Figure 10 – FY 21/22 10-Year Growth Forecast

IEUA staff and RCAs are in the process of updating the 10-year demand forecast. The draft results of the 10-year capacity demand forecast survey are summarized in Figure 10 below. Approximately 73% of the projected growth over the next ten years is anticipated to be from new development in the City of Ontario and City of Fontana service areas; building activity is projected to be approximately 80% residential and 20% commercial/industrial.

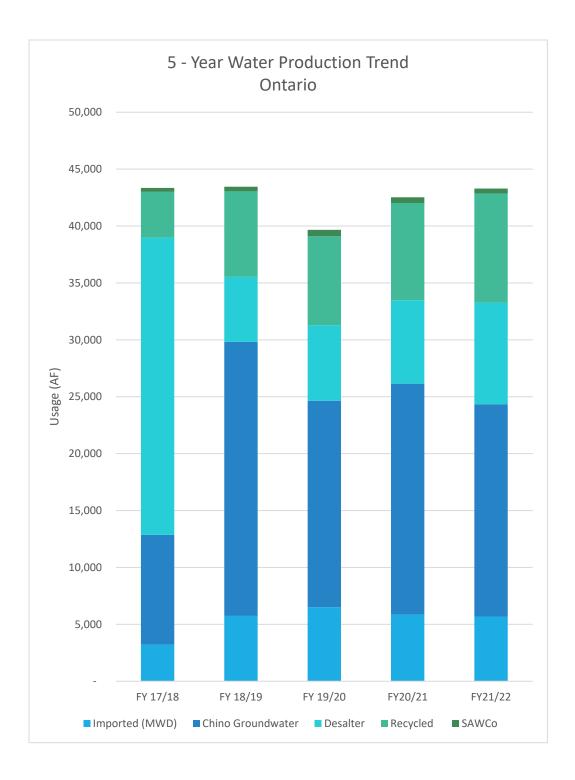


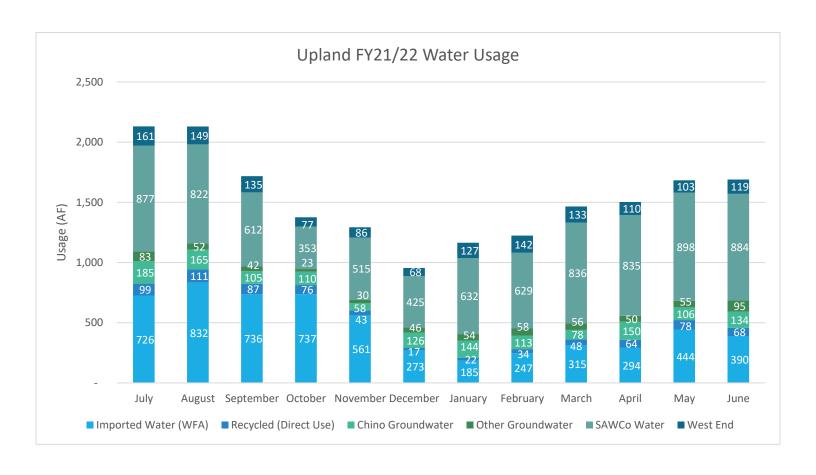


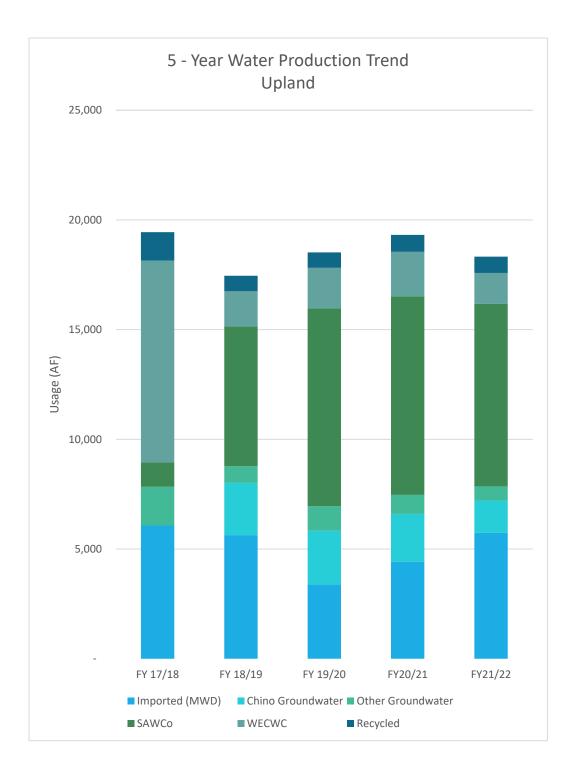


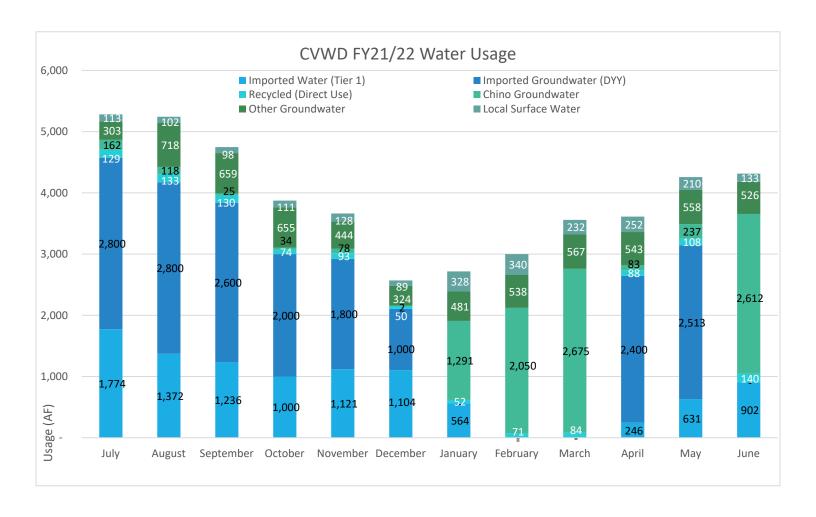


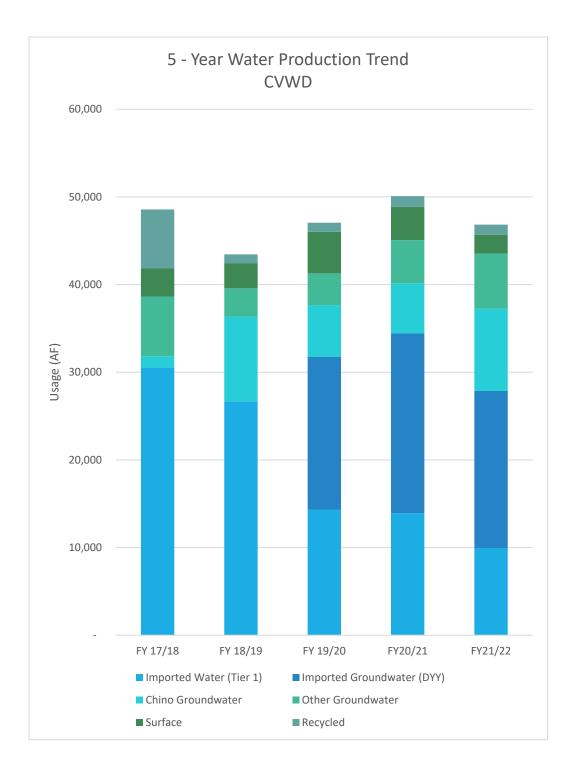


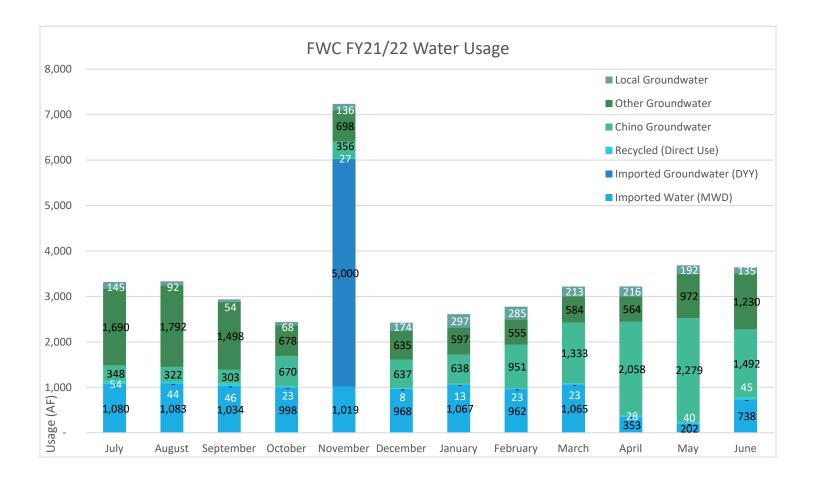


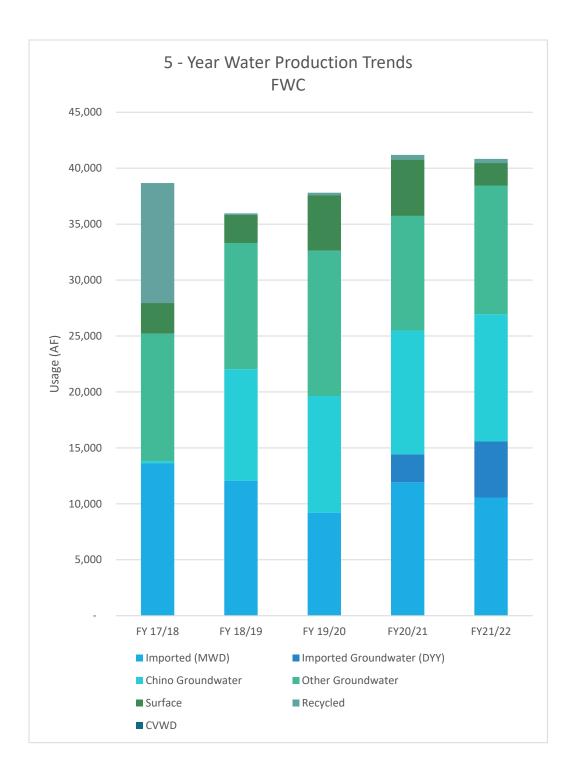


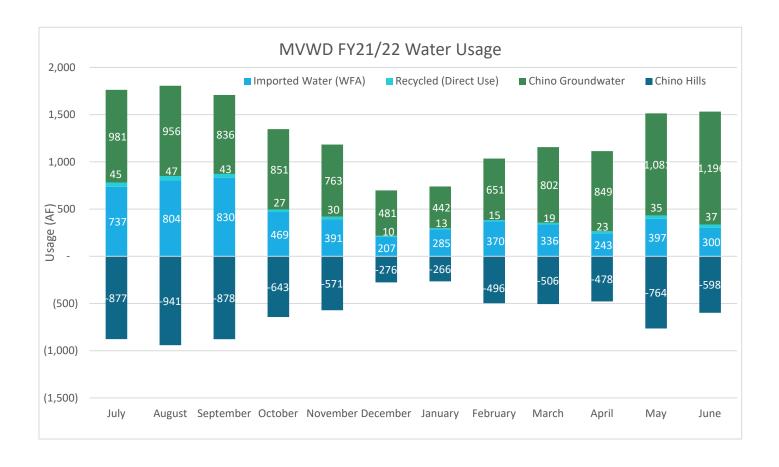


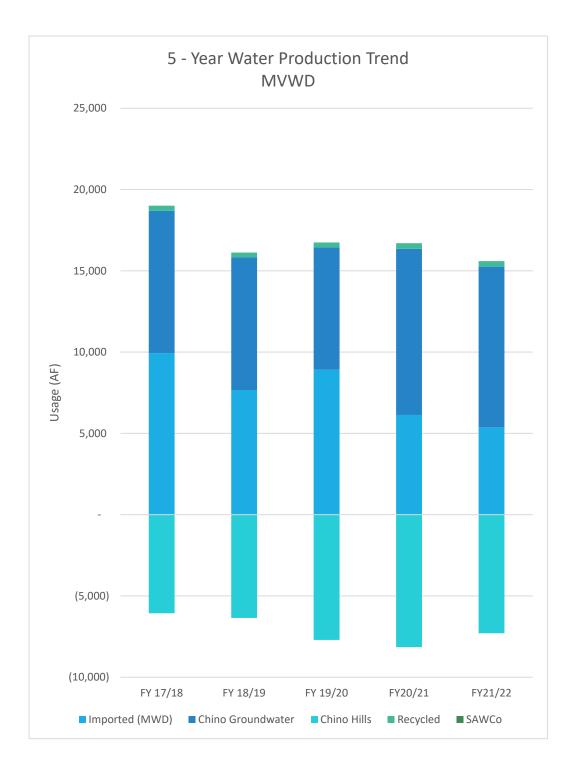


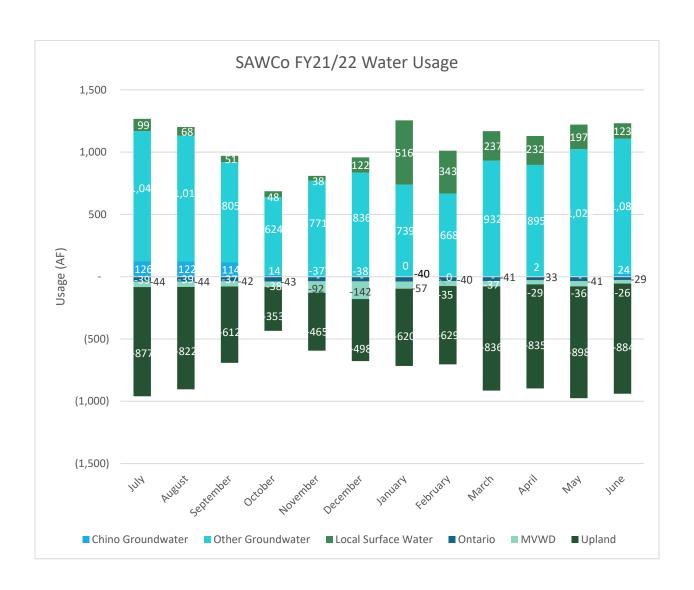


