

WATER DISCOVERY FIELD TRIP



A: Dear Brave Bird Watcher,

Woo-HOO-HOO! I sure enjoy meeting fellow wildlife fans. Bird watching is a great skill and a fun hobby. I'm sure you're always impressing your friends with your sharp eyes. Like me, Green Herons are known residents at the Chino Creek Wetlands and Educational Park. These birds are commonly spotted because of their bright yellow eyes and shorter necks.

To answer your question, I do not believe your friend seeing a Green Heron bird at the Park was a coincidence, but there were probably a few factors that contributed to them spotting these birds. First, guests are asked to stay on the paths. Secondly, guests are encouraged to quietly admire the birds and keep noise down.

The Chino Creek Wetlands and Educational Park is home not only to Green Herons but other wildlife, and it's important to be respectful of their homes. During your visit, you may come across bird boxes, and sometimes birds will gather around them. Never touch the bird boxes or feed wildlife. Your presence should not disturb the animal's normal behaviors. If it does, it's a sign that you're too close!

After all is said and done, remember to always be patient when bird watching. While some birds sing and announce their lovely presence, other birds tend to be quieter and blend into the wetlands and trees. Spotting a bird might only become obvious when you stay still for a while. My friend, the Green Heron, is commonly spotted around lakes, ponds, marshes, and swamps, but sometimes their color might also make them camouflage, too. My bonus tip is to not walk with binoculars on as you may be prone to tripping. Could be (H)awkward!

SPECIES SPOTLIGHT

PLANT: COYOTE BRUSH

The Coyote Brush is part of the sunflower family and is drought-tolerant. Native to California, the plant flourishes in sun and shade. It can reach between 4 - 6 feet in length. With its late bloom of August - December, the Coyote Brush's small flowers are an essential nectar for wasps and small butterflies within the wetlands.



American Coot

ANIMAL: AMERICAN COOT

The American Coots are dark-gray to black birds with a recognizable bright-white bill and forehead. This bird is commonly mistaken as a duck due to their body size, but the Coot is part of the Rallidae family. However, similar to ducks, they can be found in ponds, marshes, and wetlands, as this is where they form their habitats and forge their food. The American Coot redefines the saying: If it looks like a duck and walks like a duck, it must be a duck.










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