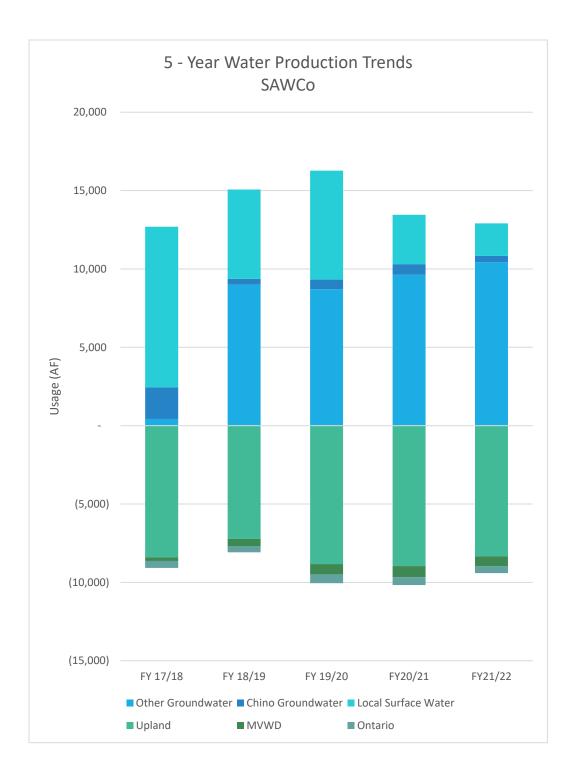












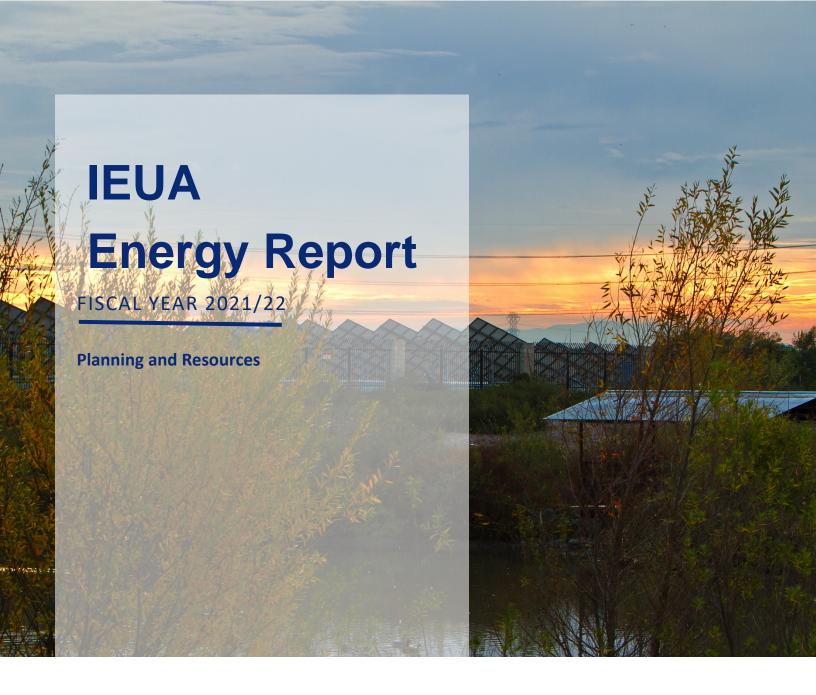




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IEUA Energy Portfolio

Executive Summary

The 2021/22 Energy Report tracks IEUA's energy consumption and portfolio, renewable generation performance and savings, and energy efficiency projects for the fiscal year. The report includes a brief description of upcoming projects and initiatives that will be implemented over the next few years.

IEUA's energy portfolio included:

- Imported Electricity
- Solar Energy
- Wind Power
- Battery Storage
- Biogas
- Natural gas

2021/22 IEUA's energy use

- Total Electricity consumption: 84,470 MWh of electricity
- Renewable Energy: 7,520 MWh (10% of total electricity)
- Annual energy expenses: \$10.9 million [imported electricity, renewable energy, natural gas, and energy management services]
- Renewable energy savings since 2008: \$1,377,000.

Flow and Energy Consumption

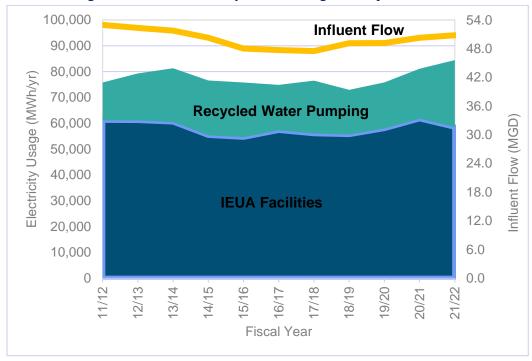


Figure 1: IEUA Electricity Use and Regional Influent Flows

- In 2021/22, the annual average influent flow to the regional water recycling plants was 50.8 MGD which was an increase of 1% as compared to the previous fiscal year of 50.3 MGD (Figure 1).
- In 2021/22, IEUA facilities, which include the regional water recycling plants, composting
 facility, and recycled water pumping, used approximately 84,470 MWh of electricity (Figure 1).
 The electricity consumption for 2021/22 increased by 4.1% as compared to the previous fiscal
 year of 81,119 MWh. This was due to the increased recycled water pumping and groundwater
 recharge activity.

Expenditure

The cost of electricity remains the highest non-labor operations and maintenance (O&M) expenditure for IEUA. In 2021/22, the annual cost for energy related utilities and energy management was \$10.9 million compared to the previous fiscal year of \$9.7 million due to more power consumption, Southern California Edison (SCE) rates increase, and rising energy costs in California. IEUA has a diversified energy procurement approach, that includes on-site generation Power Purchase Agreements (PPA), energy demand management, electricity

purchase from Southern California Edison, and direct access contract with Shell Energy North America, that continues to provide rate stabilization and cost effectiveness.

Renewable Energy Production and Storage

• IEUA's diverse renewable portfolio consists of 5.0 MW solar, 1.0 MW of wind, 3.0 MW of engines, and 4.0 MW battery (Figure 2). The battery storage optimizes energy management by charging from the grid during off-peak periods and discharging during on-peak periods, therefore it is not considered as onsite generation. In order to increase onsite renewable generation, IEUA plans to complete the installation of the necessary emissions control required by South Coast Air Quality Management District to have the Renewable Energy Efficiency Project (REEP) engines operating as part of the RP-5 Expansion project.



Figure 2: IEUA's Diverse Renewable Portfolio

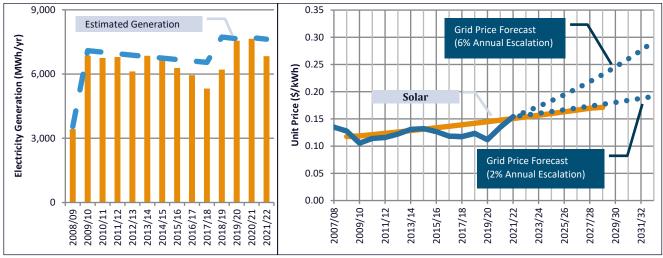
• In 2021/22, 7,520 MWh of electricity was generated onsite, 7.1% less than 2020/21. The decrease is due to performance issues with the solar systems.

- IEUA's renewable portfolio generated 10% of the electricity used in 2021/22. Of the electricity consumed by IEUA;
 - o 6,837 MWh was produced by the solar across IEUA facilities; and
 - o 683 MWh was produced by the wind turbine at RP-4.
- Despite PPA average rates being typically higher than the average grid price in 2021/22, renewable energy projects provided overall \$201,000 in savings, as a result of lower standby charges compared to the facility demand charge rate.
- Generated solar electricity varies throughout the year due to the different number of sunlight hours, solar generation is usually higher in the summer and lower in the winter.
- The REEP engine has been offline since August 2017, operation is expected to restart the engine subsequent to the completion of the RP-5 Biosolids Facility project and the installation of the emission control equipment, which is anticipated in 2025.
- In 2015, IEUA partnered with Advanced Microgrid Solutions (AMS) through an energy management services (EMS) agreement to install 4 MW of battery storage and 1.5 MW of solar to optimize energy management and achieve cost savings through strategic procurement. The RP-1, RP-5, and CCWRF battery storage systems started commercial operation in November 2018, and the RP-4 and IERCF battery storage and solar system began commercial operation in March 2019. All facilities have completed their third year of operation. As of April 2020, the battery systems are now being operated and maintained by Enel X.

SOLAR ENERGY

Solar across IEUA facilities generated 6,837 MWh of renewable energy, **10.6% less than 2020/21.** The decrease in output was due to solar inverters going offline and affecting system production. PPA provider is currently troubleshooting the issue.





For 2021/22, the average SunPower PPA rate for the solar was comparable to the average grid price. However, the solar projects provided approximately \$201,000 in savings, as a result of lower standby charges compared to the facility demand charge rate. The current SunPower PPA will expire in 2029. Staff will negotiate with the provider to extend the contract or purchase the solar, if cost-effective for the Agency.

Solar generated an overall savings of \$533,000 from 2008/09 to 2021/22

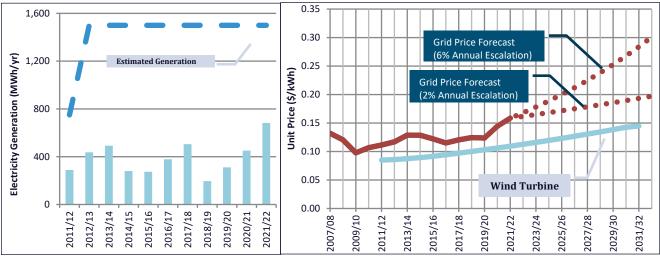

WIND POWER



Wind turbine at RP-4 generated 683 MWh of renewable energy, **51% higher than 2020/21** due to favorable wind conditions. For 2021/22, the PPA rate for the wind turbine was 20% lower than the average grid price. The wind turbine provided approximately \$34,000 in savings.



Wind generated \$101,000 in savings from 2011/12 to 2021/22.

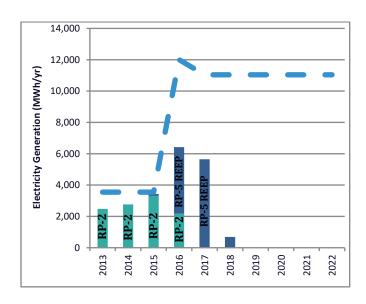

ENGINE



Renewable energy was not generated by the REEP engines since the RP-5 Solids Handling Facility was not operational the entire fiscal year. The REEP engines at RP-5 were put offline in August 2017. The engines are expected to go back online in 2025 after the completion of the RP-5 Biosolids Facility project, and the installation of the SCAQMD required emission controls.





Battery Storage + Solar Performance
The AMS battery storage at RP-1, RP-5 and
CCWRF (2.5 MW combined) started commercial
operation in November 2018, and the 1.5 MW
battery storage at RP-4 and 1.5 MW of solar at
IERCF started commercial operation on March
2019. In the third year of commercial operation,
RP-1, RP-5, and CCWRF experienced an
estimated combined average demand

reduction of 1,200 kW during on-peak hours with a total bill savings of \$117,000. While

approximately an average demand reduction of 450 kW during on-peak hours and solar generation of 2,394 MWh with a total bill savings of \$301,000 in the third term year. Since the minimum guaranteed savings per the contracts were not met, the battery system owners reconciled the remainder of the expected savings to the Agency.



Energy Efficiency Projects

- IEUA continues to work with Southern California Edison and Southern California Regional Energy Network (SoCalREN) to conduct comprehensive energy audits and to implement projects to reduce electricity consumption and demand throughout its facilities and operations.
- Since the start of the partnership in 2015, the Agency's implementation of energy efficiency projects has accumulated:

Expected annual savings: 5,236,000 kWh and \$615,000

o Incentive: \$491,000

Avoided power usage: 474 kW

Aeration Blower Replacement

These projects will replace the existing aeration blowers with energy efficient blowers at RP-4 and CCWRF, which are expected to be completed in October 2022 and January 2024, respectively. In total, both projects are expected to save the Agency an estimated 2,198 MWh/year or \$275,000/year.

CCWRF Odor Control Equipment Replacement

• The CCWRF Improvements project will replace the existing odor control system with biotrickling filters by January 2024. In addition to continuing to address plant odor, the measure will also provide energy savings of about 247 MWh/year or \$31,000/year.

Process Optimization

 Automated ammonia controls will be installed at RP-4 and CCWRF by October 2022 and January 2024, respectively. The ammonia controls will optimize operation and reduce power consumption of the aeration blowers. These projects would result in an estimated savings of 683 MWh/year or \$85,000/year.

Other Projects

Southern California Gas Company (SoCalGas) Interconnection Study

 SoCalGas conducted a renewable natural gas (RNG) interconnection screening study at no cost to the Agency. This preliminary analysis determined the nearest pipeline location with the capacity to accept RNG from RP-1. The SoCalGas Interconnection Study will be utilized in IEUA's RP-1 Beneficial Use of Biogas Feasibility Study update.

RP-5 Solids Handling Facility (SHF) Request for Information

- In FY 20/21, IEUA conducted a business case study to evaluate future uses of the RP-5 SHF, developing the following project alternatives:
 - o Status quo Idle assets and land
 - Lease for organics processing
 - Sell for organics processing
 - Lease as logistics hub
 - Sell as logistics hub
- The study concluded that the preferred alternative at this time is the Status Quo because of the benefits of using the facility as a construction staging site and contractor parking area for the RP-5 Expansion Project, and the costs associated with moving the RP-5 expansion contractor elsewhere.
- IEUA will be issuing a Request for Information (RFI) to gauge market interest in RP-5 SHF from any Private or Public Venture. The responses received will better define the Request for Proposal for a future project.

Upcoming Projects

Energy Service Provider (ESP) RFP

IEUA currently participates in a program known as Direct Access (DA) that allows the purchase
of electricity from an ESP instead of the local utility, SCE. Purchases of electricity through DA
has consistently reduced overall IEUA costs and are an integral part of the IEUA Energy
Management Plan. The Agency currently purchases electricity for the power needed at the
Regional Water Recycling Plant No.1 (RP-1), Regional Water Recycling Plant No.2 (RP-2), and

Carbon Canyon Water Recycling Facility (CCWRF) from Shell Energy North America (US), L.P. under a Master Energy Sales Agreement (MESA), which is set to expire on June 30, 2023. Staff will continue to monitor the energy market, forecast future rates, and compare DA and bundled rates at IEUA's facilities.

SCE Charge Ready 2 Program Update

Through the Charge Ready 2 program, SCE will design, construct, and install electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure. The customer is only required to purchase and install the EV chargers. IEUA submitted applications for charging infrastructure for 4 facilities in 2021. RP-1 is approved for 35 ports, and an agreement between SCE and IEUA has been executed. Applications for CCWRF and Headquarters were considered but did not meet program eligibility requirements. RP-4 project feasibility is still under review.

Beneficial Use of Biogas

• IEUA evaluated opportunities to beneficially use the biogas generated at RP-1 in addition to onsite use for digesters heating. Staff is currently updating the study to consider new technologies, and incorporate recent changes in funding, capital and energy costs.

Other Energy Related Activities

Isle Energy Management & Optimization Partnership

IEUA continues to partner with Isle Utilities along with several agencies nationwide to discuss
the challenges and successes of implementing energy optimization projects. Isle will invite
vendors who will propose successful technologies and practices to reduce and optimize energy
usage and onsite renewable generation.

SCE Rate Increases

During the FY 2021/22, SCE increased their rates by an estimated 10% based on facility billing as compared to the previous fiscal year of 20%. SCE is expected to increase rates about 3% from June 2022 to the end of 2022 and is forecasting a slowdown in rate increases. Staff is working with SCE to validate the billing accuracy and will continue to collaborate with the utility to enroll in the most cost-effective available rate.

Enrolling in SCE's Green Rate

SCE Green Rate Program gives the opportunity to purchase electricity from 100% renewable resources for commercial accounts with average usage of 782 kWh/month or lower. In January 2022 staff enrolled all 33 eligible accounts to the Green Rate to reduce the Agency's GHG emissions and minimize carbon footprint at no additional cost.

Climate Change Action Plan

In 2018, IEUA staff developed a Climate Change Action Plan that described the vision and direction needed to bolster IEUA's water management system and minimize its carbon footprint. IEUA is following AB 32 standards using the oldest emission baseline data available to reduce GHG levels to 2007 levels by 2020, 40 percent below 2007 levels by 2030, and 80 percent below 2007 levels by 2050. 2021 greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) slightly increased 1.7% from 2020, which is 62% below the 2007 baseline levels.

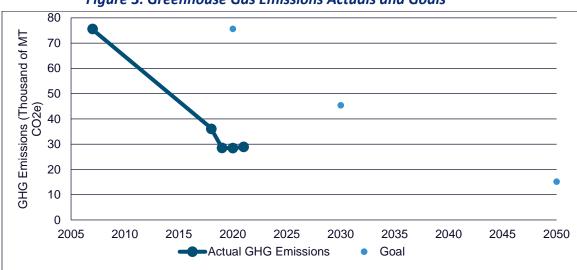


Figure 3: Greenhouse Gas Emissions Actuals and Goals

• IEUA is planning to implement capital projects and will continue to optimize operations and maintenance activities to allow the Agency to continue to prepare its system for the effects of climate change by focusing on increasing the use of zero-carbon energy sources and reducing energy consumption. The majority of the projects being explored fall into four categories, solar, hydropower, biogas (renewable methane), and energy efficiency. The current list of projects being explored by IEUA, are in varying degrees of planning and review with some being feasible for pre-design as soon as 2023 while others are 10 or more years out.

Potential projects

- o Solar:
 - evaluating feasibility for remote solar and battery storage system through a public private partnership to generate bill credits through the Renewable Energy Self-Generation Bill Credit Transfer (RES BCT) program
 - favorable outlook for the carport solar because of the forecasted SCE rate increase and higher facility load.
- Hydropower: a feasibility study conducted in FY 19/20 at two proposed locations deemed the project to be not feasible. Staff will re-evaluate in the future.
- Biogas: staff is currently updating the RP-1 Beneficial Use of Biogas Feasibility Study to evaluate cost effective alternative consistent with the Agency's Business Goals.
- o Energy efficiency: multiple ongoing expected to be completed by 2023, RP-4 blowers and ammonia controls expected to be online in September 2022.

Executive Summary:

The Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs for the month ended August 31, 2022 is submitted in a format consistent with the State requirements.

For the month of August 2022, total cash, investments, and restricted deposits of \$491,327,231 reflects a decrease of \$7,819,116 compared to the total of \$499,146,347 reported for July 2022. The decrease can be attributed due to State Revolving Fund loans debt service and construction payments primarily for the RP-5 Expansion project. As a result, the average days cash on hand for the month ended August 2022 decreased from 251 days to 244 days.

The unrestricted Agency investment portfolio yield in August 2022 was 1.213 percent, a slight increase of 0.018 percent compared to the July 2022 yield of 1.195 percent. The change in yield is mainly attributed to market conditions and an increased earnings yield in the Local Agency Investment Fund and the California Asset Management Program (CAMP) accounts.

Background

The Treasurer's Report of Financial Affairs for the month ended August 31, 2022, is submitted in a format consistent with State requirements. The monthly report denotes investment transactions that have been executed in accordance with the Agency's Investment Policy (Resolution No. 2022-4-8).

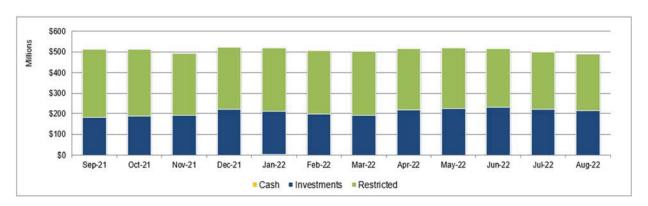


Figure 1: Cash, Investments, and Restricted Deposits

Agency total cash, investments, and restricted deposits for the month of August 2022 was \$491.3 million, a decrease of \$7.8 million compared to the \$499.1 million reported for the month ended July 2022 as shown in Figure 1. The decrease can be attributed due to State Revolving Fund loan debt service and construction payments primarily for the RP-5 Expansion project.

PFM continues to focus on investment discipline and maintaining a neutral duration strategy to ensure current investments align with the Agency's Investment Policy's goals of preservation of capital in the overall portfolio, provide sufficient liquidity to meet to operating requirements, and attain a market rate of return throughout budgetary and economic cycles.

Table 1 below represents the unrestricted Agency investment portfolio by authorized investment and duration with a total portfolio amount of \$211.0 million. The Agency portfolio excludes cash and restricted deposits in the amount of \$280.3 million held by member agencies and with fiscal agents, including \$137.1 million in capitalized interest and debt proceeds for the RP-5 Expansion Project.

Figure 2: Days Cash on Hand – 12 Month Rolling Average

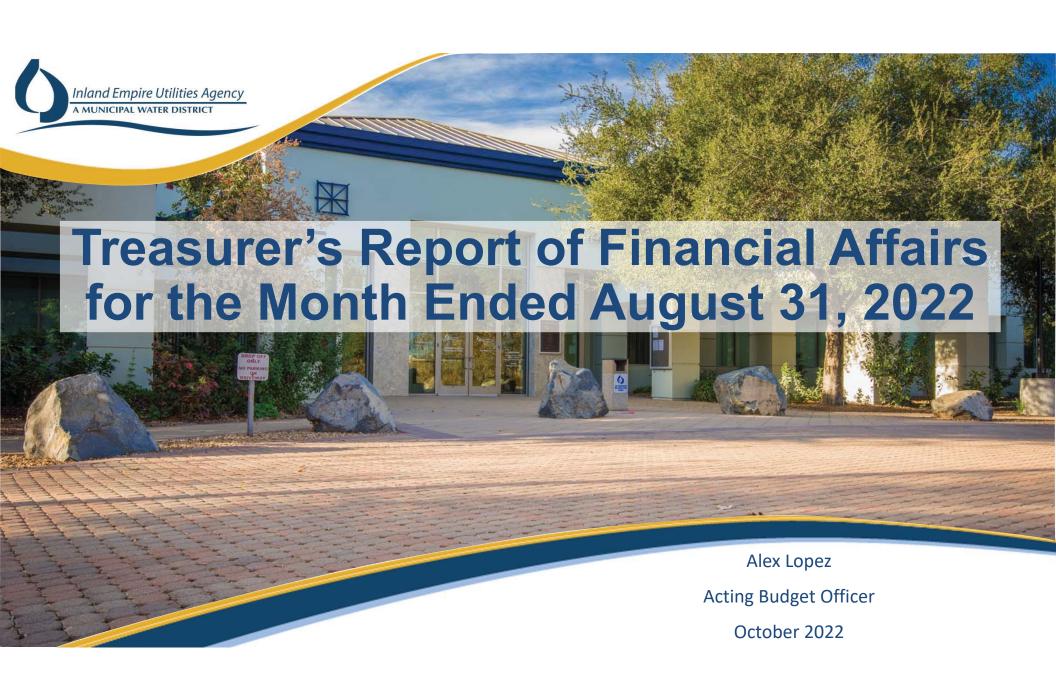

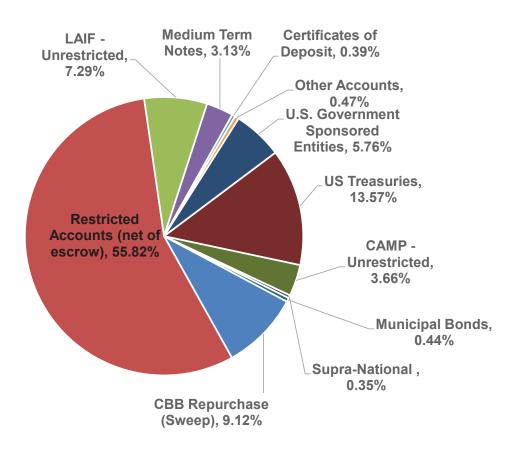

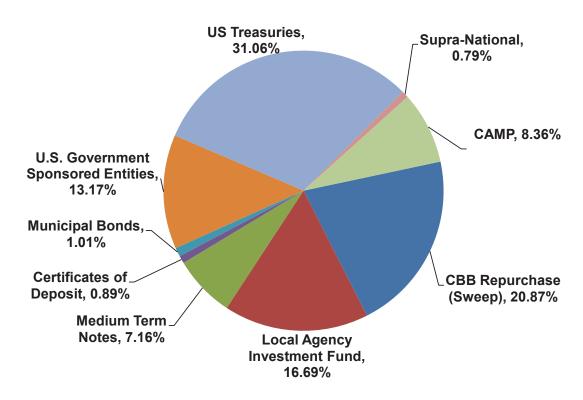

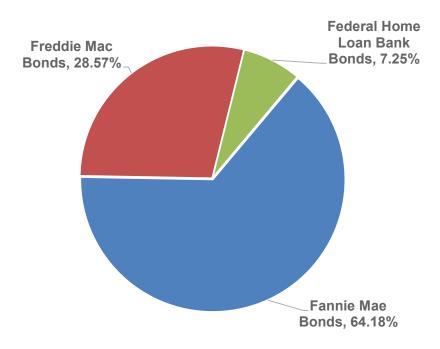

Month Ended August 31, 2022 Unrestricted Agency Investment Portfolio \$210,977,341

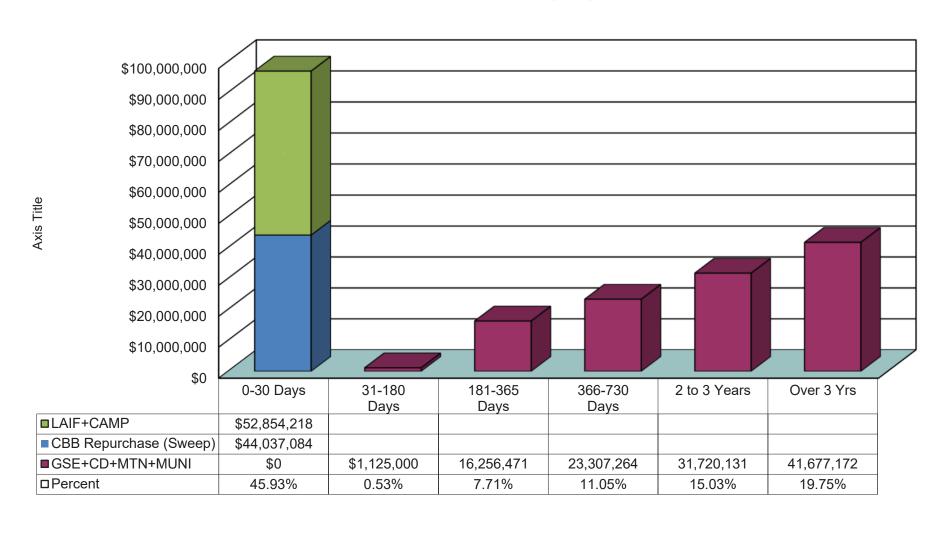


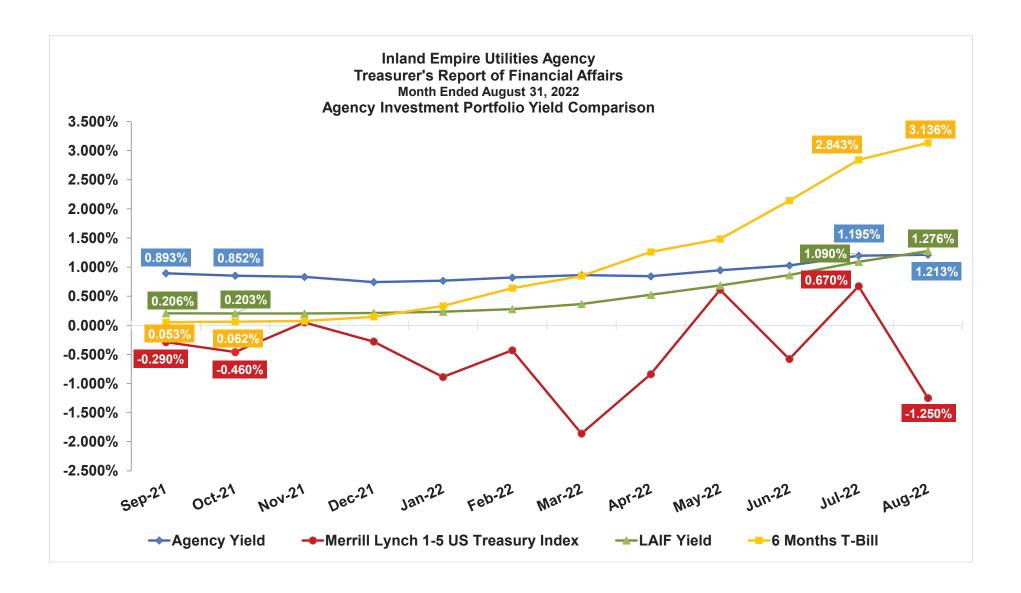

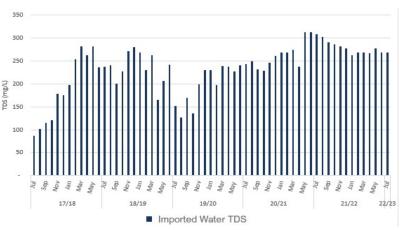
Imported Water

(FY 2018/19 to 2022/23)



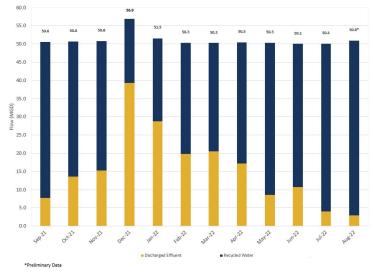


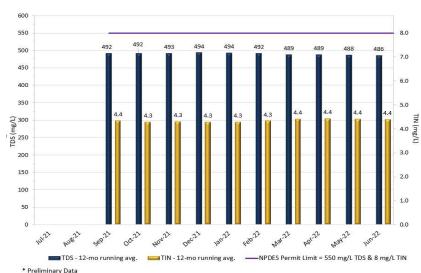


Recycled Water

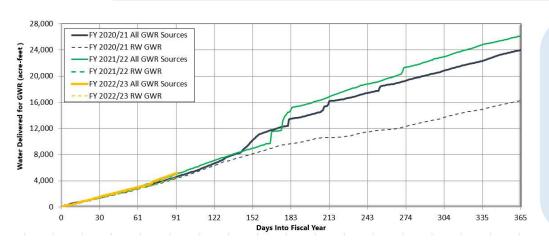
Recycled Water Use







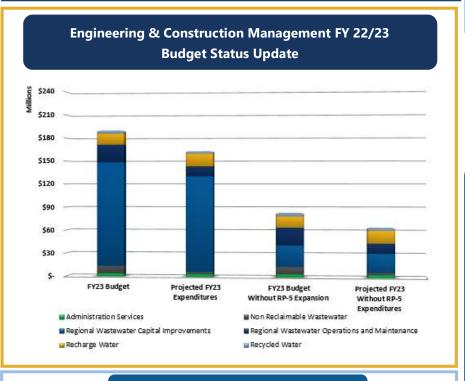
Groundwater Recharge

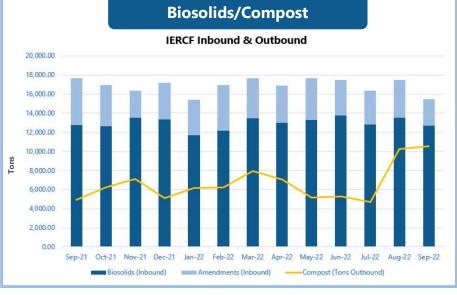
